

A meeting has been called for all persons who are now in the "each one teach one" program at the First Methodist Church parlor Monday night, November 27 at 6 p.m.


The meeting is to evaluate efforts to teach Latin and Negro persons to read, write, and speak English.

And, points out the National Safety Council, that is only part of the story. An additional 11 million, it estimates, suffered injuries at home, on the job and elsewhere that incapacitated them for a day or more.

Thus, for every accident that resulted in a fatality, there were nearly 100 others that called for medical attention and restricted activity.

The council places the cost of accidents, including lost wages, at \$20 billion a year.

Floyd County's share of this cost, applying locally the average amount per accident, comes to about \$2,856,000.



Mrs. Ida Matney Schlichezmaier of Bowie, the former schoolmate, had thrice undergone surgery in San Antonio for a malignancy. Following a third operation, doctors informed Mrs. Schlichenmaier that she had "only a few days left."

The patient learned that a Dr. E. J. Tucker in Houston had an anti-cancer serum which might prolong her life. Before giving the serum, Dr. Tucker's assistants conducted tests which indicated that the 40 year old of Panama. But there was one final ray of hope: another serum which could be administered in the Republic of Panama or in European countries. Dr. Tucker and Dr. A. Carrizo V. of the San Fernando Clinic in Panama had been consulting on the new drug, which has not yet been approved by U. S. authorities.

George Craft was employed to drive a school bus, replacing Ed Aaron who recently resigned as bus driver and junior high coach.


Board members made arrangements with school attorney Paul Lyle of Plainview to file suit on delinquent taxes, personal or real, that are past six months due.




