67,056 Bales Of **Cotton Ginned**

By Wendell Tooley estimated that Floyd county would produce 60,000 bales of cotton this year and with about 97% of the crop harvested the count is 67,056.

Bob Hambright, manager of the local Texas Employment Commission made a gin count of the 22 gins in the county and came up with the total, . A little over 57,000 bales were produced last year.

Cotton farmers are generally happy as both production and price were up from last year. Cotton's future looks good at this time with hardly a million bales of surplus stored by Commodity Credit and mills are buying the better staple and

grade cotton. With most of the nation's farmers layout out of production up to 35% of their allotments the surplus has been decreasing for the past two years from a high of 16 million bales.

The cotton program for 1968 looks encouraging, it allows a farmer to plant either 65 percent or 95 percent of his allotment.

Floyd county farmers proved this year that long staple cotton can be grown this far north and prices up to 40¢ were received by some cotton farmers.







The beautiful wig you won by your name and town being drawn by a club member in Philadelphia, Pa., is FRAUD.

The Floydada Post Office received about 300 post cards Monday addressed to ladies in Floydada notifying them that all they had to do to claim their wig, to call at their office in Philadelphia, Pa., or send \$5.36 for postage and handling fee.

Postmaster Ed Wester received the following notice from the Postal Inspector in Charge, Fort Worth, Texas 76101 on November 22, 1967 that states: "Investigation has resulted in the indictment of Elliott N. Scott at Philadelphia, Pa., on mail fraud charges on October 6, 1967. He was subsequently arrested and released on bail. The United States Attorney intends to list the case for trial in December, 1967. Scott's scheme consisted of offering for sale to the public women's wigs which were grossly misrepresented in the advertising. In many instances no wigs at all were furnished.

Scott is still operating and is mailing thousands of advertising pieces each week to all parts of the country. Most of the wigs are being sent C.O.D. He is currently using the names, CHARLES WIG STYLING CLUB, RICH BEAUTY AND HEALTH SALON, PHILLIPS SOCIAL CLUB, and NATIONAL FAMILY CONSUMER COM-PANY, all with Philadelphia addresses. Thousands of complains have been received from the public, postmasters, news media, better business bureaus, etc.

This information is furnished in order that you will be in a position to answer patron inquiries and possibly save some individuals from being victim-







SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION NEWS

Bench leveling is simply altering the slope and topography of a field from what is existing to what is desired. This is done for several reasons, some of which are:

not make the maximum use of rainfall. The interval of the bench not runn off and is utilized to the maximum.

2. Reduce erosion, Erosion results in the loss of millions of tons of valuable topsoil each year. Bench leveling reduces this to a minimum by eliminating runoff.

3. Maximum utilization of irrigation water. It takes an irrigation well pumping 400 gallons per minute a total of 17 days to put 3 inches of water on 120 acres. Bench leveling can reduce the number of pumping days to a mi imum by preventing loss of irrigation water in the form of tailwater.

4. Uniform penetration of rainfall and irrigation water. Hot spots and waterlogged spots are eliminated since all portions of the bench receives the same amount of water.

Bench leveling may be the answer to the problems created by the sloping land on the back forty. The local Soil Conserva-tion Service personnel are available to assist anyone in discussing the need for benches and planning the irrigation system. They will also explain the cost-share assistance available on this type of conservation work.

COUNTY AGENT'S CORNER

by Joe Wilson

GREENBUGS INCREASE Greenbugs have increased in population during the past few weeks and in some areas they are damaging the wheat. Some small areas in a few fields have even been destroyed by the insects. Greenbugs belong to the aphid family and they are able to reproduce rapidly at temperatures between 55 and 75 degrees F. Its natural enemies, however, reproduce very slowly when temperatures are below 65 degrees F. Thus, in cool weather the greenbug may increase to enormous numbers while the number of its natural enemies increases slowly.

The need for applying insecticides depends on the number of greenbugs present, size and vigor of plants, temperature and moisture conditions. For example, this time of the year if greenbugs were present a cold spell could reduce the numbers so that no damage would occur. However if they are killing the wheat, spraying may be necessary to maintain

If treatment is necessary the following insecticides and rates are recommended: Methyl Parathion 1 to 2 1/2 pts. per acre; Parathion 1 to 21/2 pints per acre; and Malathion 1 1/2 to 2 pints per acre. Wheat treated with Methyl Parathion or Parathion should NOT be grazed for 15 days after application. Wheat treated with Malathion may be grazed 7 days after application.

Green bugs are controlled more effectively when temperatures are above 50 degrees F. Malation is less effective than Parathion or Methyl Parathion but may be used where a less toxic material is preferred.

MULTI-COLOR FLAMES The beauty of a fire in the fireplace during the upcoming Holiday Senson, can be made even prettier with the addition of multi-colored flames. Chemical treatment of the

material to be burned can result in green, red, blue, orange or purple flames instead of the usual yellow flames from wood.

Calcium chloride can be used to produce orange colored flames, copper chloride -blue, Potassium chloride - purple, strontium nitrate - red, lithium chloride - carmine, and copper sulfate - emerald green. Dry pine cones, small chips or blocks of wood can be soaked in these chemicals for multi-colored flames. Most of the chemicals can be purchased from chemical supplies or drug-

To treat the cones or wood, a plastic pail and an onion sack are needed. The cones or chips are placed in the sack and immersed in a solution containing one pound of chemical dissolved thoroughly in one gallon of water. The bag must be weighed so that all of the material is completely covered and the cones and wood should soak for just as wood. at least 10 minutes.

After soaking, Place the treated material on newspapers to dry and then they will be ready to brighten the holiday fireplaces.
