

# Floyd County Residents Paid \$2,986,000 For Income Taxes

(Special to the Hesperian) NEW YORK, Mar. 11 - How much money will residents of Floyd County be contributing to the Federal coffers on or before tax day, which is April

17 this year, in the form of personal income taxes? The Government counts on

their offerings being well above what they were last year, when local tax payments came to

That was the approximate amount turned in last April, as determined by a breakdown of collections from the State of Texas as a whole. The statewide total, according to the official figures, was nearly \$2,-297,000,000. This included income taxes paid through with-

The size of the increase expected this year is indicated in

to Congress in January. It predicts that individual income taxes in the current fiscal year will reach \$62.2 billion nationally, as compared with actual receipts in the past fiscal year of \$55.4 billion.

The \$6.8 billion rise is based upon the fact that more money was earned because employment was up during the year and because average incomes were higher in 1966 than they had been in 1965.

The \$2,986,000 that residents of Floyd County paid to Uncle Sam last year represented 0.13 percent of the statewide total, the figures show.

Their forthcoming contribution, reflecting the econom'c gains made in 1966, is expected to be in the neighborhood of \$3,353,000, an increase of \$367.000.

I'm sure most of you are fa-miliar with the Bible story of Cain and Abel in which Cain killed his brother because he en-vied him. It highlights our need to understand one another. We're ili aware that failure in human constitutions of evil—unhappy personal situations, serious health troubles, mental tensions, disap-pointment and frustration in our

Today, in trying to analyze human relationship problems, some people will tell you that men with Cain-like natures aren't well adjusted to society, or to their environment, or to hemselves. But that's not the

What was wrong with Cain is what's wrong with the world to-day. Cain didn't know God. He idn't know God as the absolute lusive Principle of man and the universe, divine Love. Naturally then Cain didn't know anything about the brotherhood of man, or the divine rules of maintaining a right relationship with Abel. No one will ever be really well adjusted until he knows something of these divine rules. But those who do know and practice them can solve the problems resulting from discor dant human relationships, and all other problems too. Because of the growing inter-est in mental causes, it's important to distinguish clearly between differing viewpoints in this area. Christian Science loesn't concern itself with the study of the human mind or observation of human behavior On the contrary, it is the Science of divine Mind, God, Spirit. It shows that what best produces right human relationships is an inderstanding of man's spiritus and behavior as the child of God, divine Love. You remember, in the Bible story, that, after Cain killed Abel, Ced esked him, "Where is Abel the brother?" And Cain re-plied, "I knew not: Am I my brother's keeper?" (Genesis 4:9.) Well was sheet Cain was asked Well over since Cain was asked that question most of the people of the world have gone right in effect, "Why should I'm not my brother And even though Chris s taught his followers that should love their neighbo themselves, mortal nature haven't been impelled to follow his teachings on this point. Wh this co? Because they haven' learned that Jesus' teachings exand demonstrate divine Mar Taker Eddy, the Discov ever and Founder of Christian Science, with inspired spiritua sion saw beyond the age-o ctrinal views held of Jesus ar his teachings. She revealed the full purpose of his mission. Sh writes in "Science and Healt with Key to the Scriptures, "Jesus of Nazareth was the mos be. He plunged beneath the material surface of things, and found the spiritual cause" (p. 313). So Mrs. Eddy didn't re-gard Jesus' teachings as a form of human psychology. She saw that his teachings were Science derived from divine Spirit, God and from his recognition that Spirit or God is the only cause. To be our brother's keeper and to love our neighbor as ourselves are one and the same thing They're not just pleasant phil ophical attitudes toward life They're not a man-made formula devised from observations of human behavior. Divine Science is involved in both of these teach ings. They're basic to the law of spiritual healing with which Christ Jesus met all human problems. They're indispensable scientific rules for correcting discordant human relationships and the ills arising from these dis cords. So they have to be practiced in spiritual healing today. Spiritual healing is an essen-tial activity of the Church of Scientist, founded by Mrs. Eddy. In the spirit of love and brotherhood she met the resistance of long-established systems of medicine and religion. She revealed and established the most effective and radical healng method of all time, a method that is wholly spiritual. She saw and proved in her healing work that the divine Love which

Christ Jesus taught and scientifically demonstrated is what heals all ills. And this Christli-ness, this Christ-power, when practiced today, is still the only real healing agent. When Jesus taught that a man

should love his neighbor as him-self, he was explaining something of the Christ, Truth, or the Science of Cod. Yes, he was try-ing to show us what our real spiritual natures are like and how to behave as sons of God. To live as God's sons is the way to completely and permanently cast out the Cain-like elements, the envy, hatred, and jealousy, that disturb human relationships and to heal the sorrows, diseases, tensions, and frustrations that arise from them. So this is what we're going to think about here this evening-what is needed really love our fellowmen-the Science involved in being our brother's keeper

#### The Nature of God and Man

The basic reason why people don't love others as themselves is because they think of themselves and others as material mortals. Cain slew Abel because he saw everything through the limited eyes of a mortal. He didn't understand that there was didn't understand that there was enough of good for his brother and himself. So the way for us to stop being Cain-like, to stop envying and hating one another, is for each one simply to learn of his unlimited selfhood as an immortal child of God. And then immortal child of God. And then act like the child of God.

I'm sure you've asked yourself, "Who am I?" and "What am I?" Well, the Bible tells us who we are and what we are. As most of you know, it says in the book of Genesis, "So God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him" (1:27). People have been reading that Bible description of man ever since it was first written, but they've still thought of themselves as material mortals. Why? Because we can only understand what the image of God is like by first knowing what God is.

first knowing what God is. The study of Christian Science reveals that God is the absolute Principle of the universe includ-ing man. He isn't like a human being at all. But this doesn't mean that God as Principle is cold or distant. On the contrary, He is divine Love, everywhere present, always just at hand. He is infinite and eternal Life, the inexhaustible source of all life. His living, loving presence is the ceaseless activity of good. He perpetually governs and holds the whole of creation in uninterrupted harmony. He is Soul, the source of all true capacities and capabilities. He is Spirit, the indestructible substance of man and the universe, and the one Mind or intelligence of all.

When we comprehend that that's what God is, we can let go of the mental picture of Him as being manlike. When we gain this understanding of God, we can also comprehend our own real nature. Mrs. Eddy writes "God's being is infinity, freedom, harmony, and boundless bliss" (Science and Health, p. 481); and elsewhere she says, "Man is the expression of God's being" (ibid., p. 470). So he isn't a corporeal mortal. He's the ex-pression of "infinity, freedom harmony, and boun He is the expression of all that God is. Then he can't be a physical or finite personal mentality, but is the individual spiritual idea of all-inclusive Mind. He is the object and expression of limitless divine Love. But how can we speed the at-tainment of this understanding of man as the expression of divine Love? By taking hold the loving nature that really be-longs to us as the image of God It has to be loving in order for us to be the image of God. And if it takes great persistence to overcome a tenacious clinging to a physical nature, that's al to the good too. It means spiri-tual awakening will surely come Now it stands to reason that for us to love our brother as ourselves and heal the sicknessproducing frictions and tensions between us, we have to admit his true nature to be spiritual and loving like our own. In fact it's only through our own spiritual vision that we recognize his true nature. Then we'll love him and want to be his helpful keeper. In this pure mental atmo-sphere the ceaseless action of livine Love takes possession of human consciousness and healing results. It's the irresistible power and activity of divine Love that will eventually pry open the thought of all mankind. It will reveal the indestructible spiritual nature of Life and of Life's expression, man, infinite in sub stance and intelligence. The mortal, material concept of life is no image at all, but an illusion, a mistaken, restricted sense of man. The scientific fact is that infinite intelligence and substance can't be measured out in limited quantity for just a few people Substance and intelligence are inexhaustible and immediately available for everybody. Indeed as this is seen, men will begin to understand that the capacities and capabilities of every individual, as the image of divine Principle, Love, are unlimited. Then they'll realize the utter folly of envy, rivalry, and hate They won't be Cain-like thinkers any more; there'll be no reason to even want to exclude others from their full share of good And they'll not fear there won't be enough of it to go around They'll see the Science of being their brother's keeper and gladly follow the rule of loving their neighbor as themselves. And finally, they'll understand that divine Love alone is the only giver of good. So you see there's a great dif-ference between the Christly rules of Jesus and the psychological approach to human relationships on the basis of the human mind. Jesus' teachings are pure Science. They're based on the spiritual facts of life. He possessed the spiritual perception with which to discern these facts because of the Christ, the divine idea of Truth and Love, which inspired him. Mrs. Eddy refers to Jesus' teachings as the Christ, Truth. They show mankind what life is all about. That's why Jesus

#### was called Saviour. His teach-ings save or redeem us from the material sense of life and its

sufferings So Christ-healing differs widely from all merely human forms of treatment. Christ-healing leads out of a material sense of life; it does not accept a material sense of life and work within it. Just forming new patterns of human thought and emotion isn't enough. This doesn't eliminate the material sense of life that causes envy and hate to churn within the human heart and pro-duce the tensions which make people quarrelsome and sick. We have to feel the love for our brother man that comes from understanding the scientific fact that he too is in truth the unlimited expression of divine Principle, Love. As St. Paul says "For God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind" (II Timothy 1:7).

#### Healing Through Christliness

These days psychiatrists, med-ical doctors, and even dentists advise patients to avoid mental tensions because of their bad effects on the mind and body. Now, because they've seen this much they're in a position to do some good. But Christian Science goes much further. It shows people how to be led right out of what it is that produces tensions, out of mortal and material ignorance of God.

Here's an actual example of how the scientific understanding of divine Love healed suffering produced by tension. A man h know suffered from childhood with very painful liver attacks. They grew more severe as tin went on. He'd get quick relief when he would turn to Christian Science treatment for help, but he didn't get a permanent healing until he realized that he had to love his neighbor as himself. One time he was in a meeting

with some businessmen and there was much hatred being expressed. He found himself becoming very resentful. He began to feel ill and was gripped with fear. But he tried to think scientifically about those present Then it dawned on him for the first time that he developed this illness only when he became upset over personal relationships This was a turning point in his life. He saw that, instead of just using Christian Science as a remedy, he had to live its teach-ings. He had to be willing to love people who expressed hatred toward him. He needed to be permanently redeemed from hate by practicing Christliness. This healing took place a good many years ago and that was the last of those attacks. You see the harmonizing influence of divine Love brought him mental tranquillity. Then its ceaseless healing action restored normal action his system. This was a spiritual healing, not a human adjustment.

We hear a lot these days about the many people who think they can't get along without using drugs called tranquilizers to relieve them of tensions, and this is tragic. Indeed, it's bondage. The harmonizing action of divine Love, the Principle of Christian healing, is the only needed and safe tranquilizer—and it's free. Each one of us has the choice

#### Making Mental Elbowroom

Now physical healing is only one benefit of maintaining sound human relationships on a spiritually scientific basis. Another is right achievement that blesses ourselves and others.

Experience has proved that those who would be successful in whatever they're doing have to get along with people. But I want to stress again that we shouldn't merely adjust to other people's thinking in order to get along. What we need is to lovingly make mental elbowroom for them in which to grow and expand. But this doesn't mean we have to accept imposition or injustice. No, indeed! It means that we refuse to hate and condemn people who don't agree with us. Jesus said, if we judge others, we condemn ourselves. Anybody who keeps a loving

attitude toward others because it's Christianly scientific to do so refuses to be disturbed when mental conflicts appear. He refuses to become resentful or afraid. He learns to hear the ceaseless voice of divine intelligence guiding him. As the Bible says: "And thine ears shall hear a word behind thee, saying, This is the way, walk ye in it, when ye turn to the right hand, and when ye turn to the left" (Isaiah 30:21

It takes the wisdom born of divine Love to deal successfully with mankind's growing problems. It's the wisdom that comes from God through prayer, not human maneuvering. The wisdom of divine Love dares to do right; it dares to be fair; it dares trust man's native goodness It looks for and expects to find honesty and right thinking in others. It's divine Love too that frees people from their defensive attitudes toward each other. It awakens in them a greater spiritual perception. Those who grow in Christliness will gain the spiritual perception that tells them where they can safely put their

trust. They won't be self-righteous about it either, because others seem to be in need of some improvement in character. If they look to behold the Godlike man in others, they will lift the load of error from them and help them to become trustworthy Who can doubt that people feel our thoughts toward them? How we see each other is a big consideration in establishing sound human relationships. Mrs. Eddy says in Science and Health, "The great truth in the Science of being, that the real man was, is, and ever shall be perfect, is incontrovertible; for if man is the image, reflection, of God, he is neither inverted nor subverted, but upright and Godlike'

(p. 200). I once knew a lawyer, a Christian Scientist, who really tried to correctly behold his fellowman. A noteworthy thing about his practice of law was that he truly wanted divine Principle to govern. Other lawyers were amazed ern. Other lawyers were amazed at his honesty and fairness. His serenity, born of loving his brother men as himself, was im-pressive. He put trust in them and expected good from them, and he got it. He didn't classify people as good or bad. He looked to behold the Godlike man. Was he a successful lawyer? Indeed was, and highly so. But that wasn't all. He was one of the most respected men in his community. His views on civic and educational subjects were sought and valued. Later as a Christian Science practitioner and teacher. he had another successful career in the healing work. He certainly had given the right answer to Cain's question, "Am I my brother's keeper?" (Genesis 4:9.)

selfishness, narrowness, and pettiness. It's the effectual working of His grace in us that causes us to make mental elbowroom for our brother. It prevents us from wanting to shut him out from good or to dominate and direct his search for it. It spiritually energizes us and increases our energizes us and increases our ability to practice Christian healing for ourselves and for others. It activates our prayers which should be consistent affirmations of man's perfection as the image of God. It impels us to include our fellowman in our prayers, and eliminate the poison of rival-rous hate from our thought and theirs. This purifies and heals those who pray and those prayed for. In her chapter on "Prayer in Science and Health, Mrs. Eddy says, "Love is impartial and universal in its adaptation and bestowals. It is the open fount which cries, 'Ho, every one that thirsteth, come ye to the wa-ters'" (p. 13). (p. 13).

When we understand the Science of being our brother's keeper, we shall desire to have him come to the open fount infinite good where his God-given rights may be respected and protected. Then we shall want to make room for him and not shut him out. When that's where we've arrived in Christlike thinking, we shall have demonstrated some understanding of the infinite nature of God, divine Principle, Love.

#### Mrs. Eddy's Unselfish Example

The way to attain the Christli-ness that willingly makes mental elbowroom for others is through the pathway of unselfishness. Because mortal inclinations seem to resist unselfishness, it has to be cultivated. Through God's grace we can do this. We have to dare we can do this. We have to date to act unselfishly, and not fear the loss of good. The Apostle James wrote, "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the Father of lights, with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning" (James 1:17). To Mary Baker Eddy that was Science. To her, loving her fellowman wasn't merely being willing to live and let live, it was an unselfed desire to free him from every limitation. Mrs. Eddy is rightly recognized as a scientific discoverer and religious pioneer of unique stature. But she worked always under the impulsion of divine Love. So, unlike many persons of outstanding ability and genius, she was throughout her life a sublime example of unselfishness. From the very start of her ministry there were people who tried to shut her out. However, she impartially loved everybody. She prayed for all mankind, and instructed her followers to do likewise. She truly understood the Science of brotherhood! So there was room in her love for those who tried to shut her out. She refused to exclude them or to war with those who ridiculed her and her teachings. Under the impulsion of God's grace, she refused to deny good even to those who hated her. Making strong demands on love, she writes: "We must love our enemies in all the manifestations wherein and whereby we love our friends" (Miscellaneous Writings, p. 11); and she concludes the paragraph, "When smitten on one cheek, I have turned the other: I have but two to present. This is but one incident in her life that illustrates her great love for her fellowman. When certain persons with malicious intent tried to gain control of her affairs and went to court to prove that she was too elderly and incompetent to handle them, they failed. The suit was widely publicized by those who wanted to destroy the growing influence of Christian Science. They thought by discrediting Mrs. Eddy they could accomplish this end. They didn't succeed. Long before this suit was started, Mrs. Eddy's followers had come to call her Leader, and not without good reason. After the suit was over, many friends urged Mrs. Eddy to have a book written that would preserve for all time a history of the treachery of her attackers. The book was prepared, but after reading it she never permitted it to be sold or circulated. Aware of her obligation as keeper of her brother, she refused to shut out from her love those who had attempted to destroy her. She remained true to her understanding of God's impartial love. Here was leadership of the highest order. She was practicing what she taught. Years before, she had written to one of her students "Love unselfed, love of one's enemies, humility, moderation, strength, are the cardinals of Christian Science." She exemplified to the world what it means for us to be our brother's keeper. She saw forgiveness as an essential part of the Christly law of loving our neighbor as ourself.

martyr. And we have prayed aright if the unworthy pride and self-rightcousness that keep people from forgiving real or wrongs are wiped imagined away. Then we're saved from self-imposed suffering.

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Can we ever be reminded too often of Jesus' prayer on the cross when he prayed, "Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do" (Luke 23:34)? The time to be our brother's keeper is now. The time to for-give is now. The time to include him in our love is now. All that's true about him is true today, this moment. He's really never been less than the image of di-vine Love. This is the fact that divine Science reveals. It's the basis of Christian healing. It isn't God's image that needs to be saved from hating. It's our mortal view of man that has to be exchanged for the immortal view. And that's how we do our forgiving.

Some years ago a dear lady came to my office with what she said was a very difficult physical problem. As she talked, it wasn't hard to see that she was full of hurt and resentment. Finally I told her that her whole problem could be solved if she was willing to forgive. After a bit she said, "Yes, I see that's the answer, I must forgive." "Well," I said, "then your problem is solved!" "Why," she said, "you don't expect me to forgive all at once, do you? This has been going on for a long time." I never saw her again, but I hope she decided to do it right then.

Now forgiveness doesn't mean adjusting or accommodating our convictions to anything that's wrong. We only need to conform to divine Love's method of forgiving and be redeemed from hating. Then we'll want to have our brother included in the Christly plan of liberation, from all sense that men are Cain-like mortals. Don't most of us have to learn as we go? Don't most of us need all the help we can get? The big question is how willing are we to make living room for our brother, and do it right now?

If we're going to forgive, right this minute is the time. If we think we have to gradually grow out of a hurt, well, we're pro-longing our own suffering. But how pleasant and warming it is when misunderstandings are corrected in the Christly way. Then we have given our brother the mental elbowroom in which to grow and expand as we want to.

#### **Exposing Nothingness of Evil**

Still another aspect of forgiveness is that of forgetting wrongs by seeing them as nothing, see-ing that they never had any reality at all. How? By not holding people's errors over them-by forgetting them and letting them be forgotten. Forgiving and forgetting means realizing that sin, and evil are not personal; they're only something untrue that is believed to be true about somebody. They're ignorant, mortal beliefs that are destroyed by the immortal facts of Life. The Christlike under-standing of God and man will always be bringing to the surface for destruction the ignorant, evil Cain-like beliefs of mortal existence. But they're never part of man. Good is the fundamental fact of Life, and it always has been. And Christian Science makes clear that evil is never a person. It's only ignorance of good. The Christ, Truth, wipes it out. In the book of Ecclesiastes the Preacher says that God re-quires the past. This means only the good of the past is real. Mrs. Eddy says in Science and Health, When we learn that error is not real, we shall be ready for progress, 'forgetting those th which are behind'" (p. 353). things So Christliness refuses to fasten people's mistakes on them. This position is scientific as well as Christian. Again, it invokes the all-powerful action of God's grace which heals the malice and sickness resulting from attaching error to persons.



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of meeting hatred either with hatred or in a Christlike way The Christlike way is to pray for those who despitefully use us, as Jesus said we should, to admit into our consciousness only lov-ing thoughts about them. It's ening to see hatred met with hatred and the painful expe-riences following. But they who think lovingly of those who hate them are being truly Christian In a very real sense; that's pray-ing for them. They are on the side of Christliness and are worthy of God's gift of grace that heals and blesses all. Furthermore, as we give our brother mental elbowroom in which to grow out of his hatefulness, we are responding to God's grace Making mental elbowroom for others means that we want to be guided by divine intelligence in dealing with them and not let emotional reactions govern Those who reach this point.of Christliness will make compassionate decisions and won't irritated by other people's problems. And they'll not only prevent discordant human relationproblems from arising, they'll keep themselves healthy.

I recently heard a well-known preacher say over the radio that fifty percent of the patients in hospitals are there because they're mentally disturbed. It's noteworthy that Mrs. Eddy recognized as far back as 1866 that all disease has a mental cause and a spiritual cure. This discovery was immensely significant for the welfare of mankind. And it's important to give her credit for this discovery as the mental and emotional causes of sicknes are being more widely investigated.

Every day more people are realizing that hatred, envy, malice affect the entire human sys-They're recognizing too that they're the cause of much organic disense. Yes, constant indulgence of these Cain-like qualities can bring on chronic suffering. When I was a Christian Science Wartime Minister, had an Army docter tell me that seventy-five percent of the problems that people take to the doctors are emotionally caused and could be cured by a straight talk from the doctor. But he added, "They don't want that kind of advice from doctors. They don't believe anything is being done for them unless they're given some kind of medical treatment."

This was a revealing conve sation to say the least. But let me reemphasize that the only way to permanently educate sickness-producing thinking out of anyone is to reveal to him his spiritual nature as the image or ild of divine Principle, Love This purifies his thoughts and makes them loving. Then he is truly healed and blessed by the restorative action of God's grace, God's free gift of good. The mental pressures and fears that placed his body under tension aren't just side-tracked—they're permanently destroyed.

#### Resisting the Cain-like Man

I've already spoken of God's grace that heals and blesses. This same divine grace enables us to love our brother as ourselves. It is Christliness on our part-that is, the expressing of unselfishness, forgiveness, mercy, and the like—which opens the way for the grace of God to work in us. And it's God's grace operating in us that enables us to express this Christliness and resist the temptation to see our brother as Cain-like.

Even though we may feel we love him, we have to resist the common tendency to classify him humanly and thereby limit him. Loving him also means protect-ing him. Wanting to protect him, won't saddle him with any limiting classification such as "hateful," "selfish," "stupid," or "difficult." And divine Love will speed our own reformation too and help us to grow in mental stature and spiritual vision. There's great joy and content-ment in seeing all mankind in a Christianly scientific way. There's no happiness or satisfaction in downgrading others. One time when I was in the

real estate business, I was asked by a nationally known corporation to undertake some difficult negotiating with their lessors. The company's representatives had tried and failed. Several of them actually became ill in the attempt, and it wasn't surprising. The company's entire organization had just gone through a sales training course that was said to be based on psychology. Their men were told to immediately classify every person they called on and then to deal with him according to the category in which he fitted. Well, you should know what some of those categories were. The course was nothing short of a cold-blooded attempt to try to find people's weak points and take advantage of them. The last category on the list took harsh and profane words to describe it, and of course the company's representatives were told not to waste any time with people in that classi-fication. Needless to say I took a very different approach and successfully completed the negotiations.

To truly be our brother's keeper, we need a Christlike understanding of his struggles. But God's help alone can enable us to banish the mortal impulses that cause us to become impatient, critical, and condemning of others who don't fit our patterns for people. It's the grace of God that saves and redeems us from

#### Forgiveness Necessary

Forgiveness is an activity of divine Love. It is divine Love that supplies the impulsion to forgive. So our ability to forgive indicates some measure of our stature as Christians. Forgiveness is the willingness to let our brother man correct his mistakes. It is a willingness to affirm his perfect image in God and to lift error's load of condemnation from him by denying as real anything about him that isn't Godlike.

Now forgiveness works two ways. It blesses both the forgiver and the forgiven-and the forgiver even more. It sweetens his nature; it broadens his outlook; it widens his spiritual hori-zons; and above all, it makes him more Christlike. And surely this must be the supreme desire of every Christian. The Apostle Paul says: "Love worketh no ill to his neighbour: therefore love is the fufilling of the law" (Romans 13:10).

Well, the fulfilling of the law is most important if we wish to heal scientifically. We have to conform to the law, the law of divine Principle, Love, for our prayers to be answered. Knowing this we must refuse to be hurt or to take on the role of a

#### Being Merciful

Jesus said, "Blessed are the n:erciful: for they shall obtain mercy" (Matthew 5:7). Being merciful is still another aspect of true forgiveness, of being our brother's keeper. Mercy is an attribute of divine Love. In Jesus' parable of the prodigal son you will recall that the brother objected to the father restoring the erring one to his full sonship. Here was hardness of heart, pitiless disregard for his brother's well-being. He was attaching error to him. He was willing to shut him out from good. Merciless is the word for -unforgiving. But the father didn't make any distinction between the brothers. He made room for the prodigal. The father's forgiveness wasn't just a parental indulgence either. He wasn't just satisfying a human affection for his son. The parable was intended to teach the nature of God as all-acting, all-inclusive Love. Christliness in us exemplifies this Love in acts of mercy A merciful attitude is a prayerful attitude. Mercifully wiping out error or mistakes by declaring and spiritually reasoning that divine Principle, Love, knows no mistakes is true prayer. It is Christianly scientific prayer to expose evil, not as something, but as the nothing which it has always been. Its divine impulsion heals the effects of error. Then we see there's no such thing as a man of mistakes.

Now what I've been saying doesn't mean that Christian Scientists close their eyes to mis-takes. Certainly not! Mistakes must be corrected. But when they've been corrected, we don't condemn people for having made them. To do so is a form of selfrightcousness. In such a state of mind we hold ourselves in error by wanting to perpetuate it in others. Mrs. Eddy says, "Blindness and self-righteousness cling fast to iniquity" (Science and Health, p. 448). It takes purchess of heart and true mercy to forgive and forget another's mis-takes, but it's the way of Christliness; it's the spiritually scientific way
