Dry Weather , Daylight Savings Time Increase Water Use

A report from Bobby Welborn at the city water department reveals that consumption of water in Floydada is up 5,606,000 gallons the first 15 days of May over the same period of time

The first 15 days of May in 1966 residents used 9,654,000 gallons...this year 15,258,000. That's an average of a million gallons a day!

Of course it's plenty dry this year but this new innovation of Daylight Savings Time may have a bearing on water use. Many residents arise earlier through daylight savings time and of course start watering yards and gardens earlier. The water probably gets turned on earlier in the afternoon as the city worker returns home from work an hour earlier by the sun. There's plenty of water available but don't be surprised if your water bill is higher at the end of the month.

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

hour. Although convenience is the main selling point for a private airplane, the cost will usually compare favorably with the total cost per mile traveled in a rental car. When costs are divided among two or more peoole making the trip, they are surprisingly reasonable. FLYING CLUBS

Many pilots belong to thousands of flying clubs which operate on a non-profit basis. The most obvious advantage of these clubs is that they permit the cost of airplane ownership to be spread over a broad base and at the same time give partners regular access to their own aircraft.

Another popular plan is for two or more families to get together informally on the purchase of an aircraft, sharing the costs as well as the flying time.





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

Recharge Wells Add 53 Water At High Plains

A total of 636 acre-feet of run-off water which includes both tailwater and rainfall, has been recharged into the Ogallala formation through the two multi-purpose wells since 1959. The water recharged in the experimental research well recorded during this eight-year period was 352 acre-feet. A second well, which is the type that would normally be used by a farmer, with no experimental equipment, was installed in 1961. From 1961 through 1966, a total of 285 acre-feet of water have been recharged through

this well. This savings of 636 acre-feet (or a little more than 207 million gallons) is enough water to completely irrigate the 1/2 section farm at Halfway for about 2 years. Approximately 90% of this same water could have been lost to evaporation if it had not been stored under-

ground. Two thousand four hundred five acre-feet of underground water has been pumped for irrigation at the Research Foundation since 1959, 26,4% of this amount came from the water which was recovered by re-

charge. Several grasses, hybrid sorghum grazers, and rye were planted in the playa lake at the experimental recharge well site in 1966. Some of the advantages of these crops are: sent no less than \$40 billion a



COUNTY AGENT'S CORNER

by Joe Wilson

Cotton seedling disease is affecting some cotton in Floyd County. The disease has been brought on by the below normal temperature during the first part of May.

Symptons of the disease are: seed decay; young plants may be killed before or after emergence; and the plant roots may be partially girdled and rotted. Young plants are stunted and the main tap root fails to develop on older plants.

There is no successful way to treat infested cotton. Rotary hoeing or other similar cultural practices will help the soil to warm up and consequently help the plants to outgrow the disease. Generally cotton over six inches is not affected by the disease.

If three to four stalks of cotton per foot of row are left the stand is sufficient to make a normal yield. If the stand is damaged greater then replanting is suggested.

It is getting time to sidedress cotton and grain sorghum with nitrogen, Sidedressing is recommended only where the total amount of nitrogen needed for the crop was

not put down preplant.

Cotton should normally be side-dressed from 30 to 40 days after planting to avoid root pruning. Due to adverse weather conditions slowing the growth of the cotton down, sidedressing could be delayed some this year.

Grain sorghum should be side-dressed at the sevel leaf stage to avoid root pruning.

Cotton that did not have a systematic insecticide applied should be checked for thrip damage as the young seedlings are growing. Normally systemic insecticide put down at planting time will last at least six weeks.

Thrip are approximately 1/20 of an inch in length. The adults are winged. Control should begin as soon as damage is apparent. Damage is characterized by wilted, deformed and blackened leaves. Silvering of the lower leaf surface is also common. Several insecticides are recommended for control. They include: Dieldrin plus DDT; Guthion; Strobane - DDT 2-1 mixture; Sevin; Toxaphene - DDT 2-1 misture; Heptachlor plus DDT; Endrin plus DDT; and Bidrin.



Squeezing Mr. Freeman

The Plight of Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman demonstrates how politics sometimes gets blinded to reali-

Every politician, including Freeman's boss, knows that political power has shifted rapidly from rural areas to the cities,

where the votes are. That's why Freeman does a great deal of talking to consumers, pointing out how relatively little they pay for food and other farm products.

It also explains why "farm programs" are no longer the center of fiery congressional debates and anguished administration pleas such as once claimed large newspaper headlines. Congressmen are more apt to have an ear cocked toward the city folks than the farm area. Even in Texas, once the bul-

wark of the farm legislative program, the congressional delegation is now city orientated. Our own Congressman, Bob Price, works for the farm and ranch interests, and Rep. George Mahon of Lubbock is one of the powers in the House for farm interests, but that's about it.

However, the shift of power from farm to city is not yet complete, when you add in the indirect forces that depend upon agriculture even though not making a direct living from the

Farming and related businesses still constitute a vast industry involving many millions of people.

The farm industry is one of the major users of steel in this country and one of the major consumers of petroleum pro-

While the bulk of the nation's population is now in the major cities and in urban areas, there are still millions of voters in small towns and in small cities where the income from agriculture is the principal source of income.

And all of these people are getting mighty unhappy, getting that way because it is obvious that the consumer is getting a good deal at the market place only because the farmer is getting squeezer dry when he goes to sell his products.

The government gets quite excited when the consumer cost of living index rises, but the government remains quiet when the farmer sees his prices plummet. U. S. News and World Report this week has an article on

the plight of the farmers and farm areas, pointing out that since last fall prices have dropped straight down while prices farmers pay for their supplies and tools have climbed straight This doesn't make sense, and it cannot be long tolerated. The U.S. News talks about a "farm revolt" and while this

may not be an accurate term, it is sure that some revolting is going to take place at the ballot box. Freeman announced a government measure to subsidy which would amount to about 2 cents a gallon, hardly enough to be worth the effort. At that, Freeman's office announced that retail outlets had better not go up on their prices or risk government investigation, indicating that even while purporting

about the consumer and the political implications there. We don't know what it takes to bring about a "farm revolt." But we do know that something will have to be done to reverse the trend. Too much depends upon it and it is time the administration wised up.

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
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
