High Winds, Hail, Rain On The Rampage

Tornado Cuts Swath North Of Lockney

Leaving devastation in their wake, deadly tornadoes roamed a trail north of Lockney and into the town Friday night. One house, as well as several barns, were destroyed and two other residences suffered heavy damage in the storms which left electrical and telephone service disrupted over a wide area.

The storm was the worst to strike the Lockney area in years. Turbulence, to a lesser degree, also erupted Wednesday and Thursday nights.

Fortunately, not a single serious injury was reported. Apparently the worst twister originated near the John L. Riley farm, four miles north and two miles west of town. It flattened the foundation of the Charles Carthel home, about 1 1/2 miles to the southeast of Riley.

Perhaps the same tornado - or was it a different funnel? - pulled the roof from a house 2 1/2 miles northeast of Lockney occupied by the Sylvester Guerra family, then badly damaged the Austin Beedy home one mile down the road east. The Beedys had occupied their new home less than two months.

After the storm had cleared, farmers discovered that hundreds of acres of crops had been wiped out. Much of the ground, which had borne young crops, was completely barren. Acre after acre of infant cotton stalks were leveled at the ground.

Hail struck in varying degrees in Lockney and to the north, with rains in excess of two inches being dropped. Some fields washed badly from the hard, driving cloudbursts, which were accompanied by high winds.

Friday Moisture Amounts Varied Throughout Floyd

Although the major portion of the damage caused by Friday's storm was centered in the northwest parts of the county around Lockney, "high winds," some rain and hail were reported in virtually every part of the county.

At Floydada, only 1.33 inches of moisture was recorded in the period from Wednesday night through Saturday morning and the high wind and scattered hail did little, if any serious damage.

Main centers of the storm, other than in the Lockney area, seemed to be around South Plains and Cedar Hill. At the former, 3.0 inches of rain was reported along with golf-ball sized hail and stiff winds.

A lifeguard is on duty at all times and the pool is available by reservation for private parties any evening except Sundays, Ginn announced.

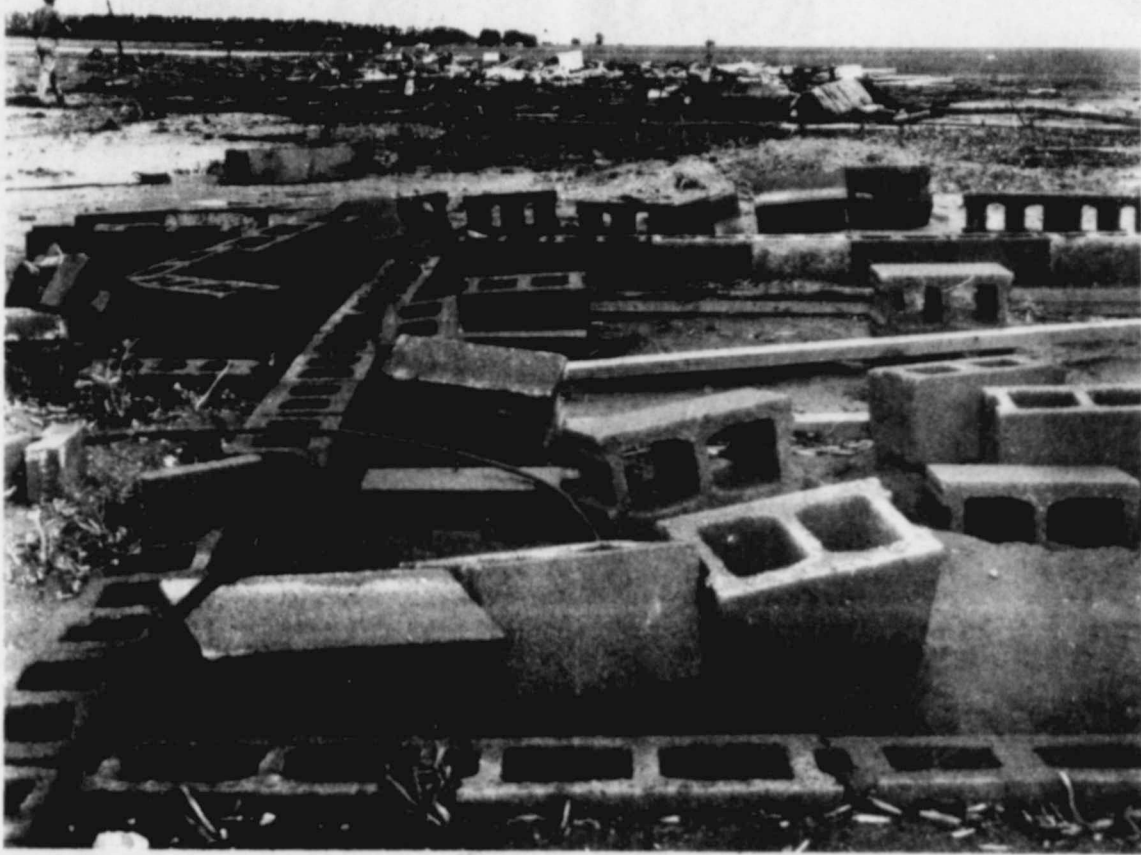
Shotgun Pellets Injure Hand Of Lewallen Youth

Carl Lewallen, 13 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. James Lewallen of Gorman, former Floydada resident, was expected to be dismissed from Lubbock Methodist Hospital this week where he has been under treatment for a gunshot wound. The youth will recuperate in the home of his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Lewallen in Floydada. The family was here visiting when the mishap occurred.

Carl was visiting with the Jerrold Vinson family and he and Mark Vinson had gone rabbit hunting when the accident happened about 10:30 Friday morning at a lake near the Vinson home.

The two boys were getting in a pickup when the 410 shotgun held by Mark Vinson, accidentally discharged, striking the Lewallen youth in the right hand, according to Mrs. Vinson. Mark wrapped his companion's hand and drove him to the Vinson home. He was then rushed by car to Caprock Hospital for emergency treatment then taken to Lubbock.

Head Start Program Will Begin Here Next Monday

"Headstart" in Floydada begins Monday, June 10 at Andrews Elementary School. Officials say 31 students are eligible thus far to attend and they can handle 16 more. The total for the local program is 47 set up by the office of Economic Opportunity.

The eight weeks school will be supervised by Bob Copeland, principal; Mrs. Wade Warren, secretary; Mrs. L. B. Cozby, nurse and teachers, Mrs. Ed-

na Phillips, Mrs. Lavada Garrett and Mrs. Rose Aguilar. Anyone having moved to Floyd County in recent weeks may bring their children to the school for registration prior to starting date. School will open each morning at 8 o'clock and close after the noon lunch is served each weekday. Classes continue through August 2nd.

Birth certificates must be presented before a child is admitted to "Headstart." Transportation will be furnished by bus to all children in town and car pools will be used to transport children who live outside the city limits.

Accident insurance will be carried on all students attending. Medical and dental examinations and follow-up treatments will also be furnished as well as school supplies, morning snacks, lunch and playground necessities.

"Headstart" is primarily designed to help those children who are disadvantaged because they are lacking in the most elementary experiences. The needs of these children are too numerous to list. Since they need individual attention and understanding, many of our study clubs, churches, high school groups, and other organizations may have to volunteer who would be willing to volunteer. Floyd County voters followed the same trend as those throughout the state in last Saturday's second Democratic Primary, the only difference being that they gave gubernatorial winner Preston Smith more than a 4-to-1 lead over challenger Don Yarborough.

In the race for a district post, that of Associate Justice, Court of Civil Appeals, county voters also followed the final tabulation trend, giving

James Joy of Plainview a narrow 61 vote edge over Amarillo's Jack Hazelwood.

Total vote for the county's Democrats was 1,550 with Smith receiving 1,250 of those votes, compared to Yarborough's 300.

In the associate justice race, the only other question on the ballot, Joy polled 781 votes to Hazelwood's 720.

Statewide, Smith won by about 135,000 votes, 758,654 to

Yarborough's 621,087, as more than a million Texas Democratic voters went to the polls, despite early forecasts of an extremely light vote.

For the county, almost 600 less voters made the trek to the polls, compared to the 2,139 who voted in the first Democratic Primary.

Smith will now face Republican Paul Eggers in the November General Election.

W. A. (Shorty) Hall, a local resident, recently purchased an old house located at 224 East Georgia and is remodeling to structure prior to moving the house to a lot he owns elsewhere in the city.

On Sunday, Hall was tearing up some old floor covering in the house, layer by layer, before putting down new linoleum.

Upon reaching the third layer of the old covering, Hall noticed that there was a padding under the final layer and upon lifting the old linoleum, found a large number of papers, mostly Floyd County Hesperians, neatly laid out on the floor as a padding for the covering.

Dates of the ancient papers range from 1925 to 1928 and despite having been walked upon for 40 years or more...the papers are in excellent condition!

In fact, except for some rips and tears, the papers are all completely legible and in just about as good condition as the file copies stored at the Hesperian.

The rain, with high winds and swirling black clouds, did damage here to fields of wheat incredibly in places. Many fields of young cotton were destroyed. Most people were in storm cellars. All the highways were covered in the 2 1/2 inches of rain which fell in solid sheets. A barn blew away at the Alvin Nichols place in Cedar Hill, and other minor troubles were reported. Don Probasco, Alen Wood, Phillip Smitherman, and Early Pritchett were among those who lost crops.

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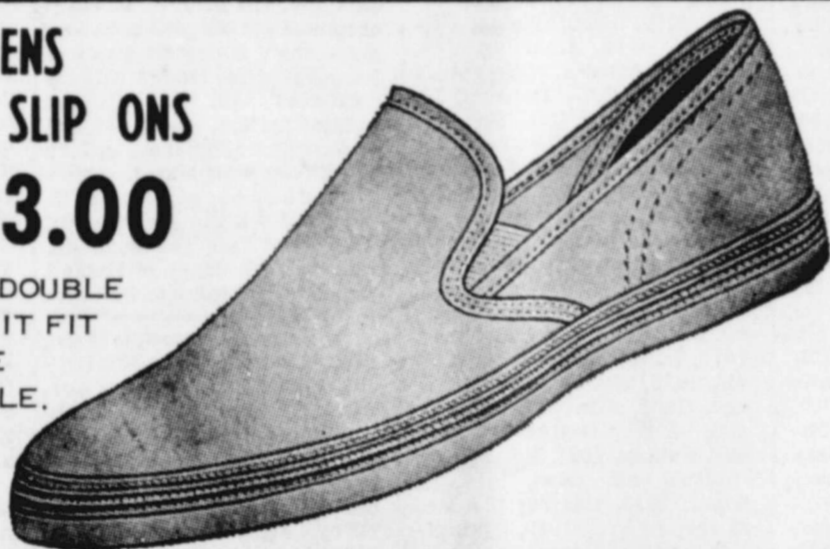

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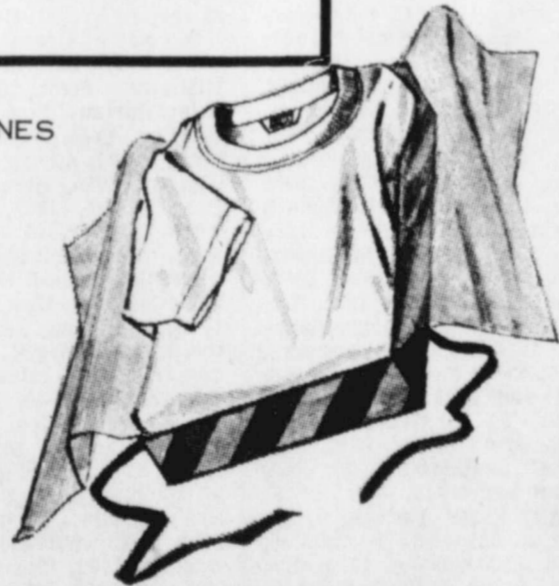

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suggesting a tremendous suction at ground level.

When the group emerged from the cellar, they found six granaries, garages and other outbuildings "gone with the wind." Shingles were peeled from the Carthel house, but neither residence was badly damaged. Large trees between the two homes were uprooted.

Gonzales said his car was unscratched after the shed around it was completely demolished. The same thing happened at the Riley place, although vehicles there were slightly dented.

Ears Pop

The people here reported their ears "popping" as the storm passed. Windows were broken from the south section of the Carthel house, away from the force of the window, again indicated a heavy suction.

Carthel's employee also told of seeing chickens "in the tops of trees and everywhere" after the big blow. They were normal the next morning.

Kenneth Wolford had 12 cotton trailers completely destroyed by the Friday twister. His farm lies north of the former Charles Carthel home. A garage was blown away from the Joe Cumble farm, east of town. Bill Reagan, who resides one mile north of Lockney, had a toolhouse badly damaged.

Outbuildings Razed

Outbuildings were damaged or demolished on the John T. Carthel, Paul Cooper and Mrs. Josie Taylor farms. Cooper had a storage barn downed and the top and one side torn from another barn. Two windows were broken out of this home and a TV antenna was "bent over the house as if it had been hammered." Two 1x2 boards shattered a truck windshield.

Mrs. Taylor lost a tool shed, horse shed, chicken barn, TV antenna, top out of a well house and had tops twisted from numerous trees. She and a brother, Lester Martin of Vernon, went to a basement. They reported that "it was perfectly still for a few seconds before the blunt of the storm arrived.

Chickens roosting "about a foot" below the chicken barn roof were not disturbed.

George Sparkman and his family were at First National Bank when they spotted the twister near the Taylor farm.

Clyde Stapp stated that electrical lines, a TV antenna, clothesline and numerous trees were downed at his home in North Lockney. One large tree was thrown against the house. He suspected that a small twister caused the damage.

Sights Funnels

Truett Bilbrey sighted a small twister near Lockney General Hospital, which withdrew into the clouds before it damaged property. Another report told of two small funnels near the Parhandle Compress.

Shingles were blown from the T. J. Word home in North Lockney and other damage was reported in that section of town. Much of it was relatively minor.

Bill Strickland told of having a hog pen blown into his front yard. The animals escaped harm and sought cover under a nearby barn. Strickland lives one mile east of town.

After the storm had ravaged the Lockney area and moved away to the southeast, water was running over some city streets, nearby highways and dirt roads in rural areas.

Eight Inch Hail

Hail was reported by Cooper, Mrs. Taylor, at Paymaster Farm and in the Providence community, among other places. Harold McLaughlin at Providence placed a hail stone "eight inches in diameter" in his deepfreeze after the storm.

Damage was reported at the Albert Scheele and Wilfred Stoerner farms in that community. However, crop damage was "spotty" there.

The turbulence apparently was confined to Lockney and northward. No significant damage was reported south of town.

Dozens of telephone and electricity poles were downed. Crews - some of whom worked around the clock Friday night and Saturday - had returned service to most of the area by Saturday afternoon. Some power lines, however, were badly bent.

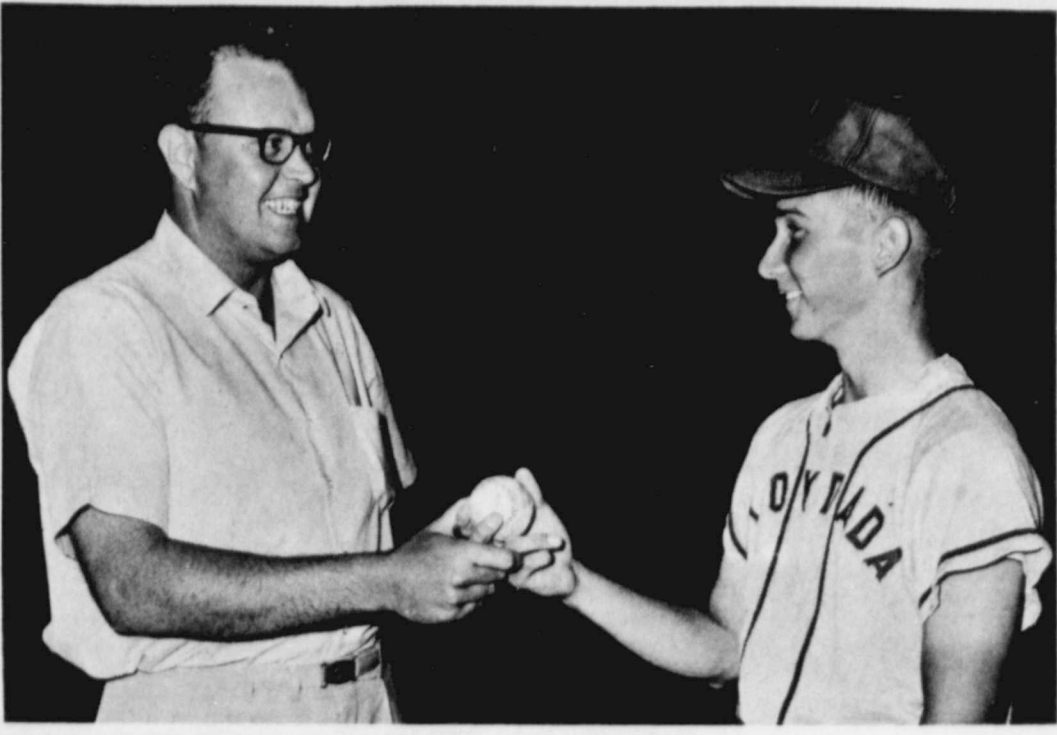

Freeman Trained In New Speeding Device, Vascar

Patrolman Jim Freeman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Grady Freeman of Floydada, has been trained extensively the past month in a revolutionary new speed control device, which is being tested at present by highway patrol in the Panhandle area.

It is called Visual Average Speed Computer and Recorder (Vascar), a product of the Federal Sign and Signal Corp., based in Blue Island, Ill.

The device thus far has been tested at Amarillo and in the Austin area and is being used on a trial basis by the Department of Public Safety.

Capt. J.W. Blackwell, head of the 31 county District 5-B of the highway patrol based in Amarillo, said "we are ready to use it, but we haven't set a date as yet to when we will start using enforcement purposes; that is, when to start issuing traffic citations. Vascar works differently than radar. The unit in the patrolman's car has two switches, one is a time switch, the other a distance switch. A patrolman can time a driver as to how long it took him to travel through an underpass or between any two designated points. The electronic unit computes the speed of motorist through a linkage between the time and distance measurements inside the Vascar. Patrolmen are able, by varying the sequence in manipulation of the switches, to determine the average speed of a motorist no matter which direction the patrol car and the target vehicle are traveling.

Freeman will work primarily in Potter and Randall Counties, but he will also be sent to other counties in the district.

It has been mentioned that use of the machine might have drawbacks in West Texas because of wide open spaces with few objects to use for markers, but patrolmen are optimistic about its use in the Amarillo district.

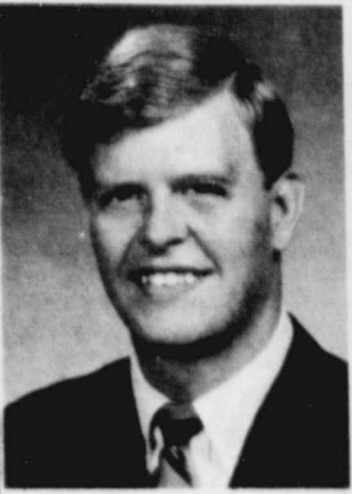

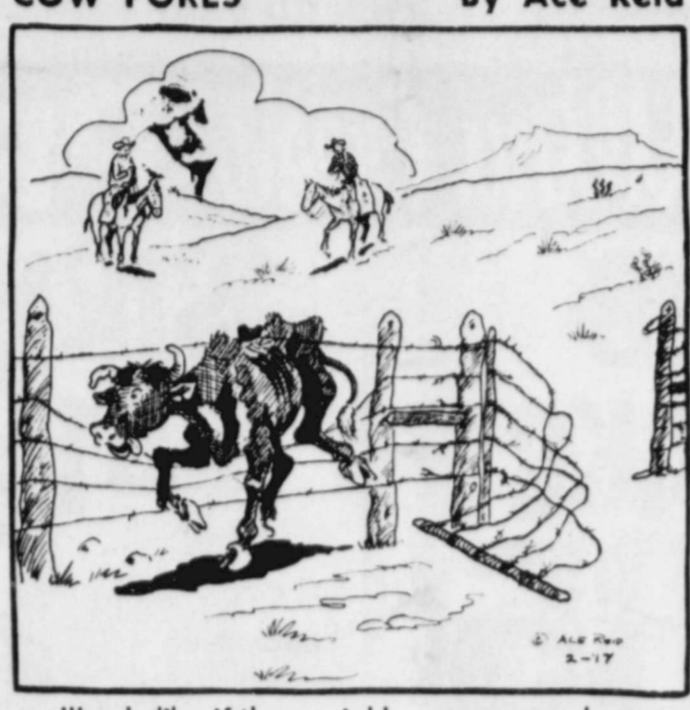

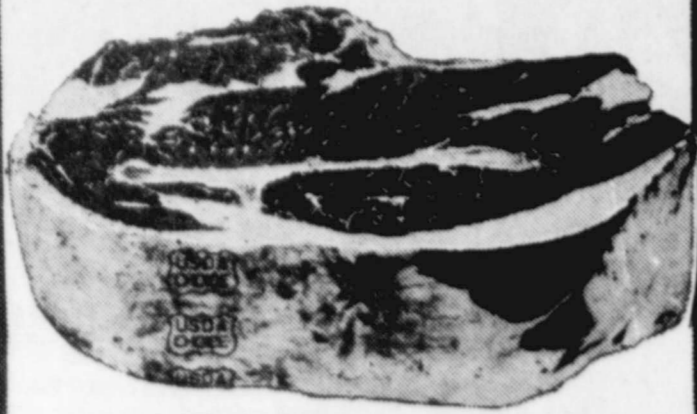
