The event has grown consistently. Pioneers registering numbered 439 in 1935, 700 in 1969, 900 in 1964 and over 1,000 the past two years.

At the first reunion, Mrs. Laura V. Hammer, Potter County Superintendent of Schools and Senator Pink L. Parrish were guest speakers. Musical entertainment was provided by "Cornhuskers Orchestra" composed of J.R. and John McDonald, J. B. McPeak, C. H. O'Bannon, Clyde Jackson, R. C. Dunavant, and Dan Ratjen.

Mrs. Arthur B. Duncan, the first woman to settle in Floyd County, addressed the second

Dry Weather, Daylight Savings Time Increase Water Use

A report from Bobby Welborn at the city water department reveals that consumption of water in Floydada is up 5,606,000 gallons the first 15 days of May over the same period of time last year.

The first 15 days of May in 1966 residents used 9,654,000 gallons... this year 15,258,000. That's an average of a million gallons a day!

Of course it's plenty dry this year... but this new innovation of Daylight Savings Time may have a bearing on water use. Many residents arise earlier through daylight savings time and of course start watering yards and gardens earlier.

The water probably gets turned on earlier in the afternoon as the city worker returns home from work an hour earlier by the sun. There's plenty of water available... but don't be surprised if your water bill is higher at the end of the month.

Mrs. Collier In Top Eight Of Pioneer Women

(Editor's Note. Mrs. Kate Collier was selected as one of the top eight in the "Pioneer Woman of the Plains" event held in Plainview last week. Portions of her life story are revealed in the story below. It is felt it will be of interest to our readers, especially at the time our county is preparing for its celebration)

In the Spring of the year 1915, Mr. and Mrs. Wm. K. Collier of Hardin, Missouri, loaded all of their belongings on an Excursion Train in Kansas City, Missouri, and headed for the Plains of Texas, in hopes that the new climate would improve the health of Mr. Collier.

took them to an irrigated farm in the Irick Community in Floyd County, some ten miles southeast of Plainview, where they were to begin a new life in a new and strange surrounding. However, they were not strangers long, for the people in the community were a friendly group and welcomed all newcomers.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Collier were school teachers before their marriage, and were firm believers in education, so as soon as possible, they enrolled five of their eight children in

the Irick School, and the entire family was "on its way" to becoming a part of the community in which they lived. The following Fall a problem came up about where the school teacher would stay since there were no teacherage facilities available, and it looked for a while like they would have no school, since they could find no place for the teacher to stay. Mr. Collier was a member of the Board of Trustees of the school by that time, so Mrs. Collier offered her home and the teacher came to live and board in the Collier home.

In the month of October, 1918, a "Texas son" was born to Mr. and Mrs. Collier, and in the Spring of 1919 during the flu epidemic Mr. Collier contract-

ed pneumonia and leaving Mrs. Collier with four children, living on a farm, with very little money, and with the help of friends and a donation from the "Pioneers" and rear her family. She bought a 100-acre one-half mile west and with the help of friends she moved to Lubbock and enrolled her son in the school and in the fall of the First English began an active community.

Dog Poisoned Here

The following letter was received this week from a resident of Floydada telling of his dog being poisoned. The police department has been notified. . . there is of course danger here for children as well as pets.

"To the dog poisoner: You have accomplished your fiendish deed, once more, you have killed one more dog that someone loved. . . one that was never off his leash except for him to exercise a little. That is what happened Sunday. The only thing is, I forgot him for five minutes and he went less than two blocks north and found poison food waiting for him. I called him and he came home. The boy played with him a few minutes, then put him back on his leash, not knowing he would be dead in an hour or so. We went visiting for a spell. On return our little boy found his old friend dead. You didn't just kill a dog, you broke a little boy's heart. For others who have pets in this neighborhood, I give my address so they will know to watch them. 409 Missouri Street."

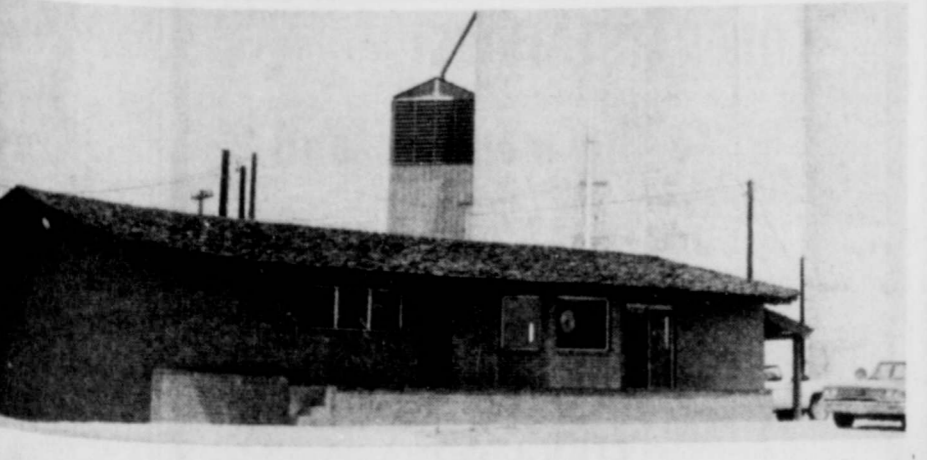

Directors, past planning committee members, and all employees of Lighthouse Electric Cooperative attended one of the 4-day sessions of "Good For All Americans II."

John Myre, NRECA, Washington, D. C. instructed this program entitled "An Appointment With Destiny" which was held for 2 days in Amarillo and 2 days in Lubbock so that all electric cooperatives in this area might be able to participate.

Myre is well qualified for this phase of work. He began working for rural electricity in 1935 along with many others. They began by signing-up so that electricity could become a reality for the farmer and other rural people. Most of his 32 years since that time have been spent in one phase or another working with the rural electric program.

Approximately 19,000 people, (the majority which were Texans), have seen the first "Good For All Americans" which began in 1963. This program reviewed the need for rural electricity, creation of the Rural Electrification Act, its purposes, and the changes that have had to be made since that time in 1936.

"Appointment With Destiny" has been presented to about 11,000 cooperative personnel and it deals with the structure of a non-profit cooperative as private enterprise in a society of Free Enterprise as compared to other types of private enterprise.

Functions, authorities, and responsibilities of a board of directors, a manager, employees, and members of a business were discussed. Employee functions were described as BREAKS which when broken down are:

- B for boldness meaning originality
- R for reliability
- E for enthusiasm
- A for accentuate or be optimistic
- K for knowledge
- S for sincerity
- a good definition for any employee in any business!

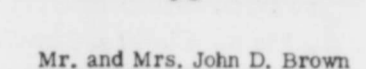

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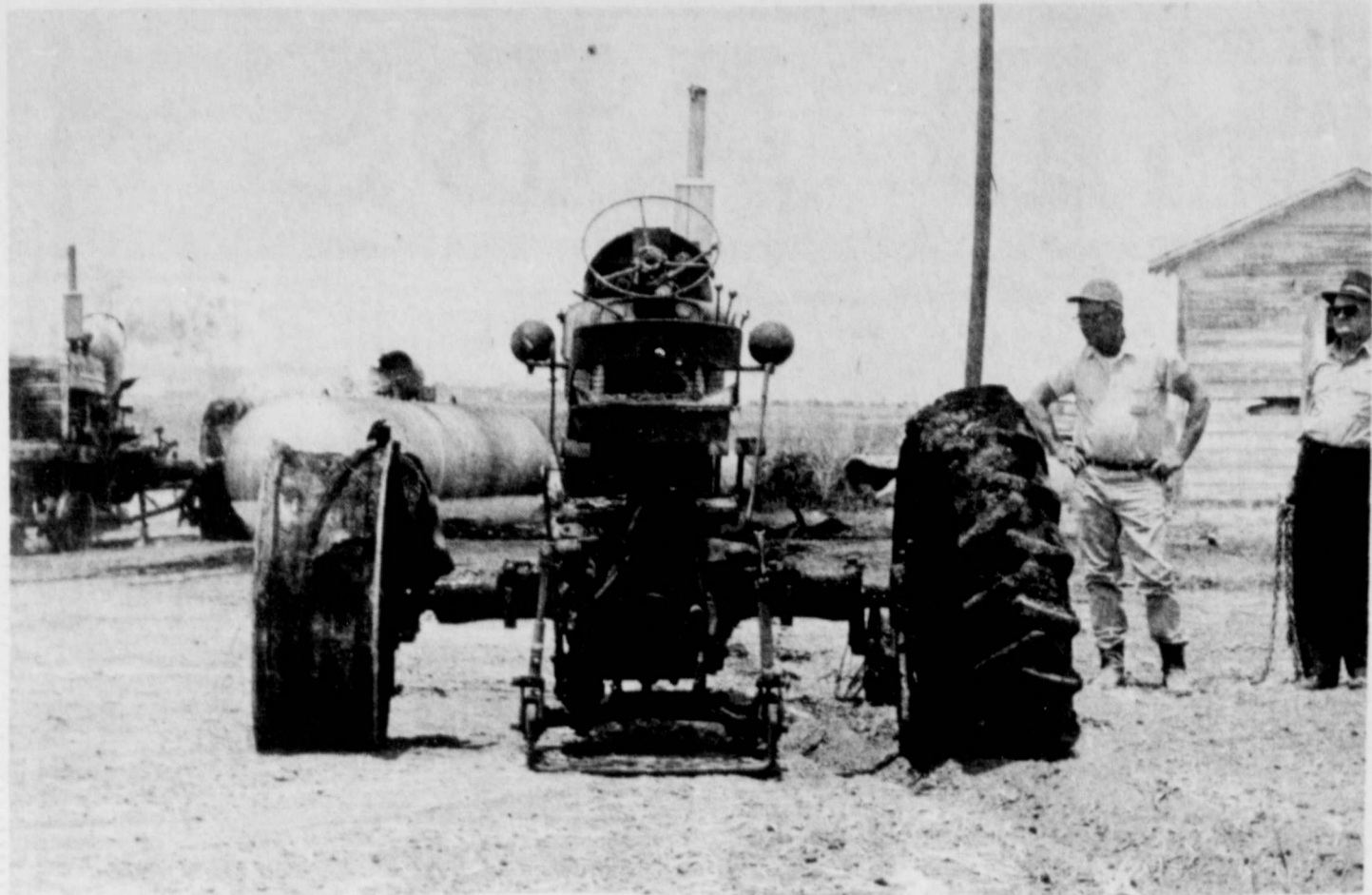

Floyd Residents Sign For Medicare

1,094 persons in Floyd County signed up for Medicare during the first week of the program, July 1, 1966, according to the county health officer, M. J. King, social security supervisor-in-charge.

Those who qualified for hospitalization under railroad retirement have their bills paid from the railroad retirement funds. The hospital bills of those who qualified for neither social security nor railroad retirement money benefits are paid from the general treasury of the United States.

Although all who enrolled for the medical part of Medicare are subject to the \$3 a month premium, those who enrolled for hospitalization and who did not have enough work credits to qualify for money benefits were not deprived of this protection. Most of these retired before their occupations were brought under the social security program or are wives or widows of those who did.

Beginning next year, however, a person reaching age 65 will need some work credit to qualify for the hospitalization part. Three quarters of coverage will be needed for one attaining age 65 in 1968, and generally 3 additional quarters of coverage will be needed by the person the following year, three more for the next year and so on until a fully insured status requirement is met. Once a person has qualified, he needs no more credits. Wives and widows may qualify on their husbands' accounts if the husbands worked enough under social security.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to their community and state.

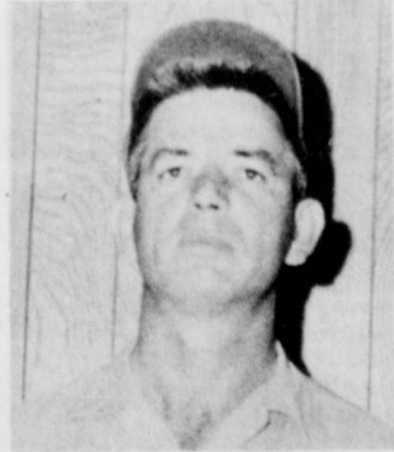

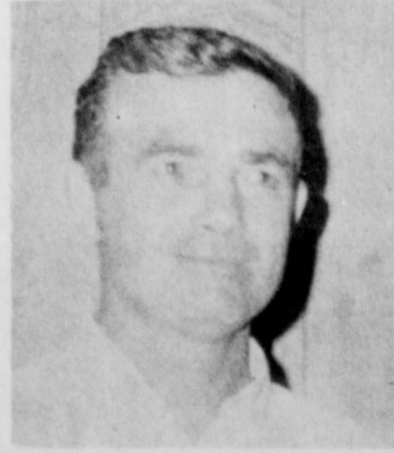

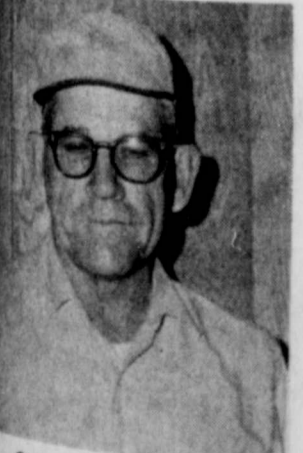

Local Merchants Woo Over-65 Market

(Special to the Hesperian) NEW YORK - Emerging as an important element in Floyd County's economy is the over-65 segment of its population.

The figures show that this age group has been growing more rapidly than most other portions of the population. Locally, about 1 out of every 12 is now 65 or over.

Financially, too, they have become more self-sufficient than ever before.

By virtue of private pensions, social security, personal savings and investments, most of them now have the means to maintain and operate their own households. Only a small portion of them are living with their children or other relatives because of necessity.

The findings are based upon national studies conducted by the Commerce Department, the Department of Health, Education and Welfare and others.

In Floyd County, on the basis of the sample surveys, the number of older citizens has gone well above the 1,039 counted in 1960, when the last census was taken.

At that time there were 479 men and 560 women in the plus-65 group.

Nationally, there are now more than 19 million in that age bracket as compared with only 9 million some 25 years ago.

Although they have considerably less money to spend than they had before reaching retirement age, they are much better off than their forebears were at that age. The average income of the over-65 family is \$1,000 higher than it was in 1955, the statistics show.

As a whole, they now repre-

Recharge Wells Add 53' Water At High Plains

Fifty-three feet of valuable water was recharged through two multi-purpose (artificial recharge) wells at the High Plains Research Foundation in 1966, according to Jim Valliant, Soil Scientist at the research farm.

A total of 636 acre-feet of run-off water which includes both tall water and rainfall, has been recharged into the Ogallala formation through the two multi-purpose wells since 1959. The water recharged in the experimental research well recorded during this eight-year period was 352 acre-feet. A second well, which is the type that would normally be used by a farmer, with no experimental equipment, was installed in 1961. From 1961 through 1966, a total of 285 acre-feet of water have been recharged through this well.

This savings of 636 acre-feet (or a little more than 207 million gallons) is enough water to completely irrigate the 1/2 section farm at Halfway for about 2 years. Approximately 90% of this same water could have been lost to evaporation if it had not been stored underground.

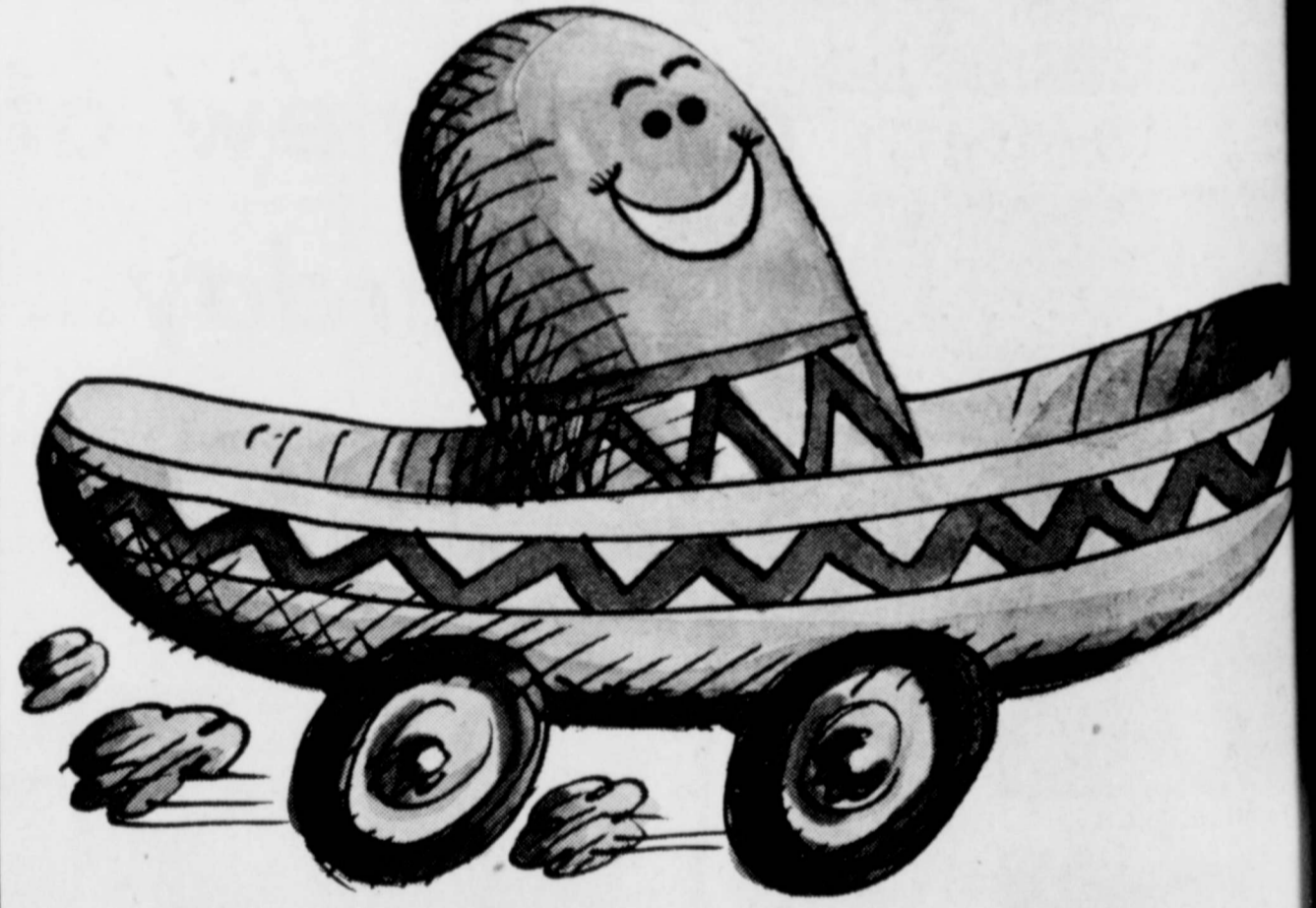

COUNTY AGENT'S CORNER

Cotton seedling disease is affecting some cotton in Floyd County. The disease has been brought on by the below normal temperature during the first part of May.

Symptoms of the disease are: seed decay; young plants may be killed before or after emergence; and the plant roots may be partially girdled and rotted. Young plants are stunted and the main tap root fails to develop on older plants.

There is no successful way to treat infested cotton. Rotary hoeing or other similar cultural practices will help the soil to warm up and consequently help the plants to outgrow the disease. Generally cotton over six inches is not affected by the disease.

If three to four stalks of cotton per foot of row are left the stand is sufficient to make a normal yield. If the stand is damaged greater than replanting is suggested.

It is getting time to side-dress cotton and grain sorghum with nitrogen. Side-dressing is recommended only where the total amount of nitrogen needed for the crop was not put down preplant.

Cotton should normally be side-dressed from 30 to 40 days after planting to avoid root pruning. Due to adverse weather conditions slowing the growth of the cotton down, side-dressing could be delayed some this year.

Grain sorghum should be side-dressed at the sevel leaf stage to avoid root pruning.

Cotton that did not have a systematic insecticide applied should be checked for thrip damage as the young seedlings are growing. Normally systemic insecticide put down at planting time will last at least six weeks.

Thrip are approximately 1/20 of an inch in length. The adults are winged. Control should begin as soon as damage is apparent. Damage is characterized by wilted, deformed and blackened leaves. Silvering of the lower leaf surface is also common. Several insecticides are recommended for control. They include: Dieldrin plus DDT; Guthion; Strobane - DDT 2-1 mixture; Sevin; Toxaphene - DDT 2-1 mixture; Heptachlor plus DDT; Endrin plus DDT; and Bidrin.

HOME MADE MIX
Here is an all-purpose baking mix that you can make up ahead of time and store in quantity. It is always ready for quick adaptation to a variety of delicious baked products. This is a time and money-saver idea.

9 cups sifter all-purpose flour
1/3 cup double-acting baking powder
1 cup plus 2 tablespoons non-fat milk solids
4 teaspoons salt
1 3/4 cups vegetable shortening or 1 1/2 cups lard

1. Stir baking powder, dry milk and salt into sifted flour. Sift all dry ingredients together until well mixed.

2. Cut fat into flour mixture until all particles of fat are thoroughly coated and mixture resembles coarse meal.

Yield: 13 cups of mix
Store in tightly covered container. May be stored at room temperature up to 6 weeks. Mix made with lard should be refrigerated.

Use your own recipe by substituting 1 1/2 cups of the mix for each cup of flour called for in your recipe. The mix will contain the necessary flour, baking powder, salt, fat and milk. From this mix you can make biscuits, dumplings, muffins, griddle cakes and waffles, fried pies, sweet rolls, coffee cakes, cakes, and cookies and others.

To make biscuits -
2 cups mix
1/2 cup water
Follow standard procedure for mixing and baking

To make griddle cakes and waffles -
2 cups mix
1 teaspoon sugar
1 egg

1 cup water
Follow standard procedure for mixing and cooking.
To make fried pies -
2 cups mix
1/2 cup water
To make peanut butter cookies -
2 cups mix
2/3 cups sugar
1 cup chunk-style peanut butter
1 egg beaten
1 tablespoon water
Combine ingredients thoroughly. Roll dough into balls, press with fork and bake in 375 degrees F. oven for 10 to 12 minutes.

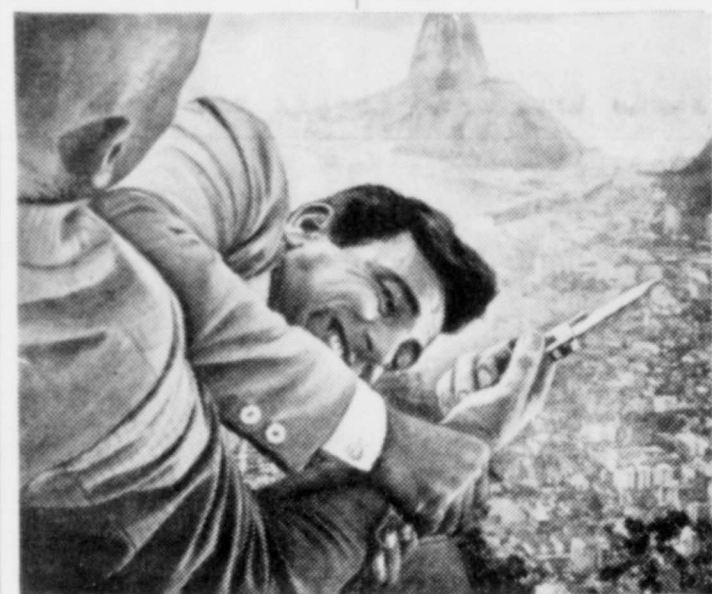

Highways to the Great Outdoors aren't all on the ground. Thousands of highways in the sky connect the country's weekend or vacation playgrounds.

These highways are being traveled more and more by thousands of people who have discovered the fun and convenience of do-it-yourself flying.

How does it work? First, using your home town as the focal point on a map, draw a circle with a radius of 750 miles. Then imagine yourself making a fun-filled trip in a private airplane to any point within this 1500-mile-diameter circle.

For a week or two-week vacation, you may expand the circle to include virtually any place in North America, regardless of where you live.

All this, of course, depends on your having access to an airplane - a private airplane. If you haven't been exposed already to private flying, the whole idea probably sounds beyond your wildest dreams. But consider a moment the following:

-There are some 90,000 airplanes in the US classified as "general aviation," that is, civilian airplanes flown for business or pleasure. According
