

# First Of 1966 Wheat Crop Rolls To Market

## Cedar Hill Firm Receives First Load

The Floyd County wheat began rolling to market late last week as three elevator managers watched their potential customers race the clock for the first load harvested.

Danny Green, of near Quitaque pulled on to the scales at Cedar Hill Grain around 4:30 Friday afternoon and Cecil Baxter got a load to Producers Coop Elevator in Floydada around dark Friday. Around 4:30 a load was received by Producers at Dougherty, but it came from Motley County.

The wheat harvested on the Green farm was dryland and was cutting about 9 bushels per acre. The load consisted of 141 bushels that tested just over 12 percent moisture and weighed 60 lbs. per bushel. The load weighed in at 8,460.

The Baxter load was irrigated, received two waterings, and "missed one it should have had," Baxter said. The crop

was cutting around 23 to 25 bushels per acre.

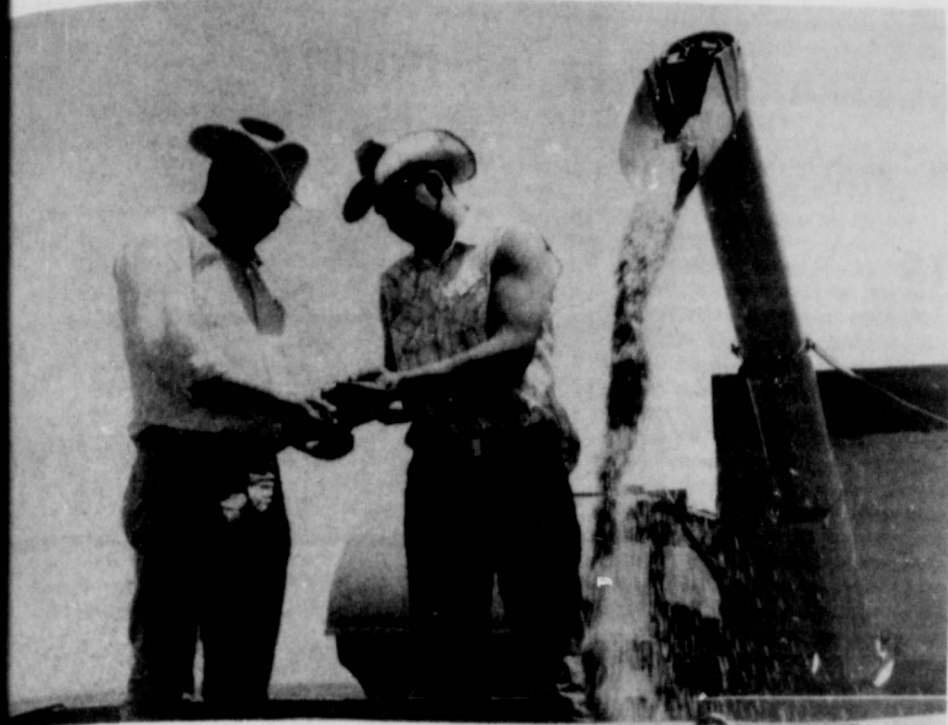
The Baxter crop was an Early Triumph variety that was planted in October.

Green's wheat was planted in mid-September and was an Early Wichita variety. The crop was not grazed as most surrounding crops were.

The wheat price in Floydada is around \$1.55 while it was reported that Matador was paying \$1.62 per bushel, on the open market. The government loan price is about \$1.25 but discounts and premiums on the farmers' certificates cause this price to fluctuate.

Floyd County has a wheat allotment of 110,631 acres, from which around 76,000 acres of wheat will be harvested. A total of 31,000 acres were diverted to comply with the government program and several thousand acres were plowed up after the

Carl Taylor is managing the grocery store.

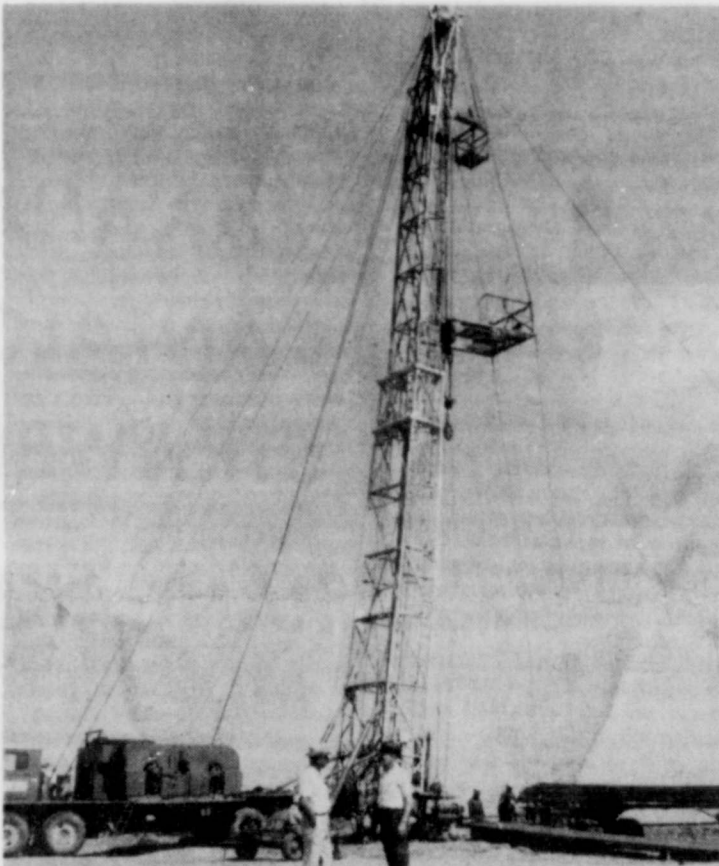
The grain company not only markets all types of grain, but also sells fertilizer.

## WRECK VICTIM

## Final Rites Held For Mrs. Roy Edwards

Final rites were conducted Tuesday afternoon in the First Baptist Church in Floydada for Mrs. Roy Edwards, 31 year old wife of music and education director of the First Baptist Church in Floydada. She died Sunday night in Plainview Hospital of injuries sustained in a one-car mishap Tuesday afternoon of last week around 4 p.m. two miles west of Lockney.

Mrs. Edwards, who brought her husband home from the Plainview Hospital that fatal afternoon, was enroute back to Plainview to pick up his pajamas left at the hospital, friends said. Highway patrolmen surmised she lost control of her small Volkswagon car which overturned at least four times. Mrs. Edwards was thrown from the vehicle sustaining a broken hip and arm, severe internal in-

juries and a concussion. She was given emergency treatment at Lockney Hospital and transferred to Plainview for additional treatment and surgery. Mrs. Edwards regained semi-consciousness Sunday, but lapsed into a coma later in the day. Her condition steadily grew worse, followed by death at 11:30 p.m.

Born Betty Jean Sutton in Lawton, Okla., December 22, 1934, the deceased was married there to Roy Edwards in August of 1956. The Edwards family moved to Floydada from Morton August 27, 1964 and made their home at 814 Ross St.

Talks that have been held daily since last Thursday be- tween the company and Com- mercial Telegraphers Union continued up to the deadline but no agreement could be reached, officials said.

It was the second walkout of telegraphers in the past week. The CTU demanded a 6 per cent increase in each of the two years while the company reportedly offered 4 per cent the first year and a 3.9 per cent the second.

over the Lockney Tigers 22-0. Prior to that game there had been some problems with the local's infield but they have been solved and the team is put-

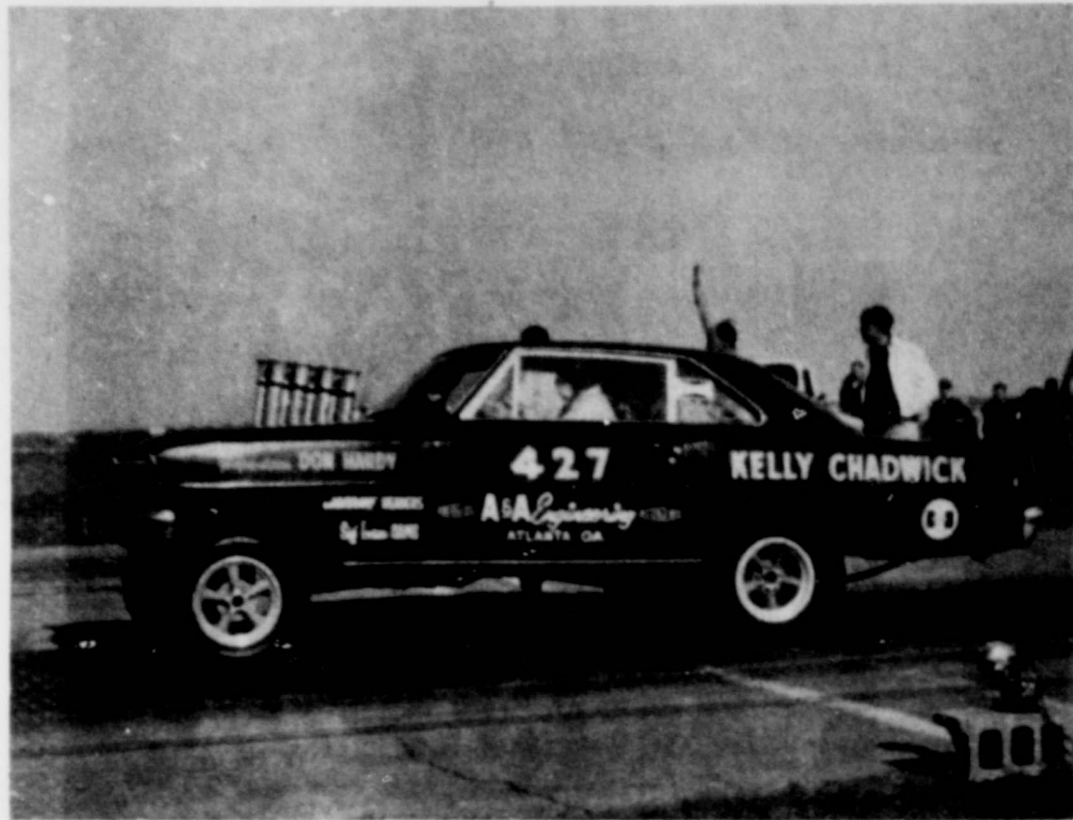

The drilling should check the subsurface structure and the makeup of the side walls. received about an inch and a half of hard driving rain. Mrs. Parks said so much dust was in the rain that it looked brown and several persons sought underground shelter when the storm hit from the southwest.

Past the cap Quitaque and Turkey caught heavy rains with a six inch downpour and 60 mile an hour wind at Turkey along with golf ball size hail. Silver-ton and that area reported over an inch of rain and large hail southeast of there. Lockney was reported to have had about .40 inches of moisture.

Floydada received no rain or hail but gusts of winds broke off small tree limbs and a number of persons sat out the winds in storm cellars after a tornado watch was posted for the Floyd County area.

**Boll Weevil Survey Begins; Grasshoppers Invade County**

Four individuals employed by the Agricultural Extension Service are in Floyd County keeping tabs on 240 fields to keep a check on the increase of boll weevils and check on the infestation of boll worms.

At the time the survey got underway, Monday, the northern edge of the county had been invaded by grasshoppers and several farmers in that area have joined a special effort with Briscoe County to try to kill the pest.

Although only about 2,500 acres of Floyd County land are involved, the hoppers were reported to be increasing in intensity early this week. About 40,000 acres in Armstrong, Briscoe and Floyd Counties are presently affected by the infestation.

Farmers and ranchers in the affected area had put up two-thirds of the amount required before government assistance in helping control the insects could be secured. The control measure will begin as

soon as funds are raised. Floyd County farmers and ranchers affected are joining the effort.

On the boll weevil part of the pest program, Mike Terry of Paducah, Gary Milborn of Lubbock, Gary Cain of Smyer and Ray McKinney of Littlefield, all Tech and South Plains College students, and conducting the survey in Floyd County.

It was estimated that the Boll Weevil Eradication Program sponsored by the Plains Cotton Growers, got a 98 per cent kill of the weevils last fall.

For those that overwintered it is suggested that if infestation gets up to 15 per cent that farmers should spray five times at 5 to 7 day intervals to break the production cycle.

The fields that were selected for the survey were picked on the infestation reported last year, the farms were some of the first hit, most are along the eastern edge of the county and below the Caprock, but some are west of the spray zone.

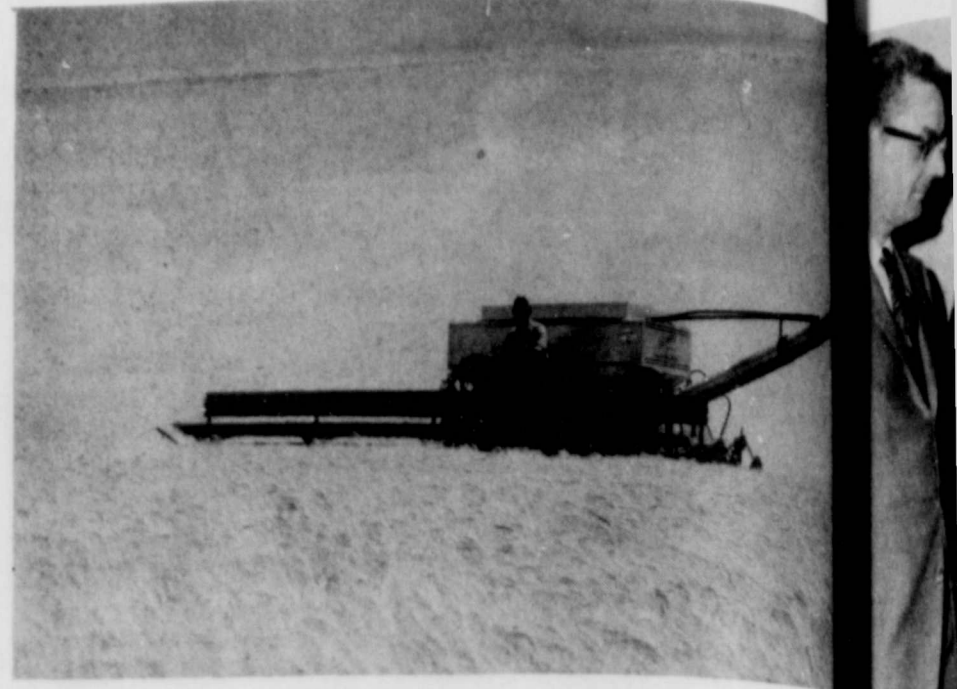
**FILM REVUE**

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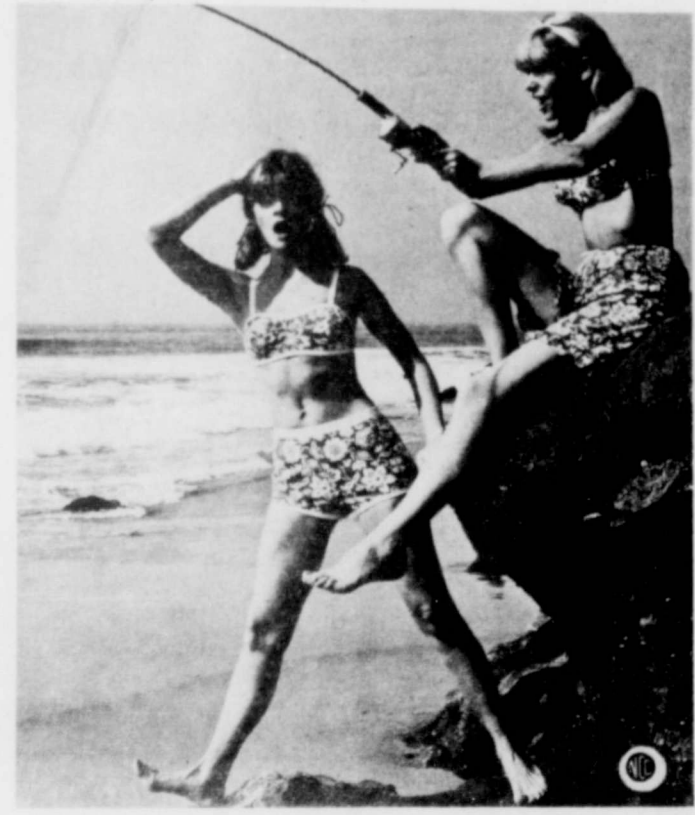

# Medicare Covers 9 Per Cent Of County Residents

NEW YORK, May 21 - A better estimate of the number of people in Floyd County who will qualify for medicare is now possible. It is based on recent figures

from the Department of Commerce showing what the over-65 population is in each section of the country.

Everyone in this age group will be entitled, automatically, to some of the benefits of medicare. Beginning July 1st, they will be able to obtain hospital care, nursing-home services and certain other assistance without cost.

But they will not be covered for doctor bills. To get that sort of protection, they must apply for it. The cost will be \$3 a month.

Most of the over-65 residents of Floyd County have already signed up for this medical coverage. The remainder have

until May 31st to do so. How much of a rush for hospital accommodations may be expected in the local area when July 1st rolls around?

On the basis of the figures--probably more than in most parts of the United States because the proportion of people over 65 is greater than average locally.

On the strength of the 50-state survey made by the government, approximately 9.4 percent of Floyd County's population is now in the 65 or older group.

This compares with 8.4 percent in 1960, when the last census was taken.

Nationally, there are 9.3 percent in that age bracket. In the State of Texas the average is 8.0 percent.

The number of people who signed up for the voluntary

part of medicare (coverage for doctor bills) was smaller than expected in the beginning but it has climbed rapidly in the last few months.

To date, nearly 90 percent of the 19 million people in the country who are eligible have enrolled.

Locally, approximately 1,130 men and women have registered for it.

As for the hospitals being swamped with patients after July 1st, the Public Health Service does not expect too big a problem.

Even if there were as much as a 20 percent rise in the admission of elderly people, it points out, it would cause an increase of only 5 percent in the total number of hospital patients since the elderly already account for about a quarter of the patient load.

### Huffman Says "People Make The Community"

PHILOSOPHER SAYS

Dear editor: According to an article in a newspaper which I found caught on a corner post where my pasture makes a right angle and which I pulled off as that post has enough to do to hold up the fence without any extra weight being added, there are so many cars in this country now, 90 million at the moment and multiplying faster than people, that city people are having more and more difficulty getting anywhere. As for the traffic jams with cars, it's one thing to have a woman driver hold up traffic for ten blocks back, but you think it'd be any better with a few balky horses scattered up and down the line? I tell you, people who want to go back to the good old days are welcome to try, but they'll never make it. Ninety million horses lined up on the roads bumper to bumper.... I'll stay at home.
