## Floydada Reaches All Time Building Record

### \$2,863,856.00 In All Types Construction

According to a report from the local chamber of commerce office Floydada reached an all time high in building within the city limits for the period of November 1, 1965 to October 31, 1966, of \$2,863,856.00.

Records were compiled from building permits filed at the city hall.

Most of the amount was wrapped up in two big packages. . . over \$800,000.00 in schools and around \$900,000.00 in the new hospital.

Building expansions expense recorded since 1960 are as follows:

- 1960 - \$1,016,000.
- 1961 - \$1,393,000.
- 1962 - \$ 507,000.
- 1963 - \$1,196,000.
- 1964 - \$1,321,000.
- 1965 - \$1,193,750.

**RESIDENTIAL**  
Most of the \$457,650 spent on residential building was for new homes in the Texas, Steen, West and Willford additions. This figure also includes remodeling and repair work.

Of course, the tight money situation has slowed down building in the last month or two,

but several homes are now under construction in Floydada.

**COMMERCIAL**  
This year's commercial building and expansion amounted to \$113,000. Several businesses have made improvements. Beall Bros. made up the bulk of this figure. The tomato hot house is also included as a major item in this classification.

**PUBLIC BUILDING**  
The schools, hospital and airport make up the bulk of this total of \$2,079,861, recorded in this classification of building. The school, cafeterias, science wing and remodeling of school work is almost complete. The hospital is scheduled for completion in July or August and the airport could be finished next month.

**CHURCHES**  
Improvements and expansions in the city's 23 churches accounted for \$25,000 of the building expenditure.

**CITY IMPROVEMENTS**  
The city spent a considerable amount for paving and works improvements this year. This amounted to \$188,345.00.

According to telegrams received from U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough and Congressman George Mahon Floyd County has received approval of a grant for \$48,609.00 for migrant health service.

The telegrams read as follows: "Please be advised public health service has announced an award of a grant to Floyd County Commissioners in the amount of \$48,609.00 to provide farm migrant health service in Floyd County.

The county commissioners court had made application for the grant two or three months ago. Although the approval is granted for the money, it probably will not be available until around the first of the year.

**WTTA Christmas Seals Continue Job Year Round**

(Editor's Note: The following is one of a series of articles prepared by the West Texas Tuberculosis Association to remind the people it serves in 23 West Texas counties that Christmas Seals do a continuing job all year long. Where case histories are used, identities and locations are disguised to protect the privacy of individuals.)

In a West Texas town very near here, there once lived a man who had no steady, full-time job. Call him Joe. Joe wasn't lazy, but he felt lazy - kind of tired most of the time. Just a week or so ago, Joe spent one day something like this:

A cup of coffee with Harry and Mike at the drug store. He was coughing some, but Harry and Mike were used to his coughing. Then, an hour or so at Thurston's used car lot. He liked cars, and he liked to visit. He spat at a tire, and he visited with a customer and with a couple of salesmen. Later, more coffee at another Main Street coffee bar.

Because everybody else seemed to be lining up at the Tuberculosis Association mobile x-ray unit, Joe lined up, too. He had the time, and the x-ray Number 31,602-b took just a second. In minutes, he was back on the street, making the rounds.

A few days later, a doctor scanned x-ray Number 31,602-b. He stopped short, looked

again, and again made a careful check of this particular chest picture.

Then he marked it "urgent" and he made a telephone call. The chair reaction set in. The doctor's call led to a stir at the West Texas Tuberculosis Association offices in Lubbock. More telephoned messages - all including the word "urgent" - until the wandering Man on Main Street was located.

His home town doctor confirmed the urgency of this case. Joe had an advanced case of tuberculosis, both lungs showing severe damage.

Within hours, he was enroute to a hospital where he will live several months, until he can no longer endanger Main Street with the tubercle bacillus - the big name for the deadly germ that travels on a breath of air.

Approximately 50 persons in 23 West Texas counties already this year have learned that they have suspected cases of active TB. Judging by past figures, close to 3,000 Texans will be found to have active TB this year. They will be among 50,000 Americans to make the same discovery and among two or three hundreds of millions of infected persons in the world. In the developing countries, health authorities estimate that 10 to 15 million active TB cases are able to transmit the disease to one another and to travelers. In the U. S. alone, the disease kills 9,000 persons annually - 434 in Texas last year.

It is the business of Christmas Seal gifts to reduce these numbers, and they are being reduced. A seal on a letter says that somebody, somewhere cares to eradicate tuberculosis.

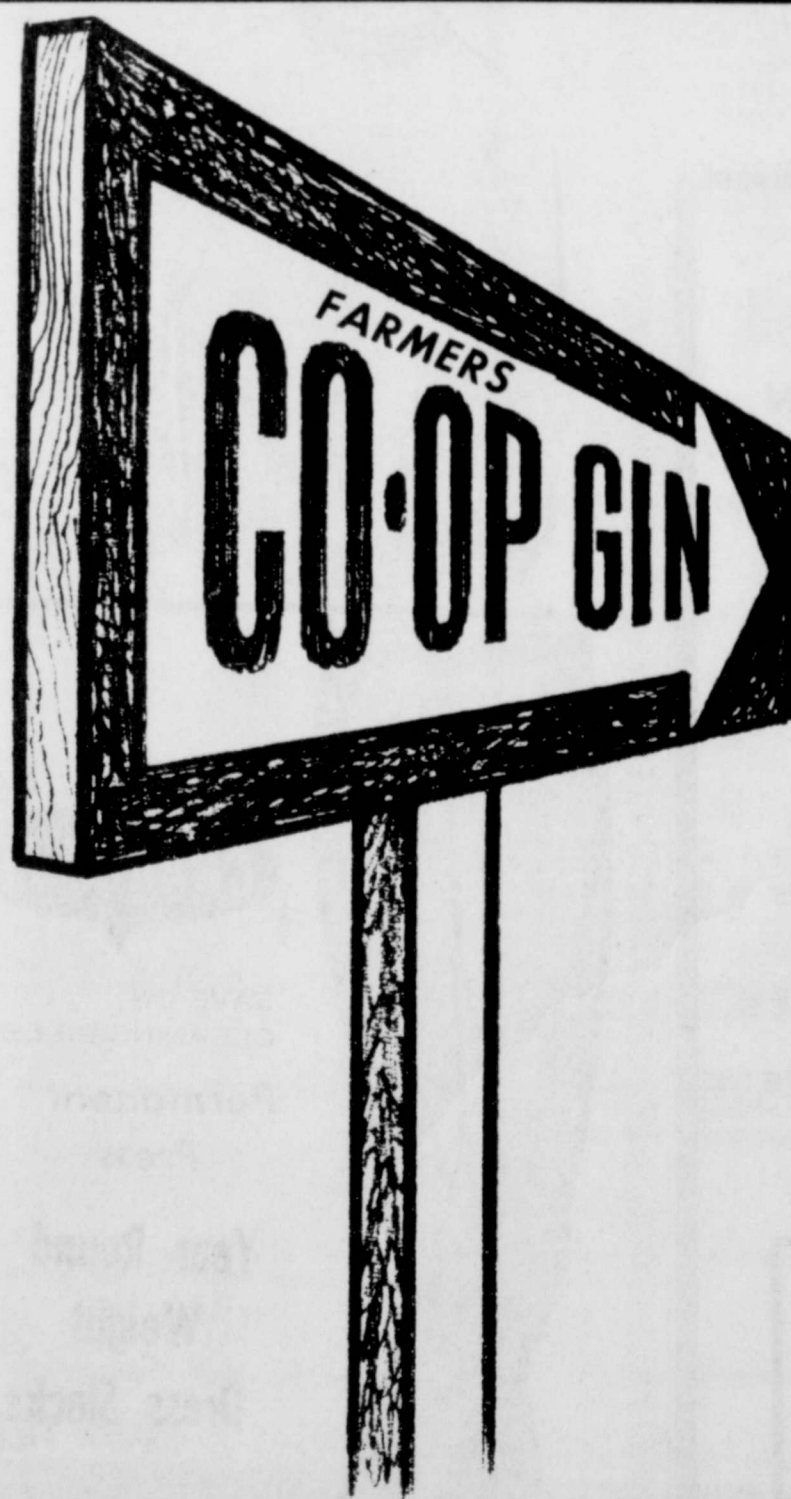

**ORANGE CANDY CAKE**  
1 cup butter  
2 cups sugar  
5 eggs  
1 tablespoon vanilla  
1 (8 oz.) package dates, cut up  
1 (1 lb.) package orange slice candy, cut up  
2 cups pecans, chopped  
1 (4 oz.) can shredded coconut  
4 cups sifted flour  
1/2 teaspoon baking soda  
1 teaspoon salt  
3/4 cup buttermilk  
Cream butter and sugar until fluffy. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Add vanilla. Mix dates, candy, nuts and coconut with 1/4 cup flour. Sift remaining dry ingredients; alternately fold them into creamed mixture with buttermilk. Fold in fruit-nut mixture. Spoon into well-greased and floured 10" tube pan. Bake in slow oven (300) for 2 1/2 hours.

Remove cake from oven and pour on a syrup of 1 teaspoon each grated orange and lemon peel, 1/4 cup each orange and lemon juice and 1/2 cup confectioners sugar.

Cool cake on rack; then remove from pan. For improved flavor and ease in cutting, wrap cake in aluminum foil and refrigerate at least one day before serving.

This cake is sweet and moist with the flavor of fruit cake, but not the expense.

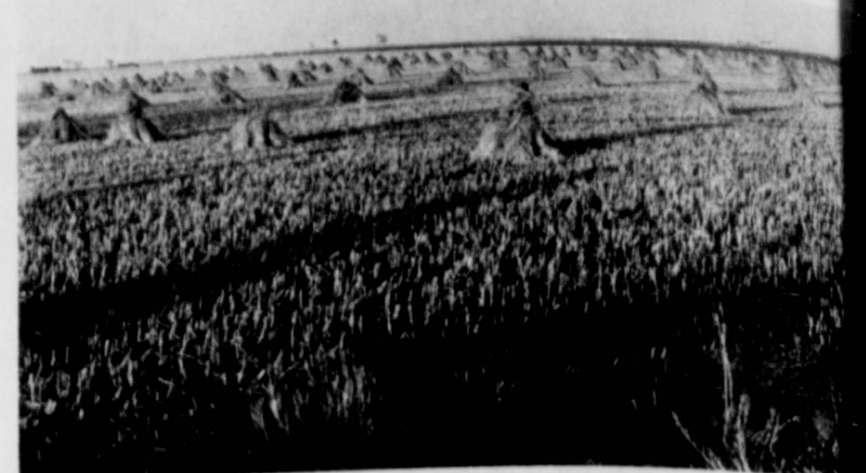

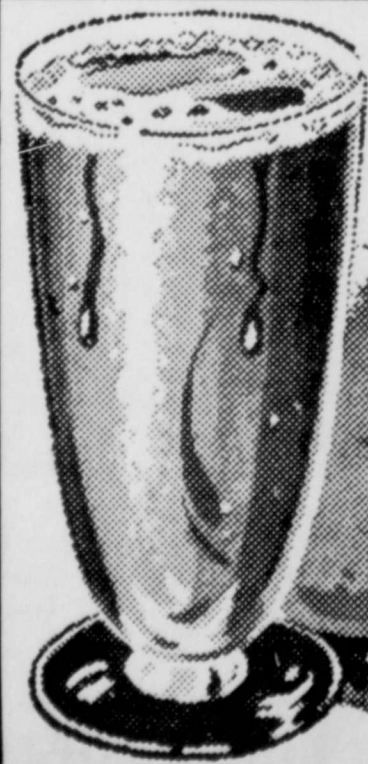

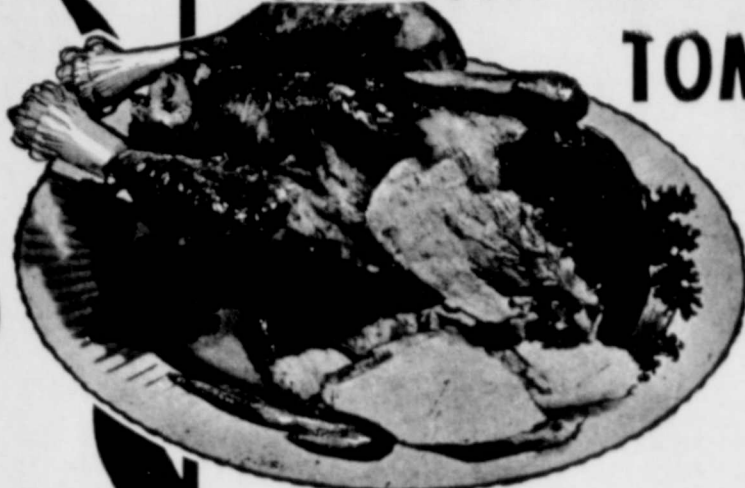

Telephone Prefixes To Change In July

All telephone number prefixes in Floydada will change from YU 3 to 983 in July. This new telephone numbering plan is known as All Number Calling (ANC).

Bob Davis, manager for Southwestern Bell, said about three-fourths of the telephones in the United States have already been converted to All Number Calling. The change to a new numbering system is necessary because of the tremendous growth in the number of telephones. Telephone companies would eventually run out of suitable numbers if they did not convert to All Number Calling, he said.

Davis explained that for Floydada customers the prefix is the only part of their telephone number that will change. The last four digits of the numbers will remain the same. He noted, too, that the location of the all number prefix on the telephone dial will be the same as the present prefix, meaning, of course, that telephone users will continue dialing exactly as they do now.

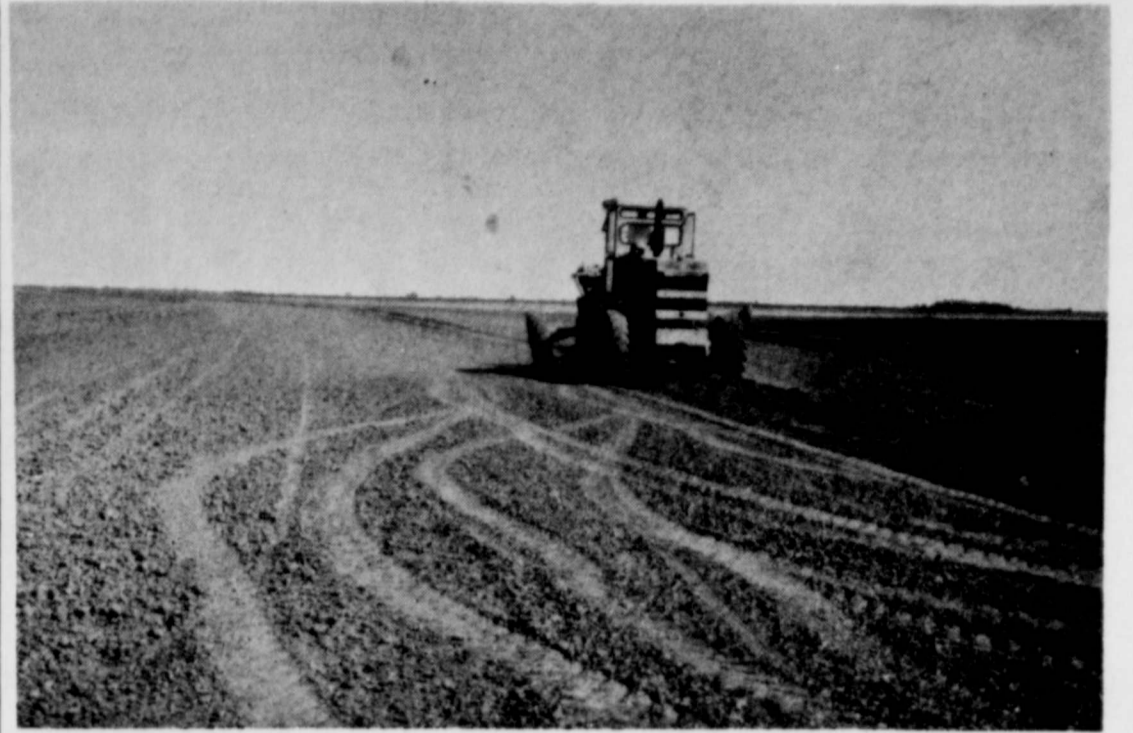
Telephone directories listing the new numbers will be distributed when the changeover is made.

Giving an example of the new all-numeral numbers, Davis said the Southwestern Bell business office number will change from YU 3-2891 to 983-2891.

Persons who plan to order stationery and other printed material on which telephone numbers are carried should keep in mind that their number will change in July.

The changeover to all-numeral numbers in Floydada is part of a Southwestern Bell program to convert all telephones in the states served by the company to All Number Calling gradually over the next few years.

Davis noted that all-numeral numbers will eliminate dialing errors caused by confusion of the numeral "1" with the letter "I" and of the letter "O" with "zero."

All Number Calling is also a step toward worldwide dialing where the language problem negates the use of letters, he pointed out.

He said, too, that the trend in telephone instrument design is toward compactness. A dial with only numbers can be smaller, yet actually more readable and easier to use than a dial with both letters and numbers.

**EDITORIALS**

**The Split Ticket Vote**

Political reporters and editorial writers all over the U. S. . . . and the world are analyzing the recent general election in the United States. Many reasons are cited for the gain of Republicans in Congress.

In the meantime we here in Floyd County are studying the Carr-Tower election. Mr. Carr himself hasn't completely decided why he lost the race; he said that it could be a vote against the national administration.

Several reasons are evident:

1. The incumbent Senator Tower had an advantage in being in the office. . . . and evidently doing a good job.

2. The Republicans put a lot of personal contact work into the campaign.

3. The Republicans spent about \$100,000 more money on the campaign than did the Democrats.

4. Texas people liked the job that Senator Tower has done in the past.

5. Unhappiness with the national administration.

Floyd County voters followed the state trend of voting for Tower. . . . they also followed a state trend of split ticket voting. The majority of Texans and Floyd County voters have not turned Republican.

In Floyd County around 1400 voted for Democrat governor John Connally. . . . around 1100 voted for Republican Senator John Tower.

Split ticket voting indicates a trend away from party loyalty. . . . a trend toward independent voting. . . . which is usually considered voting for the man instead of the party.

Another factor to be considered is the feud among Democrats in Texas. . . . which may have kept the liberal element from going to the polls at all. Connally's conservative forces took control of the state convention. . . . and the minority liberal group didn't like Carr. . . .

**GUEST EDITORIAL**

**Time To Stand And Be Counted**

A GENTLE lady once said of a rather nonconformist friend who had a way of expressing his personal whims, whether or not they were popular: "He has the courage of my convictions."

She agreed that she admired her outspoken friend, but showed plainly that she had no intention of following his example. It was much easier to be a conformist, to go with the crowd, than to risk social isolation by being different from others.

Most people are like that. In matters of clothes we're inclined to be conformists, and in thought and life we're tempted to go with the crowd. Yet few can keep from admiring a person of conviction and moral courage.

It's harder today than ever before to go against the crowd when some great moral issue is involved. Few want to do so and thus risk losing their popularity, in an age in which popularity has become something of a fetish. Yet some do, and these have become the "conscience of mankind" in a period of cynicism and confusion. They are not necessarily individuals who make a show of piety, but they are men and women who possess strong convictions and are not ashamed to declare them.

Carr is considered with the conservative group.

We doubt that many of the liberal Democrats voted for Republican Tower. . . . Instead . . . they just didn't go vote.

We have asked many farmers what they don't like about the national administration. . . . why they are voting against a Democratic leadership.

One told me that he just wasn't making as much money under the present farm program. He said his half section used to gross \$50,000 . . . now it grosses only \$35,000. Of course, there are several reasons why a farm might lose money. . . . weather conditions play an important role. . . . and certainly government prices and acreage allotments exert considerable control over what a farmer will gross.

Another thought might be what the net profit picture in farming is today compared with what it was when the Republicans controlled the farm program.

Certainly farmers were unhappy under Benson. . . . in fact few government programs have been popular.

We asked this farmer who said that his gross was declining under the Democratic administration if he thought the Republicans could help the situation. He said he was ready to give them a try.

We asked him how he voted last Tuesday. He said he didn't feel like voting for Carr or Tower. . . . and just didn't go vote.

On the other hand we talked to a farmer who said he was a Republican. He said, "I have complained about every government program that has come out. . . . yet I have paid out my farm and enjoy just a pretty good living."

In looking over the voting boxes for Floyd County, we recognize three things. . . . a lot of split ticket voting. . . . more Republicans live in the north end of the county. . . . one box remains strongly Democratic. . . . Starkey.

By going still one machine further back, we could predict how the first machine would predict how the handful would vote, and know right now what the election results will be in the year 2,000.

*Ship "Floyd County" Returns To San Diego*

The tank landing ship USS Floyd County (LST-762) returned to San Diego Nov. 9 after spending 15 of the last 17 months in the western Pacific. The past nine months were in Vietnamese waters supporting Navy River Patrol and Swift Boats and U.S.-armed Army helicopters in the Mekong River Delta.

The ship was scheduled to dock at the Naval Station, Pier 8 at 9:13 a.m.

Leaving San Diego Jan. 31 Floyd County off-loaded a Marine motor transport battalion in Chu Lai, Vietnam, in mid-March and then spent three weeks fitting-out in preparation for a special mission.

The ship was modified to support 10 River Patrol Boats and two Army helicopters. The boats and helicopters operated from Floyd County in the Mekong Delta. They teamed-up to stop and inspect Vietnamese

junks and sampans in an effort to stem infiltration of Viet Cong men and munitions and to keep the waters open for use by friendly forces. This is Operation Game Warden.

Floyd County spent two months in support of Game Warden, then left her Army helicopters behind to start a new type of LST operation.

After becoming the first LST to transit the Sol Rap River, the main artery of the Saigon River, Floyd County began 12 weeks of operations in support of Operation Market Time.

Market Time is the Game Warden counterpart on the high seas. The tank landing ship supported Navy Swift Boats and Coast Guard Cutters off the coast of the Ca Mau Peninsula.

Floyd County was the first Market Time LST to independently support smaller patrol craft over a long period of time. She was on station 83 days.

During both Game Warden and Market Time operations, Floyd County supplied her patrol craft and helicopters with over half a million gallons of fuel.

She is commanded by Lt. Shane P. Daniels of 4572 El Cerrito Drive, San Diego.

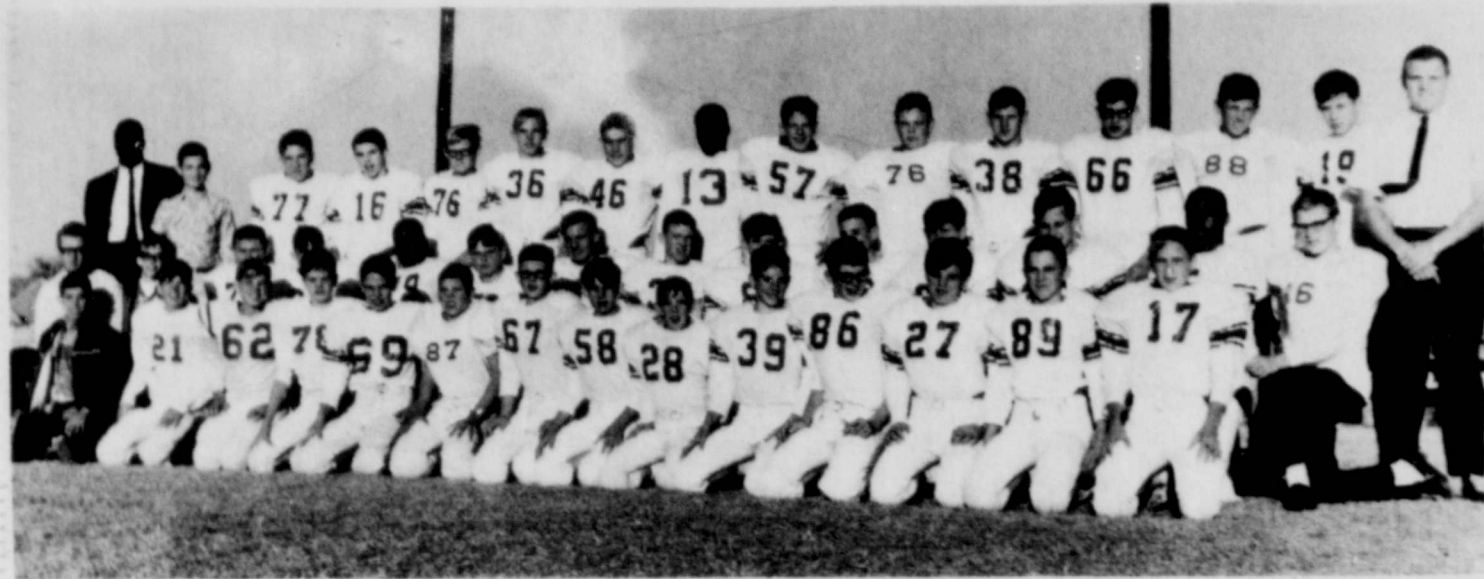

Christian made one, then Monday made 10. Next Barbee threw to Marler for another first and ten. The 'Winds couldn't go on the 47, so Bearden punted.

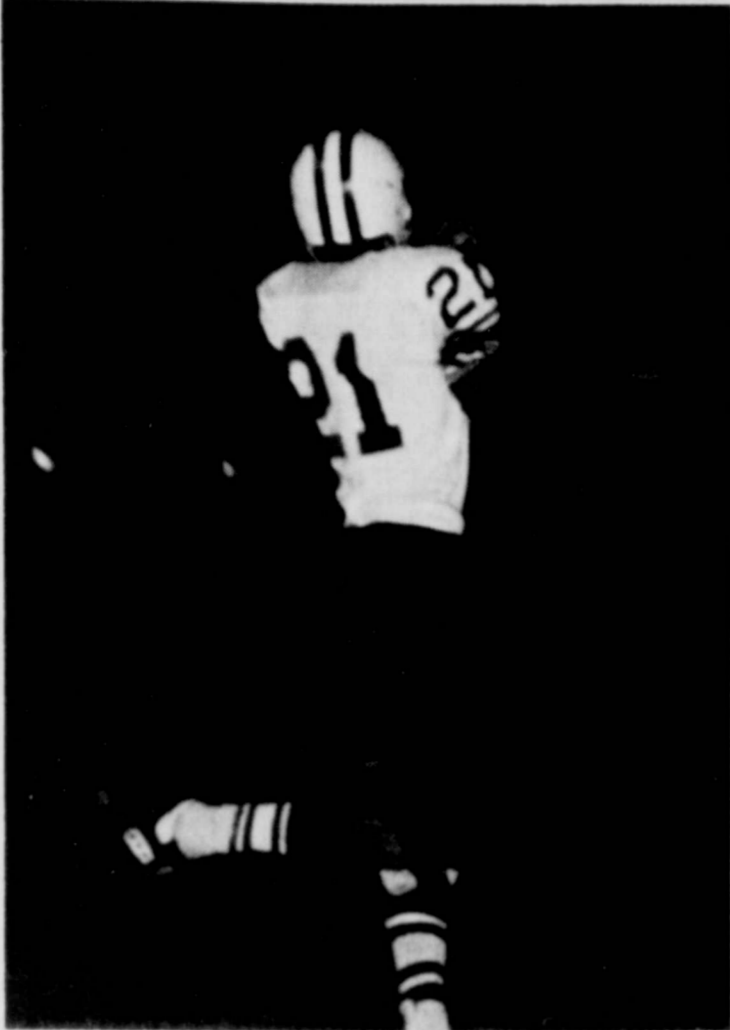
The Bobcats took the ball on their own 20 yard line. They made one first and ten, tried some passes that didn't work, then lost the ball on downs on their own 21 yard line.

Consumer  
Education Week**

November 15-18, 1966 has been designated as Consumer Education Week. It is to be a National observance. One purpose is to call the public's attention to the consumer educational information available from County Extension offices. There is always a supply of various educational pamphlets available free of charge at the County Extension Office. Everyone is invited to visit the office during the week or anytime during the year for educational materials relating to Home Economics and Agriculture.

Ten Timely tips for borrowers, according to CUNA, the National Association of Credit Unions:

1. No matter how good the

interest rate sounds, find out what the credit or loan will actually cost you in money. This is the first thing to do.

2. Before you sign any papers, make sure that all the figures are entered correctly. Never leave any blank spaces to be filled in later.

3. Question all insurance charges. Find out what kind of insurance you are buying, and exactly what it covers. Many different insurance "loadings" practices have been reported.

4. On installment purchases you may owe the payments to some other firm, not the dealer. Find out who it is, and if it is a reputable firm. If you have any doubts, check.

5. Read the note or contract to see what penalties are imposed for late payments. Some penalties are exorbitant.

6. See if there are any other extra charges specified in the note or contract. Don't skip the fine print or you may be sorry.

7. Read what is said about repossession in a time-payment contract. Do you get a fair notice before the item is repossessed? What repossession charges can be levied against you? This is important.

8. Understand clearly what security you are giving. On a purchase, find out if it includes other merchandise you have bought previously. Above all look to see if the note or contract gives your creditor the right to collect your salary through a wage assignment.

9. Make sure you do not sign away any of your legal rights or guarantees, such as the right to refuse merchandise that is not as promised.

10. See if there is a provision for a refund of interest or carrying charges if you complete the payments ahead of schedule.

**Cotton Harvest Gains Momentum**

The South Plains cotton harvest continued to gain momentum during the past week and the volume of samples received at the three USDA Classing Offices was highest for any week this season, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the USDA Classing Office in Lubbock.

The classing offices at Lubbock, Brownfield and Lamesa received approximately 15,000 samples daily during the week ending Thursday, November 3rd, and classed 27,000 samples during the week. This brought the season's total for the three offices to 39,000. This year's harvest continued to lag behind the 1965 harvest. Through November 3rd last year, 91,000 samples had been classed.

Trading increased in the new crop cotton on the Lubbock market but prices remained

steady. Demand was strongest for cotton with micronaire of 3.5 and better and cotton in this micronaire category was selling at a greater premium.

Cotton prices paid South Plains farmers, as reported by the Consumer and Marketing Service of the USDA, ranged from the loan to \$3.00 per bale over the loan for the White grades. Light Spotted grades were bringing from \$1.00 to \$5.00 per bale over the loan.

Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire range were: Middling 29/32 - 19.55, Middling 15/16 - 20.00, Middling 31/32 - 20.80, Strict Low Middling 29/32 - 18.50, Strict Low Middling 15/16 - 18.50, Strict Low Middling 31/32 - 18.90, Middling Light Spotted 29/32 - 18.20, Middling Light Spotted 15/16 - 18.65, and Mid-
