Two Hour Window Service Begins Saturday At Local Post Office

Post General W. Marvin Watson has ordered some hiring and postal services curtailment, to comply with the cutback required by Congress under the recently enacted tax bill, Public Law 90-364. It effect all First and Second Class Post Offices and classified units but will not effect Third or Fourth Class Offices or Rural Contract Sta-

In Floydada it will discontinue window services on Saturday, except that a call window will be open from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon, for General Delivery or call window service. THERE WILL BE NO CASH TRANSACTIONS. Stamps must be purchased from the Stamp Vending Machine, Post Office Box mail will normally be ready by 10:00 a.m., patrons may call for packages after this time until 12:00 noon,

There will be no service change for City Delivery or Rural Delivery patrons. Resident and business packages will be delivered as usual.

About September 1, Postmasters are directed to submit to the Department their plans for elimination of all Saturday delivery on residential routes. The effective date for elimination of Saturday residential delivery will be established later by the depart-

The Bishop home is located at 711 West Virginia.

It has been surmised the vandalism took place some time during the day Wednesday of last week. Bishop said his yard man told him he arrived at the house around 2 o'clock that afternoon and upon entering the back yard he noticed green peaches had been pulled from the trees, scattered over the ground and some bitten into. Investigating further the yard man also noted a ladder leaning against the back of the house

Hail Damages Floyd Crops

A variety of moisture reports came in from the Floydada area in regard to the weather pattern for last week. In general it may be said that the rainfall varied from 1/4 inch to ten times that amount. Considerable hail damage resulted, but the farmers seem to feel that there is no choice but to leave the cotton in the fields. A complete wipeout was approached in a number of cases, and very possibly realized in some instances that have not come to the attention of the Hesperian.

Apparently much of the largest rainfall, and almost certainly the damage, took part in the South Plains community, The John Kinnibrugh farm received .6 inch on Monday night July 15, and then considerably more two days later, described as "Quite a bit, but not hailed out." The S. D. kinnibrughs were not so hard hit at their home farm, but a half mile away their farm received considerable hail damage. 

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

was not complete damage, the crop will stand. Two inches of rain fell there. At the E. P. Pritchett farm there were 2 inches of rain on Wednesday night, with considerable hail damage, as well as blow damage and shredded up fodder. The evaluation there was, "We were lucky. It could have been worse,"

Moving over to Dougherty, the Farm Supply there reported about 1/4 inch of rain in the city limits, but considerably more to the south at the Robert Ward place. Swinging around to the southwest, McCoy Farm Supply told of "Quite a bit of hail damage", and 2.5 inches of rain. Still further to the west, Sandhill Elevator listed 1.7 inches of rain, but considerably more "All the way around."

Here in town the Producers Coop Elevator recorded 1.28 inches of rain on Wednesday night, with .02 on Saturday, Highs and lows of temperature during the week were: Wednesday, 90-67; Thursday, 94-69; Friday, 86-65; Saturday, 77-62; Sunday, 86-68; Monday, 89-68; and Tuesday, July 23, 92-69.



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

NEWS FOR HOMEMAKERS

"A salad is only as good as its dressing" is a statement familiar to most of us.

So now when ingredients for fresh salads are so abundant, you'll want to concentrate even more on producing a tasty salad dressing. Oftentimes you can start with a basic ingredient, then add others to produce real

variety, says the U. S. Depart-ment of Agriculture.

MAYONNAISE 1 teaspoon sugar 1 teaspoon dry mustard

3/4 teaspoon salt 1 egg 2 cups salad oil

3 tablespoons vinegar or lemon

Combine sugar, mustard and salt. Mix well. Add egg, beat with rotary or electric beater, Continue beating and gradually add 1/2 cup oil, at first by drops. Add vinegar or lemon juice and remaining oil alternately, beating well after each addition, until mayonnaise is stiff enough to hold its shape. Makes 2 1/4 cups.

Using the mayonnaise as a basis, try these varieties for vegetable salads. BLUE CHEESE DRESSING

Combine 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 1/2 cup crumbled blue cheese and 3 tablespoons chili sauce to tomato catsup. Makes

THOUSAND ISLAND DRESSING Combine 2 cups mayonnaise, 1/4 cup chili sauce, 2 tablespoons chopped green pepper, 2 tablespoons chopped stuffed liver. Makes 2 1/4 cups.






