Heat tuberculin testing is being done in local schools. Section 4 of article 4477-12, Vernon's Civil Statutes, suggests that pupils in the first and seventh grades of public, parochial and private schools should be examined for evidence of tubercu-losis infection. This pro-gram should be conducted in every local school district in an effort to find all cases of active tuberculosis and to protect our school children from infection.

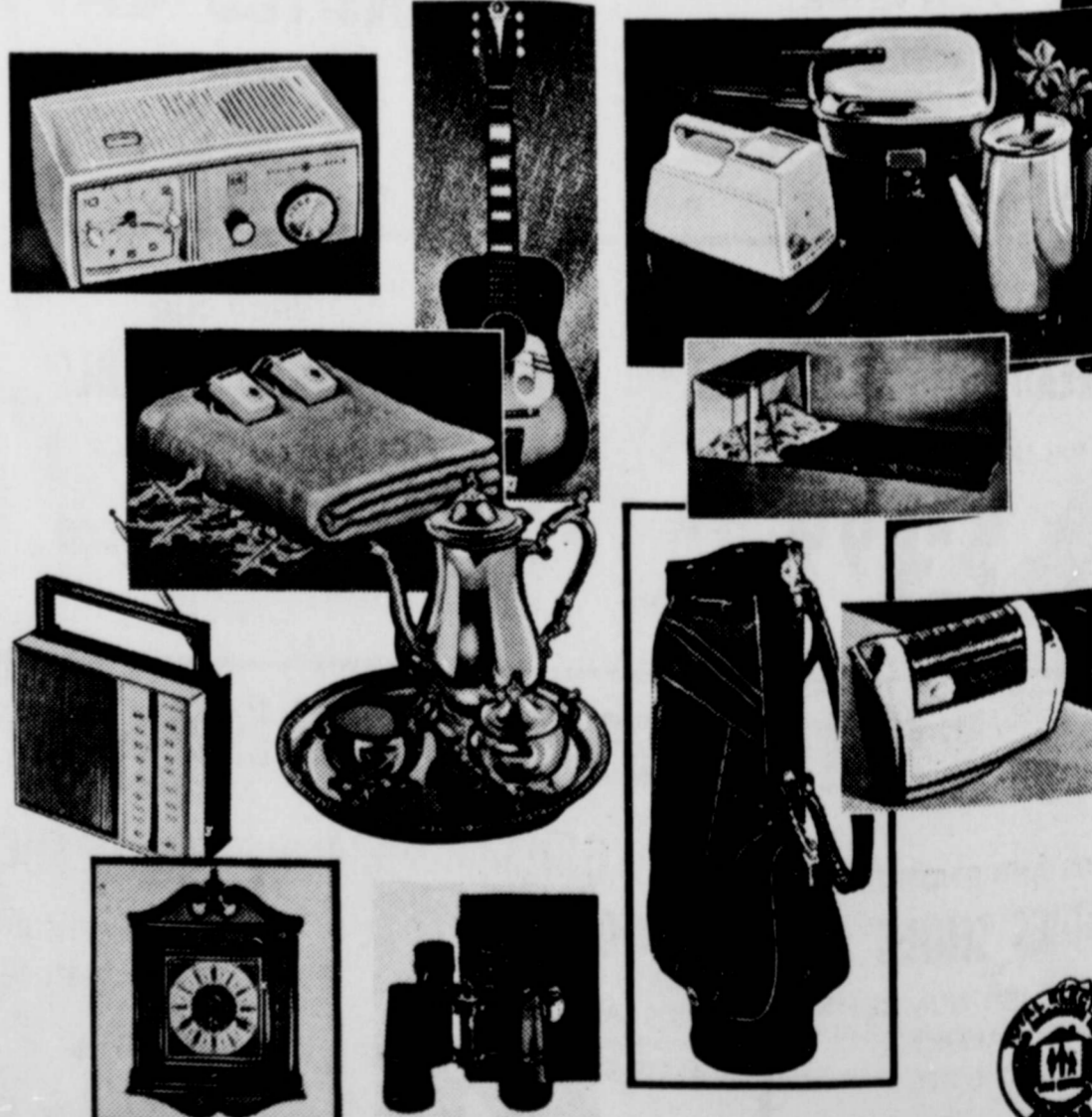

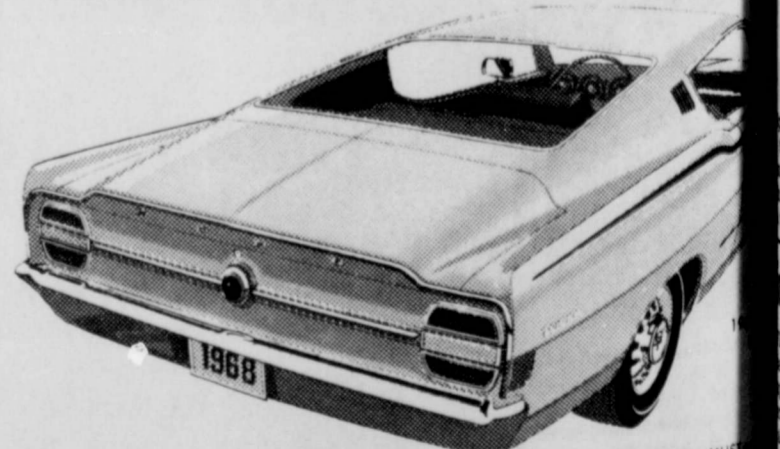

Accidents Cost \$2,856,000 Annually In Floyd County

(Special to the Hesperian)

NEW YORK - According to the latest government statistics, life in Floyd County appears to be more hazardous, from the standpoint of safety than in many places throughout the United States.

For the average local resident, the chances of becoming involved in an accident, fatal or otherwise is somewhat greater than for those in other areas.

The problem of accidents and their prevention is receiving special attention just now because this is National Safety Month.

Just how the local accident record compares with the records in other communities is revealed in the current report, which is based upon data gathered by the U.S. Public Health Service for its annual compilation of vital statistics.

The survey shows that there were 16 fatal accidents among Floyd County residents during the year ending January 1,

1966, and that motor vehicles were responsible for 7 of them.

The figures take into account all types of accidents affecting local people, wherever they may have occurred, but they do not include non-residents involved in local accidents.

In terms of population, the local accident toll was at the rate of 119 fatalities per 100,000 people.

It was higher than in the United States as a whole, where the average rate was 55 per 100,000.

It was also above the West South Central States rate of 63 per 100,000.

"Mission Of Mercy" Gives Cancer Patient New Hope

Lockney carpenter Johnny Huggins returned recently from a "mission of mercy", and saw medical miracles being performed in the small and poverty stricken Republic of Panama.

The mission began with a plea by phone from a friend in Clarendon for Huggins, an accomplished pilot, to accompany a former Texas Tech schoolmate to the Republic of Panama for a "final hope" in her hope against terminal cancer.

Mrs. Ida Matney Schlichenmaier of Bowie, the former schoolmate, had twice undergone surgery in San Antonio for a malignancy. Following a third operation, doctors informed Mrs. Schlichenmaier that she had "only a few days left."

The patient learned that a Dr. E. J. Tucker in Houston had an anti-cancer serum which might prolong her life. Before giving the serum, Dr. Tucker's assistants conducted tests which

indicated that the 40 year old housewife would be allergic to the drug and might sink into a coma.

Ray Of Hope

But there was one final ray of hope: another serum which could be administered in the Republic of Panama or in European countries. Dr. Tucker and Dr. A. Carrizo V. of the San Fernando Clinic in Panama had been consulting on the new drug, which has not yet been approved by U. S. authorities.

Now came the problem of transportation. Huggins was contacted, but he explained that he did not see how he "could get away for a long period of time." Another phone call from the Clarendon friend informed the local man that he was the only one who might consider . . . so Huggins consented.

He and ambulance attendants loaded Mrs. Schlichenmaier, confined to a wheelchair, aboard a private plane at Love Field, Dallas, for the trip to Republic

of Panama. During the course of surgery, she had lost 18 pounds—from 110 to 92—and was unable to walk.

The woman, who attended Tech with Huggins and former Lockneyite Richard Patterson and Billy Bean, began to show marked improvement during her five weeks of treatment.

Her weight increased from 92 to 107½ pounds and she now can drive an auto. But even more miraculous, an "orange size" tumor had disappeared, x-rays revealed.

Dr. Carrizo informed his Texas patient has her life expectancy has been prolonged to four years. The new cancer arresting formula—Hematexilang or DMSO—may offer permanent cure, but it is "too early to say for sure."

Developed In Europe

It was developed in Germany and Switzerland and now is widely administered in European countries, as well as the Republic of Panama.

Huggins explained that the Pure Food and Drug Act bars the serum in the United States

because of "the danger to eyes if mishandled, and it eliminates all pain from any source if overdosed."

A move reportedly is underway to have DMSO approved in the States.

During his five week duration in Panama, Huggins found that he had time on his hands so he took a 2½ day tour into the Darien Jungle, part of which still is unexplored by man and where the Choco Indians build their homes on stilts. He also visited the Canal Zone and many other nearby sites. He returned October 15.

More importantly, his "mission of mercy" has given a friend renewed life and hope!

As in the past, the board paid the tuition of a local student to the special vocation school in Plainview since Lockney does not have these classes.

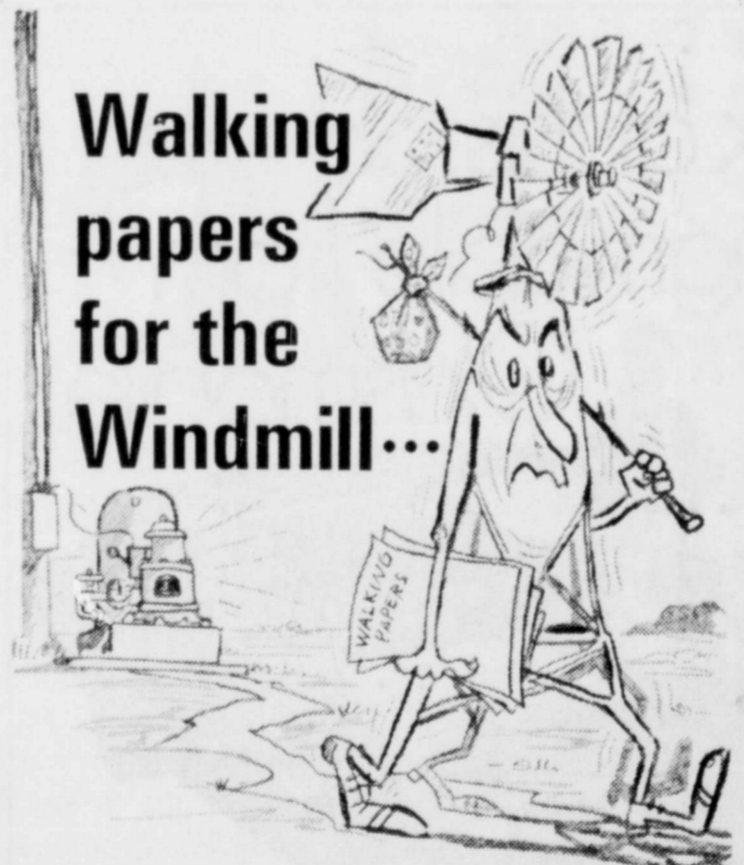

Q. My husband is still working and earning too much to draw social security. I will be 62 in January. Can I draw my social security even though my husband is still working?

Turkey is a good buy in more ways than one. One way turkey is a good buy is because of the relatively low cost per pound and the high yield of tender meat. A good food buy also is one that provides the greatest amount of nutrition for the money. Again turkey meets the test. For those weight watchers, poultry is lower in calories than most other meats provided you don't add rich gravies and sauces.

If you bought a large enough turkey, so that you have "planned left-overs" here are some recipe ideas you might like to try.


HOT TURKEY SALAD
2 cups cubed cooked turkey or chicken
3/4 cup chopped celery
1/4 cup finely chopped green pepper




