Estimate Loss Near Million Dollars Here

A disastrous hail storm that cut a 15-mile wide swath across the Parmer, Deaf Smith, and Castro, county wheat belt last Sunday night caused damage to crops estimated at a million

Estimates place the prospective wheat yield destroyed in the three-county area at half a million bushels. Probably 40 to 50 thousand acres of wheat was
