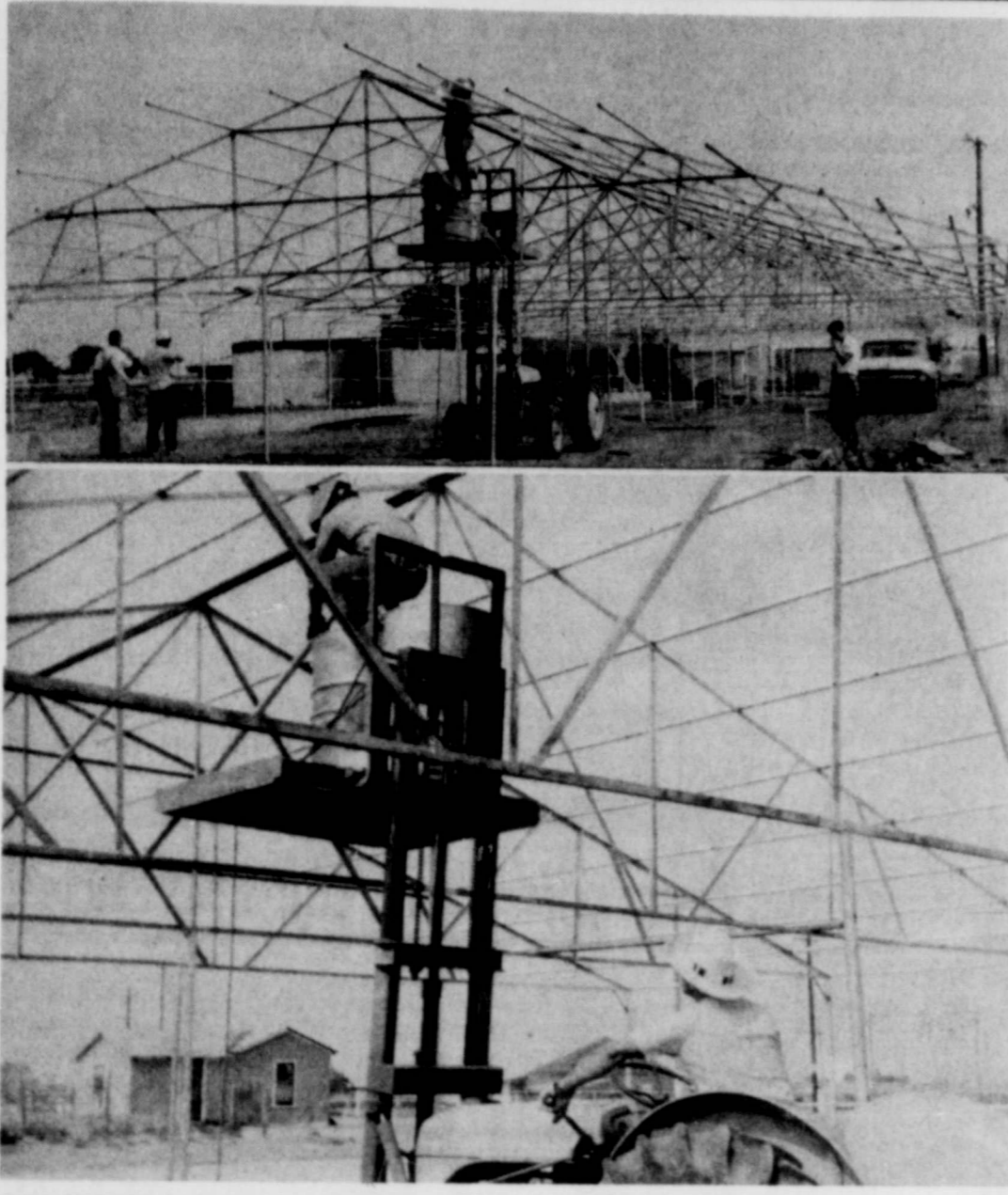

Greenhouse Will Make Tomatoes Available Locally Year 'Round

A greenhouse being built near the Silverton and Matador highways by L. D. Smith, Jr. and Chuck Holmes, will make fresh tomatoes available in Floydada from January through December. A small supply of cucumbers will also be available. The framework of the structure is almost completed now and the house will be in operation around August, according to Holmes. Two structures are involved,

a greenhouse and a packing and grading shed. The greenhouse will be 50 x 150 feet and the grader will be 50 x 50. The pair plan to grow some of the plants in a Hydroponic tank. That is, there will be no soil involved, and all chemicals will be taken out of the water by the plants in the tank. This is one of the most popular ways to grow greenhouse vegetables, according to Holmes, and has been done for several years by vegetable growers in the Western U. S. Most of the plants, however, will be grown in the soil.

The plants that will go into the house are already growing at Barwise and will be moved to the house around August 1. The first production is expected to be packed and sold around November 1. Primarily the installation is set up to serve Floyd County and the surrounding communities, but marketing as far away as Houston is expected by the builders. "The greenhouse will be a 150 x 50 evaporative air conditioner," Holmes said recently. "The entire south wall will be cooler pads and in the north wall will be several suction fans that will draw the air through the pads. A summer temperature of below 80 degrees and a winter temperature of 58 to 78 degrees will be maintained all

Wide Street For New Grade School

A joint meeting between the Floydada school board and the city council approved a 51 foot wide street to be paved in front of the new grade school now being built in the southeast part of the city. Some interested property owners also met with the group. The property owners will pay half of paving costs on the basis of a 41 feet street. The city and school will pay over \$8,000 each on the paving.

Bonds Posted In Matador Bank Robbery

Sammy Jim Horton, 24-year-old Texas Tech senior accused of robbing the First State Bank at Matador last Thursday, was free on bonds totaling \$110,000 Thursday night. Horton was released from jail following a chain of events that earned him his freedom for the first time since his arrest near Floydada. The suspect was transferred from Lubbock County jail to Matador Monday and had remained there until posting \$50,000 bond on state charges filed in connection with the bank robbery.

After posting bond on the state charges, he was brought to Lubbock by agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation and arraigned on a three-pronged federal charge before U. S. Commissioner Frank R. Murry. He was later released after posting \$60,000 bond on the federal charges. Horton faces state charges of robbery by firearms, and federal charges under a section of the bank robbery act alleging unlawful robbing of a bank with deposits insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.; plac-

It was hit by a truck belonging to Weems Texaco that was being driven south by Fidel Martinez. The truck overturned following the wreck and the car was spun around but did not overturn. Butane was released from the truck tank to lessen the possibility of an explosion. Reeves suffered slight cuts and bruises but Jimmy Owens, a passenger in the car, and Martinez escaped without injury.

Spraying Begins On 6,000 Acres

A joint effort by farmers in the eastern part of Floyd County materialized out of a meeting to discuss the boll weevil situation at Dougherty last Friday night. A survey team, working for the Extension Service, noticed considerable buildup of weevils in the Dougherty area and a meeting was called to discuss a solution. The group decided that a joint effort would be needed to control the weevils in the growing season, and a contract was let for the spraying of close to 6,000 acres to help control the pest. Norman Spraying Service of Dougherty was awarded the contract at \$1 per acre and the Spraying Service would furnish the materials and insecticide.

Jury Finds For Plaintiff Here, Awards \$40,000

In a case before the District Court here last week the jury found for the Plaintiff and awarded her \$40,000 for damages done by the defendant. The case was entitled Mrs. S. A. Thornton vs. Henry L. Stafford, suit for damages. The incident arose from a series of blasting in a caliche pit north of Floydada in June of 1965. The plaintiff charged that the defendant caused to be set off a charge of blasting powder larger than it should have been and it damaged her house, out-buildings and wells on her property nearby. The defendant claimed that no excessive charge was set off, but the jury found for the plaintiff.

Lions Officer Installation Slated Today

The installation of the Lions Club officers for the 1966-67 year will be held at the regular luncheon today at the Colonial House, according to outgoing president, Tommy Assiter.

Veda Thayer will be the sweetheart for the coming year. Assiter became president of the club last fall when he was moved up from vice president to replace Weldon Harris who moved to Amarillo. R. H. Farris, District Deputy from Crosbyton will install the officers.

At the meeting, presided over by G. B. Morris, the group decided to have two applications. It was recommended by entomologists at the meeting that spraying begin when the largest squares on the cotton stalk were around match head size, and the second should take place before the plant has 1/3 grown squares. That time is the critical period for the weevils do not lay eggs before the plant has 1/3 grown squares. It was noted at the meeting that it is the third or fourth generation that migrates, and an in-season control method will cut down on the amount that will migrate farther into the county. A total of 6,000 acres were signed to be sprayed at the meeting last week and Ned Bradley, Ralph Johnston, Lawrence McDowell, Howard Drysdale, Kent Covington and S. C. Burtleson were named on a committee to get other acreage signed up. Several farmers in the Wake Community in Crosby County had joined in the effort, but dropped out. Early this week they decided to join the effort. Most cotton in the infested area began squaring about two weeks ago and the squares are at the proper size for the spraying to take place. Also, the

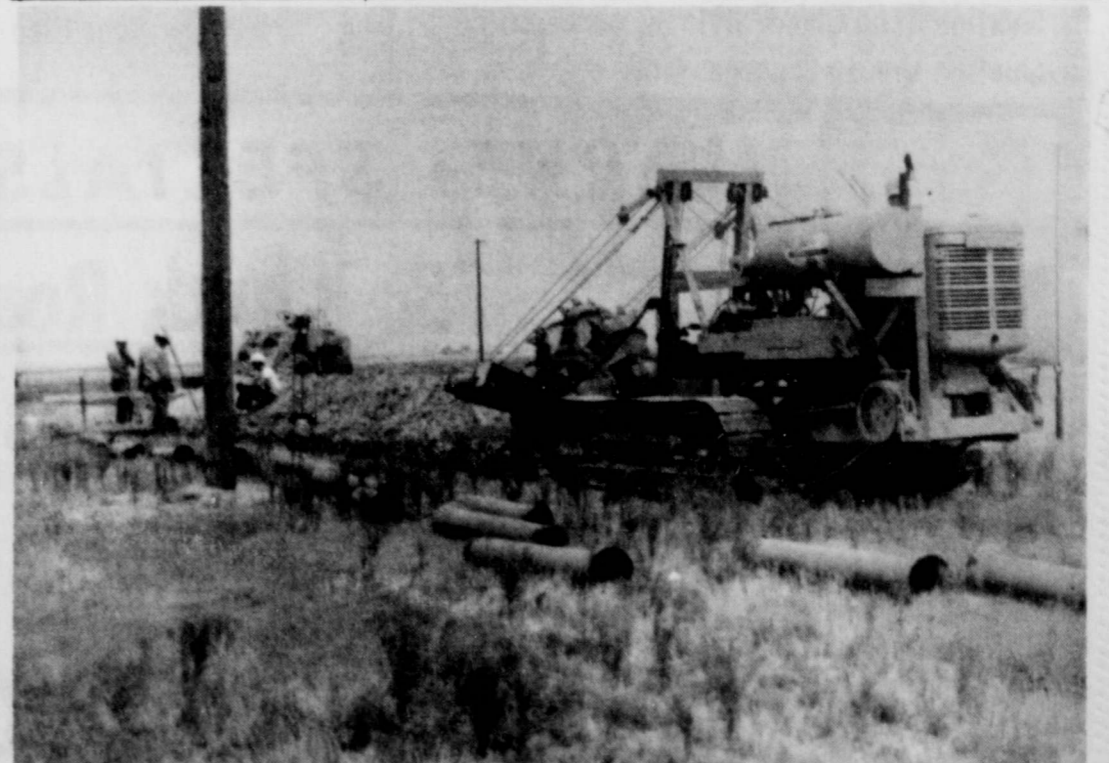
County Business At All Time High In 1965

The 1965 "Survey of Buying Power" published by Sales Management magazine is out and reports all time highs for Floyd County in retail sales and buying power. According to the report a total of \$24,091,000 was recorded last year in retail sales. This compares with a little over 19 million in 1964. A breakdown of the retail sales shows: food, \$4,756,000; eating and drinking, \$751,000; general merchandise, \$1,224,000; apparel, \$197,000; auto, \$6,659,000; gas stations, \$1,973,000; lumber and hardware, \$3,874,000; drugs, \$589,000. There was \$27,955,000 buy-

ing power recorded for the residents of the county. This is broken down into the following percentages according to family income: 29.9% under \$2500, 18.5% \$2500 to \$4000, 24.1% \$4000 to \$7000, 10.4% \$7000 to \$10,000, 17.1% over \$10,000.

water and chemical change will be automatic every 12 hours. Chemicals mixed in water will be transferred from a reservoir below the tank to the tank automatically. The old solution will be removed.

Although the grader and packing shed will be built primarily for use by owners of the greenhouse, other farmers are invited to make use of the facilities for their vegetables as well.

Holmes said, "If we like the tanks it won't be hard to convert the entire operation to that method. If we don't like them we can put flowers along the wall in the tank."

The price of the vegetables grown in the greenhouse will be competitive on the grocers' shelf.

Auto Insurance Rates To Go Up

The average motorist in Floyd County will pay \$4 more for automobile insurance if the proposed change in rates is made by the State Board of Insurance, according to the southwestern insurance information service of Dallas.

Present cost of insurance on a new Ford or Chevrolet private passenger car driven to and from work and not driven by a male under 25 years of age is \$138. The new cost would be \$142. This includes basic liability coverage of \$10,

\$100 for injury or loss of life of one person, \$20,000 for two, and \$5,000 property damage; \$100 deductible collision; and full coverage comprehensive insurance.

Under the new rates, motorists would pay \$1 more for bodily injury and property damage liability and \$5 more for comprehensive. But the cost of \$100 deductible collision would be reduced \$2.

Cost for the same coverage but with \$50 deductible collision would be increased \$4, from \$151 to \$155.

Other types and older cars would have different rates. Texas has 26 rating territories and eight automobile classifications. The cost estimates given are for cars in classification 1B, which includes about half of the private automobiles in Texas.

For cars in this classification and insured under \$100 deductible collision policies, insurance would cost less in nine territories and remain unchanged in two. Costs for \$50 deductible policies would be lowered in seven territories and unchanged in one.

Even with the rate increases, Texas would rank about 30th among the states in the cost of automobile insurance to policyholders.

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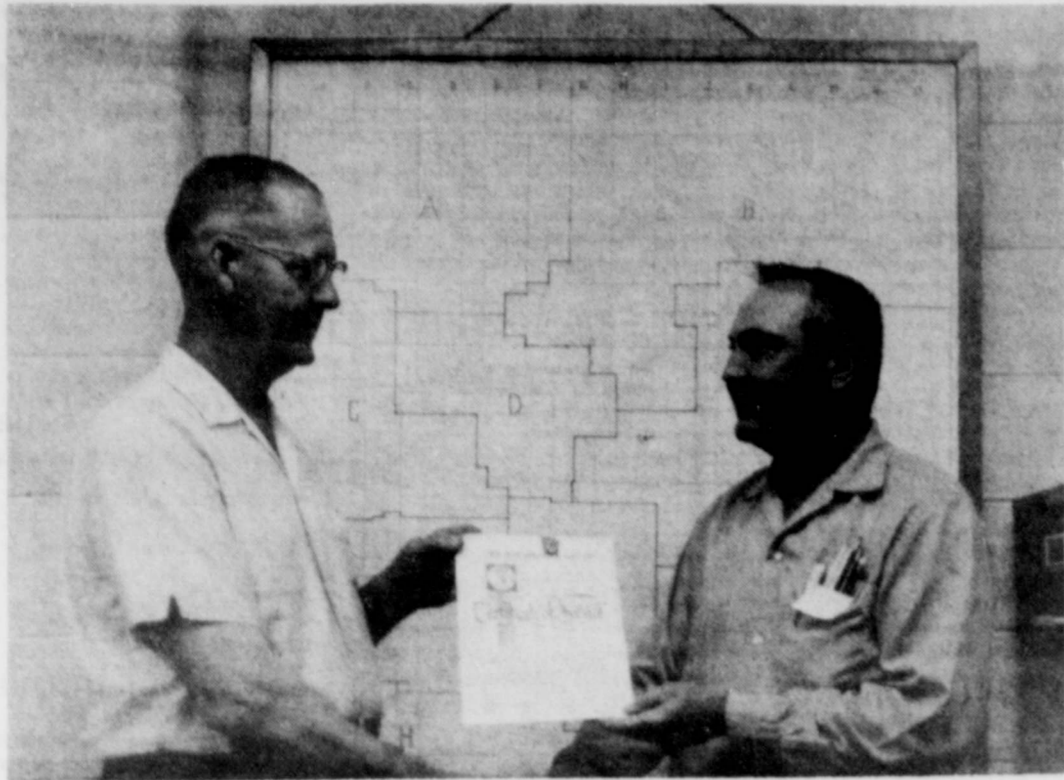

July Fourth Traffic Count 1966?

What will this July Fourth bring traffic wise? If it is similar to the ones in the past it will be deadly, injurious, and destructive. Our forefathers thought back in 1776 after declaring Independence that future generations would be free from wanton deaths and destruction. However, they were greatly mistaken to what the future would bring. During the last 190 years since our nation declared its Independence there have been eight major wars claiming 1,130,393 American lives. The automobile has been in existence for about 65 years claiming 1,559,950 lives. Thus, the battlefield has been a safer place than the "homefront."

The 1965 July Fourth holidays covered a period of three days in which there were 19 persons killed and 372 persons injured in rural traffic accidents in Texas. The 19 persons killed were involved in 14 fatal accidents. These fatal accidents involved 21 hazardous violations and one pedestrian violation. The 372 persons injured were involved in 178 injury accidents. The injury accidents involved 167 hazardous violations and 11 vehicle defects. There were 395 property damage accidents involving 344 hazardous violations, 28 vehicle defects, and one pedestrian violation.

On the rural highways in this DPS Region there was one fatal traffic accident claiming one human life. This fatal accident involved two hazardous violations. There were 20 injury accidents injuring 48 persons. These injury accidents involved 19 hazardous violations and four vehicle defects. There were 51 property damage accidents involving 40 hazardous violations and two vehicle defects.
