Harry Schultz Is Candidate For District Judge



The Star is authorized to announce the candidacy of Harry Schultz for the office of District Judge in the 69th judicial district, subject to action of the Democratic Primary in July. His announcement follows:

Because I have been in the army the past five years and absent from the district, it is necessary, in announcing as a candidate for the office of District Judge of the 69th Judicial District, to introduce myself to many of you by briefly relating my background and my qualifications for that office.

I am nearly 44 years old, married and have one daughter. I am a Presbyterian, and have been a resident of Daltart the past 23 years. While in my second year of high school it was necessary for me to take a night job with the Rock Island Railroad in order to help other members of my family and to continue my schooling. I am still on the roster of its employees. In my spare time I pursued my interest in law by home study. With such money I could save and borrow I attended Cumberland University Law School at Lebanon, Tennessee, and then was admitted to the bar in Texas in 1926.

Soon thereafter I started to practice law. The people of Dallam County have been most kind to me by electing me four times as their County Attorney, and once as their County Judge and Ex-Officio Superintendent of Schools. Meanwhile I had also become interested in military law. By several hundred hours of home study I qualified for and was commissioned in 1936 as a Reserve Officer in the Judge Advocate General's Department of the U. S. Army. The commission obligated me to serve on active duty in the army for the duration of any emergency or war.

When the national emergency developed in 1941, I was ordered to active duty in the army in the month of May. This necessitated my resigning as County Judge of Dallam County. The national emergency conditions that have still existed since the fighting ended are now rapidly coming to an end.

For nearly two years I served as Staff Judge Advocate at Camp Wolters, and the past three years I have been staff Judge Advocate of the 2nd Infantry Division. My duties have always been those of legal advisor to all military personnel—from the newest private to Lieutenant General. During this time the "Indian-head Division" served about two years in the E. T. O., and it was in combat from D Day plus one (D plus 1) to V. E. Day. On V. J. day we happened to be in the United States enroute to the Pacific theater to help wind up

The members of the American Legion Post, No. 206, of Parmer County, are arranging for an appropriate observance of National Memorial Day, which occurs on Thursday of next week, May 30th.

The program which is being carefully prepared, will be held at the public park, in the midst of the city, and will begin at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon.

The outstanding feature of the program will be the unveiling of the Memorial Monument honoring all the soldiers of Parmer County, who lost their lives while in the service of their country. This memorial was sponsored by the members of Post No. 206, and has been prepared and erected by the Memorial Committee appointed by the Post.

The monument bears the names of all Parmer County boys who gave their lives in the service. It has been placed at the west entrance to the park, which is on the east side of Main street.

The services at the park will consist largely of short addresses by two of the local pastors, Rev. Binkley, of the Methodist Church, and Rev. Day of the Baptist Church, with Rev. Binkley, an ex-army Chaplain, delivering the leading address for the unveiling ceremonies.

Following the ceremonies at the park, there will be further ceremonies at the Friona Cemetery, with Rev. North, pastor of the Congregational Church, and Rev. Houlette, pastor of the United Pentecostal Church, delivering the addresses.

The services at the cemetery will include decoration of the graves, which will conclude the Memorial Day program.

Post Commander, Frank O. Griffith, will be in charge of the program and will serve as Master of Ceremonies throughout the entire program.

Parents of deceased soldiers, will be honored by the memorial monument, and are invited to attend the Memorial service.

Estimate Loss Near Million Dollars Here

A disastrous hail storm that cut a 15-mile wide swath across the Parmer, Deaf Smith, and Castro, county wheat belt last Sunday night caused damage to crops estimated at a million dollars.

Estimates place the prospective wheat yield destroyed in the three-county area at half a million bushels. Probably 40 to 50 thousand acres of wheat was wiped out.

Only a small percentage of the destroyed wheat was insured, a check-up discloses, and most farmers in the hail-out area report a total crop loss.

The hail started locally in the northwest part of Deaf Smith county, and swept southward in a wide arc to the south and east into Parmer and Castro counties, the central path of the storm lying between Summerfield and Friona and fringing both communities.

The T. E. Seigler farm, 27 miles northwest of Hereford, was approximately the northern limit of the storm, and the hail cut a 15-mile wide path southward from that point to a distance of at least 20 miles, wiping out virtually everything in its path.

Farms lying on the east edge of Summerfield community, and west of Friona, received only light damage.

Although 40 inch of rain fell in Hereford, and half an inch of rainfall was reported at Dawn during the storm, little moisture accompanied the hail storm to the west.

The storm which struck this tri-county area was according to reports, part of a major hail storm which started at Tucumcari, New Mexico, and swept in a southeasterly direction into the southeastern part of Hale county.

Ben Taack, one of the bigger operators in Deaf Smith county, reports 3500 acres of wheat completely wiped out, and estimated that the yield from this acreage would have been between 50,000 and 60,000 bushels.

Part of the Cecil Guseman acreage in that area was destroyed.

Syd Maxfield reports that the grass in a pasture which had not been grazed for three years was mowed down and beaten into the ground by the hail storm.

Bill Edelman reports the loss of 3 sections of wheat southwest of Summerfield.

Practically all the wheat crop in the Summerfield, Rance, and Black communities was reported to be a total loss.

All gardens in the area were ruined, and most of the fruit destroyed.

Windows and screens were broken and torn up, on some houses, and tanks and barns destroyed. A number of farmers reported house roofs damaged by the hail.

Very little hail was reported north and east of Summerfield, the major damage lying to the west and south of that community reported little damage east of the schoolhouse, the main storm sweeping through the western edge of the community.

The storm was of short duration, lasting not more than an hour.

Wheat crops in the area struck by the storm were among (Continued on Back Page)

Hail Victims May Plant Large Acreage in Vegetable Crops

Many farmers in Deaf Smith, Castro and Parmer counties who had wheat crops completely hauled out in Sunday's storm are planning to seed considerable acreage in vegetables under contract to the new canning plant which will go into operation in Hereford this summer, according to Worth Ware, manager of the plant.

The plant is offering to furnish seed to all farmers who want to plant, and will contract for the entire yield, Ware said. Although the plant, which will operate under the trademark of Deaf Smith County Food Products, Inc., had planned to confine its planting to Deaf Smith County, the disastrous hail storm which wiped out many farmers in neighboring counties Sunday night brought about an immediate change in policy.

"We have decided to extend aid to all who want it this year," Ware said, "by offering a cash crop which can be marketed this summer."

Enough black-eyed peas to seed 1500 acres arrived in Hereford Tuesday in response to a hurry-up call by Ware Sunday night, and additional seed for planting carrots, beets, and green beans should arrive this week, he said.

"We don't expect to be able
