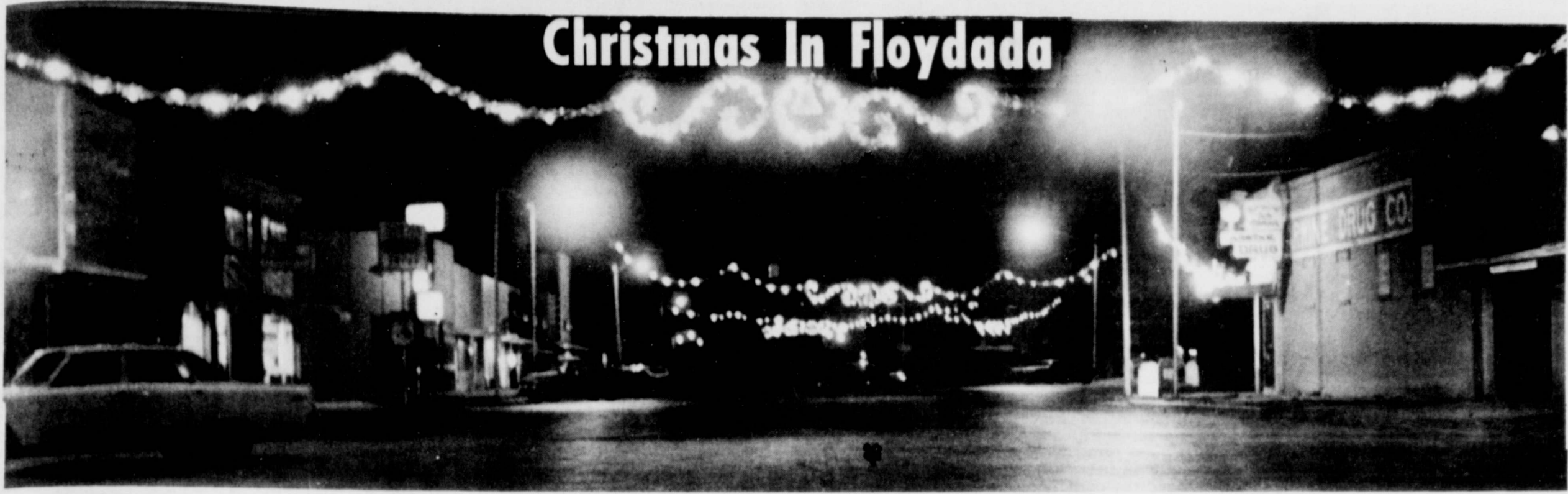

Schools Admitted to Southern Association

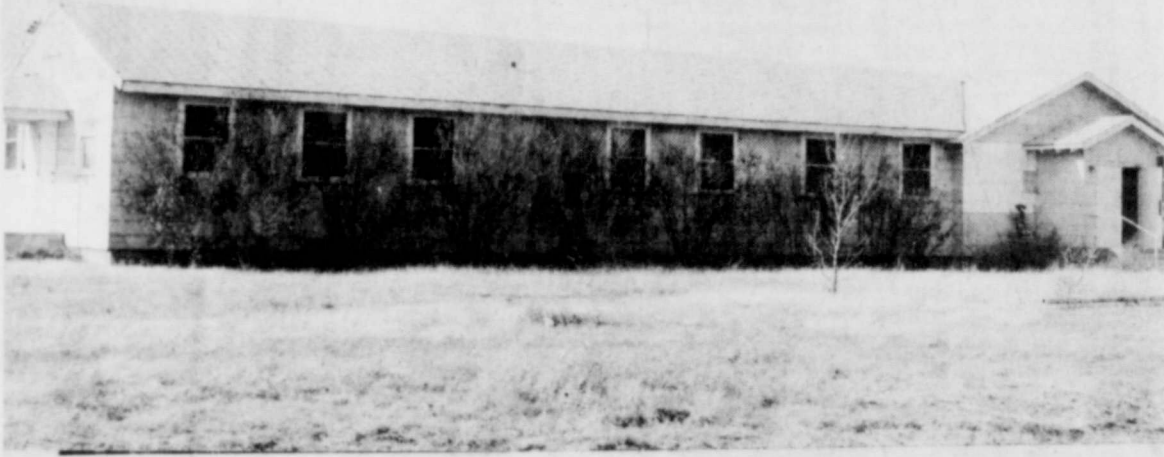

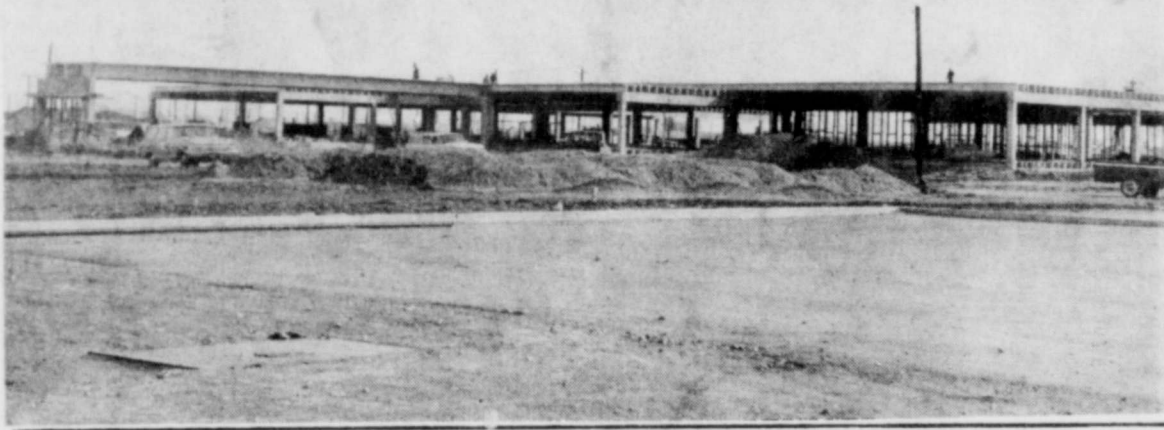
ACHED a group of fellows (they're now) . . . who I think will be winners in football, basketball and I don't know whether it will happen.

Farmers Line Up At ASCS Office For Cropland Program

About 50 Floyd County farmers lined up at the local ASCS office last Thursday morning to make out applications to put crop allotments in the Cropland Adjustment Program.

The lineup came about due to the fact that there may not be enough money to cover the farmers who desire to put their land out of production.

By late Wednesday afternoon, 80 persons had put 14,407 acres in the program. If all acreage happened to be approved - and Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service officials say they could not possibly be - the federal government would pay \$580,000,00 per year.

Under the program, which many farmers referred to as

the "Soil Bank," the landowners agreed to retire such allotment crops as cotton and seed grain for a minimum of five years or a maximum of 10 years. The government pays for the land they do not use.

Tom Moore, ASCS manager, said the applications will be processed and investigated by the county ASCS committee "and they should be getting answers shortly after the first of the year."

Moore said Floyd County had an initial allocation of \$83,000. Lewis David, state ASCS director at College Station, said that Texas received a little over \$3 million to begin the program and "should get another million dollars. I could be wrong, but except for a few isolated places I think there will be enough money to go around this year."

High School Senior To Preach First Sermon

Ronnie Hill, a senior in Floydada High School, will preach his first sermon Sunday evening at 7:00 in First Baptist Church. Ronnie surrendered to the ministry a few months ago.

Special youth emphasis will be given to the entire service. The Junior Choir will present a Christmas Cantata, "Within A Little Stable." The Primary Choir will also present Christmas music.

Preceding the message two high school young people will give testimonies. The Youth Choir, composed of about thirty five teenagers, will present special music.

There have been three young men dedicate their lives to the gospel ministry in First Baptist Church within the past few months. Each of the others will have opportunity to preach in the near future.

Peoples Hospital Sells For \$9,495

Evidently there were not very many persons interested in buying a hospital. . . Peoples Hospital, in Floydada, when it went on the auction block Tuesday.

The equipment was sold in nine groupings for \$1495. Then the auctioneer (Sheriff Walter Hollums) sold the building and property at the courthouse steps for \$8,300.00.

Holder of the first lien note on the hospital, Farmers Union bought the building and property.

Although Floydada is now out of, and has been out of a hospital for over three months the people's hopes are not dimmed as they watch a new hospital fast taking shape on the western outskirts of the city.

Peoples Hospital has an "up and down history." It started

here as a prisoner of war barracks moved to its present location in 1951. It has been operated as a community enterprise. . . it at one time was under a semi-cooperative management, and until about a year ago was paying its way, until Doctors Ed Bayouth and Stermon Wells left town.

PEOPLE HAVE FAITH
There is no knowing how much the people of this community have put into Peoples Hospital. . . to bring it here, to remodel it countless times. Grants have been made for the equipment that was in it.

It is interesting to note that in spite of the poor history of its service, the people of this community raised over \$80,000 from their pockets this year to insure the building of the new hospital when the bid came out more than had been allotted through a bond election and Hill-Burton money to pay the cost of its building.

DOCTORS
Hollis Bond, head of the Caprock Hospital District board reports that as the new hospital will be finished around July or August next year, it isn't too soon to start working for the locating of two more doctors.

Floyd Cotton Crop Estimate Goes Down

Back in July. . . before a too-wet August. . . and before a too-early freeze in early October, the Lubbock cotton forecasters predicted 80,000 bales of cotton for Floyd County. The estimate kept dropping and this week's estimate is down to 60,000 bales.

Most of the cotton is out of the field and in the bale now. . . so an actual count will be made in another week.

If Floyd County makes 60,000 bales, this will be about a bale

to the acre average with approximately 62,000 acres in production.

In 1965 and 1964 the county averaged a bale and a quarter to the acre.

Quality of the cotton ranges from some too sorry to pull to prices of 22¢. The light irrigation or dryland areas of the county have fared better on quality than the strong irrigation farms. Most of the irrigated cotton was soaking wet when the August rainy season set in.

FOR MAILING: Send only those cookies which can stand jostling. These include the rich moist bars and the cake-type drop cookies.

BARS: Line heavy cardboard box (about the size to fit the amount of cookies) with foil or waxed paper. Cut sheet of cookies to just fit the box. Do not cut individually. Place foil or waxed paper between layers and on top. Wrap box with corrugated paper and heavy paper. Mark "PERISHABLE" and "HANDLE WITH CARE."
CAKE-TYPE COOKIES: Line a sturdy box with foil or waxed paper. Place crumpled paper or a layer of popcorn or sugar coated cereal in bottom. Wrap cookies in pairs (back to back, with waxed paper between) in foil or waxed paper. Pack in rows, snugly. Fill crevices with crumpled paper, popcorn, or cereal. Top with layer of foil or waxed paper and a final layer of crumpled paper, popcorn, or cereal. Tape box shut. Wrap and tie securely. Mark "PERISHABLE" and "HANDLE WITH CARE."
CRISP COOKIES: Store in a loosely covered container. If they absorb moisture from the air, crisp them in a slow oven (300 degrees F.) about 5 minutes.

CHRISTMAS
 A Christmas tree is symmetrical and joy of life safe if used

1. As soon as you bring the tree home, saw 2 inches off of the butt end, so it will absorb water and stay fresh. Put the tree in water and keep it in water until you discard it. Check water level daily.

2. Keep the tree in a cool, shady place until you decorate it. It's best to buy close to decorating time.

Here's how to make trees, wreaths, and greens flame-resistant: To 3 quarts of water add a 1 pound box of borax from the grocery store and 1 pound of ammonium chloride from the drug store. Mix until ingredients are dissolved. Spray this solution on the tree until all branches are well-moistened. A spray bottle from your cleaning supply shelf will do the job. Safety is simple if you practice these rules.
 Safety experts suggest that you place the Christmas tree well away from the heat of a fire-place, heaters, lights and flammable curtains, drapes, window shades and furnishings. Repair or replace frayed, worn or poorly functioning cords and connections.

Many of us like to bake Christmas cookies for gifts during the Holiday season. Perhaps the following tips will help you with your cookies.

Cook cookies thoroughly before storing. Slide baked cookies with a spatula onto wire cake racks. Do not overlap or stack cookies until cold.

BARS: Store in a tightly covered container or in the pan in which they are baked. Cover the pan tightly.
CRISP COOKIES: Store in a loosely covered container. If they absorb moisture from the air, crisp them in a slow oven (300 degrees F.) about 5 minutes.
