## "Howdy! Pioneers And Old Settlers"

Floydada will open its arms today and extend warmest affections to the many pioneers and old settlers who will return to the city for the annual Old Settlers Reunion held each May 28.

A number of activities are planned, in addition to just visiting and getting re-acquainted with friends, some of whom haven't seen each other for several years.

A total of 588 old settlers registered for the event last year, but that was a special occasion, commemorating the 75th anniversary of the founding of Floyd County. However, the year before a total of 567 registered. Those who were here 20 years ago may register as old settlers but one must have been in this county 40 years ago to partake of the noon meal free.

**WESTERN ATTIRE**  
Of course, the usual Western Attire will be the dress of the day, partly because of the reunion and partly because of the rodeo that will be going on at that time.

A few of the men in Floydada have grown beards, or mustaches for the occasion, but the residents as a whole haven't shown as much of the spirit as last year, so fewer beards can be seen.

**PARADE**  
A parade, which is one of the highlights of the day, is scheduled to begin at 2:00 p.m. Saturday afternoon.

Prizes will be awarded to the best community float, best commercial float, best junior cowboy, best junior cowgirl, best antique auto, best all-around cowboy and others. Several baseball teams are expected to march in the parade.

A total of \$600 has been offered as prizes in the past, and a similar amount is expected to be paid out this year.

In addition to the prizes mentioned above, cash awards will also go to the sponsor of the best antique window. Mrs. Eugene Beedy is in charge of that event.

Floyd Jackson of Lockney is in charge of the parade and

A carnival is already set up near the square and will continue to operate under the sponsorship of the Lions Club through Saturday night.

## School Receives Grant For Head Start Program

### Eight Week Summer Session Planned

A telegram received by the Hesperian Tuesday, from Congressman George Mahon stated that the Office of Economic Opportunity has approved an application made by the Floydada School personnel for a summer Head Start grant in the amount of \$11,372 and will provide a program for 45 children.

Presently the school, to be conducted at Andrews Ward, will be an eight week program. The school personnel plan to apply for a year program, limited to six months actual teaching, to begin in September and run with the local school term.

According to W. P. Nicholson, principal at Andrews Ward, the program will start in the early part of June, the first or second week, and will be concluded the last of July.

That school was selected for the site of the program because of the cafeteria facilities and because of the playground equipment. The students, all of whom will enter the first grade this September, will be fed the noon meal at school.

Tentatively the school hours have been set for 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. five days per week.

Under the Head Start program the local district must provide a minimum of 10 per cent of the amount the Federal government is providing. This can be done in money, facilities

### Floydada Airport Construction Contract To Be Let Soon

According to a report from city manager Bill Feuerbacher the city engineer is fast winding up final plans for bids on the new Floydada airport and it is possible that construction could start in July.

The \$135,000 airport will be located on a 74-acre strip of land off the northeast corner of the town section. Land will be purchased from J. R. Turner.

The land runs parallel with the Silverton highway for one mile and is approximately 500

feet wide. A paved north-south landing strip will be around 3,700 feet long and 50 feet wide.

An access road and site for hangars are included in the project. Hangars will be provided later.

Total cost of the project is \$135,432. The Federal government has granted \$67,716, the state government \$12,000, the city of Floydada \$10,000 engineering costs and local individual donations of \$15,000.

The deficit of \$30,716 has been underwritten by the city. It is thought that of this amount around \$8,000 will be returned in the form of use of city and county equipment on the project and that the airport financial committee will raise another \$5,000 from individuals. Savings on the cost of fence around the project and other items of construction also are possibilities in getting the cost to the city down.

### Heavy Damage In Wreck West Of Floydada Recently

A two-car mishap 1.5 miles west of Floydada recently, resulted in the total loss of one vehicle and heavy damage to another. Only one of the three occupants of the cars needed overnight hospitalization.

Guadalupe DeLeon was driving west on FM 207 in a '66 Pontiac belonging to Junior Martinez with Martinez as a passenger, when a '40 Ford Coupe, driven by Joseph McKaskle, pulled onto the highway. The collision occurred in the intersection, according to DPS officials.

DeLeon was admitted to Peoples Hospital and required overnight treatment. The accident occurred around 2:30 a.m. Sunday, May 15.

All three men live at Floydada.

### Overstreet Family Gets Region Award

The R. W. Overstreet family was named the Outstanding Farm Family of Region I at Hereford last week. Last September the family was named the Outstanding Conservation Family of the Floyd County Soil Conservation District.

The Region is made up of 51 counties in the Texas Panhandle and the South Plains Area.

Around 500 old settlers are expected to register for the big event and the local Chamber of Commerce members would like the city to help get into the spirit of the celebration by dressing in Western Attire.

### Businesses To Close Monday, Memorial Day

According to the Retail Trades Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, next Monday, May 30, Memorial Day is an official Floydada holiday, therefore most of the firms in Floydada will be closed that day.

Last year a few firm managers felt they could not close their stores Memorial Day for it fell on Saturday, one of the best business days, so some stayed open.

However, Monday, is not one of the big business days and most firms are expected to be closed.

There are five official holidays in Floydada, New Year's Day, Memorial Day, July 4, Thanksgiving and Christmas.

### AN EDITORIAL

#### Rising Costs And Further Delay In Building The New Hospital Unless....

Unless the citizens of this community can raise \$68,000 by June 5th, the architects will have to make new plans for the Caprock District Hospital, the construction of the hospital will be delayed possibly a year, and the quality of hospital for the money will be lowered, due to creeping inflationary building costs.

About a month ago the hospital board opened bids for the construction of the new hospital and the lowest bid was over \$100,000 over the amount of money that was in hand to build the hospital. The delay in building the hospital of some two and a half to three years since the architect's original estimate caught the project in a 15% construction increase.

The hospital board and the architect have worked with the lowest bidder and have now got the deficit money needed down to \$68,000. State and federal boards will allow the community until June 5th to raise the \$68,000, or plans and bidding will have to be redrawn. . . . which means additional delay and less hospital for the money due to the increasing construction costs.

The board reports that there is no more government grant money available. . . . the difference in building costs can only come from this community and it is not possible through the taxation arrangements of the creation of the hospital district.

Last week the board came together in a "town hall" type meeting at the local bank with sixty interested citizens. At this meeting it was decided to attempt to raise the needed money by personal solicitation.

At present \$28,505 has been raised or pledged by over forty firms, individuals and clubs. A committee is being selected to make personal contacts.

Many persons have signed a note at the bank payable in February of 1968 for amounts of \$500 to \$1,000. The donations are deductible from income taxes.

**MEMORIAL GIFTS**  
Members of the hospital board are interested in talking to any individual or family who might be interested in giving the money as a memorial gift.

**BUYING INDUSTRY**  
The following statement is made by Ray Reed, head of the industrial committee of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce in regard to the new hospital, "actually, the money given now to cinch the building of the new hospital should be considered as an investment in a new industry in Floydada. The operation of a hospital means the employment of more people and that payroll in circulation means another industry in business in this community. Of course, we don't have a chance in going out and getting more industry for this community unless we do have a modern adequate hospital. There is no need to organize an industrial foundation unless we can secure this new hospital now." Reed concluded.

**HUMAN WELFARE**  
A statement by Ralph Mardis, president of the Floydada chamber of commerce points out the most important aspects of the need for the new hospital: "Several points can be considered in evaluating the necessity of a local modern hospital. The most important is human welfare. When human suffering is involved, the best care we can get, in a lot of instances, is too little.

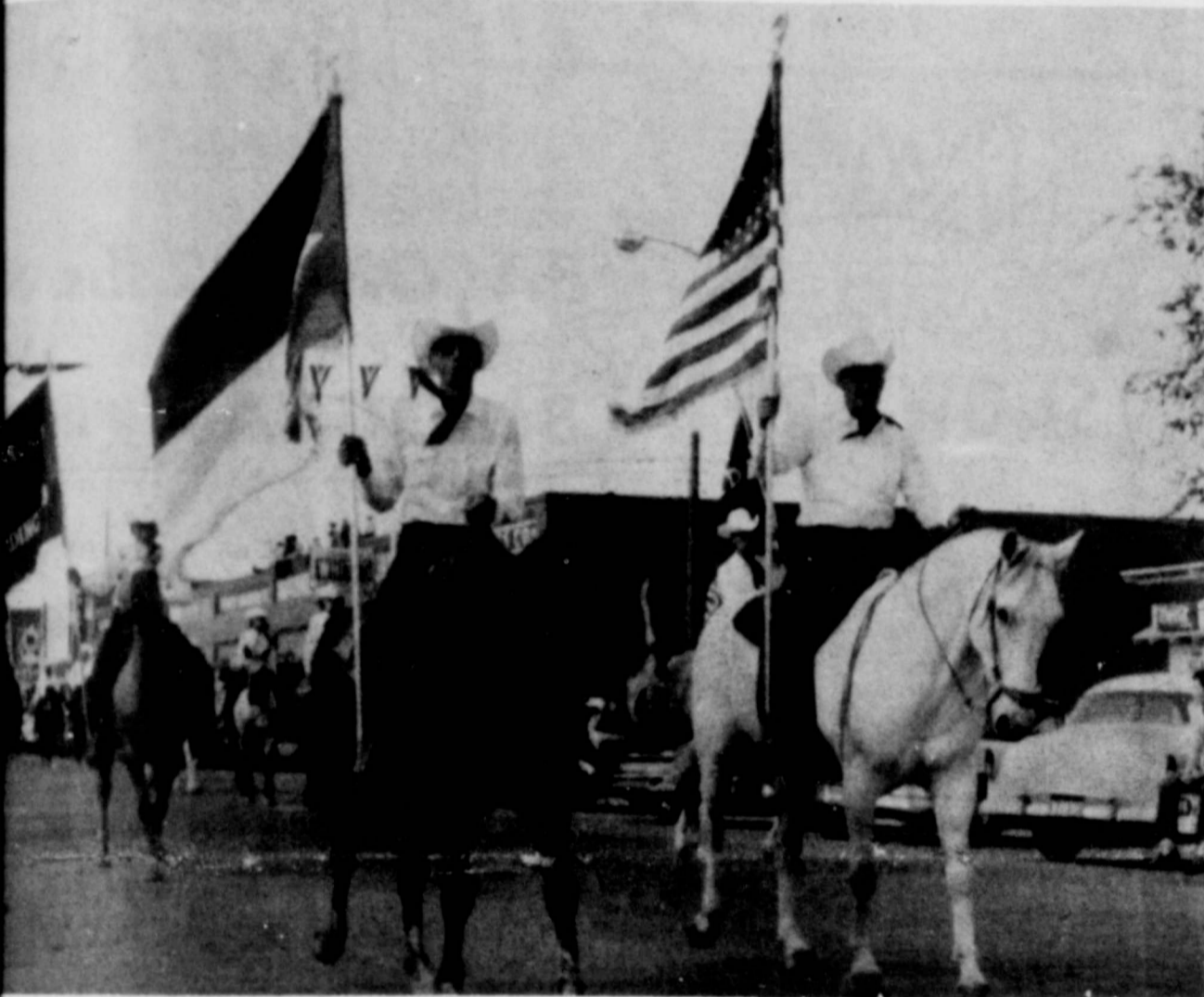

### J. E. Newton Home Burns To Ground

The home of the late J. E. Newton, in Dougherty, and Mrs. Newton who now resides in a convalescent home in Lubbock, burned to the ground early Sunday morning. Nothing could be salvaged in the 3:50 a.m. blaze which routed the townspeople of Dougherty who went to the scene to give assistance.

R. D. Holly and wife, whose home is across the road from the Newton place, was the first to notice the blaze. He promptly called the Floydada Fire Department, then notified all nearby neighbors, who in a matter of minutes were at the Newton place to help. However the roof was blazing and falling in by that time and nothing could be saved.

The three bedroom brick

home, which was well furnished, was still smoldering late Sunday. The Holly home and the Bob Covington home, close by, were hosed down in order that sparks would not ignite them. Vehicles parked in the Newton garage, and other out buildings were not damaged.

Glenn White, son of Mrs. J. E. Newton, was residing in the Newton home, however he had been gone since Friday visiting in Lubbock and was not home at the time of the blaze.

Friends said the Newtons had been bothered with field mice coming into the home and there was a possibility that they had gotten into some matches in the house, which they ignited, or faulty wiring could have caused the fire.

Congratulations to Clem McDonald, owner of the building, Builders Mart, contractors with Pike Hanna, and to the United States government represented by local postmaster Ed Wester.

(It's real unusual when a fellow gets to congratulate the U. S. government).

I SURELY hope Floydada doesn't get as big as New York. I see in this issue of Newsweek that they're breathing a considerable amount of poisonous air in New York City. Smokestacks annually discharge 597,000 tons of sulphur dioxide over the rooftops; the city's 7.5 million residents produce an average of 29.6 million pounds of combustible waste a day; and each of its 1.5 million vehicles averages a ton's output of carbon monoxide each year. In fact they are breathing the most poisonous air in America.

In fact the average New Yorker has to contend with more than five times his weight each year in noxious... materials.

I suggest that the local chamber of commerce officials get a group to New York at once and sell them on the idea of moving to Floydada where the "breathing is easy."

But like I said, we don't want all those New Yorkers to move here... say some 5,000. I always figured a town of 10,000 was a good average size. (... and if we don't get this new hospital, we aren't going to keep the 5,000 we've got).

MATADOR'S Douglas Meador gave a very inspiring talk on the establishment of museums in Floyd and Motley Counties at the Rotary luncheon yesterday. Here's a man who has seen first hand the development of this country from the day of the early pioneer and we believe like Doug that this is something that our county needs.

FLOYDADA community is no different from Plainview or Lubbock, both of whom are soliciting money for the building of new hospitals. The main difference in these situations is of course that Plainview and Lubbock have a lot more doctors and facilities for use in the meantime than we.

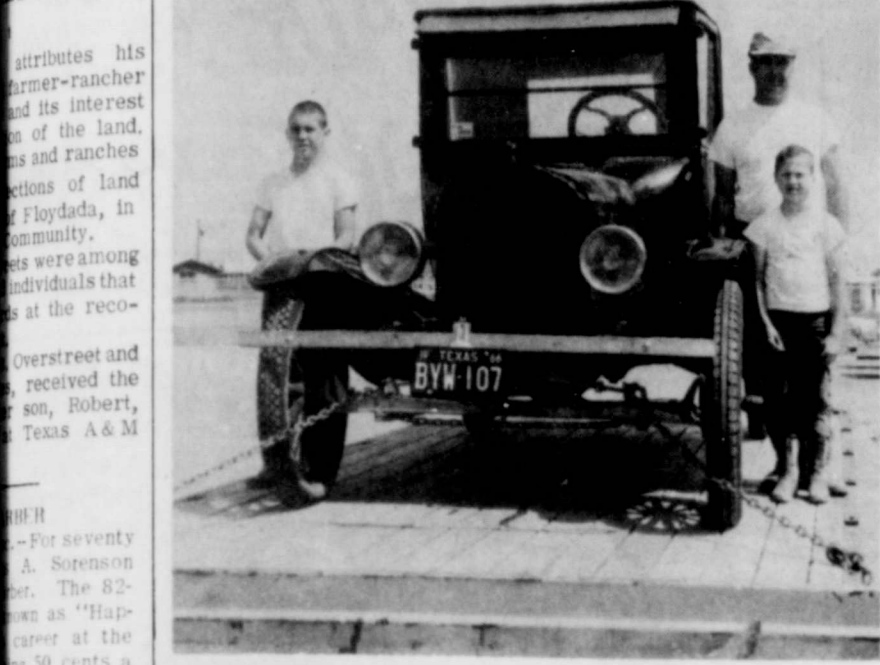

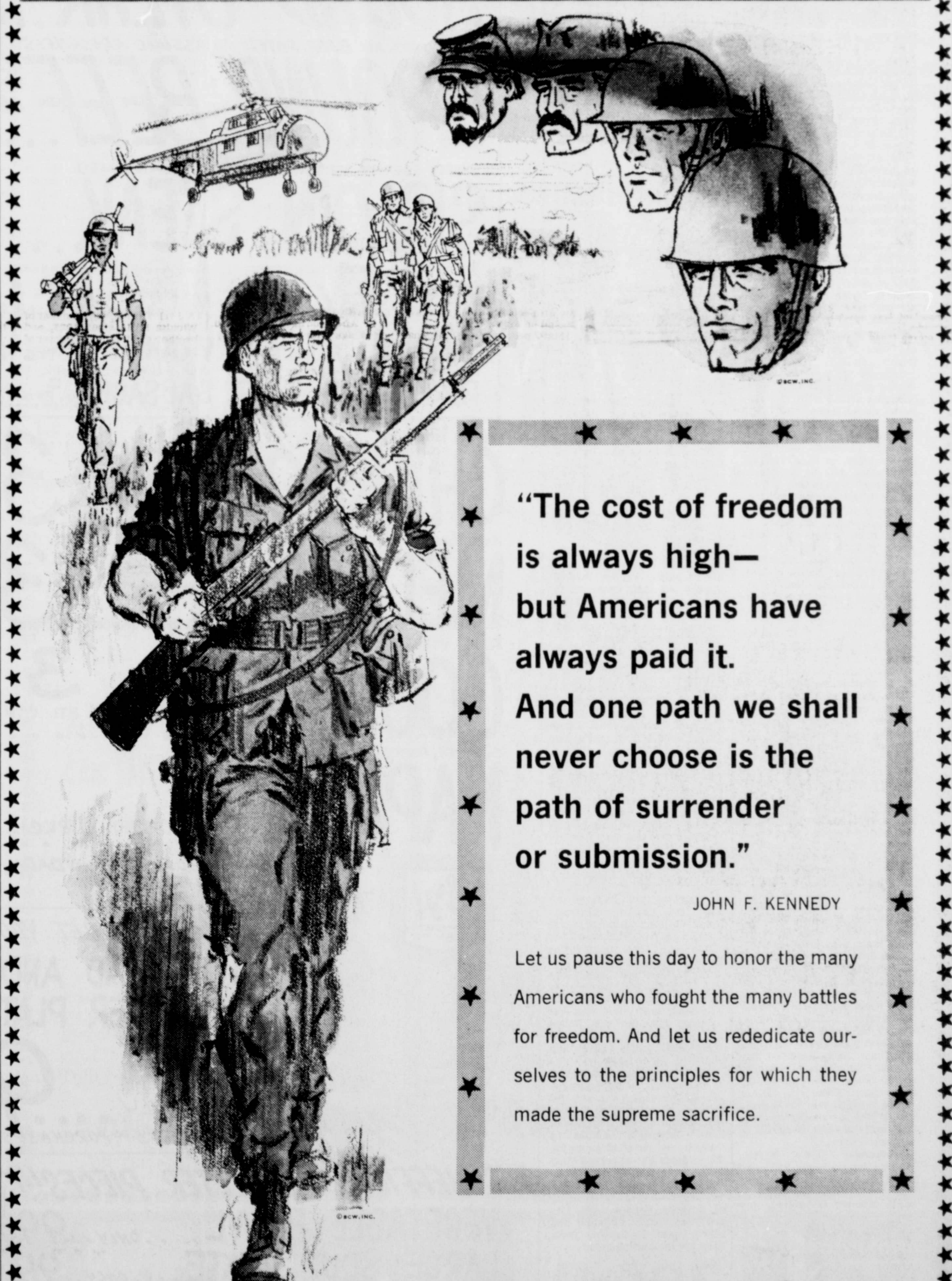

# Life Of J.A.T. Pearson Reveals Much Of Early Floyd County Days

Besides being a rancher and farmer Dad was a carpenter. He helped everyone that needed carpenter work done, and also built windmill towers. Once he was at the top of a 30 foot windmill tower when suddenly the wind changed, knocking him to the ground. With a few cuts and bruises and three broken ribs he rode the three or four miles home on horseback.

Dad was a member of the Methodist Church, a member of the Masonic Lodge, and the Odd Fellows, and was one of the Trustees' at Sunset School District as far back as I can remember. More than once he gave a beef to be barbecued to help feed the people at the picnics--both at Floydada and Lockney. He spent his life trying to accommodate and to make someone else happy.

I am reminded of a terrific electric storm one summer day, with the wind and rain it drifted a bunch of the cattle along the bob wire fence and with one bolt of lightning, killed five of them.

My Mother had a big part in all of the work and worry of raising a big family. Along with cooking, washing, ironing, sewing, mending clothes and keeping the children in school, she baked 10 to 12 loaves of bread every other day--besides hot biscuits and corn bread. She canned fruit and vegetables, even dried fruit, beans and corn.

We sometimes milked as many as 20 cows, twice a day. We had our own milk and butter, and raised our meat and lard, chickens and eggs. My mother sold eggs as low as 8¢ and 10¢ per dozen. Mother passed away July 1933.

Dad went to Estelline for some of the groceries and supplies, which took three and four days to make the trip, and if the weather was bad it took even longer.

Then tragedy came, Dad had Cancer. He went to Dallas for treatment. He was there for quite a long time, and when he came home he got along fine for about 18 months, then it broke out again, and he went back to Dallas for more treatments, but came home, and after two years or so of suffering he passed away on July 3, 1905. He is buried at Lockney, Texas.

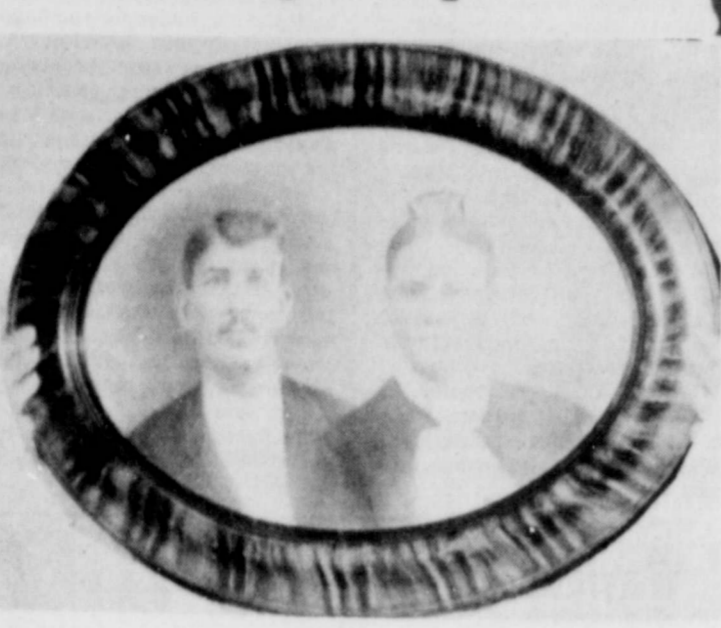
After the death of my Father, Mother rented out the old home place and built a house on the north east corner of the same section and farmed on a smaller scale. I drove four horses to a plow from sun up till sun down many a day, and many mornings we arose to eat our breakfast, milk the cows, do all the chores, and go to the field to wait for it to get light enough to start picking cotton. Although I didn't realize it then, those were our happiest days.

To supplement the income Mother bid on the mail route that ran from Curlew to Lockney--known as the "Star-Route"--and got it for four long years. The schedule was for three trips a week--Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday--round trip, with delivery of mail in boxes along the route. In four years the mail went through half but one day. These trips were made with horse and buggy, and on this particular day there was a terrific snow storm. My brothers Lee and Willard went to try and find the horses, but couldn't see but a few feet ahead because of the wind and snow. They finally came to the fence and followed it back to the house, but were almost frozen by the time they reached it. The trips were made through cold, heat, rain and snow, and if there is a horse heaven our little dun horse that was so faithful, is surely there. It took him several months to get his vim and vigor back after the four long years of toil. I think out of the four years of carrying the mail, I carried it three of the four years.

Mother rented out the whole farm and built a house in Lockney and moved there. I finished High School there.

I would like to mention some of the outstanding teachers that taught when we were in school; Miss Fannie Rucker (Mrs. Bascom Jenkins), M. Homer Howard, Mr. A. H. Grubbs, Mr. E. C. Nix, Mr. Frank Nix, Miss Blanch Robinson and others. The Nix brothers were outstanding Christian men--they always opened school with a song and prayer.

As Mother had divided up the land Dad had left in his will, I sold my portion and went to Amarillo and bought a little

place there. That is where I met my husband.

In 1923 we came to California, and have lived here for the last 43 years. We were living here during the March 10, 1933 earthquake which killed hundreds and hundreds of people--it was an awful thing to go through. Then the beginning of World War II--it seemed such a short distance to the Hawaiian Islands. We had many "blackouts," with no house, or street lights. Then the recent rioting was another horrible mess. One of my deepest regrets is that I ever left Texas.

As I have gone this far, I will tell of my brothers and sisters. My brother Joe was the oldest, Joe was married to Willie McNeil, and they have seven children--three girls and four boys, one set of twin boys. Joe had two close calls with death as a young man. Once when a horse he was breaking to ride threw him and he lay unconscious all night in the pasture. In the morning when he came to, he crawled to the lake and washed the blood from his face and managed to make it to the house. Another time some of our cattle were caught up in a snow storm and drifted down into the brakes south of Lubbock, and Joe went down to find them. After riding all day in the snow storm he finally came to a house, and, as he got off his horse he fell to the ground. The people said that if he had been out much longer he would have frozen in the saddle. My brother Joe passed away July, 1956.

Jenny was married to W.A. (Will) Merrell, and had four boys. She passed away in Jan. 1916.

Della was married to Henry Wooton, and they have six children--four girls and two boys.

Mrs. Hickerson, a former resident of Floydada, died Thursday morning in Ralls Nursing Home where she had resided for the past 17 months.

A native of Lancaster, M.S. Hickerson moved to Floydada in 1929 from Grand Prairie and returned to Dallas County in 1940. Following the death of her husband in 1963, Mrs. Hickerson returned to Floydada to live until becoming a patient in the rest home.

She was a member of the Church of Nazarene. Survivors include two daughters, M. Elmer Dazey of Clovis, N. Mex.; and Mrs. A. H. Rockett of Waco; two sons, Pete and Buck of Floydada; three sisters, Mrs. Floyd Lam, Mrs. Estelle Cobb and Mrs. Melborn C. Brown all of Grand Prairie; two brothers, Dink Adair, Dallas and Allie Adair, El Paso, six grandchildren and ten great grandchildren.

Rev. E. R. McGregor, pastor of the Cone Methodist Church, officiated, assisted by Rev. R. A. Staggs, pastor of the First Assembly of God Church in Floydada. Interment was in Floydada Cemetery under the direction of Moore Funeral Home.

Montgomery (the owner of the TM-Ranch) and this is only a few of the many, many, friends my Father had, I only heard of only a couple people that he didn't like.

## BACCALAUREATE SERMON

### "At The Station . . . Two Trains To Catch"

Editor's Note: By popular request The Hesperian publishes the recent Baccalaureate sermon of The Rev. Charles Lutrick, pastor of The First Methodist Church:

"This class was born about the turn of the mid-century. You have been reared and protected and excused under the charming variations and ramifications of the general philosophy of education technically known as 'progressive education'. One aspect of this philosophy of education is that, 'There are no bad children, only bad parents . . . He is not an evil boy, only the victim of unhealthy circumstances and environment' . . . .

"You have lived your lives under the umbrella of thinking of yourselves as the hapless victims of adult dominated circumstances . . . . but in five days (Friday night) the 'door of graduation' will slam hard shut behind you . . . then you can bid farewell to the world of adolescent innocence. Let me be the first to welcome you to the fellowship of the guilty. For after Friday night whatever the younger generation finds wrong you will be one of the guilty adult delinquents!!

"But remember that innocence does not end at the door of graduation nor does responsibility wait until then to begin.

"In Christian literature there is the story of St. Peter's vision in which as he leaves the city of Rome he meets the Lord. He said to the Lord, 'Where are you going?' The movie version used the Latin wording, 'Quo Vadis?' That is my question to each of you tonight. Where are you going?

"Let me suggest the use of an analogy for the question using the terms of railroad travel. You are at the station and you have two trains to catch!!

"The Church has said through history that there are two trains on the road of life, one goes toward heaven and one goes toward hell.

"The road toward heaven is the way of Love. This is the way of Jesus of Nazareth. And the truth is that Christians . . . real ones . . . are the world's great lovers.

"God alone can satisfy your divine longings to be made complete and happy. And when the time comes, if it comes, that you desire God above any possible competitor, then you are near the final station!!

"The train that travels in the other direction is going either direct express route or by a longer side road, but ending at the same station. "The express route is the way of Selfishness, and some are already on that train. Some of you haven't learned to look life and its real issues straight in the face yet. You care supremely 'or self, cars, clothes, etc. . . . You cannot excuse your actions because you live in a day of fears. All others before you have faced fears, of all kinds. . . . The choice between love and self is real, and so are the consequences!

"The winding road is the way of indifference, the way of trying to avoid decisions, the way of trying to be 'normal'. The sin of express route is clear cut selfishness, the way of the winding road is utter emptiness."

"Elizabeth Browning describes this way . . .

"Earth's cramm'd with heaven, And every common bush affire with God;

But only he who sees takes off his shoes . . . The rest sit round it pluck blackberries!"

"Two trains to catch, but you are already on one of the other. As you travel into the adult world you can change trains . . . because God leaves us free to choose, as long as there is breath in the body.

"We are not hapless victims of environment, nor clumsy parents, nor poor health, nor pretty faces, or anything else. We are free men and women who can break and remake habits . . . we can change trains whenever we say . . . 'now'.

"I believe in people, people with God-given freedom to choose.

"I believe that every member of this class may become the saint he or she was born to be.

"You were born to be lovers

County Agent's Corner

By Joe Wilson Care should be taken this time of the year to check cotton for thrips. This small insect about one eighth of an inch in length can stunt cotton severely and cause it to get a slow start.

The symptoms of plants infected with thrips are thick leaves that are wrinkled and silvery colored in appearance. Thrip can be easily controlled with the following insecticides at the pounds per acre rate shown:

Dieldrin plus DDT, .25 A, 0.5; Guthion, 2; Strobane-DDT (2-1 mixture), 2; Carbaryl (Sevin), 1.0;

Toxphene - DDT (2-1 mixture), 2; Heptachlor + DDT, 0.375 A, 0.5; Endrin + DDT, 0.3 A, 0.5; Bidrin, .2.

Generally the danger of thrips lessens as cotton gets over six inches tall, however heavy infestation may hurt cotton at any age or size.

June 1 is the date boll weevil survey teams will begin work. Two teams will check cotton in all areas of the County except far western part. Reports will be sent to farm operators where cotton is checked.

The weevil survey is a part of the Bollweevil diapause spray program that was first initiated in the fall of 1963.

Until Medicare Begins, People Shouldn't Cancel Health Coverage

Medicare, the new program of health insurance for the aged, begins on July 1, 1966, for all people over 65 who have signed up for it.

Many people are asking what they should do about their private health insurance plans. While this decision is a private one, Mance King, social security officer-in-charge in Plainview, cautions: do not cancel any other health insurance you have until your medicare coverage actually begins.

This warning also holds true for people who become 65 in the future. If they apply for medicare in the three-month period before their 65th birthday, their coverage will not begin until the month they are 65.

King said that it is important that people approaching 65 do three things:

- 1. Obtain good evidence of your age well before your 65th birthday, so you will know when your benefits under medicare can begin.

## Berl Huffman Will Speak To Rotary Lion Luncheon June 1

Berl Huffman of Lubbock will be the guest speaker next Wednesday in a joint Rotary-Lion luncheon in the Colonial House.

An old saying in Lubbock is that if you stay long enough to wear out a pair of shoes, you will never leave.

No better example of this saying is Berl Huffman, for the past six years freshman football coach, head baseball coach and spinner of stories that keep audiences laughing continually. The affable coach spent some 16 years in Lubbock, at Lubbock High School and Texas Tech.

Huffman finally left the Hub City to coach at the University of New Mexico, served as Albuquerque's Chamber of Commerce manager, directed the State Economic Development Commission and left that post to direct the Alamogordo Industrial Development Corp.

The love of coaching was too deeply embossed on his flesh and when coach J. T. King beckoned to him, he responded. King was looking for a mature coach, one who could direct the freshmen and indoctrinate them in what the varsity expected. He also wanted a man who could be a "father confessor" to them, helping them over the difficult hurdles of their first year in college's demanding society.

Coach King was not unaware of Huffman's ability as a public speaker, but it's doubtful that even he realized when he hired Huffman that his investment was going to pay such rich dividends. Huffman still coaches the freshman footballers; he still coaches the baseball team; but most of his spare time is spent on the banquet trail.

The veteran coach has a reservoir of jokes as deep as Milton Berle and a homespun philosophy of coaching and boys that comes only from his own vast experience. He is as much at home in a men's stag party as he is a church social. When he tells a group about sports, the audience knows that he doesn't have to make up any stories.

The veteran coach has grown a little heavier than when he started his coaching career at White Deer in 1928. That assignment followed letters in three sports at Trinity University, where he matriculated from his home in Grapevine.

Huffman coached at Lubbock High from 1931 until 1935, when he joined the Texas Tech coaching staff. His duties were freshman football coach, varsity basketball coach and track coach. He interrupted his coaching duties for four years of duty in the Air Force and then returned to Red Raiderland. He left Lubbock in 1947 to coach New Mexico's Lobos, a post he held until 1952.

Then came the divorce from coaching. He threw himself enthusiastically into the work and

made thousands of new friends. But when the chance to coach again was offered, he knew what the answer would be. He responded as eagerly as a drowning man will when offered a straw.

The new "marriage" has worked so well that Huffman still is on a honeymoon. He's one of the hardest workers on the entire coaching staff. He comes in early, leaves late and he's never too busy to talk with an old friend or a young athlete asking for advice. To many,

If you're tired of that "same old taste" in crackers, even with the manufacturers trying to out-do each other with varieties and flavors, try making your own. They're simple to fix, rich and crisp to eat, and so good you'll enjoy just eating them plain.

**CHEESE CRACKERS**  
1-1/2 cup sifted flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 tablespoon chopped parsley

1/2 cup butter  
2 cups grated sharp cheese  
Sift flour; measure. Add salt and parsley. Cream together butter and cheese. Add flour mixture; mix well. Roll into 1-inch balls. Flatten to about 1/4-inch thickness with the bottom of a glass tumbler. Prick top with fork. Bake in moderate (350 degrees) oven for 12 to 15 minutes. Makes five dozen crisp crackers.

Two cookie recipes that are "party-pretty" and "everyday" good and easy to make are -

**SKILLET COOKIES**  
1 cup dates, chopped fine  
1 egg, well beaten  
1 cup sugar  
2 tablespoons butter

Put together in skillet, start at low temperature. Stir 10 minutes or until dates are melted. Remove from fire and add 1 teaspoon vanilla and 1 cup nuts. Add 2-1/2 cups Rice Crispies. When cool, shape into balls and roll in flaked coconut.

**SNOWBALLS**  
3 1/2 cups vanilla wafer crumbs  
1/4 cup butter, melted  
1 cup pecans, chopped  
1/2 cup Dr Pepper

Icing:  
2 cups powdered sugar, sifted  
2 tablespoons butter, melted  
1/3 cup Dr Pepper  
1/4 teaspoon vanilla  
Flaked coconut

Mix crumbs, butter, sugar, pecans, Dr Pepper. Roll into very small balls. Using a fork, dip balls in icing and then roll in flaked coconut.

For Icing, measure sifted powdered sugar into mixing bowl. Add melted butter, Dr Pepper, vanilla. Makes about 6 dozen cookies.
