# Moisture Highest In Past 39 Years

of low gear into high during the past week in Floyd County, and although not yet at peak activity, grain sorghum seed is going into the ground and there have been isolated reports of cotton

Of course, main reason for the speedup is the weather which has been ideal for the past week to ten days, the last freezing temperature reported the night of April 4 when the mercury dipped to 28.

Highs have ranged from a 58 on April 5 to the low 80's on Tuesday.

And, of more importance is the rainfall picture with a total of 5.48 inches thus far in 1968.

January - February - March, more than any amount recorded in Floydada since 1929, the only year with more moisture recorded in the 43 years since 1925 when the rainfall records were begun.

Breakdown of the rainfall shows 1.37 in January, 1.56 in February, 1.96 in March and .59

With the exceptional moisture and the warm weather, most county farmers have hopes of a bumper yield of cotton, maize and wheat, with others trying their hands at such crops as onions and cantaA total of 77,239 Floyd County acres are eligible for cotton planting, more than 20,000 acres than were planted last year. Last year's yield was 1.2 bales per acre, a total of 69,519.

In the grain sorghum picture, some of which is already sending shoots into the warm April air, there are 92,532 acres to be planted by county farmers, compared to about 120,000 harvested acres in 1967.

County wheat farmers have a total allotment of 131,514 acres this year, compared to about 100,000 harvested acres in 1967.


Tom Moore, county ASCS office manager, reminds the

wheat farmers that their acreage must be certified at his office by May 1.

As far as other crops are concerned, there is an estimated 750-800 acres of onions already planted in the county and perhaps 150 acres of cantaloupes are in the planning stage.

Although grain, wheat and onions are already in the planted or planting stage, a widespread influx of cotton planting is perhaps at least one week away.

Most farmers choose to begin planting after the soil reaches a minimum of 60 degress for a 10 day period at an eight inch depth, that figure standing at 52 degrees on Monday in the Lubbock area.

The Floydada City Council approved a new teenage curfew ordinance at its monthly meeting last Wednesday night. The new ordinance requires that all persons 17 years of age or un-der be off the streets by 12 p.m. on Sunday through Thursday nights and 1 a.m. on Friday

and Saturday nights.

The request was made by police chief Tom Hopper, Chief Hopper told the council that this would help solve some problems of teenagers who were driving or roaming the streets as late as 5 a.m. in

the morning.

Chief Hopper said similar curfews were in effect in Lockney and other area towns and he felt that a curfew ordinance would help a lot of Floydada teenagers get home before they get into trouble.



hat" to discuss the merits of owning an automatic dishwasher. Yet a Home Economics Director for one of the leading dishwasher manufacturers points out that the saturation of dishwashers is surprisingly low - in only 15.7% of U.S. homes as of 1966 -considering that it is one of the most effective means of saving a homemaker's time to allow her more leisure.

During the First Annual Home Appliance Conference in Washington, D.C., shedispelled many misconceptions which persist concerning the benefits of a dishwasher. The following information is adapted from her presentation, "Time

A dishwasher uses too much water. - Actually it uses less water per day than probably would be required in washing the dishes by hand. The machine fills with about 2 gallons for each wash and rinsecyclerecirculating this water over the dishes with a vigorous scrubbing action about 5 times in a full cycle. The soiled water is drained, then fresh water is pumped in and recirculated - for a total of about 11-15 gallons per load.

A dishwasher requires too much advance scraping and rinsing. - Automatic pre-rinsing eliminates the need for handrinsing before machine-washing. Manufacturers recommend only removing bones and other left-overs before loading.

A dishwasher won't clean pots, pans and casseroles, -Powerful scrubbing action, combined with very hot water and special detergents formulated just for automatic dishwashers, will generally clean utensils completely.

Any "almost clean" piece can be polished off in seconds. compared with the time and energy required to clean it completely by hand.

A dishwasher can't be used with a septic tank. - Dishwasher detergents are compatible with septic tanks and leech they can be safely

It may be regarded as "old and detergent into the tank-be cause most homemakers use an automatic dishwasher only once day vs. three times when washing dishes by hand,

The dishwasher is a long term investment, it should be used for everything possible to assure maximum dividends, Therefore, any new dishes and equipment should be selected with the machine in mind. For example it is best to avoid buying glasses and cups that have concave wells where water collects when they are loaded upside down.

The cleaning ability of any dishwasher is affected by the water quality, the type of detergent, and care in loading. Water should be 140-160 degrees at the dishwasher for proper rinsing and efficient drying, and only a special detergent designed for dishwashers should be used - in amounts recommended on the package. This may need to be somewhat varied depending on water conditions and



The final entry in the 1967 Texas traffic records has been entered and closed. There were 3,367 persons killed, 205,308 persons injured and an estimated property loss of \$793,-094,000.00. This compares to the 1966 record of 3,406 persons killed, 208,310 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$557,414,000.

TAILWATER RECOVERY SYSTEM - A tailwater recovery system is a facility to collect, store and transport irrigation tailwater for re-use in the farm irrigation system. This type of system is applicable to farms that are irrigated by a graded furrow or graded border system. It is especially applicable to a farm which has sandy type soils with a high water intake rate. The tailwater system in the photo above is located on the Ike Johnson farm. The pit is 100 feet long, 50 feet wide and 6 feet deep, and will store approximately .7 acre feet of water. The pit serves a field of 133 acres. With the system, Johnson achieves approximately 90% efficiency with his irrigation water as compared to approximately 70% efficiency with his irrigation water as compared to approximately 70% without the system. According to Johnson, he can now fill the soil profile without any water loss to runoff. Johnson was assisted in the design and layout of the system by local Soil Conservation Service personnel. The SCS personnel will be glad to assist area farmers in determining the need and feasibility of a tailwater recovery system on their farm.




