It describes a small town as "a person can keep his mouth shut in a small town."

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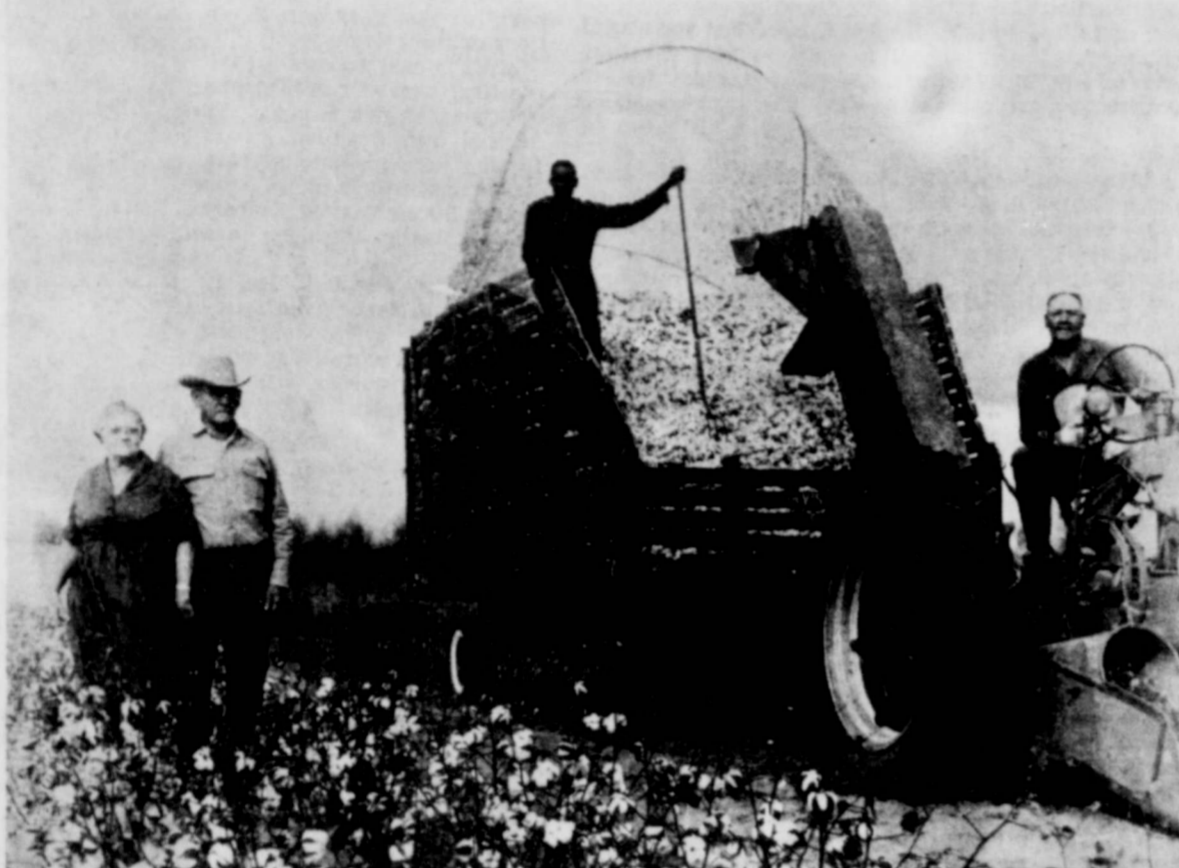

## Snow, Mist Slow Cotton Harvest

### 75% Crop Estimated At Gins In County

### 1733 Attended Church Last Sunday

A spot check with cotton gins in the county reveals that possibly 75% of the 1968 cotton crop was either ginned or being ginned when a wet snow settled in the county Monday night and Tuesday.

This brings the November moisture to .30 and a total of 15.76 for the year. Last year's moisture was 20.10 inches.

Bob Hambright of the local Texas Employment Agency is making a gin by gin bale count in the county to determine if production is anywhere near the 65,000 estimated bales for Floyd county. The estimate was made about a month ago by the Plains Cotton Growers.

Teen-Agers In Floyd Spend \$1,440,000

(Special to the Hesperian)

NEW YORK, Nov. 25—Many grown-ups in Floyd County were in a saving mood during the past year, but not their teen-age children.

These free-spending youngsters were not bothered in the slightest by all this talk about bigger taxes, inflation, the high cost of living and such.

They had more money than ever at their command, an estimated \$1,440,000, and they never gave it a chance to bore holes in their pockets.

Out it went—fast—for cosmetics, tape recorders, food, paperbacks, mod clothing, wiglets, sports equipment, entertainment, soda pop, used cars and the many other teen-age "necessities."

The valuation of the teen-age market is based upon studies made by the Institute of Life Insurance, the Youth Research Institute and others.

They find that the 24 million teen-agers in the United States earned, received and spent nearly \$18 billion in the past year, a record amount. It was at the rate of \$750 per year, or \$14.40 per week on average, for those in the 13 to 19 set.

For the 1,920 in that age bracket in Floyd County, it figured out to \$27,650 per week.

Some of the teen-agers in the local area earned part of their money by cutting grass, baby sitting, working as delivery boys and doing other odd jobs after school. The rest of their income came from weekly allowances and cash gifts.

Because most local parents can afford to give their children more money nowadays and because, to a greater degree than in former years, the children do their own shopping for clothes and other items, the allowances have grown in size.

The Life Insurance Institute cites figures showing that boys

between 16 and 19 have average earnings and allowances of \$17.05 a week and that girls in that age group average \$16.20. The 13 to 16's have considerably less.

Of great importance to retail merchants, in addition to the business they do directly with their young customers, is the \$35 billion of cars, household equipment and other family purchases that are specifically influenced by these youngsters.

In Floyd County, on the basis of the national pattern, their influence affects some \$2,794,000 of the spending done in local stores per year.

**"Outdoors USA" Yearbook Published**

The opportunities that rural America offers for living, working and relaxation are told in the 1967 Yearbook of Agriculture, "Outdoors USA," which was published last month (October 26) by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The Yearbook tells its story largely in the terms of people. It is a handbook of conservation and wise use of natural resources, a guide to the America outdoors with its great recreation potential, and a primer of natural beauty.

An article in the book on the economics of deer on rangeland was written by Olan Dillon, of Fort Worth, regional biologist for the Soil Conservation Service, and Vernon Hicks, of Temple, SCS biologist for the State of Texas. Another article in the book was written by Tarleton Jenkins, formerly of Fort Worth and now assistance director of the Information Division of SCS, Washington. It concerns the Pozeau River Watershed in Arkansas.

Among the pictures in the book are two by Hugo Bryan and one by Claude Crowley, information specialists, both of the SCS Regional Technical Service Center, Ft. Worth.

The book is designed for all American--citizens concerned about conservation of our natural resources, hunters and fishermen, family campers, all who are concerned with the quality of the total environment, children eager to learn about the outdoors, and farmers interested in profit making recreation enterprises.

In the foreword, Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman writes that the Department is "moving forward with bold new actions to restore, conserve, and wisely use our natural heritage and maintain it for future generations." He stresses that this work is vitally important.

"Outdoors USA" contains 408 pages of text illustrated with 220 black and white photographs, plus a section with 43 color photographs. There are 109 chapters under four headings: The Big Woods, Water, Beautification, and The Countryside.

Senators and Congressman have limited numbers of copies of the Yearbook for free distribution to constituents. Copies of "Outdoors USA" may also be obtained for \$2.75 each from the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402.

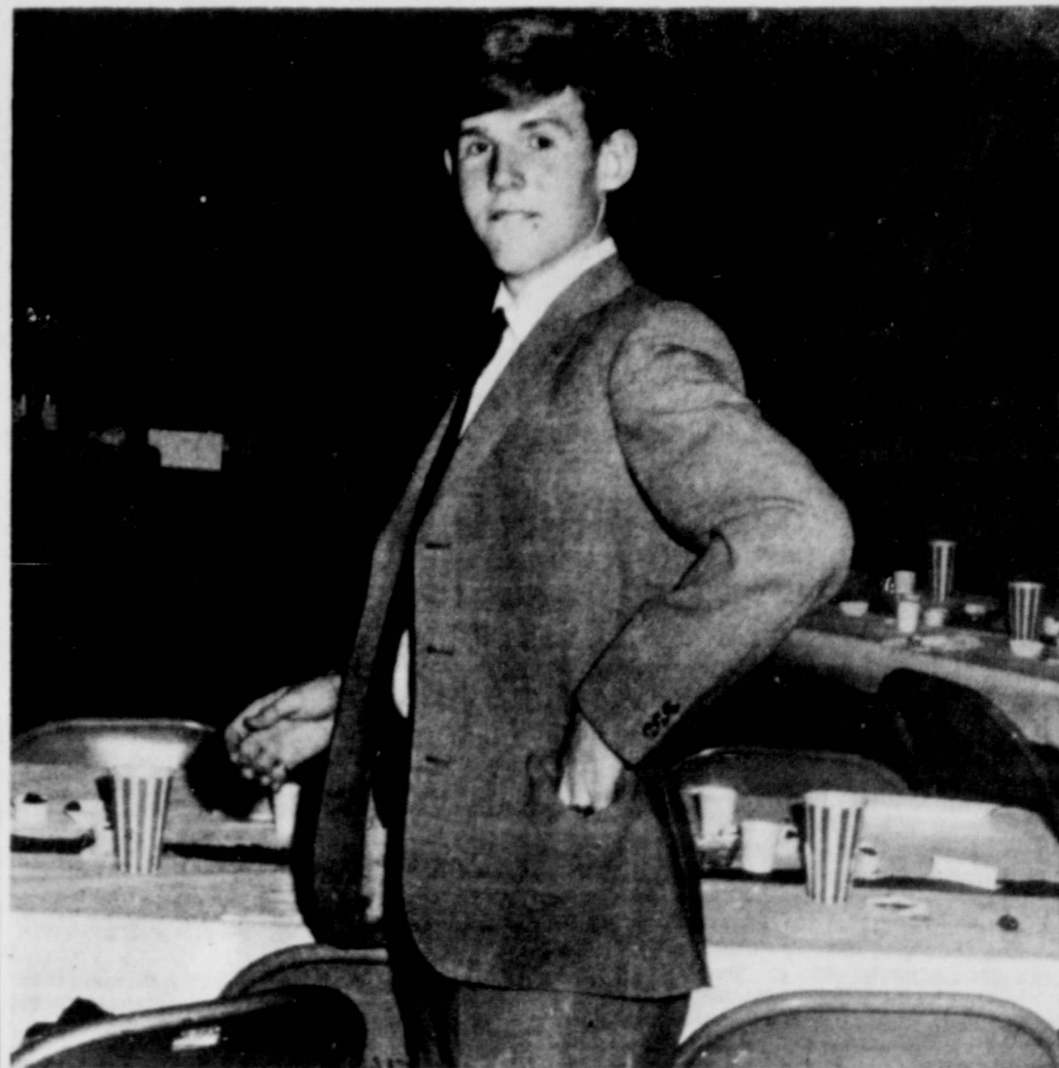

## ACS Newsletter

1968 COTTON:  
Cotton allotments for Floyd County will remain the same for 1968 as they were in 1967. Cotton yields have been cut approximately 7 1/2% for the 1968 program year-The 1967 county yield was 707 lbs. as compared to 654 lbs. for 1968.

This reduction was brought about by our short 1966 crop plus the fact the State increased its average production. Producers will have 15 days after receiving their notice of acreage and yield to appeal either. All appeals must be in writing. Proven yields will be accepted, based on the years 1964-65 & 66.

SKIP ROW  
The revised skiprow regulation which is applicable to cotton for 1968 is not applicable for feed grains or peanuts. Example: 100 acres of land planted 2 rows cotton 1 row fallow is 66.7 acres of cotton. 100 acres of land planted 2 rows Grain Sorghum 1 row fallow is 86.7 acres of Grain Sorghum.

MEASURING SERVICE  
Farm operators will be responsible for measuring and reporting acreages in 1968 as they were in the two previous years.

If you have any doubt about your acreages it is probable that you may need the local office to measure your farm. The fee for measuring the wheat acreage is \$3.00 for the first plot plus \$.50 for each additional plot plus 4¢ per acre. EXTENSION OF 1967 CROP LOANS (RESEAL)

Wheat, corn, grain sorghum, oats, barley and (soybeans) from the 1967 crops which are under price-support loans in commercial storage, will be eligible for loan extensions (reseat) before the respective crop loan matures late in the spring or early summer of 1968.

All producers who are eligible for price support on 1967 crops will be eligible for resale in commercial storage or farm storage if approved for the State. Storage cost accruing during the resale period will be paid by CCC.

Producers may redeem resale commodities at any time and dispose of such commodities as desired. Under the 1967 crop resale program, price-support loans on stored commodities will be extended beyond the 1968 maturity dates until called. ## Postmaster Says Use Serviceman's Correct Address

Postmaster today urged the Floydada, Texas to use the correct address for letters and packages to servicemen overseas to avoid serious delays in delivery.

Postmaster reported that letters and packages overseas have been delayed because they were in the wrong address. He said the biggest problem is the failure to include the very important APO or FPO address. He said that last year more than 1 million pieces of mail were in delivery. Of these, 1/2 million pieces

failed to include the complete 5 digit APO or FPO number in the address. This improperly addressed mail had to be sent to a military locator directory where time-consuming searches were made to determine the proper addresses. "As the Christmas mail volume going overseas is expected to increase up to 30 percent or over 4 million pounds above last year, every precaution should be taken by friends and relatives of servicemen to address their letters and packages properly to assure rapid

id delivery to its destination," E. H. Wester said. There are four essential elements to an overseas military address. They are: 1. The serviceman's identity - grade, full name, and service number. 2. His military unit - complete. Gateway post office - New York, San Francisco or Seattle. 4. APO or FPO - a 5 digit number. When any of these elements is missing, the letter or package will be delayed in delivery.

(Editor's note: This letter was received by local postmaster Ed Wester. We pass it on to you, as it is of interest to people of Floydada.)

Postmaster, Will you give this letter to your editor of your paper or some one who would like a story of truth about Floydada when it was first started as a city. I went to the first school of the city and the school house was moved from Della Plains.

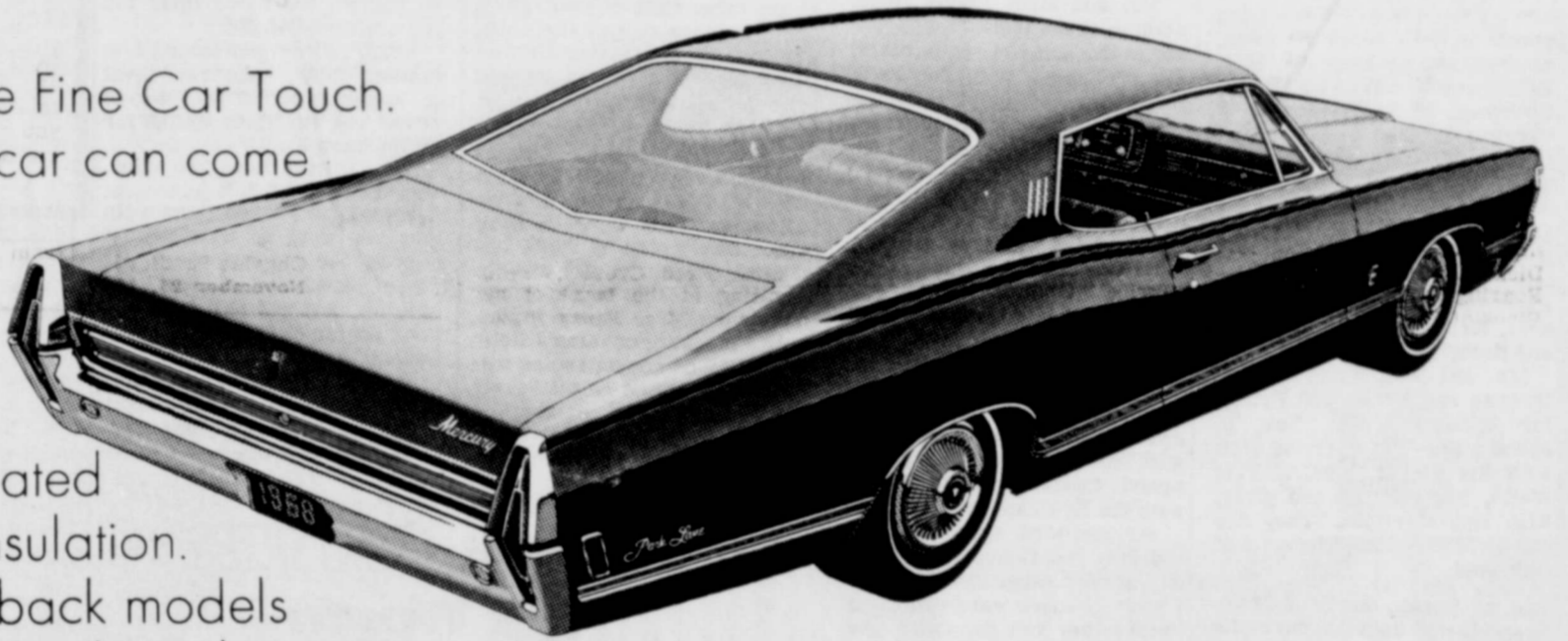

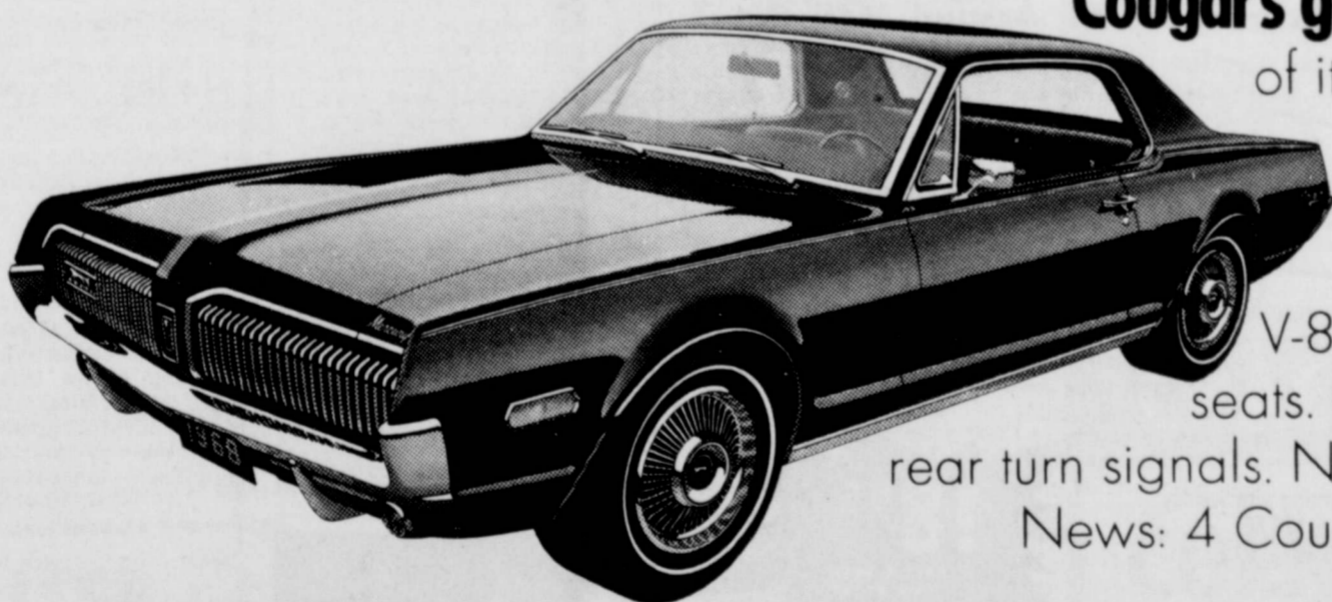

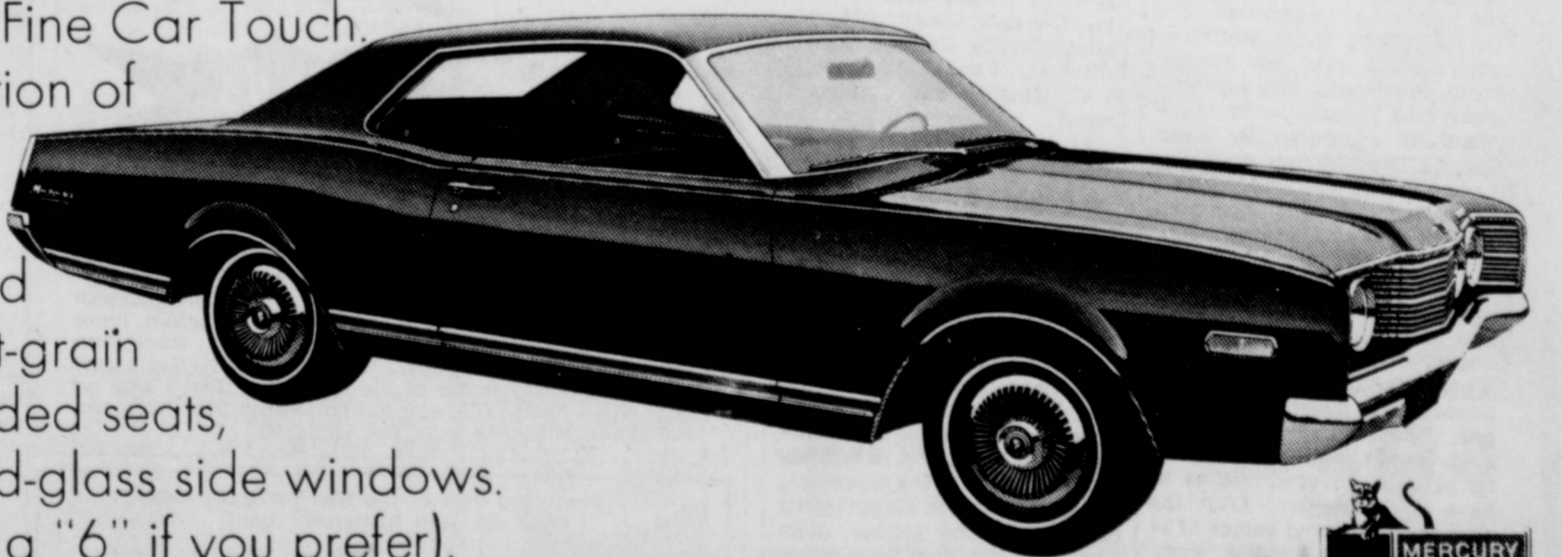

**LAND LEVELING - AN AID TO SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION** - Land leveling is one of the most important conservation practices being applied on irrigated farms today. With the water table dropping, the need for managing irrigation water is increasing. It has been estimated that 50% or more of the water applied on the South Plains does not add to crop production. This loss is caused by several things, one of which is poor distribution of water on the land.

Field leveling is one way to provide efficient use of irrigation water. By reshaping the land surface to a planned grade, efficient use of rainfall as well as irrigation water can be obtained.

Another method of using water efficiently is through bench leveling. On sloping land, bench leveling has been proven to be an economical soil and water saving practice. Tests at the High Plains Research Founda-

tion for a given five year period has shown that cotton on bench-leveled land produced 744 pounds of lint per acre or 55 pounds per acre more than the sloping land. The benched area returned \$24.31 per acre more than the slope and required 1.3 inches less irrigation. Grain sorghum grown on the benched land produced 1255 pounds per acre more with an increase in return of \$25.44 per acre on 7.1 inches per acre less irrigation.

Bench-leveled land makes better use of rainfall and irrigation water and cuts down on soil loss due to runoff. They are constructed parallel to each other, thereby getting rid of troublesome point rows.

The best time for farmers to do land leveling is at hand, since crops are being harvested and preparations are being made for next year's crops. For further information and assistance concerning land leveling, contact your Soil Conservation Service office and personnel.

If this is the case, be extra careful with your measurements. Instant flour is processed with steam or hot water after regular milling to make tiny granules stick together as larger particles. They take up less space in a measuring cup. The result is that a full measure of instant flour in a cake or cookie recipe designed for sifted regular flour can alter the shape, texture, and flavor of the final product.

Instant flour weighs more per cup and takes up liquid at a faster rate than regular flour, so there's too much flour for the amount of liquid.

**SOLUTION:** When baking with instant flour, take two level tablespoons out of each cup of sifted regular flour called for by the recipe.

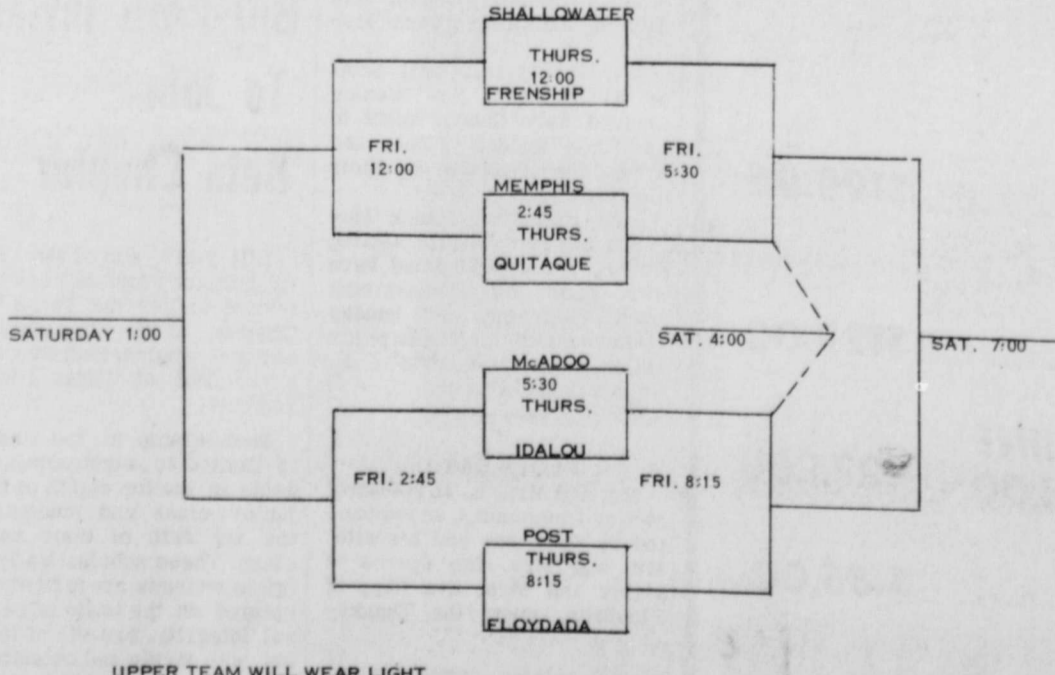
