Hospital To Close

Eighty Six Persons Sign Letter Of Petition For Integration

The board of People's Hospital met Monday night and unanimously agreed to close the hospital on August 1st.

The Rev. Paul Link came before the Floydada school board at its regular meeting Monday night and read to them a letter to be sent to several government offices and officials protesting the new zoning plan approved by the school board.

About a month ago Rev. Link and a delegation of some nine persons came before the board on a similar request and the board answered that it would keep the zoning as planned.

The board took no action on Rev. Link's request Monday night.

The following letter was mailed to Congressman George Mahon, Senator Ralph Yarborough, Department of Health, Education, Welfare, Washington-

Murder With Malice Charged In Lockney Death

A charge of murder with malice has been filed in District Court against Valentino Rodriguez Garza in the slaying of Cavino Morales of Lockney, with a car Saturday night in Lockney.

A similar charge against Valentino Rodriguez Garza, Jr., that was filed Saturday night was dropped Monday when further questioning revealed that the father was the driver of the vehicle that killed Morales.

According to witnesses the two Garzas were in the Morales dwelling in a Coop Gin camp in southeast Lockney, when an argument erupted. Morales hit the older Garza in the mouth with his fist and the younger Garza seized an iron rod and started after Morales.

Both were picked up by authorities and Saturday night at Floyd County Court House, each of the Garzas accused the other of being the driver of the vehicle. Both were therefore charged with the crime and no bond was set.

Upon further questioning the authorities found that the older Garza was the driver of the vehicle, so charges were dropped against the younger Garza and he was released.

Services for Morales were held Tuesday in the St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Lockney, with the Rev. Paul Link officiating.

He is survived by his wife, Ester; three sons, four daughters, a sister, his father, Juan Morales of Lockney, and his step-mother.

AN EDITORIAL Brotherhood Of Man

The Hesperian has studied for the past month the new zoning plan of the Floydada school system for children who live in the city limits. We have talked to Latin, Negro and Anglo residents about the new zoning plan.

At this time, The Hesperian feels that it should editorially take a stand that differs with school officials. . . and possibly the federal government. The Hesperian feels that school officials in trying to satisfy the government in the change-over from "freedom of choice" to "zoning" have created a situation that is unfair to both the Latin and Negro children.

The situation is this: 1. Floydada school officials have zoned the city for school attendance, creating a zone in the Della Plains school area where 115 Negro and 90 Latin students will attend school. No Anglo students will attend Della Plains.

2. The Latin Americans who live in this zone, who in the past have been allowed to attend "white" schools must attend Della Plains. They desire the association of both Negro and Anglo children.

3. The school officials feel that the government will approve the zoning plan because the government considers Latins "white" and will consider the Della Plains enrollment as almost 50-50 Negro and white.

4. The school officials went to the zoning plan after the government required more integration in the system. Under the "freedom of choice plan" which has been used in the past, only 25 to 30 Negro children chose to attend the white schools.

5. Four or five Anglo teachers will join the Negro teaching staff at Della Plains.

6. Latin and Negro children who live out of the city limits will be attending grade school at Andrews Ward. All children regardless of race, color or location of home will attend Junior High and High School.

7. Eighty-six persons including some local ministers have signed a letter of protest to government officials about the zone plan which limits only Negro and Latin children to attendance at Della Plains.

The Hesperian joins with these 86 people in the belief that every child should have the best learning experience possible. . . especially the Negro and Latin children who have so many cultural traits to overcome.

The Hesperian feels that the question of concern should not be the "fear of what the adults will say" should full integration be the plan, but the question of utmost importance should be "what is the best learning experience that we can give the Latin and Negro children?"

The Hesperian feels that Floydada school children should be mixed regardless of race or color as other area schools have done. . . not necessarily because of governmental requirements, but for the sake of the child's learning process and the "Christian Brotherhood of Man" principle.

The Hesperian suggests that the school officials take another look at the "Princeton" plan of school attendance and when the new grade school is finished in January put this plan into action. The Princeton plan would mean full integration in our school system. For instance, all first and second graders might attend the new grade school, all third and fourth graders might attend Andrews Ward, and all fifth and sixth graders might attend Della Plains. (Of course this could be varied according to the capacity and facilities in each of the three grade schools).

The Hesperian feels that this plan would meet the requirements of the Civil Rights Law . . . but better still follow the plan of love set by the example of Jesus Christ.

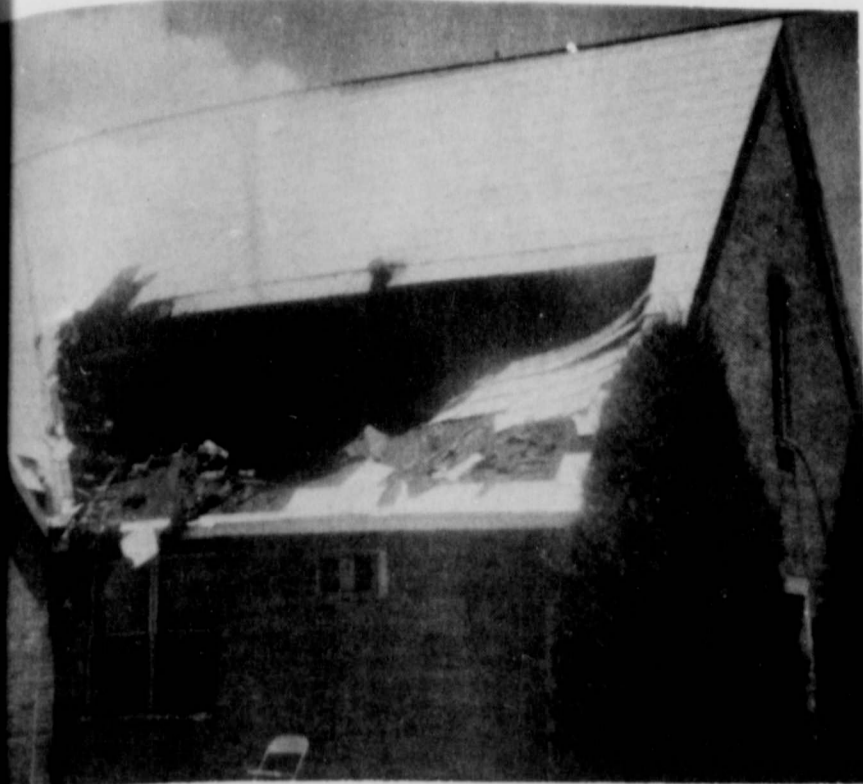
The group asks that area residents go through the scrap lumber they may have been planning to throw away and see if some can be salvaged for use as target frames, bench rests, or other part of the range.

Council Looks At Improvements Cost

In its regular session this week the members of the City Council looked at the expenses that will be incurred this year with all the capital improvements hitting the city in one year.

The additions that should, and normally, fall over a three or four year period, have created a burden on the city's finances.

The improvements include the facilities to Texas Addition, utilities and paving to Duncan Elementary School, improvements in Steen Place, Floydada Municipal Airport, Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority, West Crockett Street Improvements and Price Street expenses. These total \$158,508.08, which takes a big bite out of a \$600,000 budget.

A group of land owners petitioned the council for annexation to the city limits. The land is located on Price Street from the railroad east to the Silverton Hwy., a strip of land 82' 6" amounting to 11.1 acres. A public hearing has been set for July 26, as can be seen by the public notice in today's Hesperian.

The council members voted to pay the Board of Equalization members and give them a vote of thanks for their work this year.

The council was presented an ordinance for consideration that would zone the city into residential, business and industrial areas, and would legislate the type structure, minimum square footage etc. to be built in the areas in the future.

A public hearing was held on the ordinance Tuesday at City Hall, but no public argument against the ordinance was voiced by any citizen. However, the zoning commission found

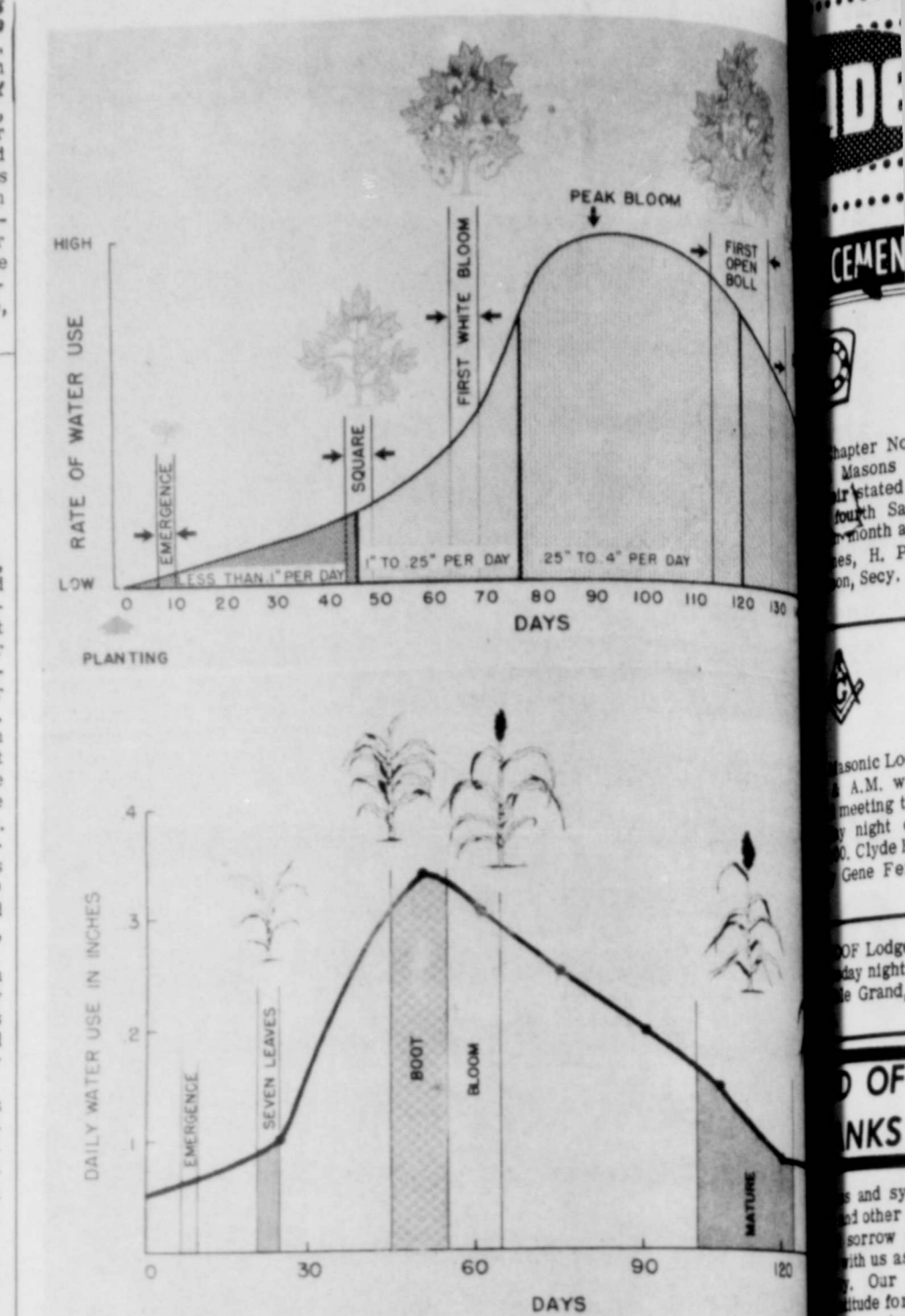

Research Indicates Time To Water Cotton, Grain Sorghum

Many years of irrigation research have led to the development of a number of basic principles farmers can use to decide the time and amount of water to apply to cotton

and grain sorghum on the High Plains. Scientists have found that cotton uses about one-tenth of an inch of water up to about the square stage. Then the plant's water consumption increases rapidly until it reaches a peak of from 25 to 4 inches per day at the peak bloom stage.

If only one irrigation will be made, it should ideally go on at early peak bloom. Cotton to be irrigated twice or more during the summer has been found to produce more efficiently when the first irrigation is applied in the first white bloom period with the others following in the peak bloom period.

More than ten years of studies at the South Plains Research and Extension Center, near Lubbock, indicate that a pre-plant plus two summer irrigations will produce the maximum net returns in the long run.

Additional irrigations naturally increase per acre yields, but the yields do not increase proportionally with the amount of water added. Late irrigations are sometimes not paid for by the small increases in yield and they can lower the cotton's quality.

Singer Lands on Pop Charts After Country-Western Hits

Eddy Arnold, probably the best voice in country-western singing, has landed on the pop charts -- as well as the country-western -- with his last four single records.

After "What's He Doing in My World?" did well about a year ago, Arnold sat down in Nashville with Chet Atkins to choose tunes for an LP to be called "My World."

"It wasn't to be songs with 'world' in them, necessarily," he says, "but I said I thought one good tune for it would be 'Make the World Go Away.' It has been done by two other artists already, but Chet said we'd do it."

Released as a single, that became a hit. His third, was "I Want To Go with You," written by Hank Cochran, who also wrote "What's He Doing in My World?"

His fourth -- and present entry on the charts is "The Last Word in Lonesome Is Me," by Roger Miller.

"Roger and I did a show together in Chicago a year ago in April," Arnold says, "and he did this song. It was on the B side of his record, 'Engine Engine No. 9.' It was a ballad and he seems to have better luck with the rhythm things. So I said to him, 'This is a very pretty song. If it doesn't happen for you, I'll remember it and I might do it later on myself.'"

"He is delighted that I've done it," Arnold says. "He has written a few songs that have become hits: and 'Just a Little Lovin' Will Go a Long Way,' and in collaboration with Sandy Walker, 'You Don't Know Me.'"

And he has been received by the pop as well as country public before. His "Bouquet of Roses" sold over a million copies in 1948. "You have to get into the pop buyer market to sell a million," he says. "There are not enough dyed-in-the wool country fans to make a record a million seller."

son, Tenn.) and tried to make a living singing and playing the guitar. I didn't know there was any difference. I just sang them straight. I never attempted to sing with a nasal sound.

"I had twanging instruments with me, but I never sang with a twang."

Arnold cut his first record, "Mommy Please Stay Home with Me," in 1945, for RCA. He has been with RCA ever since. Three or so records later he had his first hit, "That's How Much I Love You."

The biggest change in Arnold's music has been the switch from twanging back-ground instruments to a string orchestra.

At his first concert in New York's Carnegie Hall, in May, he used strings most of the time and for one group of old songs accompanied himself on the guitar.

"I do a little bit of everything -- country-western, pop and folk -- in my performances," he says. "I have no intention of going all the way to pop."

At Carnegie Hall, the song which most delighted the audience was one he sang with guitar only -- a cattle call which displayed a beautiful, floating tone and unaffected style and evoked strong feelings of nostalgia in many listeners.

In some ways, Eddy Arnold seems "country," in other ways, very "city."

He lives on 100 acres 10 miles from Nashville but lets his riding horses get fat while he plays golf and goes boating. He dresses in business suits and goes "cowboy" only when appearing at rodeos, where western garb is everybody's costume. He speaks with twang and without down-home phrases. He gives a smooth, polished performance on a stage.

But he looks outdoorsy and his blue eyes gaze steadily, with the expectation that everyone he meets will be neighborly. His conversation is warm, sometimes boyish and frankly emotional. Like many country people, he enjoys talking about his family.

And he misses his daughter, married last fall, even though she comes over two or three times a week.

Asked whether he worries about being "too country" or "not country enough" for fans, he says, "I just live the way I live and forget it."

To meet Eddy Arnold and to listen to him sing is to decide that he has the best of both worlds.

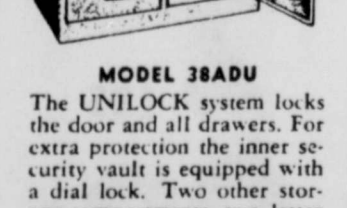

more is planned for this year). This year the plan of the Floydada Independent School District is as follows. The high school and junior high school departments of the previously all-Negro school are to be closed, with complete integration into the previously all-white school in these departments. However, the previously all-Negro school is to remain in operation as an elementary school, (grades 1-6). The City of Floydada has been divided into three school zones, as indicated on the enclosed map; those living in each zone being required to attend the school in their zone. (The third elementary school is to be built and in operation by January 1, 1967, i.e. Duncan School). However, all children of the rural areas, who make up a considerable portion of the enrollment, will be routed to either the previously all-white school (Andrew's Ward) or to the new school (Duncan School). None of the rural children will attend the previously all-Negro school (Della Plains School).

As can be seen from the enclosed map, the Della Plains school zone (previously for the all-Negro school) includes the northeast section of the city. There are living here about 60% Negroes, 40% Latin-Americans. In the integrated school of Della Plains, there will be virtually no Anglo-American children; the few Anglo-American families formerly living in this zone have almost all moved out since the zoning.

The Floyd County Hesperian of April 21st of this year stated that the intention of the school board this year was to accomplish a true integration with no discrimination as to race, color or NATIONAL ORIGIN. We have protested this zoning to the school board as de facto discrimination to the detriment of the Negroes and Latin-Americans living in the Della Plains School Zone (cf. Floyd County Hesperian, June 16th of this year; copy of article is enclosed). Our protest was rejected.

The grounds of our protest are as follows. There has existed and still exists discrimination as to race, color and Latin-American population of our county. The Latin-American is not treated as an equal with the Anglo-American and is not always considered as a white person. Census cards and other documents many times distinguish between Anglo or White, Latin-American, and Negro; thereby demonstrating a threefold division. The Latin American people feel that they are "conveniently" being classified as White in the integration of the Della Plains School, while they are not given the "White" classification and treatment in all other affairs of their life in the county. The Anglo-American people as a whole have indicated a strong desire to avoid ever doing their part to integrate the Della Plains School. As the Floyd County Hesperian, June 16th (see the enclosed copy of the article), clearly states on page two in reply to a question as to how the members of the board themselves would feel were

they in the situation of the Latin-Americans living in the Della Plains School zone, "The board agreed that they would be unhappy with the situation."

We suggested to the board that the rural areas also be zoned to insure this true balance of all groups. This was rejected because "overcrowding would result." We then suggested that the city zone be made smaller so that the rural zoning could take place to insure the integration. This was also rejected. (It is a known fact that many Anglo farmers would be very greatly irritated should the zoning include them).

We therefore formally protest to you that this "zoning integration" in the Della Plains School zone is grossly discriminatory towards both the Negro and Latin-American people who live there. The children attending the first six grades at Della Plains will be deprived of a healthy association with the more affluent and culturally advanced Anglo-American. We suggest that some change be made in the plan of integration to insure that Negro, Latin and Anglo children will together accomplish a true and non-discriminatory integration of the previously all-Negro Della Plains School.

WE THEREFORE ASK THAT THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT REJECT THE ZONING INTEGRATION PLAN AS SUBMITTED BY THE SCHOOL BOARD OF THE FLOYDADA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT 077901.

AND WE ALSO REQUEST AN INVESTIGATION INTO THE PRESENT DISCRIMINATORY SCHOOL ZONE PLAN PROPOSED BY THE FLOYDADA INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT 077901.

All we are asking is for true and just integration without regard to race, color, or national origin. Next to the Negro of the country the Latin-American has been most discriminated against. We pray that our people will not have to resort to the same means to which our Negro brothers have had to do.

The letter was signed by 85 persons including some Floydada ministers.

The Rev. Link said that he preferred that the school board would correct the situation without intervention from the government, he said that the association of both Latin and Negro children with Anglo children would help them to become better citizens, and that he had always urged the members of his church to see that their children attended school, participated in PTA and other civic duties.

He asked that the school board consider the situation in all justice and love. He said that he had no prejudice against the Negro race.

Chairman of the board Ralph Johnston told Rev. Link that the board had no intention to discriminate against anyone.

ASC Committee Nominations Asked

A call for the "best men available" to serve on the ASC community committees was issued today by Leslie Ferguson, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee. Slates of nominees for membership on ASC community committees, soon will be established at the ASC county office.

"The committee system is the backbone of farm programs," the Chairman declared. "It's responsibilities include the conservation of natural resources, the stabilization of agricultural commodities, and price-support activities which protect and improve farm income. We need the best possible cross-section of farmers to insure effective administration of the various measures."

In Floyd County, Ferguson explained about 1600 farmers took part last year in one or more programs administered by the ASC committees. Funds disbursed under the Committees' supervision amounted to \$11,933,167.00. Of this amount, \$6,648,892.00 was for price support loans aimed at increasing market returns above what farmers would receive on an unsupported market. Included in the price support program in this county are such major commodity programs as wheat, grain sorghum and cotton.

Last year, also, 482 farms were improved under the Agricultural Conservation Program cost-sharing arrangement. The total investment in conservation was about \$350,000.00, with about half coming from participating farmer and the balance from ACP.

The Chairman pointed out that any local resident who is eligible to take part in an ASCS program, may vote, and he may hold office as a committeeman regardless of race, color, creed, or national origin. Further information regarding qualifications of committeeman is available at the ASCS county office.

Farmers who are eligible to vote in the community committee elections also have the right to nominate as candidates for committee membership any farmer who is eligible and willing to serve. Such petitions,

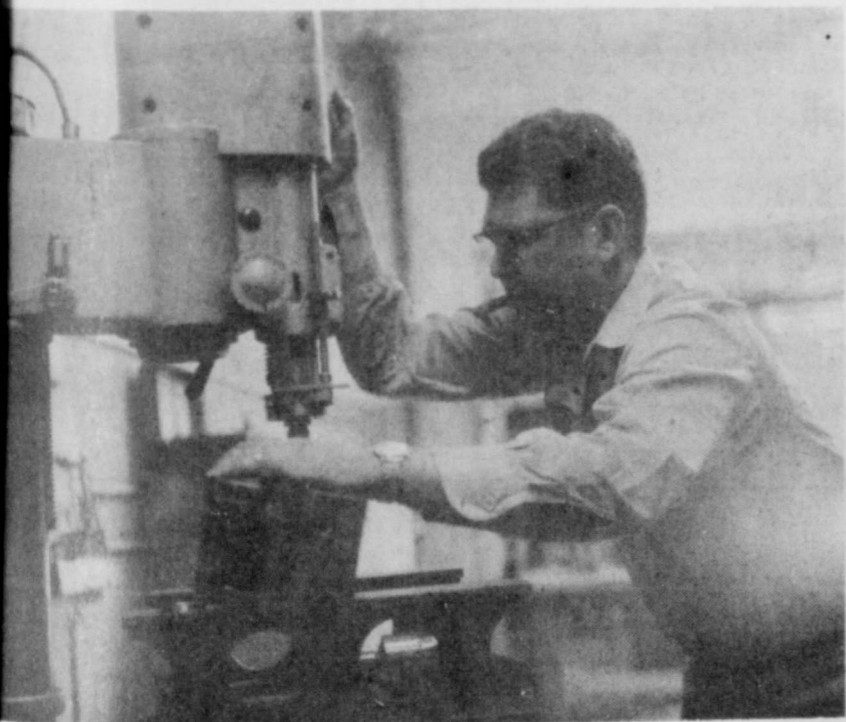

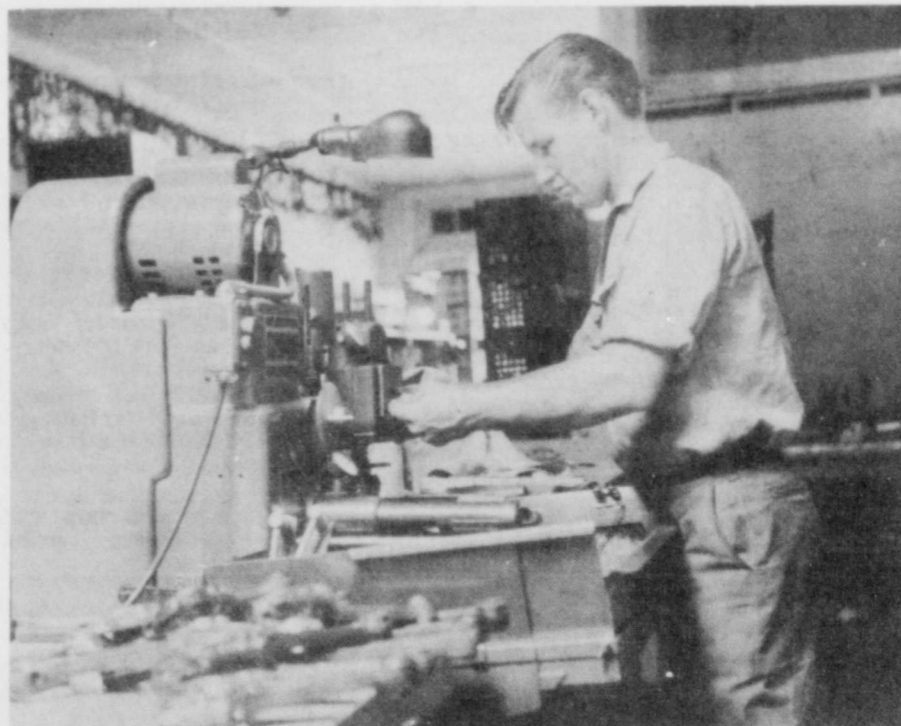

Federal Land Bank Celebrates 50th Anniversary This Month

For some 4,200 people who make their living from agriculture in Floyd, Briscoe, and Motley Counties, July will be a month-long testimony to the fact that they - and most other farmers - have turned out to be good businessmen.

It will be "Land Bank Month," the 50th anniversary of the Farm Loan Act which helped put farming on a business basis in the U. S. for the first time in history. Farmers at last were able to borrow money on reasonable terms and put it to work as a production tool.

Jake B. Watson, manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Floydada, said that farmers at the turn of the cen-

tury were regarded as poor business risks. "No one would lend them money to operate the way a businessman must if he is going to grow and contribute to his community," he said. "Interest rates for farmers were twice as high as for city businessmen, and the loans were for very short terms."

"Three presidents - Theodore Roosevelt, Taft and Wilson - studied the problem, and finally the Farm Loan Act was signed by Woodrow Wilson on July 17, 1916. This act created the Federal Land Bank System, through which farmers could make long-term, low-cost real estate loans from their own organizations."

"There are half as many farmers today as there were 50 years ago, and they're feeding a population that has doubled in this century," he said. "They rank among the greatest users of technology the world has ever known. Anyone who doubts it should visit a modern farm today."

"What goes on there - in new breeding, feeding, and other production techniques - makes many of the rest of us look as if we and not the farmers are living in the horse-and-buggy days."

"I don't know of another in-

The Federal Land Bank Association of Floydada is one of seventy-three associations in the Federal Land Bank District of the Houston, which in turn is one of 12 Federal Land Banks that serve the 50 states.

"Altogether," Watson said, "The Federal Land Bank System nationally has loaned its farmer-members more than \$12 Billion. The Land Bank of Houston has loaned Texas farmers more than 1.1 billion dollars."

Not only have farmers proved to be outstandingly good loan risks - Land Bank foreclosures are almost unheard of today - but, given money to work with, they have proved to be production geniuses of a quality rarely found anywhere in American business, Watson said.

"There are half as many farmers today as there were 50 years ago, and they're feeding a population that has doubled in this century," he said. "They rank among the greatest users of technology the world has ever known. Anyone who doubts it should visit a modern farm today."

Watson said that 723 farmers currently hold Land Bank loans in the three counties his association serves. Most of the loans have been used to expand, improve and modernize farm land and equipment. The largest category of borrowers (who are also Association members) produce cotton. Second are producers of grain sorghum. The average size of the loan made by the Association in 1965 was \$21,508.00, compared with an average loan of \$30,589.00 in 1964.

Strobane-DDT-menthyl parathion at 2-1-.5 lbs. to 3-1.5-.75 per acre.
Toxaphene - DDT - menthyl Parathion at 2-1-.5 lbs. to 3-1.5-.75 lbs. per acre.
Carbaryl (Sevin) & menthyl Parathion 2 lbs. plus .5 lb. to 3.0 lbs. plus .75 lbs. per acre.
Endrin-DDT-menthyl Parathion .3 plus 1.0 plus .5 lbs. to .5 plus 1/5 plus .75 lbs. per acre.
Azodrin .6 to 1.0 lbs. per acre.

Farmers and Ranchmen will not file a claim for refund of Federal tax on gasoline used on their farm and/or ranch as they have done in past years. Instead, the refund of Federal tax on gasoline used on or after July 1, 1965 must be claimed as a credit on their annual income tax return.

This credit will first be taken on the return for the first full tax year beginning after June 30, 1965. If the return is filed on a calendar year basis, the credit for gasoline tax refund taken on their 1966 return will include the tax on gasoline used in the period from July 1, 1965 through December 31, 1966.

The refund is claimed as credit in a manner similar to the credit for tax withheld on wages.

Grasshoppers are continuing to bother grassland and crops in Floyd County. Several farmers have applied insecticides for control measures. Hoppers are harder to kill as they get larger and older so the amount of insecticide might have to be increased to get a good kill.

The following insecticides and rates are recommended for grasshopper control on grassland:
Malathion 1 qt. per acre.
Sevin 2/3 to 1 3/4 lb. per acre.
Toxaphene 1 qt. per acre.
Heptachlor 1/2 to 3/4 pt. per acre.
Dieldrin at .2 lb. per acre of aldrin at .25 to .375 may be used on grasshoppers in cotton but should not be used on grassland.

Light bollworm infestations have been reported in Floyd County. The infestations are very scattered and are generally of no economic importance at this time, however bollworm infestations generally start about the middle of July and increase in intensity during the summer. Hot dry weather is a good deterrent for stopping an infestation.

To check for bollworms, 100 terminals of cotton plants should be checked over the entire field. The terminals should be examined closely for small worms less than 1/2 inch in length. Also check 100 squares over the field. Begin treatment when bollworms eggs and four to five young worms are found per 100 terminals or 5% of the small squares have been injured by bollworms.

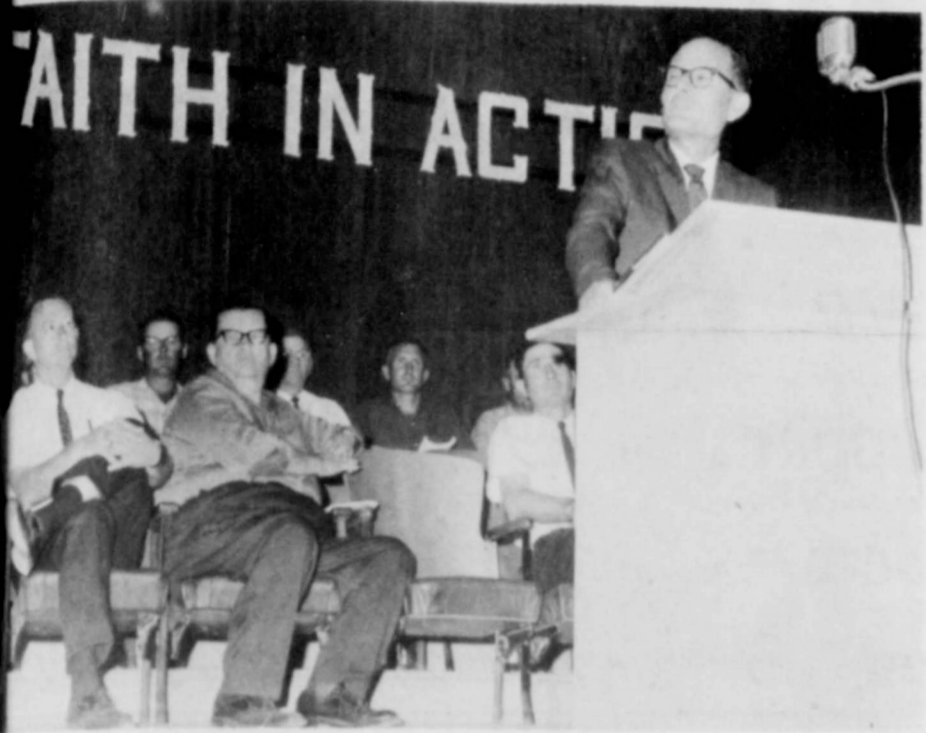
