





The 1965 grain sorghum crop was the largest ever in Texas and the Nation. National production was 666,062,000 bushels, 35% above last year and 21% above the five-year average. The biggest production shift came in the 13-county North Plains of Texas area which produced 81,111,600 bushels of grain sorghum in 1965 which was 12% of the national production and 21% of the Texas production.

The Coastal Bend area around Corpus Christi also registered increases in grain sorghum production. Nueces County moved up to the 4th place producer in the State with 12,784,000 bushels. Even in the heart of the traditional cotton area of the South Plains, grain sorghum showed gains. Lubbock County itself leaped from 4,715,000 bushels in 1964 to 6,104,000 bushels in 1965.

It is expected that the increasing grain sorghum production trend will continue this year, particularly in the North Plains, Coastal Bend and South Plains.

Along with these production increases, utilization of grain sorghum has steadily increased at home and abroad through intensive promotion program by Grain Sorghum Producers Association. When such programs were started in 1956, livestock use of sorghum was 179 million bushels, now it is 479 million. Exports in the same period have moved from 22 million bushels to over 200 million in 1965. The other major uses of grain sorghum, commercial and industrial, now promises to double with the opening of the new wet milling plant to be built at Dimmitt. Floyd County Sorghum Pro-

For Most Prompt Coverage Apply For Medicare Before 65th Birthday

Hale and Floyd County residents who have a 65th birthday in 1966 will be protected by Medicare's medical insurance at the earliest date only if they apply during the three months before they become 65.

Mancie King, social security officer-in-charge in Plainview, said today that if they wait to apply for monthly benefits or Medicare until the month they become 65 or later, their protection under Medicare doctor-bill insurance will not begin until some months after

they are 65. King explained that each person who reaches 65 on or after January 1, 1966, has a sevenmonth period during which he may enroll for the supplementary medical insurance plan, but the effective date of this protection depends on the date of his application. This individual enrollment period begins with the third month before he is 65 and ends in the third month after his 65th birthday. As an example, King said, if an application is not filed until the month after a person becomes 65, medical insurance coverage does not begin until the first day of the second month after he applies.

The 1965 grain sorghum crop was the largest ever in Texas and the Nation. National production was 666,062,000 bushels, 35% above last year and 21% above the five-year average. The biggest production shift came in the 13-county North Plains of Texas area which produced 81,111,600 bushels of grain sorghum in 1965 which was 12% of the national production and 21% of the Texas production.

The Coastal Bend area around Corpus Christi also registered increases in grain sorghum production, Nueces County moved up to the 4th place producer in the State with 12,784,000 bushels. Even in the heart of the traditional cotton area of the South Plains, grain sorghum showed gains. Lubbock County itself leaped from 4,715,000 bushels in 1964 to 6,104,000 bushels in 1965.

It is expected that the increasing grain sorghum production trend will continue this year, particularly in the North Plains, Coastal Bend and South Plains.

Along with these production increases, utilization of grain sorghum has steadily increased at home and abroad through intensive promotion program by Grain Sorghum Producers Association. When such programs were started in 1956, livestock use of sorghum was 179 million bushels, now it is 479 million. Exports in the same period have moved from 22 million bushels to over 200 million in 1965. The other major uses of grain sorghum, commercial and industrial, now promises to double with the opening of the new wet milling

plant to be built at Dimmitt, Floyd County Sorghum Pro-

For Most Prompt Coverage Apply For Medicare Before 65th Birthday

Hale and Floyd County residents who have a 65th birthday in 1966 will be protected by Medicare's medical insurance at the earliest date only if they apply during the three months before they become 65. Mancie King, social security officer-in-charge in Plainview, said today that if they wait to apply for monthly benefits or Medicare until the month they become 65 or later, their protection under Medicare doctor-bill insurance will not begin until some months after

they are 65. King explained that each person who reaches 65 on or after January 1, 1966, has a sevenmonth period during which he may enroll for the supplementary medical insurance plan, but the effective date of this protection depends on the date of his application. This individual enrollment period begins with the third month before he is 65 and ends in the third month after his 65th birthday. As an example, King said, if an application is not filed until the month after a person becomes 65, medical insurance coverage does not begin until the first day of the second month after he applies.

E-H SERIES

Bond Buyers Urged To Note Increased Limitations

Don L. Pemberton, Chairman of the U. S. Savings Bonds volunteer committee for Floyd County, today urged bond buy-ers to take advantage of the new higher annual limitations on holdings of E and H Bonds which have been announced by the Treasury Department. The new regulations provide that eligible purchasers may own up to \$20,000, maturity value in Series E Bonds bought in any one calendar year, and \$30,000 face value, in H Bonds, Previous limits were \$10,000 and \$20,000 respectively.

Calling attention to the fact that the interest rate on Savings Bonds was recently increased to 4.15%, Pemberton called the new purchase limit "an unusual opportunity" for both individual and institutional investors to become "larger shareholders in their country."

Under Treasury regulations,

any resident of the United States or citizens temporarily residing abroad, may own Savings Bonds in a choice of registrations: single owner, co-owner, or beneficiary. Where bonds are purchased in the names of two individuals as co-owners, each may hold the maximum amount of either E or HBonds, or both. Bonds may also be owned by corporations, associations, public or private organizations, fiduciaries, and other investors except com-

mercial banks.

The License and Weight Service was in effect the pioneer of the four uniformed services as they are constituted today. License and Weight Patrolmen are charged with responsibilities that are highly specialized in regulating commercial motor vehicle traffic on Texas highways.

The actual work performed ranges from on-the-road checking of trucks for size. weight, registration, equipment and motor carrier violations to the detailed examination of transportation records in the offices of shippers of all types of commodities. The Driver License Servic.

is in a way the first line of defense for the general public against dangerous motor operators. Driver License patrolmen are charged with the heavy responsibility of screening all persons seeking the privilege of driving over the public streets and highways of Texas. Currently, there are more than 4,800,000 Texans enjoying this privilege.

The purpose of the Motor Vehicle Inspection program is to discover any maladjustment which might become a link in a cycle of events leading to an accident-and by removing the like, prevent the accident.

There is no way to measure how many lives have been saved in Texas since the program began in 1951. However, the re-cords indicate that vehicle defects figured in 13 per cent of the fatal accidents at that time, whereas 10 years later they were causative factors in only four per cent of the fatal accidents. Thus, the importance of this program -- and the task of the patrolmen who administer it-can readily be seen.

The Department of Public Safety patrolmen-trainees are trained in one of the finest police academies in the nation. located in Austin adjacent to the State Headquarters.

At this modern and comfortable plant, all patrolmen go through a rugged but rerding program of 16 weeks the end of which the success-

The training of a DPS patrolman is a test of an individual's intellectural, emotional and physical stamina. It is an educational process which prepares him for a career in one of the most complex professions in America today-the field of law enforcement.

This complexity is due to the very nature of the work-dealing with people who are under emotional stress.

Therefore, a patrolman must be taught to recognize this and control any situation that might arise. The intensive training given a patrol-trainee prepares him for dealing with unusual situations under adverse conditions.

The nature of police work is demanding on the patrolman, for it deals with getting people to conform to the rules and regulations of society with

a minimum amount of friction. At the end of two years of satisfactory performance the patrolman is eligible to compete in promotional examinations to advance to the rank of sergeant, or to vacancies which may exist in the Narcotics Section, the Intelligence Section, or in other specialized services of the Department of Public Safety. He also is eligible to apply for transfer

to the Safety Education Service. After five years, the patrolman may apply for promotion to the Texas Rangers, if he can meet the qualifications.

To become a patrolman a person must be a male, age 21 to 35 inclusive, not less than 5 feet, eight inches, not less than two pounds nor more than three pounds per inch of height. He should be in sound physical condition, have a minimum of 20/30 without corrective lenses and must not be color blind.

He must have a high school education or the equivalent and must be a citizen of the United States, and a resident of Texas for at least one year immediately preceding the date of application, unless a resident applicant has been out of the state due to military service during this period.

Infestation Of Grasshoppers Noted Near Edge Of Caprock

by Joe Wilson

A heavy infestation of grasshoppers has developed along the edge of the Caprock in the North Eastern part of the county. The grasshoppers are con-

fined to pasture land now due to lack of crops on cultivated land, The largest populations are along a line east of South Plains and Cedar Hill about 1/2 mile from the edge of the Caprock

escarpment. Counts ran as high as 30 young hoppers per square yard in some pastures. Entomologists estimate that only one out of every 3 young grasshoppers reach the adult stage, so the count taken would indicate that about 10 hoppers per square yard would reach the adult

The population counts have been even higher in Brisco County than in Floyd County.

Grasshoppers can be controlled with any of the following recommended insecticides at the amount per acre given below: Malathion 1 quart; Sevin (80%) 1 1/2 lbs.; Aldrin 1/2 pint; Teaphene 1 quart; or Heptachlor 3/4 pint. Heptachlor and Aldrin should

not be used if dairy animals or animals to be slaughtered within 90 days are to graze the pasture. Aldrin should be applied only once per season. If toxophene

is used do not graze dairy animals within 5 weeks of slaughter or do not apply toxophene to forage to be sold commer-cially or shipped interstate.

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

Supreme Court **Upholds Ruling**

The Texas Supreme Court Wednesday upheld a 110th District Court decision issued in Floyd County, and T. C. Hollums of Floyd County will collect \$875 from R. D. Sharkey of Hale County

Hollums collected on the conversion of personal property and improvements on 160 acres of land in Floyd County which were deeded by Sharkey to G. W. Robertson without Hollums'

Hollums allegedly was given prior guarantee any improvements made on the land would be his own, and that the owner of the land would have no title to the improvements.

An irrigation farmer, Hollums was a tenant on the land since 1945, and Sharkey was a purchaser and seller of the tract.

The trial court ruled Hollums owed Sharkey \$3,250 in farm rent that Sharkey owed Hollums \$3,-250 for the agreed price of personal prosperty and improvements and Hollums should get \$875 for the conversion of the personal property to Robert-

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
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
