

School Board Sells Temporary Houses

The Floydada school board accepted bids on five of nine temporary houses located on Jr. High and Andrews Ward school grounds at their regular monthly meeting Monday night.

Buildings No. 1, 8 and 9 remain to be sold.

Building No. 2 sold to Bill Brown for \$1195, No. 3 to Mr. Stedl for \$1202, No. 4 to City Park Church of Christ for \$1512, No. 6 to Mr. Stedl for \$1442 and No. 7 to Bill Brown for \$1405.

The board decided to keep building No. 5 for a shop building at Jr. High School.

Spokesman for the board said the buildings sold for about a third of original cost.

The buildings will soon be vacated by students who will move to the new Duncan Elementary School.

In other business the board heard a summary of tax work from tax assessor-business manager Claude Estes.

All board members were present.

Floyd County Residents Paid \$2,986,000 For Income Taxes

NEW YORK, Mar. 11 - How much money will residents of Floyd County be contributing to the Federal coffers on or before tax day, which is April 17 this year, in the form of personal income taxes?

The Government counts on their offerings being well above what they were last year, when local tax payments came to some \$2,986,000.

That was the approximate amount turned in last April, as determined by a breakdown of collections from the State of Texas as a whole. The statewide total, according to the official figures, was nearly \$2,297,000,000. This included income taxes paid through withholding.

The size of the increase expected this year is indicated in the Federal budget, presented

to Congress in January. It predicts that individual income taxes in the current fiscal year will reach \$62.2 billion nationally, as compared with actual receipts in the past fiscal year of \$55.4 billion.

The \$6.8 billion rise is based upon the fact that more money was earned during the year and because average incomes were higher in 1966 than they had been in 1965.

The \$2,986,000 that residents of Floyd County paid to Uncle Sam last year represented 0.13 percent of the statewide total, the figures show.

Their forthcoming contribution, reflecting the economic gains made in 1966, is expected to be in the neighborhood of \$3,353,000, an increase of \$367,000.

TWO OR THREE COMMITTEES are working on plans for a big air show and open house showing of the new airport in Floydada. I hope that we can soon announce the date for the opening.

In the meantime the airport is open for use and there's a lot of activity out there.

The City of Floydada is still trying to wind up the final audit with the government on the entire cost of the airport. Looking at approximations, the airport is going to cost around \$140,000.

This includes land, fencing, runway, turn-arounds, parking paving, paving from the Silverton highway and other miscellaneous items.

The office, hangars, and shop hangar, and gasoline pumps were installed at the investment of Doodle Milton, airport manager. A truck and station wagon were received from government surplus.

The money for the \$140,000 came from several sources. . . . and we're still speaking in approximations: \$67,000 from the federal government, \$12,000 from the Texas Aeronautics Commission, \$21,000 from private subscription, and \$40,000 from the city of Floydada.

It should be noted that the \$40,000 came from the profit funds of the city's electric company.

Of course the City of Floydada is now owner of the 73 acres of land and all facilities except what Doodle owns.

Just how long it will remain at that level is uncertain at this stage. If Congress should go along with the President's request for a six percent surcharge on most individual taxes, local residents will have to pay a proportionate share of that additional levy.

The President's budget for the next fiscal year, which begins on July 1st, calls for personal income taxes totaling \$73.2 billion, including the surcharge. That is \$11 billion more than this year's estimated receipts.

In Floyd County, total income would have to rise by more than 12 percent for local residents to meet their share of this increase.

ped in the local court house by a serviceman's wife, wanting to know how she could get information other than by letter, wanting to know how she could get information other than by letter, to her husband in Vietnam of the arrival of their baby. This and many other cases especially involving servicemen need attention, but people needing this assistance in Floydada do not know where to go, Strayer said. "Therefore it is imperative that Floyd County people get together to reorganize the local chapter," Strayer continued.

Strayer told the group that people did not realize the help Red Cross gives until a disaster strikes, pointing out the assistance the organization gave to Hale Center and Silverton when storms struck these towns.

Mary Johnson, regional chairman for the office of volunteers of the American Red Cross out of St. Louis, will be in Floydada for the county-wide meeting and discussions as well as Eunice Hicks-Beach, Nation Field Volunteer out of Amarillo, and Dick Strayer.

The Red Cross concept was born on a battlefield, out of compassion for wounded combatants. The military build-up in Vietnam meant many changes for U.S. Servicemen and their families in 1965-66. Red Cross services to the armed forces have greatly increased since that time but have adapted to meet the needs created by these changes.

Red Cross sends emergency messages, arranges transportation during family crises, provide emergency financial assistance or counsel on family problems.

Nationally and locally the American Red Cross is governed by volunteers, most of its duties are performed by volunteers and is financed by voluntary contributions.







Crusade Against Cancer Underway

With the appointment of Darrell Faires as Crusade Chairman and Mrs. Cleo Whittle as Residential Chairman, the 1967 Crusade Against Cancer got underway in Floyd County this week.
 In addition to the urgent goals of getting information about cancer into every household in the county, and raising the funds needed to continue cancer control activities throughout the state, volunteers for the ACS will have a new and important assignment.

The Cancer Education Survey will be conducted in Texas for the first time this year; an estimated 600,000 replies will be collected from households in every section of the state.
 Here in Floyd County, the Survey will be carried out by Crusaders during the House-to-House drive the week of April 2. After households have been given the list of cancer's seven warning signals, they will be asked to fill out a brief, confidential form, asking questions about their own health practices. The completed forms can then be mailed back in the envelope provided and will be counted by volunteers in the District Cancer Society offices.

"This is really a two-fold project," Dr. Carl F. Page of the Lubbock Unit Board of Directors has explained. "Not only do many householders need to be reminded through this survey of the need for regular health examinations, but the answers will also guide the Texas Division ACS in planning the most needed and successful educational programs possible."
 Darrell Faires has seconded the enthusiasm of his fellow volunteers about the Survey. "We'll be giving something tangible to our neighbors in this project," he has said, "because we're giving them a chance to help us understand what the greatest needs are in programs to reach all sections of the population."
 In line with the American Cancer Society's vigorous campaign against smoking, volunteers are seeking to discover how many people in each community smoke, how many have stopped smoking in the

last year, and what the ages are in each group.
 A follow-up survey will be conducted during 1968 to compare progress made through the Society's year-round programs of films, exhibits, pamphlets and speakers.
 "A survey of this size would be impossible by a health organization were it not for the tremendous cooperation of volunteers," Mrs. Whittle commented. "The cost of the Survey, as it will be carried out in each of Texas' 254 counties, will only amount to the cost of printing. All other services are rendered free by interested citizens in each community."
 The goal for the 1967 Crusade in Texas is two million dollars, roughly a dollar for each Texan now living who will have cancer, if present trends continue.
 The climate is hopeful, however, since one-half of all cancer victims could be cured through early diagnosis and prompt treatment. To emphasize the vital need for regular, complete health examinations, the Crusade this year will seek to reach every home in the community.

COUNTY AGENT'S CORNER


With the dust of 23rd Annual Floyd County Fat Stock Show settling, other endeavors are being concentrated upon in the county agent's office. Before all activities are logged as memories of the show, I would like to thank the leaders and businessmen of Floyd County for their fine support. I have never seen a county show supported better, financially or through volunteer workers, than the Floyd County Show. The youth of this county are indebted to you.

Greenbugs are attacking wheat in the county. This small aphid type insect can damage or possibly destroy entire fields of wheat. The insects reproduce rapidly in dry weather where temperature ranges between 55 and 75 degrees F. The need for applying insecticides for control depends on the number of greenbugs present, size and vigor of plants, temperature, time of year, moisture conditions, state of growth and presence of parasites and predators. It is impossible to outline specifically all conditions where greenbugs should be chemically controlled. However, the information in the following table may serve as a guide for determining the need for treatment.

Month	Plant Height	Number of Greenbugs per linear ft.
February	3 - 6	100 - 300
March	4 - 8	200 - 400
April	6 - 16	300 - 800

Marshall Haney Receives State Proficiency Award

Marshall Haney, an official State Department citation for proficiency has been awarded to Marshall L. Haney, of the Floydada public department. The citation is the highest regard in any held by state officials. The State Health Department and authorities Texas Water and Sewerage Association, the certification is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management. To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers. State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to their community and state. The engineers said the attainment is evidence of Haney's efforts to better prepare himself for the duties of his profession.
