57,000 Bales Estimated For Floyd County 1968 Cotton Crop

The August 1 county-by-county High Plains crop estimate adds up to 1,534,000 bales for the 23 counties represented by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. despite heavy losses to rain, wind and hail earlier in the year. Good "cotton weather" recently has done much to raise producer hopes.

The estimate, compiled jointly by the Lubbock Cotton Exchange and PCG, shows standing acreage as of August 1 to be 1,549,000. A new estimate is made the first of each month from August through December.

Last year, from 1,256,000 standing acres on December 1 the area produced 1,187,472 running bales, as compared to the December 1 estimate of 1,169,000 published by the LCE and PCG.

RICHARD BERTRAND IN VIETNAM

"Rockets Almost Blasted Us Out Of The Water"

"North Vietnamese B-90 and B-60 rockets almost blasted us out of the water," were the words of Richard Bertrand as he described how his PT boat was hit on two occasions while fighting in the Vietnam war. One trip, six of his crew of 13 were killed and on another skirmish, nine were killed. Richard was topside operating the boat in both instances and the men who were killed were working below and shrapnel destroyed parts of the boat and took the lives of his crew. Both times enough engine power was maintained to return to the

base of operations. Richard has been in the Navy for three years and six months and hopes to be out and home next April 6. He'll go back to war in Vietnam about August 24 for six more months overseas duty. His early service consisted of landing troops ashore at Vietnam and hauling supplies into Vietnam ports. More recently he has experienced special service with the Green Berets. His job has been to enter small rivers and bay outlets at night and get the Green Berets in and out safely. He and his crew camouflage their

boat and wait in hiding, while the Green Berets accomplish their mission.

Richard said that they are allowed only two minutes extra time for the Berets to return. If they are to return at 12 p.m., and they're not back by 12:02, they head back for the base without them. He said his PT boat was well equipped with machine guns, rockets and other armaments, his crew is armed with M-16's and side arms.

Farmers To Receive \$12 Million Payment

Wheat Checks Going Out Now

The Floyd County ASCS office will send out checks for a little over \$12,000,000 this month and the early part of September.

The payments cover wheat, cotton and grain sorghum diversion payments and the wheat checks are currently be-

ing mailed to the county's farmers.

A little over a million dollars was sent out to the county's farmers back in the spring.

This diversion money combined with what appears to be a bumper grain sorghum and soybean crop should keep Floyd

county in the top ten counties of the state in gross farm income. The cotton crop is estimated to be down some 17,000 bales from last year and another story on this page gives more details about this crop. The Hesperian will have a report next week on the wheat production for the county.

House Acts On Farm Bill

The House of Representatives last week approved a one-year extension of the present farm program. The major controversy on the bill came on an amendment to limit government payments to producers.

A report from Representative George Mahon advises that he spoke against and voted against the limitation of payments, but supported final passage of the bill in order to give the Senate-House Conference a chance to work out an acceptable bill.

The Senate, on July 20, had passed a four-year bill without limitations. Mahon said that by sending the House bill to conference with the Senate, he felt most hopeful that a one-year extension without limitations

would be worked out in conference and later submitted to the House and Senate for final approval. He advised that if the farm law extension carried with it a limitation on payments, he was convinced that the bill would be blocked by the House and not enacted into law.

The farm program expires at the end of next year and it is generally felt that a one-year extension would assist farmers with their long-range planning and at the same time give the next Congress more time to work its will on improved farm legislation.

Mahon stated that he felt reasonably confident that a one-year extension without payment limitations would be approved before Congress adjourns this year.

The KFLD Radio Auction sale held Tuesday morning brought proceeds of \$102 including a \$10 cash donation, which will go to Floydada Chamber of Commerce toward the purchasing of welcome signs to be erected on four lane highways leading into Floydada.

investigate it to its greatest possibilities in locating more industry here...we believe that Floydada has the school, hospital, municipal facilities that

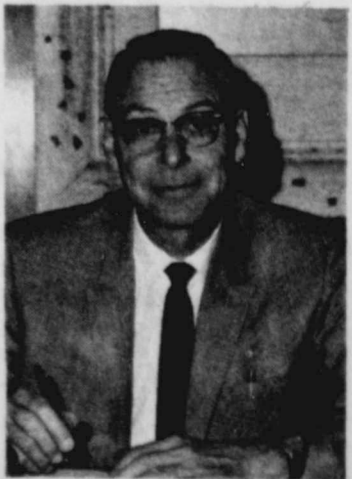

Grazing Associations Help Farmers Develop Income

Farmers and cattlemen are acquiring needed land resources by forming grazing associations and obtaining financial assistance from the Farmers Home Administration, the agency's Floyd County Supervisor, Alfred A. Harrison, said this week.

A grazing association is composed of a group of family farmers and ranchers who join together to acquire and develop land to provide seasonal grazing for livestock belonging to its members. The nonprofit association is owned, operated, and managed by its members.

"Small farmers," Harrison said, "can increase their incomes, make better use of land and water resources, and develop larger equity in land through use of a grazing association. This program often provides small farmers with their only opportunity to remain in farming on a profitable basis."

provided by the Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and the Extension Service.

Loans are available to qualified borrowers for periods up to 40 years at an interest rate of 5 percent. Interested individuals should contact Alfred A. Harrison, County Supervisor at 107 W. California Street in Floydada, form a steering committee, and begin looking for suitable acreage.

Other advantages of an association include providing opportunities to improve livestock quality, gain bargaining power in the market place, build more stable operations and strengthen the rural community.

"Results benefit the entire community," Harrison said, "because associations accomplish better use of land and water resources and provide expanded tax bases and more local buying power."

The grazing associations now in operation in Texas range in size from 4 to 43 members, depending on the number of livestock to be supported and dimensions and quality of the land.

Eligible to form associations are neighboring farmers and ranchers who operate family size units. Financial and technical assistance is provided by the Farmers Home Administration. Additional aid often is

Peace Corps Placement Test To Be Held

Lubbock area residents interested in putting their skills to use in developing nations around the world are invited to take the Peace Corps Placement Test at 1:30 p.m. Saturday, August 17 at Room 16A, Post Office Building.

The Peace Corps uses the Placement Test to determine how an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. The test requires no preparation and is non-competitive; an applicant can neither pass nor fail.

Persons interested in serving with the Peace Corps must fill out an Application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before the test. Application forms are available from post offices or from the Peace Corps in Washington, D.C. 20525.

Twelve thousand Volunteers are currently serving in Asia, Africa, Latin America and the Pacific Islands, working with the people of those nations in self-help projects ranging from food production to health to education. More Volunteers are needed for programs which will begin this fall and winter.

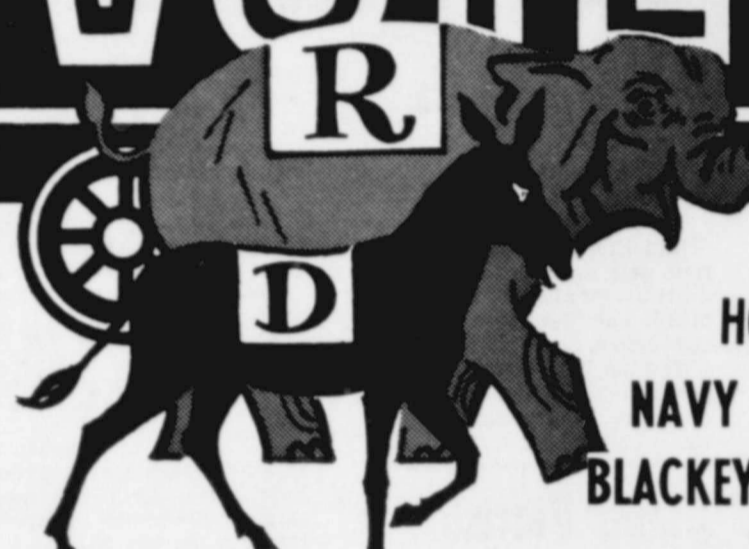

George Mahon Says Prospects Good For Extension Of Farm Program

Prospects are good in September for enactment of a one year extension of current farm programs, without payment limitations or other substantial changes — thanks to some very astute maneuvering by the Texas delegation in Congress and other proponents of the program. Without such political finesse, sometimes mislabeled political pettifoggery, farm legislation for this session of Congress would have been dead.

At least this was the opinion of Congressman George Mahon, expressed in a review of the situation with Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

The Senate on July 20 passed a four year extension of present programs for wheat, feed grains and cotton with relatively minor changes. In the process a heavy vote was registered in opposition to payment limitations.

The going was more sticky in the House on Wednesday, July 31. The House Agriculture Committee proposed a simple one year extension. The Department of Agriculture sponsored an amendment to make it four years, an action strongly opposed and more than a little feared by House Republicans.

Several amendments to limit individual farmer payments were offered. One would have set the ceiling at \$10,000. Another favored a graduated scale of limits and finally came one prohibiting payments of over \$20,000 to any one farmer.

All were soundly defeated until a roll call vote was called for and the amendment limiting payments to \$20,000 was adopted, 230 to 160, with two distinct elements voting "yea" and with resounding "nays" from Congressman Mahon and the entire Texas delegation.

Some who voted for limitations did so in an earnest effort to get either a dollar limit placed on farm payments or kill the bill entirely. Others, notably Republicans, voted for the limiting measure as a means to prevent passage of an extension for more than a year. They felt a limitation feature on the House bill would be the only trading point with the Senate to prevent ultimate passage of a bill for more than one year.

Then came the final vote on passage of the bill, a one year ex-

ension with individual payments limited to \$20,000, and the voting became even more confusing.

Some who had voted for limitations voted against the bill. Some who had voted against the limitations amendment voted for the bill with the same amendment attached.

In this latter category came the Texas delegation and virtually all other cotton belt Congressmen, and their action has been badly misunderstood in some quarters.

In the words of George Mahon, "Confusing as it may sound, we voted for the bill, WITH limitations, because this was absolutely the only way during this session of Congress that we could get a bill WITHOUT limitations."

Now it is up to Senate and House Conferees to meet to work out the differences between the bills passed by the two bodies, and in September both Senate and House will be called upon to accept or reject the conference report.

Congressman Bob Poage, Chairman of the House Agriculture Committee and a staunch opponent of payment limitations, will select House Conferees.

Senator Allen Ellender, Chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee and also a steadfast opponent of limitations, will select Senate Conferees.

"So there are really two almost ironclad guarantees against us getting payment limitations," Mahon explained. First it is understood that Congressman Poage will not permit a bill to be returned to the House with limitations intact, and second, "even if such a bill should be returned to the House, we are confident we have the strength to defeat it, just as we could have defeated it last Wednesday," Mahon stated.

Mahon pointed out that the key to this strategy rested in the Senate's prior passage of the four year extension of the Act with

a strong vote against limitations.

"With this Senate Bill," he said, "there is no legislation that can go to the President for his signature first coming before the House again. And there is no way in my mind that in the unlikely event the Conference Committee would be able to defeat it, which would mean that we would have been on Wednesday, August 6, against the measure at that time — without our own votes and our people in the country another very good one — to get a one year extension of farm programs from this session of Congress, and we would want and deserve that chance."

In answer to a final question, Mahon said, "This Congress will enact a one year extension of farm programs, without limitations, giving farmers the plan operations into the year 1970 and giving them the new Congress a chance to consider farm legislation of the extreme urgency of a December, 1969 deadline."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to add Section 64 to read as follows:

"Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within El Paso or Tarrant Counties. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require. Sec. 2. The amendments submitted to a qualified elector at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, consolidating offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within El Paso and Tarrant Counties."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR37)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

"Section 52e. 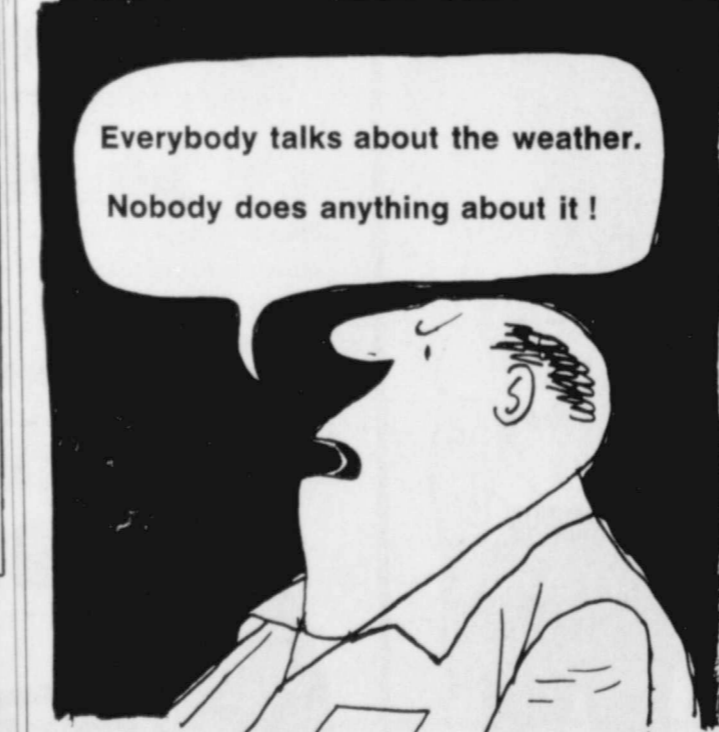

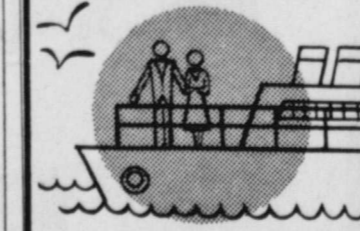

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-e to read as follows:

"Section 1-e. 1. From and after December 31, 1978, no State ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon any property within this State for State purposes except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning. 2. The State ad valorem tax levied by Article VII, Section 3, of this Constitution shall be imposed at the following rates on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the years 1968 through 1974: On January 1, 1968, Thirty-five Cents (35¢); on January 1, 1969, Thirty Cents (30¢); on January 1, 1970, Twenty-five Cents (25¢); on January 1, 1971, Twenty Cents (20¢); on January 1, 1972, Fifteen Cents (15¢); on January 1, 1973, Ten Cents (10¢); on January 1, 1974, Five Cents (5¢); and thereafter no such tax for school purposes shall be levied and collected. An amount sufficient to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public schools of this State shall be set aside from any revenues deposited in the Available School Fund, provided, however, that should such funds be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State.

3. The State ad valorem tax of Two Cents (2¢) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation levied by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution shall not be levied after December 31, 1976. At any time prior to December 31, 1976, the Legislature may establish a trust fund solely for the benefit of the widows of Confederate veterans and such Texas Rangers and their widows as are eligible for retirement or disability pensions under the provisions of Article XVI, Section 66, of this Constitution, and after such fund is established the ad valorem tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, shall not thereafter be levied.

4. Unless otherwise provided by the Legislature, after December 31, 1976 all delinquent State ad valorem taxes together with penalties and interest thereon, less lawful costs of collection, shall be used to secure bonds issued for permanent improvements at institutions of higher learning. Section 17, of this Constitution. 5. The fees paid by the State for both assessing and collecting State ad valorem taxes shall not exceed two per cent (2%) of the State taxes collected. This subsection shall be self-executing.

Sec. 2. That Article III, Section 51, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or appropriation of money to any association of municipal or other whatsoever; provided the Legislature is to indigent and federate soldiers under such restrictions as may be determined by the Legislature, and to their indigent such regulations as may be determined by the Legislature as provided that this Section shall be construed so as to grant of aid in calamity." Sec. 3. The amendments submitted to a qualified elector at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following: "FOR Amendment reducing State property taxes by all State property taxes levied by 31, 1978, as provided by Section 17, of this Constitution of the State of Texas."

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History Of Lakeview School

(Editor's note: we are carrying the history of Lakeview School in the Hesperian this week as an added interest to readers. The school was the site of a three community reunion Sunday. The history was compiled by Mrs. W. C. Wright, time beginning in 1892.

The first Lakeview School was built on the southeast corner of Roy Curry land, which is now being farmed by Wayne Appling. The building was frame, 28-32, furnished with modern seats and desks. The lumber for the building was purchased in Amarillo and freighted to Floyd County, the trip taking eight days. It was built by Anton Anderson and men of the community. The first trustees were E. M. (Doc) Walling, Cabet Huckelbee and W. S. Adams.

First teacher was Will Nelson, who served from 1892 until 1895; Hog Pruitt, 1895-1896; S. H. Adams, 1896-1897. Wages were \$35 per month.

The first school burned in September, 1897. A logout, located on the Patton land, now land of Dr. Rhodes, was used as a temporary school for two months. A box house was then purchased from a man by the name of Laycock and moved to the present location. This served until 1900 when a new building was erected, now the barn on the place east of the brick school.

Teachers during this time were Clark (J. C.) Bolding, 1900-1901; S. H. Adams, 1902-1903; Miss Allie Ellard, 1903-1904; Lewis Howell, 1904, 1905, 1906; Miss Pearl White, now Mrs. Fagan, 1907; F. N. Hunt, 1908; Mrs. Jesse Moore, 1908-1909.

A new room was added to the building in 1909. Trustees at this time were J. W. Wright, Charlie Trowbridge and F. P. Donathan.

Later teachers serving were Miss Aura Adams and Miss Stella Staley, 1909-1910; Miss Aura Adams and Miss Ella Rotan, 1910-1911; Miss Aura Adams and Miss Bessie Scott, 1911-1912; Mr. Hamm and Miss Aura Adams, 1912-1913; Frank Cook, 1913-1914; Miss Myrtle Ashton, 1914-1915 and 1916.

Frank Cook and Miss Ashton were married in the spring before school closed and roomed at the W. C. Wrights.

A new brick building was built in the summer of 1916 containing four rooms, hall and stairway to the above auditorium.

Teachers were Mr. Ratliff, Miss Ona Hanna and Miss Verna Roger, 1916-1917; Willis Simmons, Ona Hanna and Miss Lona Steen, 1917-1918; Willis Simmons, Miss May Kirkendall and Miss Wilson, 1918-1919; Price Scott, Miss Ruth Pitts, now Mrs. David Batten Sr., and Miss Ruth Wagener, 1919-1920.

Teachers during 1920-1921 were Price Scott, Miss Edith McClure and Miss Belle McClure. Price Scott also taught 1921-1922, along with Miss Wanda Armstrong and a Mr.

and Mrs. Cella Ross. Bus Driver was Orville Shearer.

1941-42: Tom Porter, Mrs. Cella Ross, Miss Leona Jameson, who married Raymond Watson after the closing of school. Trustees were J. M. Harrison, B. L. Breed, Willie Bunch. Bus driver was Bill Rucker.

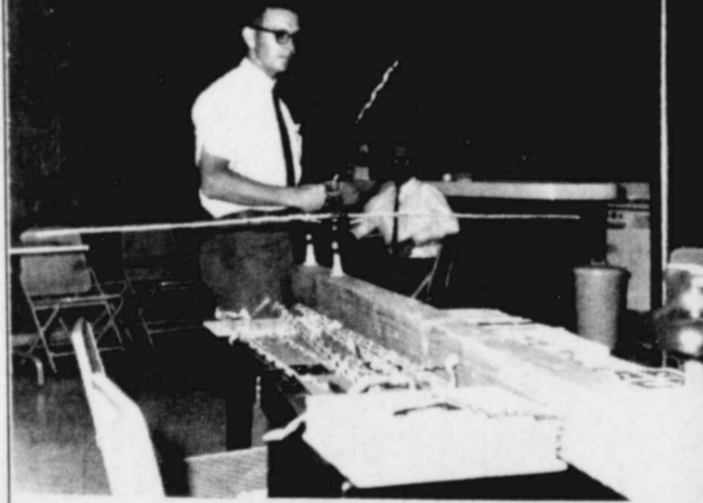

Amendments In Hesperian

The second publication of 14 more amendments to the state constitution, on which campaigns will be shaping up soon, appears in today's Hesperian and will be published in two more issues of the paper.
State law requires that these amendments be published in a newspaper or newspapers of general circulation in every county of the state for four consecutive issues. When you stop to consider that there are 254 counties in Texas, you can see that the cost to the state is tremendous. As a taxpayer, your pocketbook is hit by this law, so it probably will pay you to read these amendments, the publication costs of which you are helping pay.
Then, too, some of the 14 proposed changes in the state's basic law are far-reaching, although others are routine. All 14 will be voted on at the general election Nov. 5.
Here are the amendments in the order in which they will appear on the Nov. 5 ballot:
1. Revising provisions for management and administration of the state employee's retirement system and permitting investment in securities other than government bonds.
2. Raising the state's welfare spending ceiling from \$60 million to \$75 million.
3. Permitting investment of the Permanent University Fund by UT regents in certain types of securities, within the "prudent man rule."
4. Allowing Dallas County to issue road bonds on vote of property taxpayers.
5. Authorizing a raise in state legislators' salaries from \$4,800 to \$8,400 a year and extending the per diem expense allowance of legislators (\$12 a day) to 140 days of a regular lawmaking session. (Present limit is 120 days.)
6. Allowing the legislature to exempt from property taxes equipment installed by industrialists to control air or water pollution.
7. Phasing out the state property tax after Dec. 31, 1976, beginning next year, except that portion for higher education institutions.
8. Eliminating the requirement that the governor, secretary of state and comptroller approve contracts for printing and paper.
9. Providing for contributions to the teacher retirement system on the basis of full salaries. (Contributions now are limited to \$504 a year.)
10. Allowing the legislature to provide for refund of state tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail in Texas.
11. Authorizing the legislature to permit consolidation of offices and governmental functions in El Paso and Tarrant counties.
12. Giving the legislature power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes and permit private concerns to operate plants thus financed.
13. Exempting from property tax certain property temporarily stored in public warehouses.
14. Spelling out that legislators will not be ineligible for other offices because their terms extend a few days into January.

The death of Jack Osborn, one of Richard's High school buddies of course concerned him greatly. "I knew about the shelling that Jack's outfit was taking, and I knew that he would be real lucky to escape with his life," Richard added.
I asked Richard what he would do if he were running the war over there. He replied that he might as well pull out, or declare war and begin a general attack all across the country. Richard feels that the North Vietnamese will begin a major attack against the allies about the last of September when the monsoon season begins. He believes that the enemy has plenty of tanks, helicopters and other air power that they will unleash at that time.

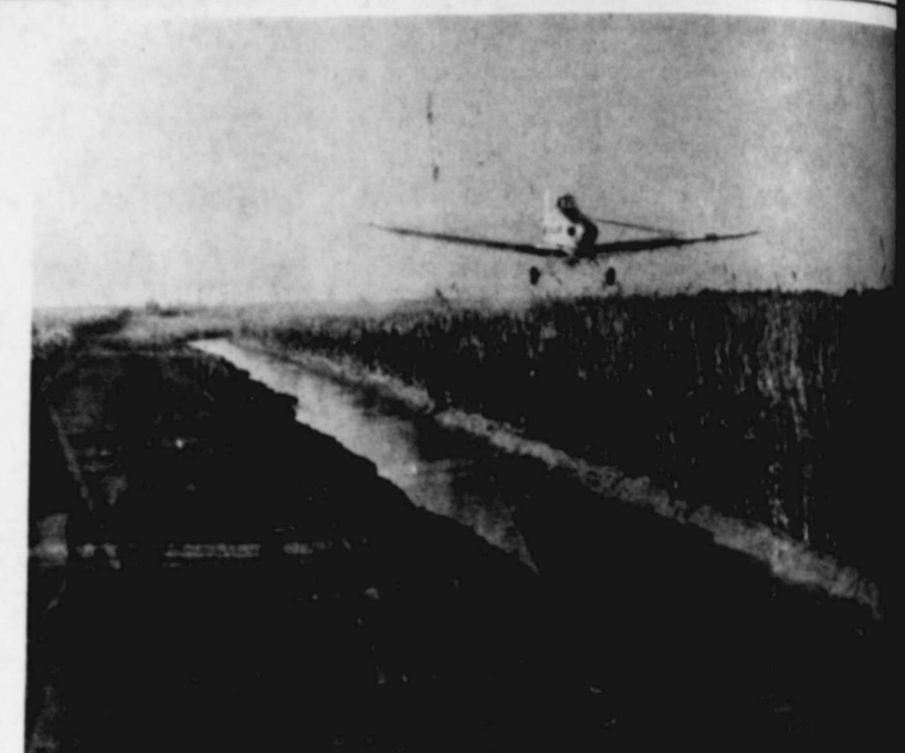

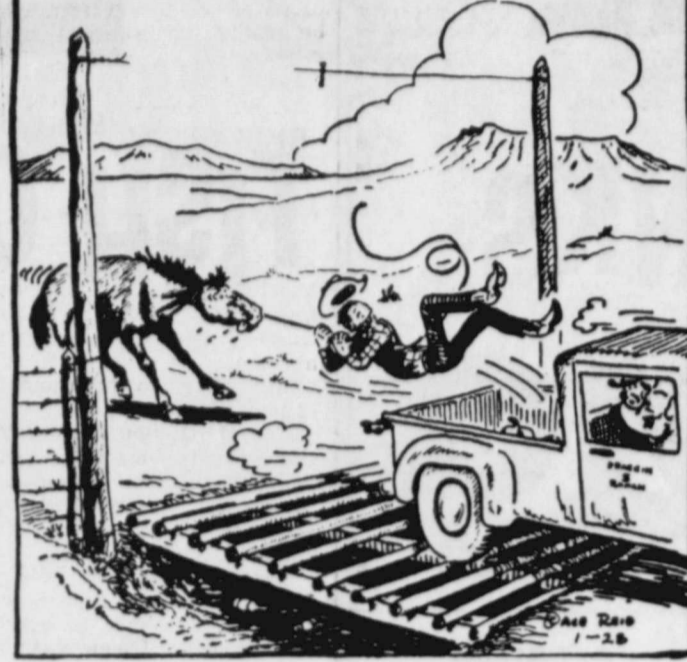
