

Caprock Hospital Fund Passes \$60,000 Mark . . . Citizens Responding To Need

Everyone Urged To Give By Saturday

In less than two weeks over \$60,000 has been raised to complete the cost of the building of the Caprock Hospital to be built here.

When the hospital board announced its need of \$68,000 last week in order to save redesigning costs, the rising construction costs and loss of architectural fee work, the people responded willingly and generously. There was also a possibility of losing the \$425,000 Hill-Burton grant.

With the help of the many persons who have said they would sign notes, give cash or make pledges, it appears that the contract can be let soon.

Over 20 volunteer workers have made phone calls, personal contacts all over this community in raising the needed money. One worker said, "this is possibly the most amount of money ever raised in this community in such a short time. . . and to meet such an important need."

It wasn't the "big gift people" who carried the load. The largest donation was \$1250. It has been the rank and file of both town and country people in the three precincts of the hospital district who either gave the cash, made a pledge due in June of 1967, or signed a non-interest bearing note to the First National Bank here, payable in February of 1968.

In looking at a distribution of the gifts it is noted that 24 have given \$1,000 each, 49 have given \$500 each, 48 have given \$250 each, four have given \$300 each, one \$400, seven \$200, one \$150 and 34 \$100. Other contributions amounted to less than \$100 gifts.

At noon Wednesday hospital board members and workers in the fund raising campaign urged everyone who has stated an intention of giving to please do so, by noon Saturday.

Weekend Rainfall Aids County Crops

The rainfall received over the weekend was a great boost to summer crops, particularly in the dryland areas. Amounts varying from a trace to 1 1/2 inches were reported from various parts of the county.

The South Plains area received the most moisture recording from 1/4 to 1/2 inch Friday night to over 1 inch in places Saturday afternoon for up to 1 1/2 inches total. Floydada proper received only .3

Friday night and .02 Saturday, according to the ASCS office here.

Dougherty received a trace and Harmony received from 3/8 to .7 of an inch.

The young grain sorghum and cotton has been about the ground for about a week, on the average, and the moisture is just what was needed to give the crops a good boost.

One Car Turnover Injures Mrs. Roy Edwards Tuesday

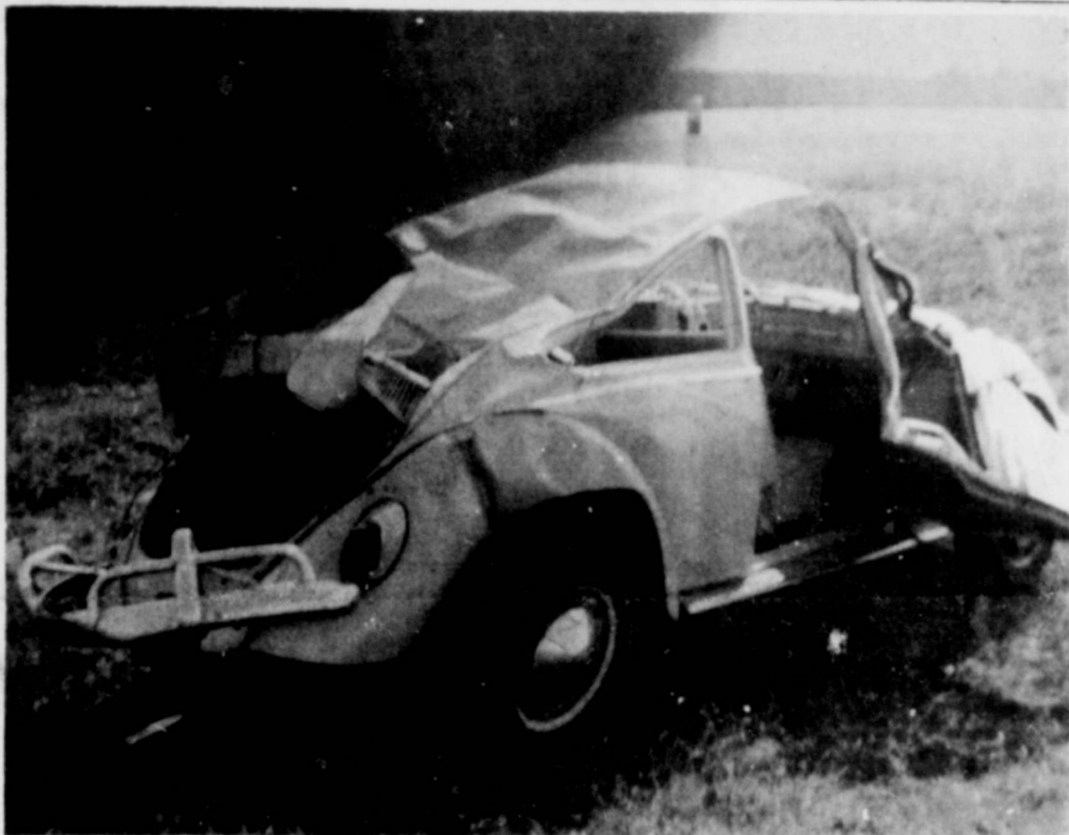
A one-car mishap about 4:10 p.m. Tuesday resulted in the injury of Mrs. Roy Edwards of Floydada.

Mrs. Edwards was driving west in a 1965 Volkswagen when she lost control of the car and turned over into the median. She was taken to Plainview General Hospital where her condition was listed as poor. However, Wednesday morning she was somewhat improved.

County Farmers Vote 'No' On Cotton Transfers

The Floyd County farmers turned down the proposal that would allow the transfer of cotton allotments out of the county in balloting done May 16 through May 25, it was reported by ASCS officials here this week.

The vote was 476 against and 405 for. However, a two-thirds majority was necessary to make the transfers permissible.

The county farmers also voted against a similar proposal last year, but 61 counties in Texas favored the transfers, which resulted in increased acreage for the South Plains farmers that went to those counties and bought or leased allotments.

Yoakum County was the only one on the South Plains that favored the referendum.

This decision does not keep a farmer who owns land in Floyd and Crosby Counties from transferring cotton allotments from one farm to the owner.

Penny McClintock Rodeo Queen

Just prior to the final performance of the Floydada Rodeo Saturday night, Penny McClintock, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. D. McClintock of Lakeview, was crowned the Rodeo Queen for 1966. She was presented a dozen long-stem roses and a silver belt buckle from the Rodeo Association by Vicki Martin, last year's queen.

The performance of the rodeo was reported to be very good, in comparison with other years, although heavy rains drove a large part of the crowd out of the stands Friday night, and threatening clouds and a light rainfall Saturday resulted in a small crowd that night.

The favorite performance of

the show was Clinton Harlow's Sheep Dog - Monkey act that left the crowd in uproars of laughter each of the nights. The most unfavorable performance came Saturday night when Paul Howard, of Portales, N. Mex., dismounted from his horse during the calf roping and broke his leg.

Before the calf could be turned loose, those trying to corral the little animal ran it across Howard as he was lying on the ground holding his broken leg.

Howard's brother, Buttons, however, won the Calf Roping with a 9.0 time, while Ed Workman of Ft. Worth was second with 10.0 and Bowie Westley of

Bobby Britton Hurt In Blast

Bobby Britton, assistant manager of South Plains Elevator, received first and second degree burns on the face, arms and hands in a flash fire last Thursday afternoon in the rest room at South Plains Gin office. He is reported to be resting well in a Lubbock hospital and expected home by the latter part of the week. Doctors told the family they felt no permanent eye injury was suffered by Britton.

The blast in the rest room and the fire which followed was believed to be caused from floor sweep. Workers at the gin said the men's rest room contained bags of floor sweep and the ceiling electric light was always kept on. This was theorized by employees and was not official, however.

Britton, who was alone in the building, said the blast occurred just as he walked into the rest room and closed the door. The explosion knocked a hole in the bathroom ceiling and wiring there evidently started the fire which caused heavy damage in the gin office. The rest room was not damaged by the fire, employees said.

Britton was able to summon help and he was taken by private car to Lockney Hospital where he was transferred by ambulance to Lubbock.

Floydada firemen were called to the scene to put out the fire.

George Russell Farris received his Masters Degree from the Wharton Graduate School of Finance in graduating ceremonies in Philadelphia's Convention Hall last week.

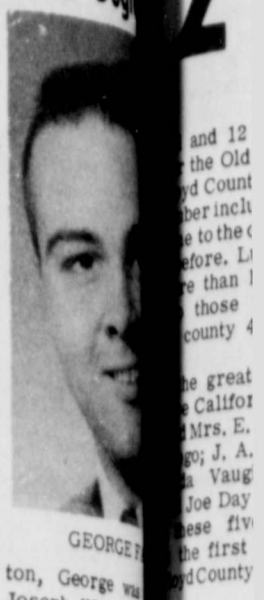
Bachelor degrees were conferred on 3,000 graduates and 300 received the Masters degree.

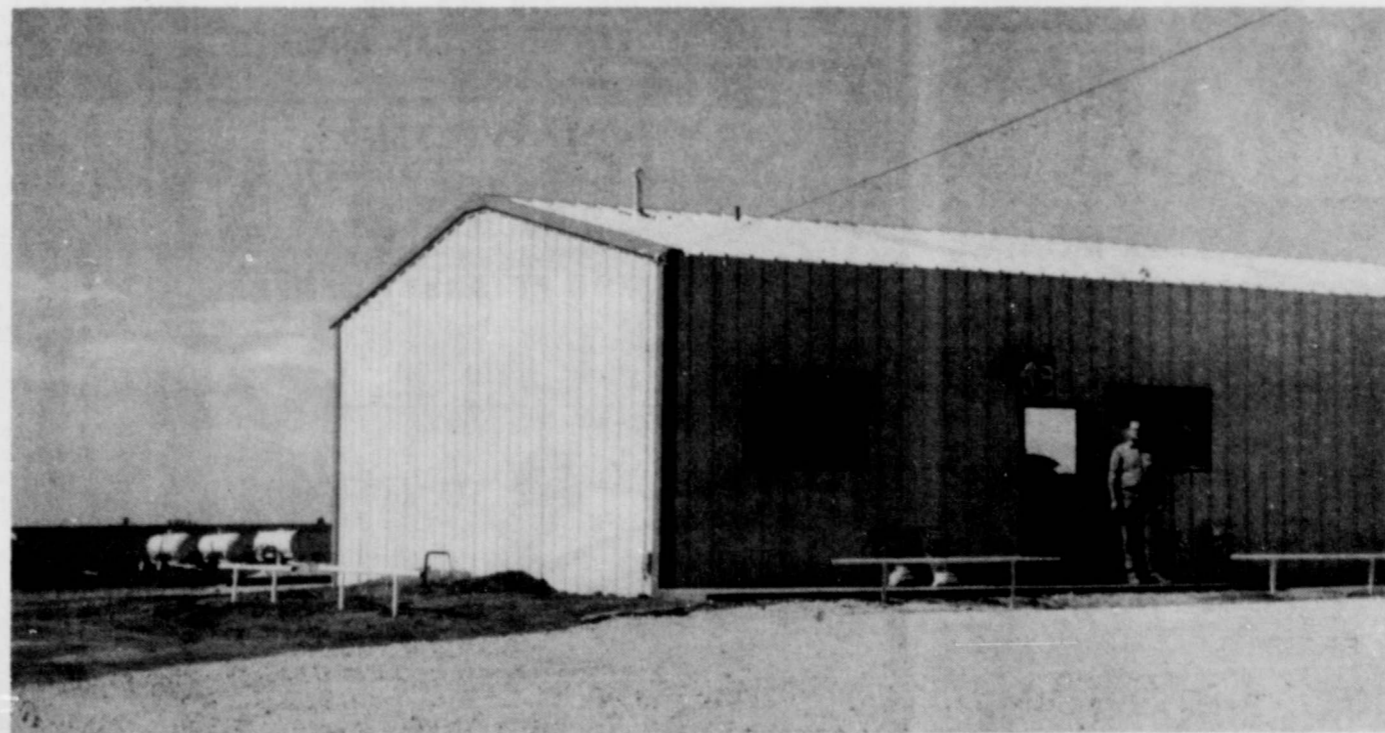

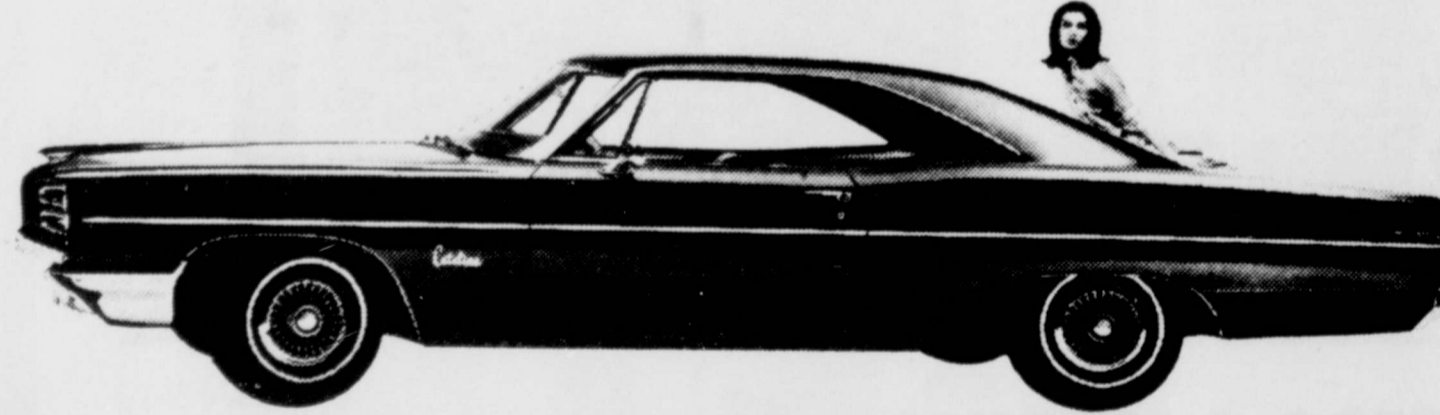

More In Floyd County Getting Pensions

(Special to Hesperian)

NEW YORK, May 28 - For residents of Floyd County, social security has its bright side as well as its tax side. It is beginning to yield returns that compensate in good

measure for what it has been costing in taxes.

This money, deducted from the wages of local workers over the years to provide for their future retirement needs, is now flowing back in sizeable amounts via pension checks.

Some 1,252 former workers and their families, the largest number ever, are now reaping the harvest. They are averaging \$767 a year as compared with the \$695 average that prevailed in 1962.

Most of it is going to people who have reached the retirement age, or to their widows and children. The remainder is to disabled workers and their dependents.

The extent to which the pension system has been expanding is brought out in the Social Security Administration's new report.

It shows that the number of Floyd County residents who are now getting retirement checks is 20.0 percent greater than three years ago, when there were 1,043 recipients.

In other parts of the United States, there was a 15.6 percent increase, on average.

Much of the growth has been due to changes in the social security law. They enlarged its scope and permitted more people to qualify.

Significant, also, has been the increase in overall benefits going to residents of Floyd County.

The official figures show that total payments locally, as of the beginning of this year, were at the annual rate of \$960,000.

By contrast, the amount reaching the local area three years ago was \$720,000.

These pension funds, arriving with regularity in the county, are of growing importance to local retail merchants.

And they will go still higher next year if Administration plans materialize. President Johnson stated recently that he would propose "broad improvements" when Congress convenes for its session next January.

He did not detail his plans other than to note that they would include a boost in the monthly minimum payments and the maximum payments.

"But for all the gains, New Horizons in Medicine makes clear that many perplexing problems still face medical researchers.

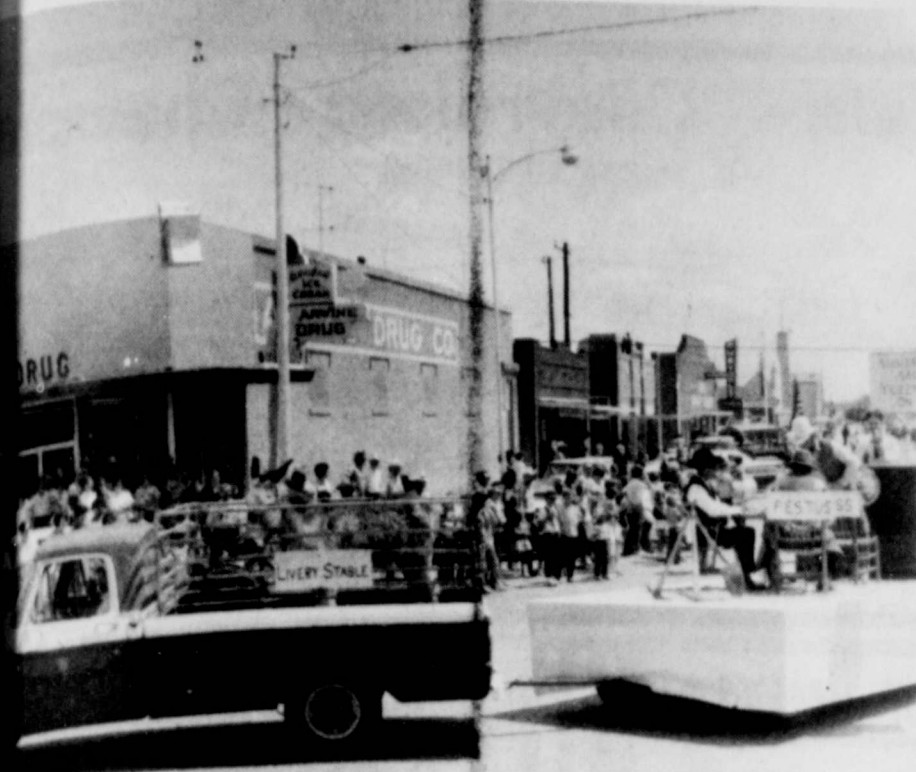

Welborn Receives Work Proficiency Award Recently

AUSTIN--An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Bobby Welborn, water superintendent of the city of Floydada water system. The citation reflects the high regard in which Welborn is held by state water officials.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water and Sewage Works Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants.

The engineers said the attainment is evidence of Welborn's efforts to better prepare himself for the duties of his profession.



County Agent's Corner

The 27th Annual American Cotton Congress will be held June 3 at the Baker Hotel in Dallas. The highlight speech will be Food for Peace and will be given by Dr. Aaron M. Altschul, Head, Food for Peace Program, W. U. Department of Agriculture.

The event, held in Lubbock last year drew favorable comments from many area farmers.

The keynote address will be given by Col. Burris C. Jackson and a talk on Cotton in the Textile Industry will be made by F. Sadler, Love, Sec. Treas. American Textile Manufacturers Institute.

Also on the program is Dr. McDonald K. Horne, Jr. Chief Economist National Cotton Council who will speak on the World Cotton Situation, and James R. Walls, Manager of Bagging, Marketing and Sales, Ludlow Corp. who will speak on Bale Packaging.

A talk on Research and Related advances for the cotton industry will be given by Dr. Page W. Morgan, Plant Sciences, Texas A & M University.

The event is scheduled to get underway at 9:30 a.m. and should conclude about 3 p.m.

The rotary hoe is still the cheapest and most satisfactory post emergence practice for controlling weeds and grass in cotton fields. Fred C. Elliott, Extension cotton specialist at Texas A & M University, says the rotary hoe performs well if it can be operated a few days after a rain while the weeds and grass are still small and before their root systems become established.

The rotary hoe is a high speed tool and with multiple units fields can be covered quickly. Careful attention should be given to cultivation methods.

Lateral oiling with herbicidal napha is also recommended for post emergence weed control. Herbicidal oils should have an aromatic content of 15 to 18 percent and are available from most oil companies.

Lateral oiling is listed as another top practice. It is non-toxic, non-corrosive and does not build up chemical residues in the soil. From 5 to 10 gallons per acre should be used and applied in a 10 inch band in the drill area, laterally in cotton two and one-half inches high before bark cracks appear in healthy plants. It should be applied with two fan tip nozzles, staggered and flat with the ground. Second and third applications at weekly intervals are suggested if needed.

Other chemicals which have performed well include DSMA or MSMA plus surfactant or Herban plus DSMA or MSMA plus surfactant. These materials should be applied laterally after the cotton is three or more inches in height and can be used until first blooms appear.

When cotton plants reach the six inch growth stage, pre-emerges plus surfactant can be used on small grasses and weeds. This makes a constant herbicide, out of what was a pre-emerge for control of small weeds up to two inches in height.

Dalapon or oils can be used for spot treating Johnsongrass and other perennial grasses.
