New State Highway Through Here

According to a report from the local highway maintenance department on the new 1968 Texas roadmaps will show a new state highway from Post to the Oklahoma line.

The new state highway number will be 207. The highways north to Silverton and south to Ralls are already wide enough for state requirements, but the highway from Ralls to Post and Silverton to Claude must be widened, according to the highway department.

....May came in like winter!

May came in like winter. . . . setting a new record for the county as temperatures dropped to 30 degrees Monday morning. A cold front following three days of hard wind blasted in from the snows in the Rocky Mountains. . . . there was ice both Monday and Tuesday mornings here.

And the dryness continues. Rainfall for the first four months of the year is nothing in January, .30 in February, .79 in March and .35 in April.

Floydada is just on the northern edge of some good early April rains. The McCoy - Cone, Crosbyton, Ralls areas have enjoyed good rainfall.

According to a report from County Agent Joe Wilson, some of the wheat has been damaged. . . . some up to 30% by the freeze. It seems that some of the wheat on top of the bed was damaged. Wilson said two or three farmers from the Baker community have reported wheat damage.

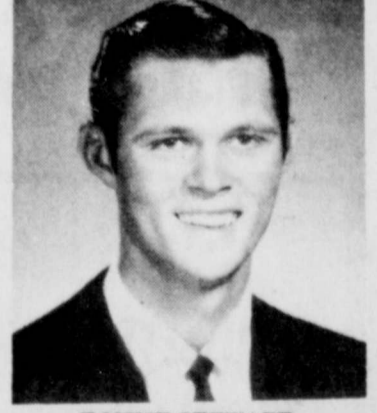

A symposium and youth forum to discuss "Alcoholism" will begin tomorrow night at 8 o'clock in the new Duncan Elementary school cafeteria.

The meeting is designed for all teenagers and their sponsors, or those whose professions are associated with youth, and will be composed of a panel of men who will speak on various phases of their special knowledge of alcohol. There will follow the individual talks, an open forum of questions from any young people in the audience that will be directed to the sev-

eral panelists. Special entertainment to conclude the evening will be supplied by Lubbock Christian College, during a refreshment period. It will consist of vocalist, Miss Judy Sexton, and equally popular singer, from Tulia, Texas - Tommy Stewart. Both will perform after the discussion hour while guests are being served. Members of the panel, each a very qualified lecturer and counselor on the problems of alcoholism will be Dr. Jess Paul, Anesthesiologist of Lub-

bock; Joe Meador, active member of the Downtown Group of Alcoholics Anonymous in Lubbock, John Stapleton, District Attorney and George Elkins, Minister, both of Floydada. "This is not a church meeting, or a rally of 'Wets' or 'Drys', but an information forum where youth may ask questions of experts on the subject, and get reliable accurate material upon which to make their decisions about alcohol," according to George Elkins, one of the panel members. Patty was first with a four year average of 93.27. Sally's four year average is 93.19. In third place is Jeff Kimble with 92.75.

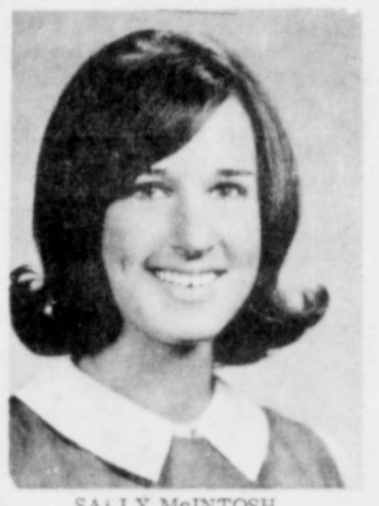

LOCKNEY - Directors of Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority re-elected the Board's officer slate at a meeting in Lockney Monday night, with Lon Davis of Floydada remaining president.

Others re-named are Jim Tom Nichols of Tulia, vice-president and John Zeigler of Tulia, secretary - treasurer. Don Bookout of Tulia is attorney for the Authority.

Other directors are S. W. Ross of Floydada, Tom Moore and O. C. Bailey of Lockney and Charles Whitfill and Milton Dudley of Silverton.

No Disapproval Lengthy discussion during the session stemmed on the fact Tulia and Floydada do not want out of the Authority although the City Councils of both member cities have proposed to explore other means of acquiring

BLOOD DONORS NEEDED

Floydada To Adopt Steve Williams

Leaders from most of the clubs and organizations of the Floydada community met at the Hesperian office Monday night and drafted plans for a blood drive for Steve Williams on May 15.

The group met with Steve and his father Millard Williams and discussed Steve's blood needs. Steve has the rare blood disease of hemophilia and owes the Carter Blood Center in Fort Worth 66 pints. Steve is 17 years of age and it is thought that when he reaches 18 or 19 (out of the growth

stage) his blood needs will be around 15 or 20 pints per year. His blood will not clot.

The folks at Lockney have given Steve over 200 pints and they cannot give more until three months have passed.

Tentatively, the blood drive is set for May 15 at the fellowship hall of the First Methodist Church. Members of the clubs will sign up donors, furnish refreshments for the donors and organize phone calls to remind donors.

municipal water rather than the approximately \$7.9 million proposed Mackenzie Dam west of Silverton.

Lockney Director Tom Moore said among possibilities pointed out during Monday's discussion was purchasing underground water or "land with underground water on it."

Moore explained the two cities are "holding off" to be certain all avenues of supply have been explored and the people understand the issue. Action of Silverton and Lockney City Councils, after the final engineers' and finance report on the Mackenzie project was given recently, was to choose between one of two methods of finance thereby indicating approval of the proposed dam.

Finance Plans

One method of financing the Mackenzie project calls for issuance of revenue bonds by the Authority secured by a pledge of net revenues of the Authority. Revenues would come from the sale of water to cities under contract.

Another plan would be a combination of revenue and tax bonds. The Authority could issue revenue and tax bonds secured by a pledge of the net revenues of the Authority and from ad valorem taxes to be levied on all taxable properties in the authority.

Recommended plan calls for both tax and revenue bonds with alternate charges for the water — one at 30 cents per 1,000-gallon rate and another at 35 cents per 1,000-gallon rate.

Before further action can be taken on the Mackenzie project, the City Councils of the four member cities must submit a preference of financing and then reach an agreement on one plan.

Since the water rights expire May 12, 1967 on the proposed dam site, the board approved sending applications, resolutions and filing money to the Texas Water Rights Commission in Austin immediately.

South Floyd Oil Wildcat Scheduled

Pan American Petroleum Corp. has staked location for an 8,500 foot wildcat, No. 1 L. H. Hammonds, 16 miles north of Crosbyton in southern Floyd County.

Floydada Boy Wounded In Viet Nam

Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Campbell of Floydada, have received word of the wounding of their son, Johnny, in Viet Nam. The young man was able to write a letter to his parents informing them of his injuries, however the family has not received official word through the war department as of last Friday. Mrs. Campbell said their first letter telling them of their son's wounds arrived Thursday week ago. He was in a hospital in Qui Nhon. They received a second letter last Friday informing them he had been transferred to a hospital in Puy Hoa. He said he was doing well and that in four more days he would be back at his home base in An Kie with the 1st Division, 8th Cavalry.

Campbell did not relate when he was wounded or how long he had been in the hospital. He told his parents he had wounds in his left leg from hand grenade fragments and that glands in his right leg were swollen.

BLOOD

It is hoped that Floydada people will give 200 pints of blood during the day Monday, May 15.

Thomas Marr, who led the blood drive in Lockney was also present at the Monday night meeting.

Technicians from the Carter Blood Center in Fort Worth, who are donating their time and services, will start receiving donors at 7 a.m. May 15 in fellowship hall of First Methodist Church.

Blood donors will be checked before it will be accepted. Refreshments will be served to donors.

The blood center in Fort Worth gives Steve one pint of plasma for every pint of blood donated in his behalf. He uses only the plasma, which has clotting properties. Young Williams uses an estimated 100 pints annually, his parents estimate.

Steve is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Millard Williams. His father is on the Lockney School faculty. The family moved to Lockney last summer from near Lamesa. Williams taught for six years at the Union School, 14 miles from Lamesa, and served as pastor of the New Home Baptist Church in Dawson County.

The Williams have two other children, Clark, 14 and Rena, eight.

RARE BLOOD DISORDER Hemophilia is a word which means little to the average family. But the Williams have fought the dread blood disorder for almost 15 years. In layman's language it means that Stephen is a "free bleeder."

A nosebleed - common for most children - has been known to continue for several days for the Millard Williams' eldest son. Without reason, blood can flow into Steven's joints.

Hemophilia is a disease of the blood in which a vital clotting factor is missing, causing abnormally delayed clotting. It is more common among males, although some women are known to have hemophilia.

Despite his condition, Steve is a cheerful, clean-cut young man, who is an avid sports fan. He loves to watch football on television... although he knows that he will never be able to compete on the gridiron. His parents hope to again have Steve walking without the aid of crutches if he continues to improve.

HONOR STUDENT Young Williams was salutatorian of his eighth grade class, although he commonly missed two or three weeks of classroom work at a time. Cooperation from his teachers, a burning desire to learn and special tutoring by his father enable Steve to continue his studies.

He has required an increased amount of plasma during the past three years. Doctors theorize this is due to his growth. They hope that his needs may be curtailed "as his growth period ends."

He can receive "an indefinite amount" of plasma within a 24 hour period, Williams explains. Bodies can receive only a limited amount of whole blood.

Due to Steve's needs, the family owes Carter Blood Center approximately 68 pints of blood. Williams gives all the blood possible and other family members also donate, but this source fails to provide an ample supply.

The Williams' deep freeze contains an item rarely found: frozen plasma. Its life sustaining clotting properties are lost if the plasma is allowed to thaw before it is used.

The plasma is shipped from the blood center via plane to Lubbock, where Williams receives it. From four to 10 pints are kept on hand at all times, the mother explains. Williams administers the plasma to his son.

DONOR REQUIREMENTS Physicians have outlined requirements for blood donors as follows:

- * Six months must elapse following major surgery or pregnancy before an individual becomes eligible to donate.
- * Donor should not have had hepatitis, cirrhosis of the liver, syphilis, malaria, tuberculosis.
- * Donors should be men and women 21 - 60 years of age.
- * Donors from 18-21 must have parent's permission.

The help of any nurses on blood drive day will be appreciated... and any person who cannot give blood, but who would like to help Steve and his parents may give \$10.00... which will buy one pint of blood.

FRIONA - A \$1 million beef packing plant will be built southwest of Friona and will have the capability of becoming the largest of its kind in Texas and the southwest, according to Dr. Loyd Shackelford, chairman of Friona Chamber of Commerce.

The plant, expected to be in operation by next April 1, will be constructed by Missouri Beef Packers Inc. of Rock Port, Mo. on land donated by Friona Industrial Development Corp.

Construction is to begin on the processing plant "as soon as possible." The plant is expected to hire 225 to 250 persons.

The plant will have a slaughtering capacity of 2,000 head of cattle per day.

The new plant is expected to add more than \$1 million annually in payroll alone to the economy of the Friona area.

The course will be taught by professors noted for their teaching ability.

Service Man, Did You Pick Up The Medal You Won?

Millions of unclaimed medals earned by World War II and Korean War servicemen are stacked up in warehouses around the country, according to the Veterans Administration.

Jack Coker, Manager of the VA Regional Office at Waco, revealed that the Army alone has some 800,000 pounds of medals in a Philadelphia warehouse.

Among the medals there are over one-and-a-half million Victory Medals, a decoration earned by almost everyone who

served in World War II. The VA Manager said that veterans interested in securing medals to which they are entitled should write a letter to the military branch in which they served.

Letters should contain full particulars about their military service, units to which assigned, and above all, the letter should contain the Veteran's complete name and serial number.

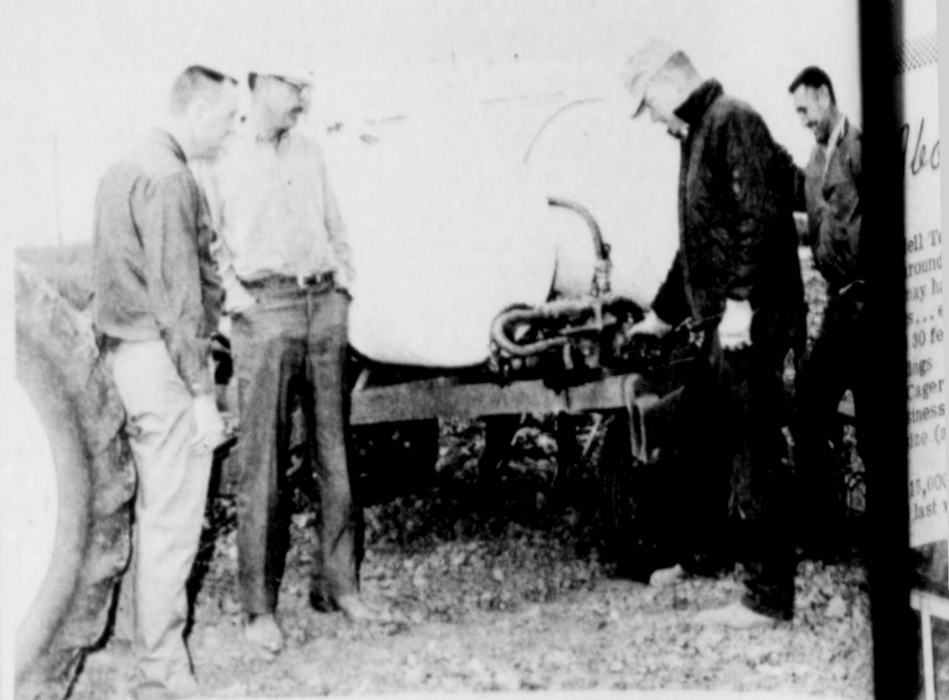

GI Home Loan Deadline July 25, 1967

The cutoff date for the World War II GI Home Loan Program is July 25, 1967, the Veterans Administration said today.

That date is the absolute deadline for applications for VA Guaranteed or Insured GI Home Loans for Veterans of World War II, according to Jack Coker, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco.

Veterans of the Korean Conflict and the Vietnam era Veterans are not affected by the WWII cutoff date. For Korean Conflict Veterans, the absolute deadline is January 31, 1975.

For post-Korean Conflict Veterans, the loan deadline formula is the same as the one for previous programs: 10 years after the date of discharge, plus one year for each three months' active duty, but not in excess of 20 years from date of last discharge.

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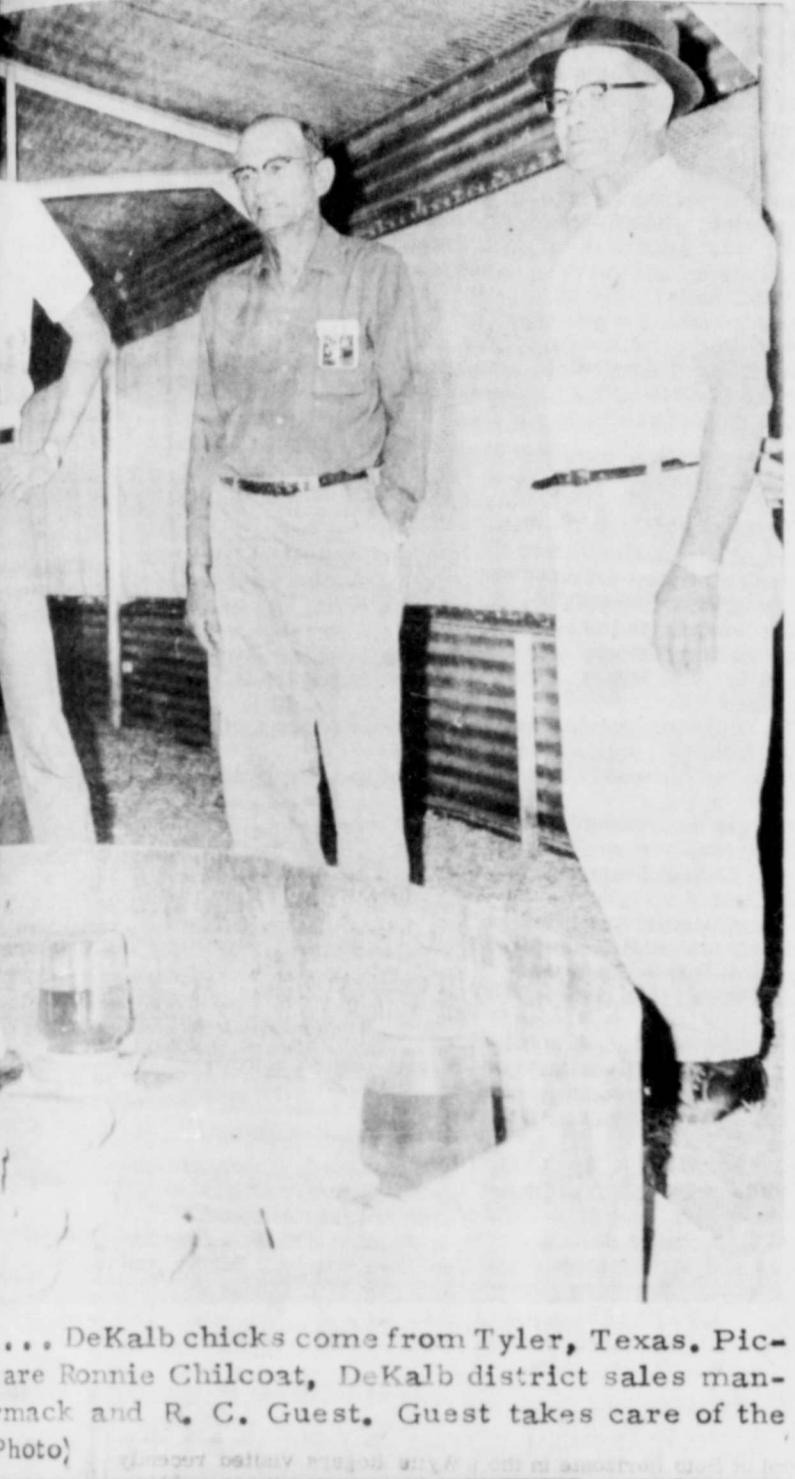

NEWS FOR HOMEMAKERS

ADAPTING RECIPES TO INSTANT FLOUR

When is a cup of flour more than a cup of flour?

When it's instant flour, say ARS researchers. They recommend that when homemakers bake with instant flour, they take 2 level tablespoons out of each cup of flour called for by the recipe.

A full measure of instant flour in a cake or cookie recipe designed for regular flour can—as many homemakers across the country have discovered—alter the shape, texture, and flavor of the final product. ARS food specialist R. H. Matthews and E. A. Bechtel conducted a series of baking tests to make instant flour more compatible with standard recipes.

Instant flour is processed with steam or hot water after regular milling to make tiny granules stick together as larger particles, thus taking up less space in a measuring cup. Because of this characteristic, instant flour mixes more readily with water without forming lumps and is therefore a handy product for making gravy.

For baking, however, this same characteristic causes problems. The instant flour weighs more per cup and takes up liquid at a faster rate than regular flour. This has the net effect of providing too much

flour for the dough in relation to the liquid. For example, in popovers the batter does not contain enough water to provide adequate steam for the product to "pop" properly.

Matthews and Bechtel, following findings from preliminary tests, showed that in 10 baked products tested, the imbalance in ingredients can be corrected by taking 2 tablespoons from each cup of flour measured out.

They tested two brands of instant flour against one brand of sifted, regular, all purpose flour for muffins, drop biscuits, waffles, popovers, yeast rolls, coffee cake, plain cake, cream puffs, cookies, and pastry.

Taste panels rated the adjusted recipe with both brands of instant flour as good as the recipe made with the normal amount of regular flour in most cases.

For pastry, taste and appearance can be improved further by adding more fat to the dough, Matthews and Bechtel say. Some companies making instant flour already suggest that extra fat be added to the product to help overcome the tendency of instant flour to soak up water. Although a little extra fat helps, Matthews and Bechtel warn that adding extra water to the dough is no solution. That destroys the proper balance between ingredients and tends to ruin the baked product.

Rotarians Enjoy Talk By Marshall Formby At Lockney

"Don't worry about the morale of the US fighting man in Vietnam," Marshall Formby, Plainview attorney, told a joint meeting Friday of the Lockney and Floydada Rotary Clubs.

Approximately 65 Rotarians attended the annual inter-city meeting at Golden's Restaurant.

"His (soldier) morale is very high and the American service man in Vietnam is one of the best trained and equipped service men ever to fight. Americans can be proud of their sons in Vietnam."

Formby spent a month recently in Southeast Asia, part of the time in South Vietnam, with a group of radio and newspaper men representing 15 states in the union. The group was briefed by the United States military in all the countries they visited - Japan, Korea, Taiwan, Kinmen Island, Hong Kong, Vietnam and Thailand.

Formby says we have half a million men with the Army, Navy, Marines and Air Force in Vietnam. Most are carefully picked and they are top servicemen. He says they know what they are doing and what they are there for - to fight Communism and aggression.

"I had a helicopter ride over a wide area," Formby says. "Below us were thousands of Viet Congs, hidden until night-

fall when they do most of their dirty work. There are two kinds of Viet Congs, the local ones, who joined up because the Viet Cong leaders promised them food, and the 120,000 well-trained, Communist brain-washed Viet Congs who have infiltrated from North Vietnam. The latter are hard to deal with. They are double tough, cunning, treacherous, mean, ugly and completely without honor. They operate out of jungles and caves and tunnels mostly, but also they are hidden around everywhere, even in cities like Saigon."

Formby says the North Vietnamese Viet Congs, whether operating in South or in North Vietnam are supplied greatly with supplies from Russia and Red China. He says the USA is bombing North Vietnam more than folks at home realize. This bombing is hurting the morale of North Vietnam and keeping them so busy in the north that fewer Viet Congs are infiltrating into the South. The Viet Congs still strike at our fighting men, then run and hide in Laos, Cambodia and back in North Vietnam. They will not come out in the open and fight. It is a different and peculiar war, for the front is everywhere. Formby says the war will end only when Moscow gives the word to stop fighting.

Miss Chan Siew Luan, a Malaysian girl, is Lockney's Foreign Exchange student for the school term of 1967-68 and will soon be transported to Lockney sometime in August. Rev. and Mrs. W. D. Miss Luan has been attending an English speaking school and speaks the language fluently. The Chinese girl is 17 years old, 5 foot 6, a brunette, and weighs 130 pounds. She is a sports fan and participated in swimming, gymnastics, netball games, love to travel, cook, sew, sing and dance and enjoys all subjects in school. Miss Luan is preparing to enter the medical profession.

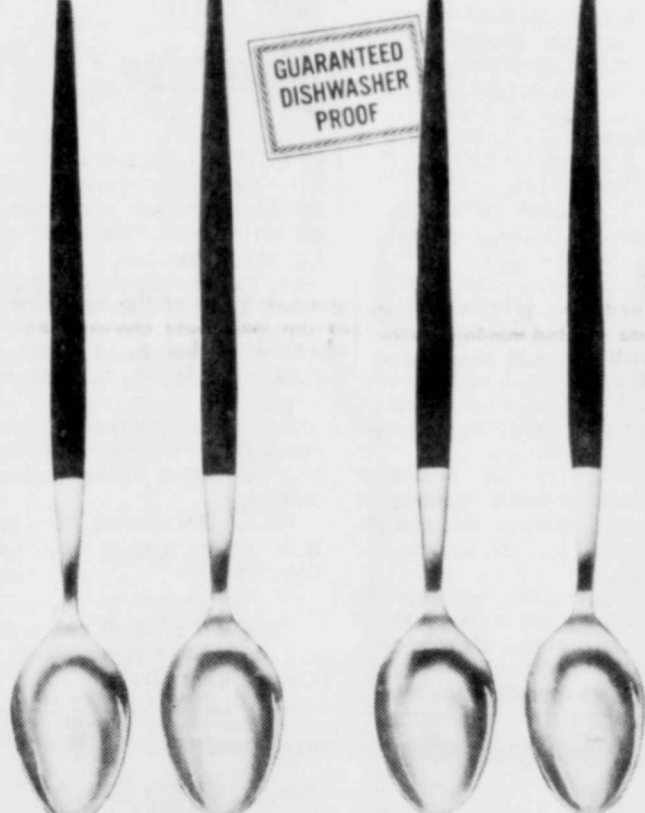

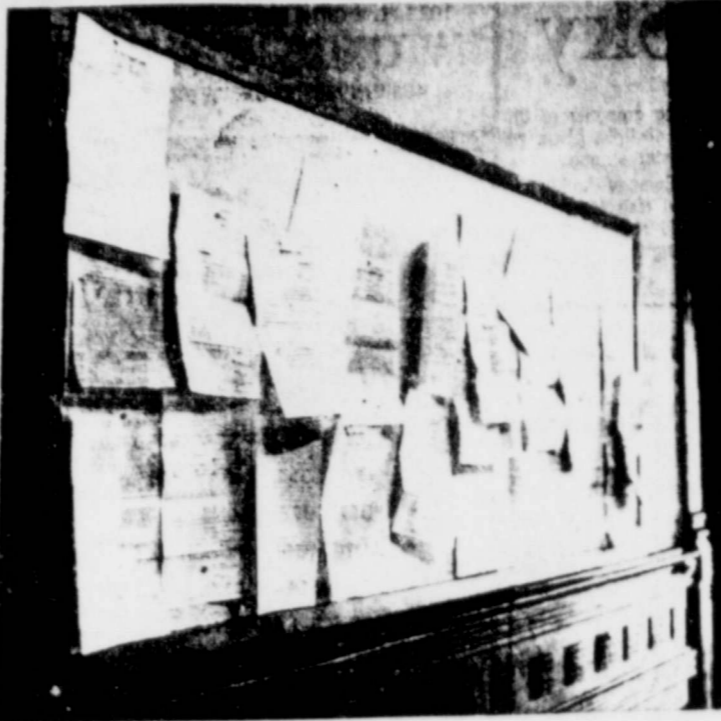
Travis Hart, youth director at the First Baptist and a junior student at Wayland Baptist College, has been chosen to edit the Portals, Wayland Literary magazine.

IS THIS 'ADEQUATE' PUBLIC NOTICE?
House Bill 343 Would Correct Antiquated System (See Editorial)
Public Interest, Public Notice

A man's home may be his castle - but under present law in Texas, he can lose that castle virtually without warning if, for any reason, his home-loan payments are delinquent.

To prevent that from happening is the principal purpose behind HB 343, introduced by Representatives Jack Hawkins and Bill Rapp.

As things stand now, the only requirement for sale of such property is that the lender post a notice on the courthouse door - or bulletin board - or tree, telephone pole, or in any of three "public places." The property then can be put up for sale by the sheriff without any published notice whatsoever to the homeowner.

If the homeowner in question isn't a frequent visitor to the courthouse - or the other "public places" - he could find himself without a roof, and without warning.

As unreasonable as it may seem, this has been done in Texas...not once but many times...without the homeowner's knowing that the sale was to be held, much less having been given sufficient notice to bring payments to date.

HB 343 would correct this unfair situation by requiring publication of the notice to sell, and by giving the owner three weeks to round up necessary funds to make his payments current. Publication also would increase the sale price of the property by building up the buying audience. It is a common occurrence at sales, under the present law, for no bidder to appear except the mortgagee who then bids the property at the balance due on his mortgage, or some other figure far below fair market value.

Dissemination of public notices was the reason for newspapers in the beginning in our 13 original colonies, and that reason has greater importance today when the general transaction of business has become so much more involved than when our country was young.

Today few people visit the courthouse, except to pay taxes or buy a license - and even most of those transactions are handled by mail. To post a notice of any sort, on the courthouse bulletin board, is virtually to bury it. That procedure can almost guarantee literal confiscation of property - and legally - as the law now stands. Fair minded considerations can only conclude that this procedure is inequitable, unkind and actually dishonest.

Proper notice can only mean printed notice in the local newspaper and disseminated as widely as possible so that all concerned may have an opportunity to read, and protect their own interests.

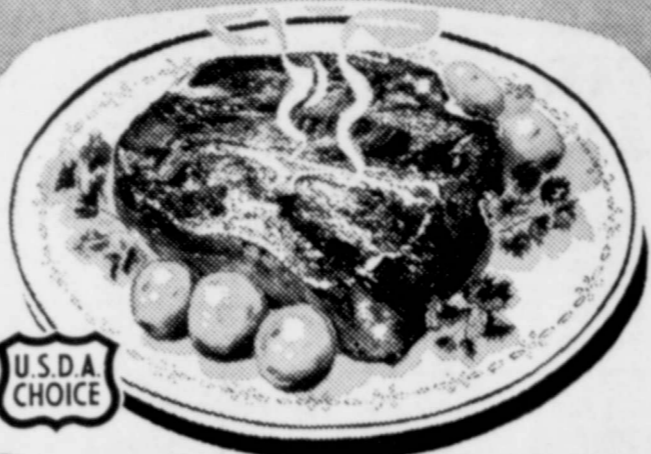

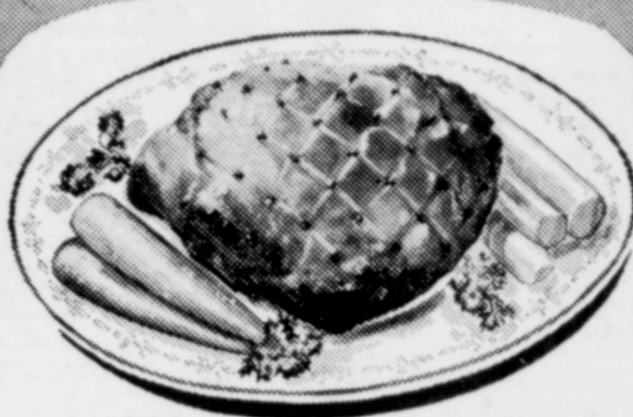
