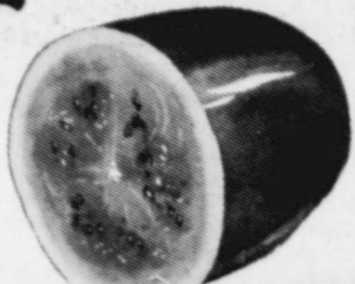

was not complete damage, the crop will stand. Two inches of rain fell there. At the E. P. Pritchett farm there were 2 inches of rain on Wednesday night, with considerable hail damage, as well as blow damage and shredded up fodder. The evaluation there was, "We were lucky. It could have been worse."

Moving over to Dougherty, the Farm Supply there reported about 1/4 inch of rain in the city limits, but considerably more to the south at the Robert Ward place. Swinging around to the southwest, McCoy Farm Supply told of "Quite a bit of hail damage", and 2.5 inches of rain. Willsons Attend Methodist Meet

Jim and Jimmy Willson left Tuesday for Oklahoma City, where both are delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference of the United Methodist Church. This is the first such conference to convene since the Union of The Methodist Church with the United Evangelical Brethren Church. Covering the states of Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Louisiana, New Mexico, Kansas, Missouri, and Nebraska, this conference is composed of an equal number of laymen and ministers. Although overall church policy is set by the General Conference which meets quadrennially, and many matters are decided upon in the annual conferences, the implementation of many legislative and executive matters is made in this session, which meets every four years. Perhaps of top interest is the election of a bishop. Two bishops are retiring this year, Paul Martin of Houston and W. Angie Smith of Oklahoma City. There will be an additional bishop assigned from the former E.U.B. church, as well as one from the former Central Jurisdiction, now abolished, which ministered only to negroes, whose work is now being integrated with that of the Anglo and Latin American work, so far as administration is concerned.

The Jurisdictional Conference is to conclude Sunday with the consecration ceremony for the one new bishop.

Hunting Season For Approaching Months Planned

Hunting seasons for the Texas Panhandle, including Floyd and surrounding counties, have been announced by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Legal hunting can be done as follows:

- * Deer season will be Nov. 30 through Dec. 15 with a bag limit of one deer - either buck or antlerless. However, antlerless deer may be taken by permit only.
- * Antelope season will begin Sept. 28 and run through Oct. 1 with a bag limit of one per season and may be taken by permit only.
- * Aoudad sheep may be taken from Jan. 4 through Jan. 8 with a bag limit of one per season and may be taken by permit only.
- * There is no open season on javelina.
- * Squirrels may be taken be-

- tween May 1 and July 1 and Oct. 1 through Dec. 1 with a bag limit of five per day and five in possession.
- * Turkey may be taken between Nov. 30 and Dec. 15 with a bag limit of one turkey per season, either sex.
- * Quail season will be between Nov. 9 and Jan. 31 except in Briscoe, Childress, Cottle, Hall and Motley Counties where the season will be Dec. 1 through Jan. 31. Bag limit of quail is 12 per day and 36 in possession. Quail seasons and bag limits for Hardeman, Hemphill and Lamb Counties are determined by statute.

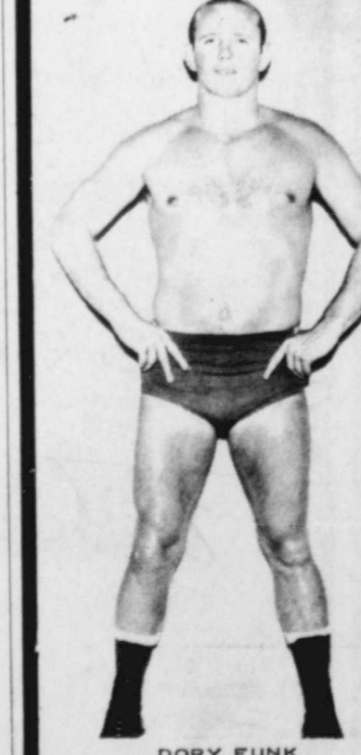

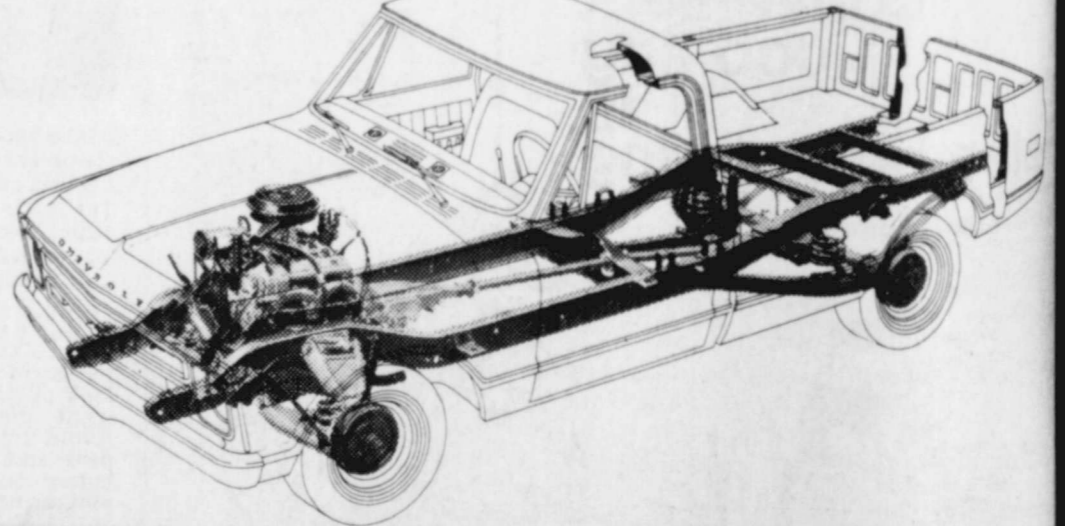

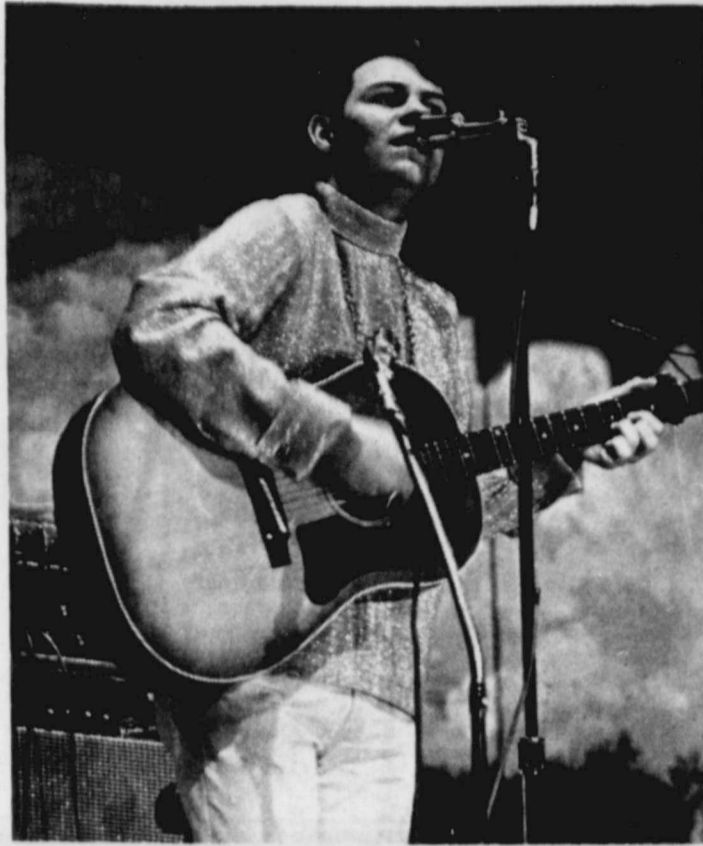

NEWS FOR HOMEMAKERS

"A salad is only as good as its dressing" is a statement familiar to most of us.

So now when ingredients for fresh salads are so abundant, you'll want to concentrate even more on producing a tasty salad dressing. Oftentimes you can start with a basic ingredient, then add others to produce real

variety, says the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

MAYONNAISE
1 teaspoon sugar
1 teaspoon dry mustard
3/4 teaspoon salt
1 egg
2 cups salad oil
3 tablespoons vinegar or lemon juice

Combine sugar, mustard and salt. Mix well. Add egg, beat with rotary or electric beater. Continue beating and gradually add 1/2 cup oil, at first by drops. Add vinegar or lemon juice and remaining oil alternately, beating well after each addition, until mayonnaise is stiff enough to hold its shape. Makes 2 1/4 cups.

Using the mayonnaise as a basis, try these varieties for vegetable salads.

BLUE CHEESE DRESSING
Combine 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 1/2 cup crumbled blue cheese and 3 tablespoons chili sauce to tomato catsup. Makes 1 cup.

THOUSAND ISLAND DRESSING
Combine 2 cups mayonnaise, 1/4 cup chili sauce, 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper, 2 tablespoons chopped stuffed liver. Makes 2 1/4 cups.

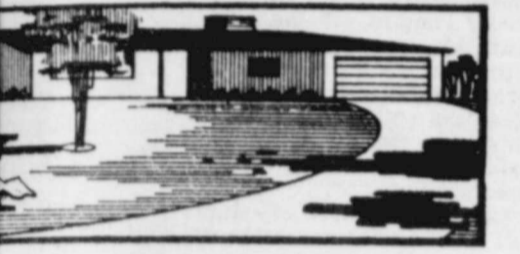

Development Of 0.9 Miles Of FM Planned Locally

The Texas Highway Commission today announced plans for development of 0.9 miles of Farm to Market Roads in Floyd County as part of the 1968 Texas Farm to Market Road Program.

District Engineer O. L. Crain of Lubbock said the estimated cost of the work is \$110,000. The Texas Highway Department engineer in charge of the work will be Sam A. Fowler, of Floydada.

The work is part of 826 miles of Farm to Market road development included in the program.

The 1968 Farm to Market Road Program includes the addition of 545 new miles, bringing the designated mileage of the Texas FM-RM system to almost 39,500 miles.

The Texas Farm to Market Road system is one of the most highly developed networks of rural highway facilities in the nation, exceeding the total mileage of the entire highway systems of most other States.

The program includes advance stage construction on some roads already begun in

addition to new mileage. Total cost of the work is \$23.8 million.

Included in the program are construction projects in 142 Texas counties. It covers advance stage construction on some roads already begun as well as new routes.

Of the new mileage 377 miles or 69 percent are school bus routes and 344 miles or 62 percent are rural mail routes.

Each day during the school year, almost half a million Texas youngsters are transported to school and back home by an estimated 8,000 school buses. Trips to school and back daily amount to more than half a million miles of travel, much of it over FM roads.

Rural mail carriers drive an estimated 50 thousand miles a day over the FM-RM system.

Impetus for the modern Farm to Market system was afforded by legislation passed in 1949 to "get the farmer out of the mud" - to enable farmers and ranchers to get their produce and livestock to market and to provide adequate, safe highways for school buses and mail

routes. In recent years, many FM and RM routes have taken on additional roles, providing access to recreational areas, daily trips between urban homes and rural farms or suburban homes and urban employment.

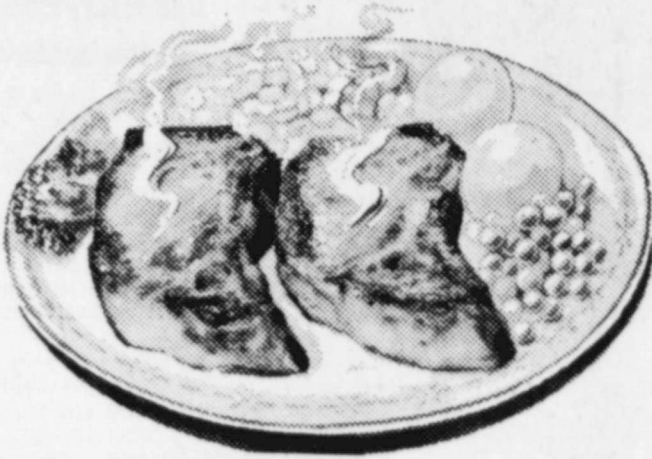


