### Q.A.&P. Building New Office, Depot

Q.A. & P. Railway's local office and depot will soon be moved into an all-new \$15,000 building at a different location according to Francis Gunter, local station agent.

The new building, which is to be located adjacent to the Q.A. & P. automobile unloading yard on the southeast edge of the city, is expected to be completed in about three weeks, according to Gunter.

Containing about 800 square feet (20' x 40') of floor space, the new building is of metal prefab construction and is being built by Prefab Structure Company, Amarillo.

Contained in the building will be the station agent's office, an auto depot room, a room for waiting trainmen and a locker room for the employees of the car unloading yard.

The Q.A. & P. Depot has been located at their present 401 East Mississippi address since 1928, Gunter added.

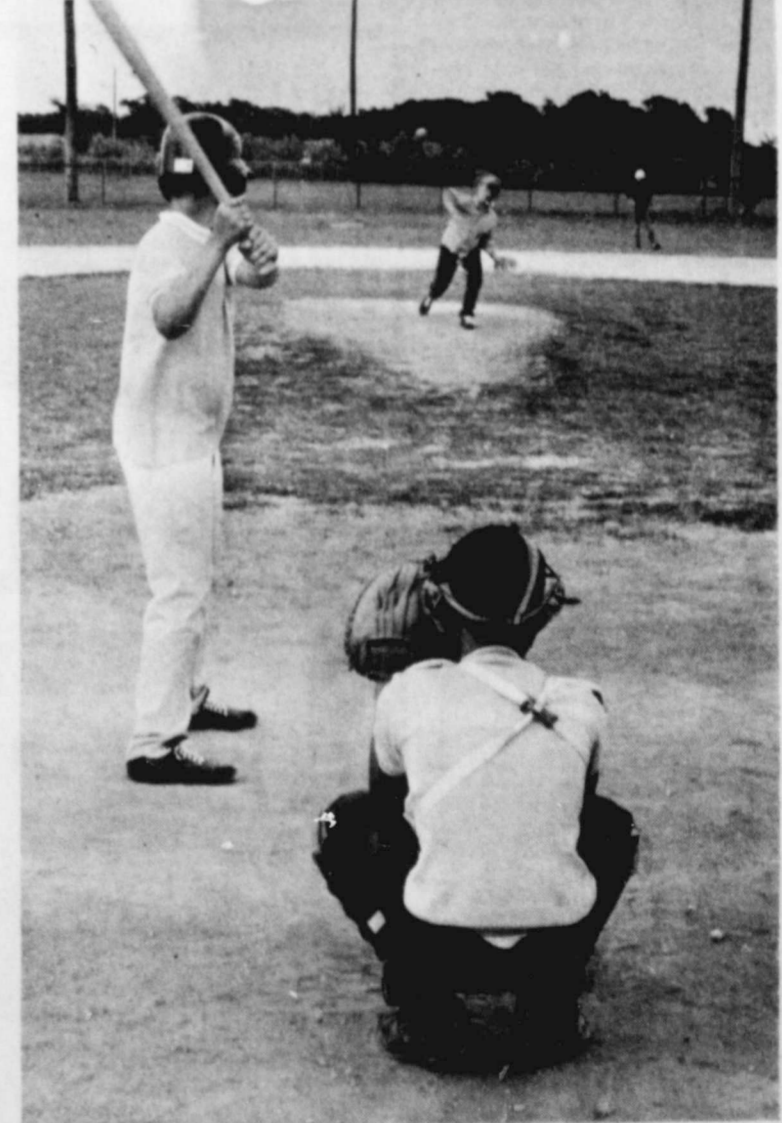

# Demo Runoff Set Saturday

A runoff for the Democratic nomination for Governor of Texas, something new for the state after the John Connally era, highlights the second Democratic Primary throughout the state Saturday.

Although there is one other race on the ballot, the heated duel between Preston Smith, the

first primary leader by a scant margin, and Don Yarborough, is bound to steal the limelight.

The other race on the Floyd County ballot will be for a district post, that of Associate Justice, Court of Civil Appeals.

Seeking the post are Jack Hazlewood, Amarillo, the first round leader, and James A. Joy, Plainview, who were also deadlocked for a runoff due to the May 4 primary.

Smith, a resident of Lubbock, is presently Lieutenant Governor of the state and is tagged as a conservative or moderate, whichever term is preferred, while Yarborough, from Houston, is called a liberal.

Polls open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. with the same polling places as for the first primary. Absentee voting ended Tuesday with a total of 90 ballots cast.

# School Buys "Greyhound"

The Floydada Independent School District last week became the owners of a special kind of vehicle . . . a 37-passenger "activity bus."

In actuality a passenger bus of the type referred to by

most people as a "Greyhound," (due to the popularity of that particular bus company) the new vehicle will be used for athletic and other trips where comfort and speed are the primary objectives.

The bus, purchased for a total cost of \$5,737.50 from Henry L. Lair, Lubbock, is a 1947 diesel coach which was previously owned by Arnold E. Wade Transit Corporation, Schenectady, New York.

Originally costing about \$55,000, school officials consider the bus a real "bargain," due to the fact that it is in excellent condition both mechanically and visually.

In fact, while looking at other buses before making the final selection, transit officials explained that the buses were usually used for six years, then sold for about \$35,000 to a smaller company.

All vehicles examined by the board and school officials during the two months the project has been under discussion were in worse repair, excepting those which cost more than twice what was actually spent. In fact, according to school offi-

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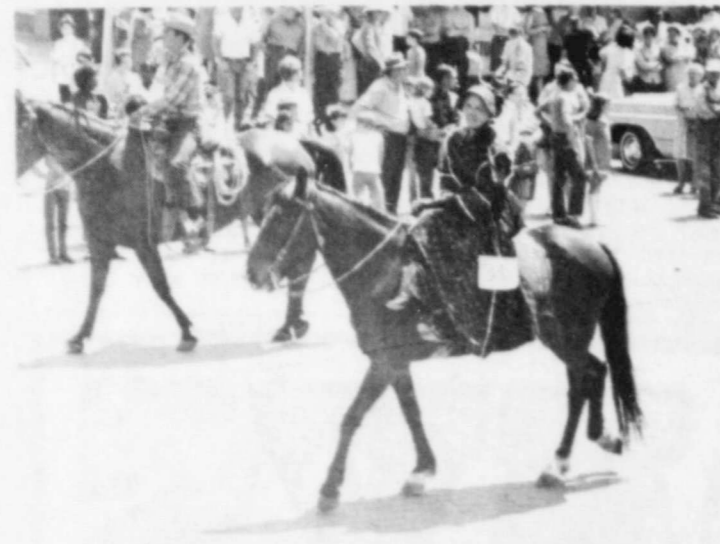

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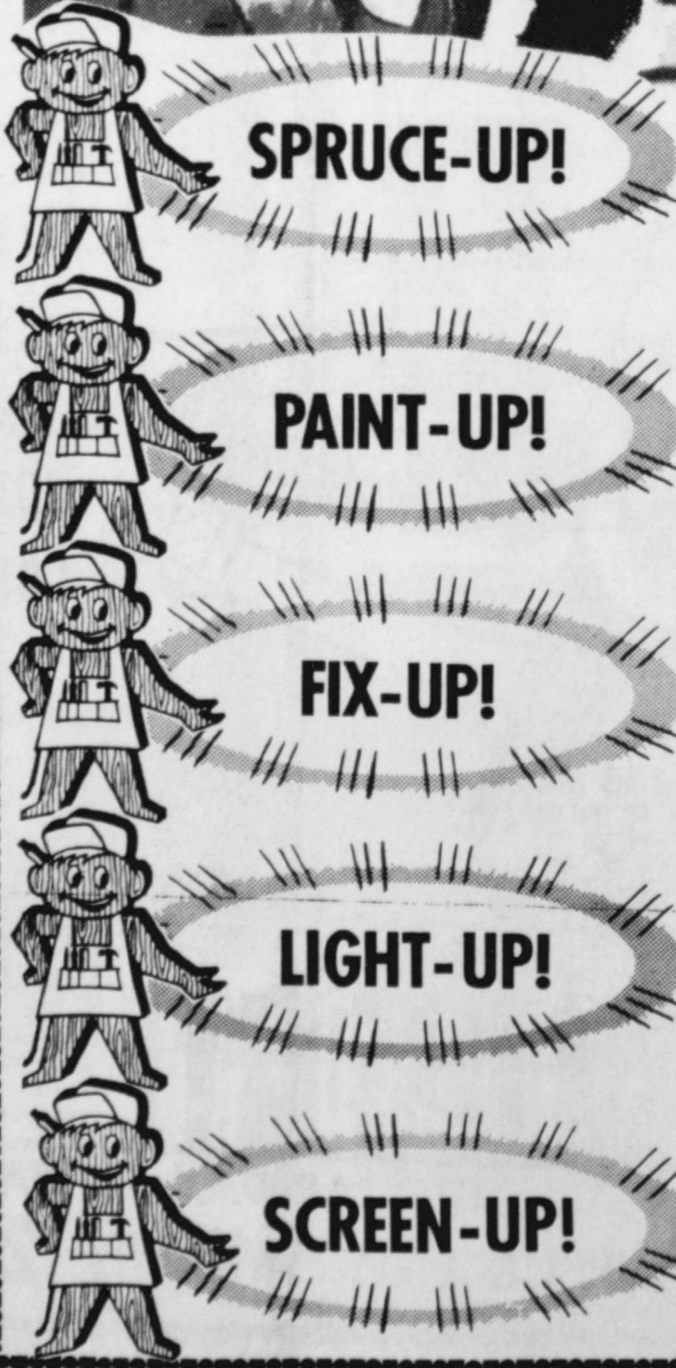
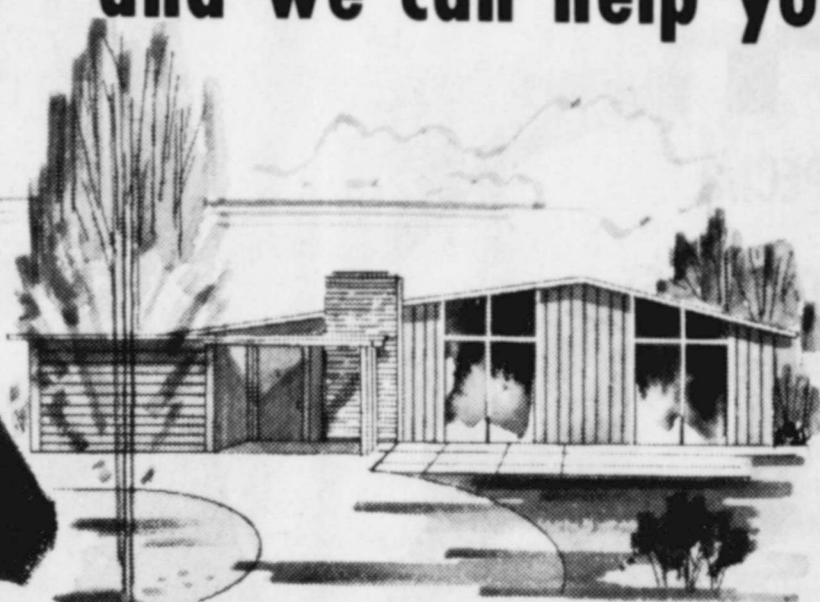
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**William Tells**

Two weeks ago, superintendents of Texas decided some Interscholastic League rules, making one change which I consider the next thing to treason.

According to my information, beginning next year, athletes will be allowed only one award jacket in four years... this means, if a student plays football, basketball and runs track, the first time he letters in any one sport, he'll get his jacket and that's all she wrote as far as his high school years are concerned.

The vote on the ruling was 511 superintendents for and 396 against... and, I'm proud to say that our own Floydada School Superintendent, A. E. Baker, was among those against the stupid ruling.

To further clarify the ruling, it even goes farther than athletics, amounting to the fact that any time a student qualifies for an honor which normally is recognized with a jacket, sweater, blanket, etc., he or she is through.

The student will be allowed to receive only one \$20 award... from then on, only a token award (such as a letter or medal) not to exceed \$3 in value may be given.

To my way of thinking, the "football jacket" tradition is one thing which should stay the same as it has been for years... it's the only reason some of the less talented students participate in sports at all.

And, after going through two weeks of pre-season workouts, plus ten weeks of intensive training and games, I happen to believe a student deserves and should be awarded a jacket, providing he has worked hard enough to letter. This holds true with running track, boys and girls basketball, and anything else where hard work and dedication are required.

As far as I can see, expense is the only reason for the 511 superintendents to favor the ruling... I say, if they feel this way, let them do it in their own individual school district and not in ours! Heaven help those who voted for it, once their respective school patrons hear about it!

And, I don't think the action of 511 idiots who want to break one of the finest traditions and memories of high school days should be allowed to stay on the rule books.

But, to take it off, there's going to have to be a lot of screaming and hollering done... and, some people are going to have to get mad, really mad!

In fact, mad enough to let their feelings be known by letters to the editor and letters to the state Interscholastic League Director.

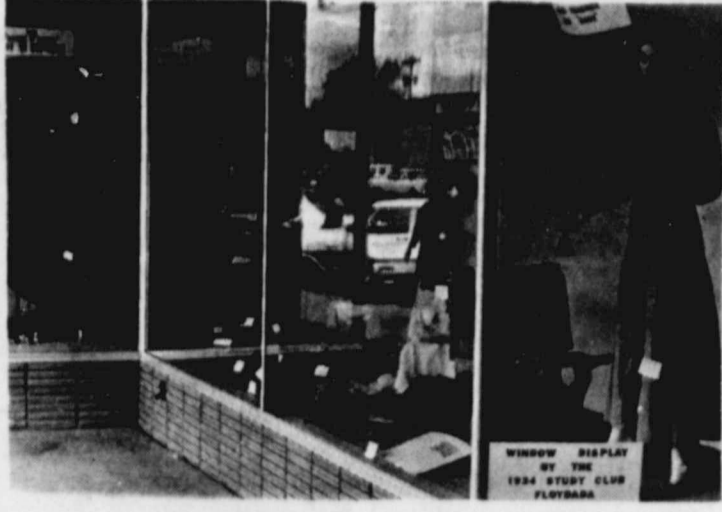
My readers will remember my column, but once again one that strikes me as I like to see others. The one week was sent to me of my column. The truth is it is really the second which I think is typical in Floydada.

### NEWS FOR HOMEMAKERS

The difference in mayonnaise and salad dressing is told by the label. Both products contain vegetable oil, an acidifying ingredient, as vinegar or lemon juice and seasonings. The oil may be from soybean, cotton seed, peanut or corn, and in mayonnaise it must total at least 65 percent of the weight. In salad dressing to a minimum of 30 percent by weight. Food standards such as these insure honest and fair dealing for both consumers and manufacturers.

History about mayonnaise and salad dressing is interesting. Mayonnaise was made for Louis XIV of France who was a gourmet devoted to sauces. When American Doughboys returned home after World War I they brought back a lively interest in French cooking and many brought French brides who could prepare mayonnaise and other delicacies at home. Because the preparation was long and tedious, manufacturers found it worthwhile to

develop mass production methods. In the 1930's another product appeared on grocery shelves, similar but less expensive to make than mayonnaise. It officially was designated as Salad Dressing. Add other ingredients to mayonnaise or salad dressing for a special treat. Try hot or sweet pickle relish, chowchow, finely chopped onion, your favorite herbs or spices. For the weight watchers you may be interested to know that one tablespoon of salad dressing has 41 calories while one tablespoon of mayonnaise has 110 calories. The difference is due to the amount of oil used in making the product.

 very few soldiers, and a sight to behold is the mass of humanity pouring out of a subway station - almost like a machine.  
 The Japanese is a neat dresser. The student wears a uniform. Most clerks, executives, etc. wear real sharp suits and ties. Most everyone is dressed similar to our people.  
 Some women still wear the long kimonos. Mary Tom observed that all day yesterday we saw no female in slacks or shorts. (Boy, that's a change).  
 There are several daily newspapers here, almost everyone has radio and TV, but telephones are very, very expensive.  
 If Migaku had a phone, or if we could have located him at school, I believe we could have found him.  
 Well, my trip is entirely a success now. . . I leaned in too close to a newspaper press here and got ink on my coat and nose. "My cup runneth over."  
 Day after tomorrow we should be in Indonesia.

We've been gone from Floydada a week (more or less) and now we're half way around the world on a jet from Bangkok, Thailand to Jakarta, Indonesia.  
 Yesterday we flew across Da Nang, Vietnam on our way here. The captain of the jet was a Christian from Indonesia and he allowed us to come forward for a better look at Vietnam. . . we also watched the pilot and co-pilot operate the jet.  
 We could see a fleet in the harbor at Da Nang and air landing strips. I thought what a contrast. . . we were flying in comfort and without fear, while just below our boys are fighting and dying. Believe 586 lost their lives there last week.  
 The taxi drivers in Tokyo drive like wild Indians, but these in Thailand make them

look like "Pikers". My fear for jets has changed to taxis.

We spent most of today in a boat up a Bangkok canal. . . "The Floating Market", and visited a "Buddha Temple of Dawn", built in 1767.

We see a lot of "R&R" American boys here from Vietnam. Saw one from Minnesota today who had served in the U.S. Navy. Got separation from the Navy at Saigon and will soon marry a Chinese girl and live in Hong Kong. He will teach English. I quizzed him about Vietnam. . . he didn't know the answer of course, but he had hauled a lot of dead servicemen home in the past year and was concerned for the loss of life there.

The average life of a person in Thailand is 55. . . our guide this morning said he would like to live to be 60. Thailand is progressing rapidly. Many U.S. companies moving here. Talked to a fellow this morning, who is trying to buy a location for Goodyear here.

It seems that young people in the Orient have a great deal of respect for their parents and their morals seem to be higher than in the U.S.A.

Thailand girls marry around 21 to 22 years of age, and boys may choose their wives-to-be. In Japan the parents still choose the mate. Thailand girls are beautiful. In fact the Oriental girl is very charming (I understand).

Our service men date some Thailand girls through hostels. They pay money for these dates. The American Negro soldier, because he is blacker than the Oriental usually must pay more for a date than the Anglo serviceman.  
 I suppose I've taken over 100 pictures to date. . . saw some water buffalo today. We see all sorts of Americans everywhere we go. . . met a woman from Wichita Falls this morning.

Yesterday in Tokyo, met a man and his wife from Corpus who knew Jo Muncy. He was with the Humble Company.

Also, the air-conditioning system of the bus is to be overhauled at a cost expected to be less than \$200, that part of the vehicle being the only system not in operation at the present.

The bus has all the normal features of a "Greyhound" including reclining seats, air brakes, luggage compartment and a drive system capable of producing highway speeds in safety.

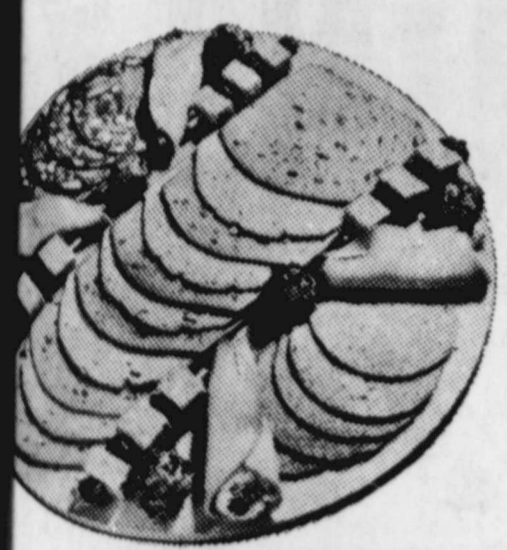

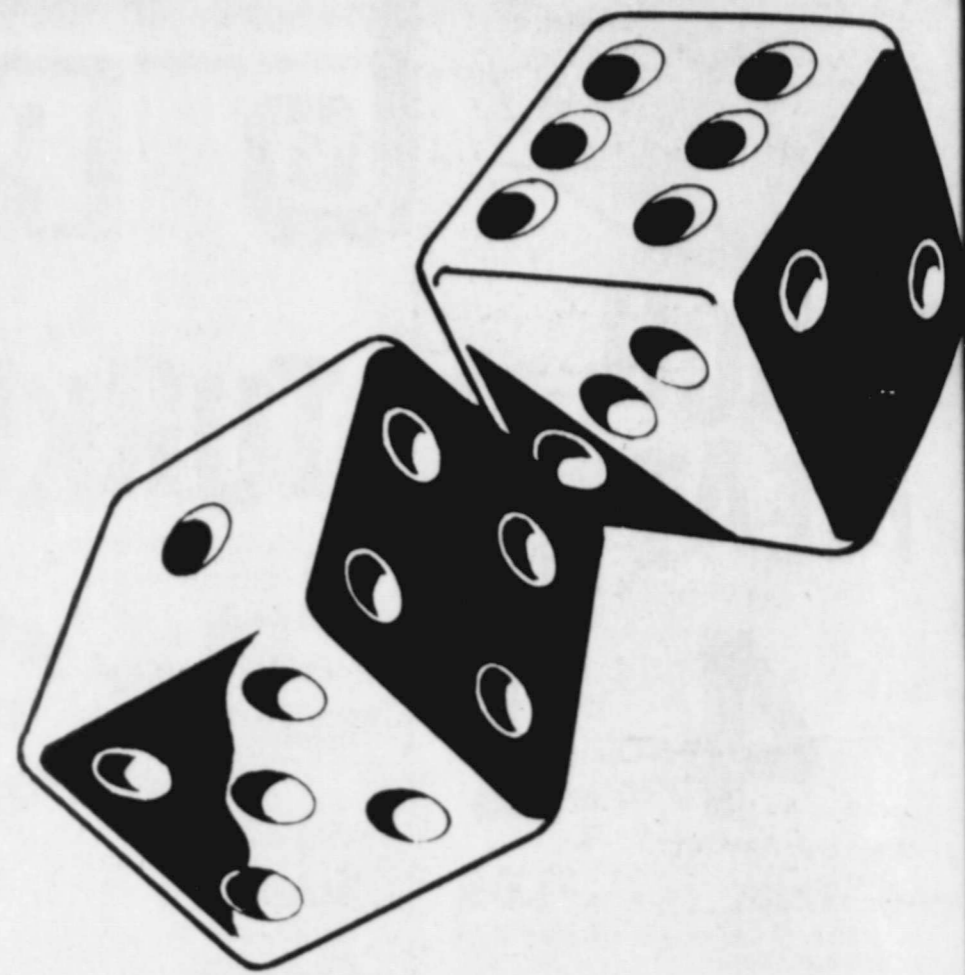
