# - First Of 1966 Wheat Crop Rolls To Market

## Cedar Hill Firm Receives First Load

The Floyd County wheat began rolling to market late last week as three elevator managers watched their potential customers race the clock for the first load harvested.

Danny Green, of near Quitaque pulled on to the scales at Cedar Hill Grain around 4:30 Friday afternoon and Cecil Baxter got a load to Producers Coop Elevator in Floydada around dark Friday. Around 4:30 a load was received by Producers at Dougherty, but it came from Motley County.

The wheat harvested on the Green farm was dryland and was cutting about 9 bushels per acre. The load consisted of 141 bushels that tested just over 12 percent moisture and weighed 60 lbs. per bushel. The load weighed in at 8,460.

The Baxter load was irrigated, received two waterings, and "missed one it should have had," Baxter said. The crop

was cutting around 23 to 25 bushels per acre. The Baxter crop was an Ear-

ly Triumph variety that was planted in October Green's wheat was planted in mid-September and was an Early Wichita variety. The crop was not grazed as most

surrounding crops were. The wheat price in Floydada is around \$1.55 while it was reported that Matador was paying \$1.62 per bushel, on the open market. The government loan price is about \$1.25 but discounts and premiums on the farmers' certificates cause this price to fluctuate.

Floyd County has a wheat allotment of 110,631 acres, from which around 76,000 acres of wheat will be harvested. A total of 31,000 acres were diverted to comply with the government program and several thousand acres were plowed up after the SEE WHEAT PAGE 2

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

### WRECK VICTIM

**Final Rites Held For** Mrs. Roy Edwards

Final rites were conducted Tuesday afternoon in the First Baptist Church in Floydada for Mrs. Roy Edwards, 31 year old wife of music and education director of the First Baptist Church in Floydada. She died Sunday night in Plainview Hospital of injuries sustained in a one-car mishap Tuesday afternoon of last week around 4 p.m. two miles west of Lockney. Mrs. Edwards, who brought

her husband home from the Plainview Hospital that fatal afternoon, was enroute back to Plainview to pick up his pajamas left at the hospital, friends said. Highway patrolmen surmised she lost control of her small Volkswagon car which overturned at least four times. Mrs. Edwards was thrown from the vehicle sustaining a broken hip and arm, severe internal in-

juries and a concussion. She was given emergency treatment at Lockney Hospital

and transferred to Plainview for additional treatment and surgery. Mrs. Edwards regained semi-consciousness Sunday, but lapsed into a coma later in the day. Her condition steadily grew worse, followed by death at 11:30 p.m.



> drinks cold. To chill drinks quickly, use finely chipped ice and sprinkle salt over the surface.

Sometimes serve other meats than the usual outdoor fare of hamburgers, steaks, or hot dogs. Ham, spare-ribs, Canadian bacon, lamb chops, short ribs, chicken, and many kabob combinations also make

good backyard fare. Select steaks for broiling from tender cuts, unless you use tenderizers.

For kabobs, use foods which require the same cooking time. Potatoes may be parboiled (or canned) to speed tenderness.

When broiling steaks or chicken on the outdoor grill, cook the vegetables at the same time. Roasting ears, potatoes, Italian squash, and tomatoes cook well in individual foil wrap.

Scrub potatoes, dry them, and grease generously. Wrap in foil, and bake in the coals about one hour.

Shuck corn, remove silks, and wash vigorously with vegetable brush. While damp. sprinkle with salt and wrap in foil. Cook on coals about 6 minutes, turning once or twice. Butter corn in foil before removing to serving plate. Wash and dry Italian squash and tomatoes. Slit the length

of squash, place butter or margaring in slit, and season with salt, pepper, and onion flakes if desired. Core the tomatoes and place seasonings in the

cavity. Wrap each vegetable in a square of heavy foil, and seal with a double fold. Place vegetables around the outer edge of grill, and turn them occasionally until they are soft when pressed gently.

Decrease the oil in barbecue sauces and substitute part water or vegetable juices. This will cut down flames. Grease grill with unsalted

fat before placing meat on it. Put grill over coals just before cooking.

Clean the grill either by letting food particles char, or by placing the grill between layers of damp newspaper after the food is cooked. A wire brush or scouring pad will remove food particles. with chipped ice for keeping

received about an inch and a half of hard driving rain. Mrs. Parks said so much dust was in the rain that it looked brown and several persons sought underground shelter when the storm hit from the southwest.

Past the cap Quitaque and Turkey caught heavy rains with a six inch downpour and 60 mile an hour wind at Turkey along with golf ball size hail. Silverton and that area reported over an inch of rain and large hail southeast of there. Lockney was reported to have had about .40 inches of moisture.

Floydada received no rainor hail but gusts of winds broke off small tree limbs and a number of persons sat out the winds in storm cellars after a tornado watch was posted for the Floyd County area.

The northeast portions of Hale County and areas in Providence in Floyd County were hard hit by the storm. A large grainery and tractor shed on the R. R. Clements farm portheast of Plainview were destroyed Tuesday night. Earl Blocker, who lives on the farm, said he didn't know if the damages were caused by a funnel or straight wind but that there was a chicken shed between the two buildings which was not damaged. The structures were some 75 yards apart. Blocker said young wheat and cotton were pounded by at least two inches of rain.

A double garage at the J. M. Carter farm in the Providence Community also was destroyed. At Petersburg they experienced a giant size dust storm, sprinkles of rain and winds that toppled trees.

Harmony Community reported winds and plenty of dust with a light shower. Tom Snead at Barwise Elevator reported light hail and wind damage west of Barwise with very little rain. Dougherty area was missed by the storm, as was Lakeview.

Weevil Eradication Program sponsored by the Plains Cotton Growers, got a 98 per cent kill of the weevils last fall. For those that overwintered

it is suggested that if infestation gets up to 15 per cent that farmers should spray five times at 5 to 7 day intervals to break the production cycle. The fields that were selected

for the survey were picked on the infestation reported last year, the farms were some of the first hit, most are along the eastern edge of the county and below the Caprock, but some are west of the spray zone.

One team will be working in the county south of the Matador Highway to Floydada and will stay south of the Sandhill Highway west of Floydada. The other team will work the portion of the county north of the line.





On the basis of the figures -probably more than in most parts of the United States because the proportion of people over 65 is greater than average locally.

This compares with 8.4 percent in 1960, when the last census was taken. Nationally, there are 9.3 per-

cent in that age bracket. In the State of Texas the average is 8.0 percent. The number of people who

part of medicare (coverage for doctor bills) was smaller than expected in the beginning but it has climbed rapidly in the last few months.

To date, nearly 90 percent of the 19 million people in the country who are eligible have enrolled.

Locally, approximately 1,130 men and women have registered for it.

As for the hospitals being swamped with patients after July 1st, the Public Health Service does not expect too big a problem.

Even if there were as much as a 20 percent rise in the admission of elderly people, it points out, it would cause an increase of only 5 percent in the total number of hospital patients since the elderly already account for about a quarter of the patient load.



#### The Community"


Berl Huffman, freshman football coach and baseball coach at Texas Tech in Lubbock, told a joint meeting of the Lions and Rotary Clubs that "People, not natural resources, make an area or community great."

In illustrating this statement he used the South Plains area, that "Once was unfit for living, for anything other than the buffalo and the savage Indians that roamed the Plains. However, now look at it. It is the envy of the agricultural world."

"Look at Switzerland and Colombia. The latter is overloaded with natural resources, but the standard of living in that country is one of the lowest in the world. By contrast take Switzerland, the little country that has few natural resources, and those people enjoy one of the highest standards of living in the world," Huffman said.

One person isn't able to make a community or area great himself, so he joins the efforts of a local organization because he can do through that club what he can't do by himself, according to Huffman.
