SCHOOL ELECTION HELD

Russell, Ferguson, Simpson Win Floydada City Council Positions

Wayne Russell, Ray Gene Ferguson and W. H. Simpson Jr. were named to terms on the Floydada City Council in balloting Saturday which also involved voters of the Floydada Independent School District and Caprock Hospital District.

A total of 281 voters turned

County School Trustees Named

Floyd County Common School Districts also went to the polls on Saturday, naming trustees at each of the schools including South Plains, Lakeview, Dougherty and Providence.

At South Plains, Keith Marble polled 28 votes and Eugene Beedy 19 to take the two places up for grabs. A total of 44 votes were cast with others receiving votes including Tillman Powell 17, Glen Wood 10 and Donald Bean 8.

At Lakeview, 18 votes were cast, all going to Fred Lloyd who will serve as that district's trustee, providing the

out to make their preferences known from among a field of five candidates for the city posts while the other two elections were only formalities... neither having contested races.

Russell led the polling for the city jobs with 235 points, followed by Ferguson with 196 and Simpson with 158. Simpson is an incumbent councilman and the other two men are newcomers.

Other candidates in the race,

J. W. Gilbreath and Roe Jones (incumbent), polled 133 and 109 votes respectively.

The new councilmen were to take office Wednesday night after postponement of the regular city meeting from the previous night.

In the school election, 149 votes were cast with Newell Burk named on all 149 of the ballots to lead the ticket. The other two trustees named, Thomas Warren and Bill Hale, polled 148 and 144 votes res-

pectively.

The three trustees took office Monday night at the regular monthly meeting of the board. Both Burk and Warren are incumbents.

A total of 150 votes were cast in the hospital district election, naming Hollis Bond, M. S. Robertson and L. T. Wood, all incumbents, to new terms.

Voting in the election included 145 for both Robertson and Bond and 144 for Wood.

\$74,909.28 REFUNDED

Lighthouse Annual Meet Held Here On Saturday

Patronage refunds totaling \$74,909.28 were distributed to 1957 members of Lighthouse Electric Cooperative at the organization's 29th annual membership meeting held Saturday in Floydada.

At the meeting, which was held at Floydada High School,

1,350 persons were fed at a free noon luncheon and 421 members from Floyd, Hale, Briscoe, Swisher, Motley, Dickens and Crosby Counties heard a business report which included a \$6,074,650.67 figure as the net worth of the cooperative.

Giving the business report of the cooperative was Manager Melvin Henry who quoted gross revenue for the cooperative during 1967 as \$1,470,734.96, up almost \$200,000 from the previous year.

In charge of the business ses-

sions of the meeting was Herman King, president, who presided over the election of directors which saw Chloma Williams and Henry Scarborough returned to the board.

King was renamed as president with other officers to include R. C. Rathaal, vice-president, and Gerald Lackey, secretary-treasurer.

Other board members are Odell Breed and Cecil Baxter.

Speaker for the afternoon session was R. B. (Mac) Mc-

Stansell Re-Elected President Of Board

Jack Stansell was re-elected as president of the Floydada Independent School District Board Monday night in their regular meeting as Newell Burk, Bill Hale and Thomas Warren began new terms on the governing body.

Joining Stansell as officers on the board are Howard Gregory, vice-president and Newell Burk, secretary, both being renamed to their respective posts.

After canvassing of Saturday's election results, Burk and Warren, both incumbents, plus Hale took office for new terms.

Main items on the agenda for the meeting was the approval by the board to purchase a 20-foot square Enscot gym mat for the high school physical education and athletic classes at a cost of about \$1,000 and approval of the school calendar for the 1968-69 term.

Under the calendar, school classes will begin on August 29, a Wednesday, and conclude with graduation on May 23, 1969.

Holidays on the calendar include:

- Sept. 2 - Labor Day
- Nov. 28-29 - Thanksgiving
- Dec. 20 - Jan. 2 - Christmas
- April 4-14 - Easter
- March 7 - TSTA Meeting
- Mid-term exams are January 9-10 and final exams are scheduled for May 22-23.

Other approvals by the board were scheduling baccalaureate services at the First Baptist Church, acceptance of the resignation of Delbert Wiley effective March 29, employment of Mrs. James (Kay Wayman) Cage for 1968-69, and reimbursement of the athletic fund in the amount of \$3,000.

A MESSAGE TO YOUTH AT EASTER

A Letter From Huntsville

Editor's Note: The Hesperian prints the following two letters in the hope that they will enlighten our citizens about some of our youth in Floydada. The Hesperian feels that these two letters should be read to our students in school and many ministers will want to share them in total or part with their congregations.

The first letter is from Mrs. Newell Burk in reference to the second letter written to Alex Wall from Leon Collins in Huntsville.

Dear Mr. Tooley,
This letter was received the night before five of our youth left for Gatesville last week. I felt both sorrow and joy as I read this letter. Sorrow because we failed this youth and joy because you can see this youth is coming through this experience as the courts of our land intended. After I read this letter I thought to myself, now how are we citizens of this community going to help this boy after he returns to find his purpose in life? How am I, a wife and mother, going to help this boy and others like him?

One thing I know to do that I believe will work is for each of us as Mothers to welcome these children into our communities. Give him work and after work, play. Give a yard to play in, a ball to throw, a friendly face to look into, visit with him, you may have a good book he would like to read, one that would enrich his life for life. Work and play with these children and with their parents, make them know we care, yes care with the love of God in our hearts.

These negro youth are no different from our youth, they have the same desires and needs our children have. The need to be accepted for who they are where they are. And now thank you, Mr. Wall, for being the man this young man admires. May God guide you in your counseling him while he is in prison and I pray God will guide us in loving and accepting him in our community after he returns.

Dear Mr. Wall,
How are things with you and your family, fine I hope. I am writing you to know if it is all right to write you. I think you are the only person that I like or admire.

I would like for you to pray for me, along with me. I am not asking you to pray for me because I am in prison, but I would like for you to pray that I will be a better person, and that I come more closer to our Savior.

I've learned a lot down here, even though I've been down here for a short time. There are boys down here that are only 18 or older with from five to life in prison. There are some of the smartest people I have ever seen as well as some of the dumbest. By coincidence there is a boy next door who has the same last name as I and an older brother which is 21 years of age and has the same name as Tommy.

He and I are the same age, he has life. I pray each day that God will help each one of us to find our way back to him.

Mr. Wall you don't know how much it hurt me to be sent down here, but I look around me, and I feel so lost even though there are thousands of men around from all ages, and all colors and I want to cry just to think that these men went wrong and how many more are going the same way.

Tell Mrs. Wall Hello and all your family. The weather down here isn't the best, but it hasn't rained or neither has the sun shone very much. The trees and the grass is very beautiful. I haven't been outdoors since I got here and won't until about 25 more days. I know that seems like a long time, but that is because you have tests, shots, physicals, and many other things.

The eating hours are very stiff, for instance we eat breakfast a 4 a.m., dinner at 11 a.m. and supper at 4 p.m. All together this isn't the best place to be but I think it's all right for those who have done wrong.

Mr. Wall tell Johnny Ray to tell all the guys hello, and to go to church because there is no better place to be on Easter or any other day. We attend church every Monday down here, there are a few that go and there are those who don't.

Mr. Wall if I be good and don't cause any trouble I might make parole in about eight more months. If any of the guys have entered service write and tell me, you know I like to know about home boys.

Mr. Wall, all that basketball playing has a chance to show me off down here, since they have a team here. Well, I better give my pencil a rest, but be sure to let me know if it is all right to write you.

Mrs. Foster In Memphis The Night King Was Killed

Mrs. Hattie Foster had quite an experience last week when she had to spend the night in a bus station at Memphis, Tenn., following the assassination of Martin Luther King.

Mrs. Foster had been to Chattanooga, Tenn., to visit a granddaughter, Mrs. Judy Green and family and was enroute home when the layover in Memphis occurred.

The Floydada woman said the bus stopped at a small town near Memphis and there they learned of King's death. Farther on down the highway they met another bus and its driver cautioned Mrs. Foster's driver that trouble possibly was brewing in Memphis but that National Guardsmen were on the way.

Mrs. Foster said when they arrived at the Memphis bus station at 10:35 p.m. the Na-

tional Guard were everywhere. The bus was to leave at 11 p.m. but at the last minute the driver told his passengers to get their luggage from the bus, then made the announcement that all would remain overnight in the bus station until the management thought it was safe to leave.

No incidents occurred during the night at the station Mrs. Foster said and the following morning the bus left at 5 o'clock for Dallas.

Mrs. Foster, who is practically blind, made the round trip to Tennessee alone. The trip was a birthday gift from her son in Abilene. She said she was able to see most of the beautiful country sides of Tennessee, Georgia and Alabama where only the previous week some 18 inches of snow had fallen.

forts and certainly history will record the reasons behind Dr. King's Nobel Prize award and the impact of his leadership for the downtrodden of this land.

Basically, all Dr. King was trying to say was "let my people go"... a statement also made by Moses.

I have always been thankful that there was a Martin Luther King at the helm of leadership for the Negro people instead of a Stokely Carmichael or Rapp Brown.

Dr. King spent his entire life at the side of the most oppressed people in this nation. He died in that struggle and all who cherish human dignity mourn his passing.

James Reston, said in the Fort Worth Star Telegram Sunday, "thenation is appalled by the murder of Martin Luther King, but it is not appalled by the conditions of his people. It grieves for the man, but not for his cause. This is the curse and tragedy of America.

"At least the extremists have kept their promises. The white racists said they would kill King, and the black racists said they would burn us to the ground. And we will not hear again that strangled cry or the rolling biblical cadences of that magnificent voice,

and the smoke is drifting through cherry blossoms by the Jefferson Memorial, and the rest of us have not kept our promises to the Negro people.

"This is the real crime of which the assassination of Dr. King is but a hideous symbol. It will not be redeemed by the capture of the murderer. It can only be redeemed by the transformation of the lives of the Negro people, and even now America has not faced up to the cost of this historic debt."

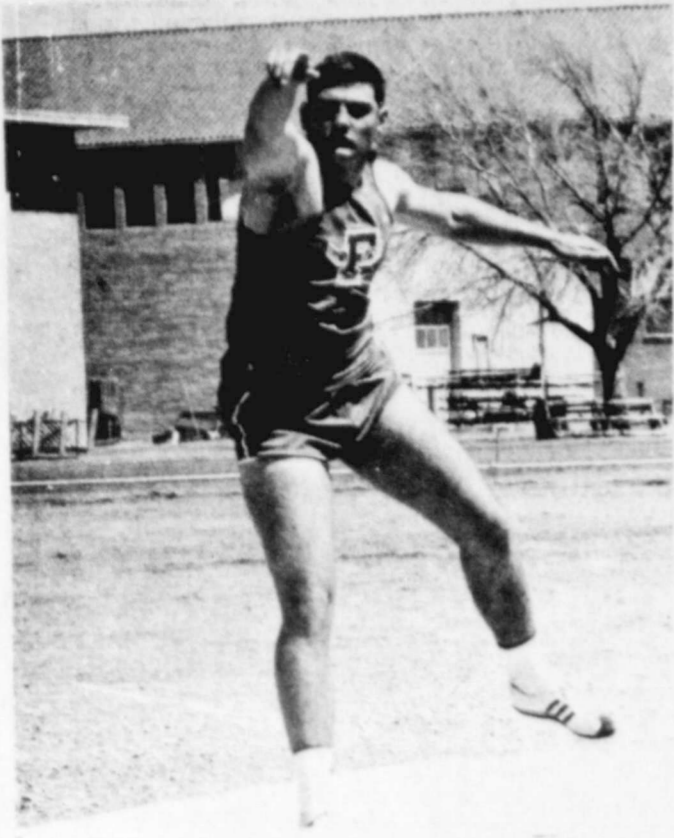

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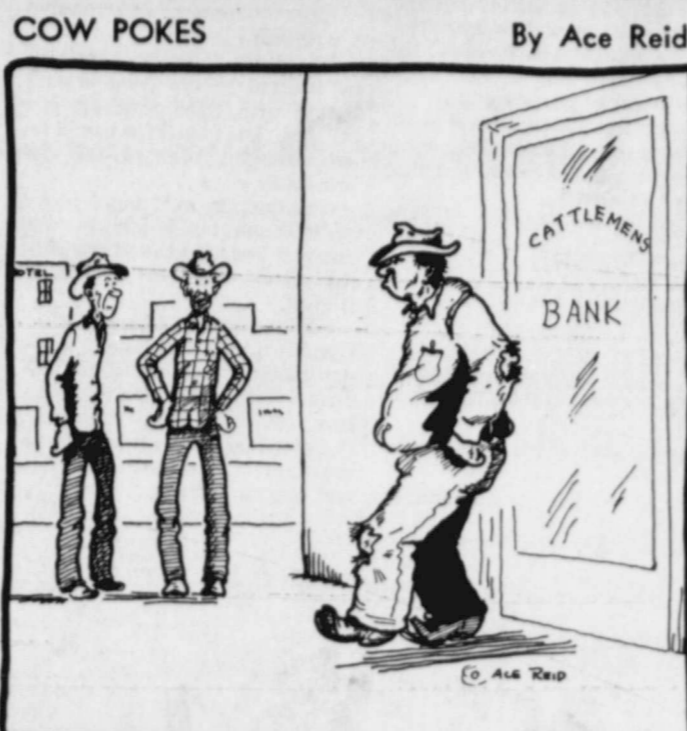

COUNTY AGENT'S CORNER

The Greenbug infestation seems to be decreasing at this time. Several wheat fields were checked this past week and the numbers were considerably reduced. In one field there were very few healthy greenbugs left but there were numerous ones that had been parasitized by a small gnat like wasp. These wasps were very numerous and active in most fields. They lay their eggs inside the greenbugs and when the egg hatches into a larva it eats the greenbug from the inside. A parasitized greenbug will be straw brown or darker in color, larger in the mid section and move rather slowly if at all.

Lady bugs and damsel flies could also be found in most fields. They are also beneficials that eat the greenbugs. If the warm weather continues, probably there will be little if any damage occurring this

year from this wheat pest.

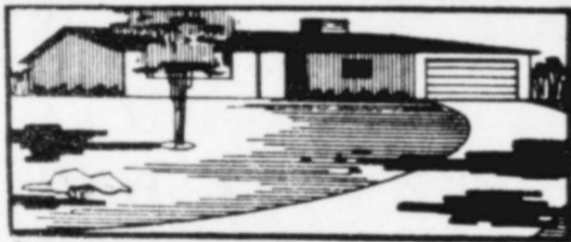
The first grain sorghum was planted this week. The soil temperature is possibly still a little cool at this time, however it is warming rapidly. According to research from the South Plains Research and Extension Center wet moist soil will warm more rapidly than dry soil. The heat waves from the sun are absorbed more readily by the damp soil than dry soil.

The soil temperature for cotton to germinate should be 60 degrees F. Grain Sorghum will generally germinate and grow at temperatures slightly below this.

Farmers should plant high quality seed if at all possible. Research shows certified or high quality seed germinates and "grows off" faster than farm saved or poor quality seed.

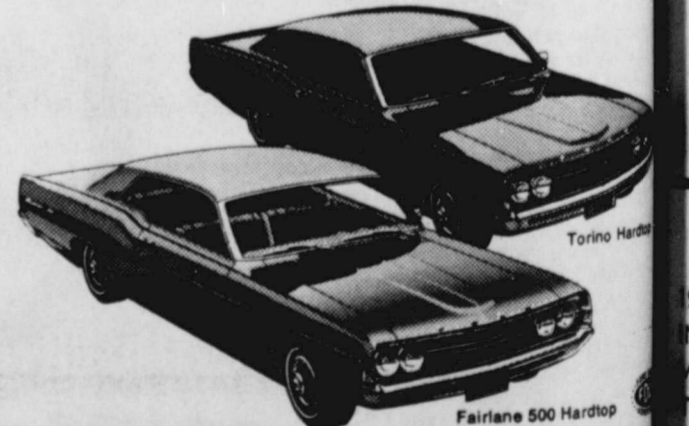

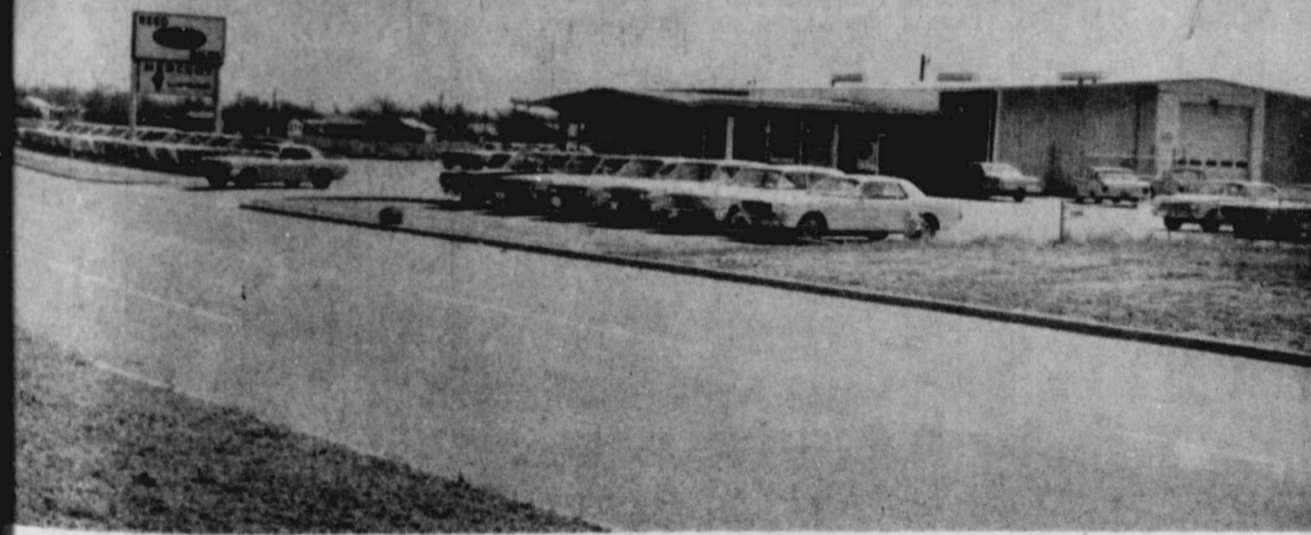

REMOVE GRAYNESS FROM LAUNDRY

If the linens and other white items in the laundry are looking gray and dingy, they need to be stripped. This is a method practiced in professional laundry circles of removing grayness from whites.

Just the sight of a drier or line full of sparkling linens can lift the spirit and set the mood for spring.

Stripping involves nothing more than running your laundry through its regular wash cycle but minus detergent, softener, bleach or any other extra you're accustomed to using. All you add is washing soda... three to four tablespoons. It attacks the most common cause of graying... your over-enthusiastic use of detergent which may be more than the rinse cycle of your machine can cope with.

The leftover detergent residue sticks to fabric and dulls it. As more and more accumulates with repeated laundering, dinginess grows. The washing soda loosens the residue as you'll see from the suds it kicks up when your washing machine goes into action. Not until the water's sudsless will every trace of the old detergent be gone. A single stripping may do it for the mild case of the dull-drum. For a bad case, however, you may have to repeat the process twice, even three times.

Now launder as usual using washing soda again plus less than the prescribed amount of detergent, for the soda softens the water thereby giving the detergent more power.

More and more homemakers have discovered that by using washing soda regularly for their laundry they can dispense with costly additives, as it not only routs dirt but softens and brightens as well. And since you're using fewer products and less detergent, think of the money you save.

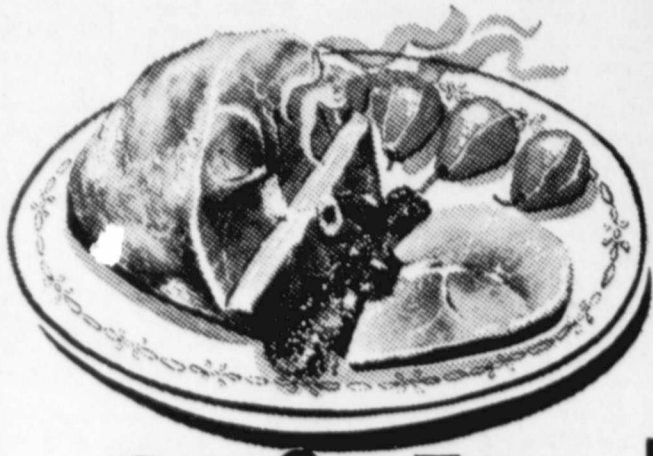

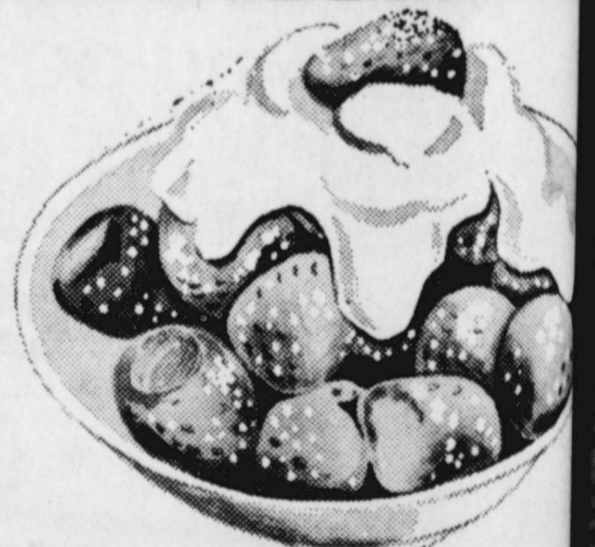
