HIRE MORE TEACHERS

School Board Approves Budget

The Floydada school board approved the 1968-1969 budget at its regular monthly meeting here Monday night of \$1,117,293.00. The budget is up some \$53,000.00 over last year, due to money received from the government for a new migrant teaching program.

Teachers resigning include typing teacher B. J. Eudy, who has been with the school system for several years, high school English teacher Frances Puckett, former Della Plains principal Faris Wilson and his wife, Mary, first grade teacher Patty Gallimore and Nancy Welborn. Eudy will be teaching in Roosevelt next year, Wilson will be assistant principal at Lamarque. Carrie S. Perry, recent Wayland graduate will teach speech, J. W. Sollis, formerly with the

Petersburg school system will teach high school math, Helen Masters of Floydada will teach in one of the elementary schools, Ruth Baker, formerly of Silverton was also employed for elementary teaching and Susie Ozuna, recent Wayland graduate, typing teacher. The board granted the school bus gasoline contract to Consumers Fuel Assn., the only bidder. The board also approved membership of the Floydada schools in the regional media center in Lubbock. This will cost the system \$1.00 per ADA and will give the school access to film strips, research material and coordination for an all new program.

City Council Raises Sanitation Rates

Sanitation rates for the residents of Floydada will go up on August 15 due to a decision made by the city council at its regular meeting here Tuesday night. The minimum charge has been increased 50¢. In the future the minimum charge will be \$2.00 for residences and \$2.75 for businesses.

Agreed to lease the city's property for oil and gas; approved a resolution guaranteeing right-of-way for Price Street to be paved; authorized the mayor to sign a new Texas Highway Department maintenance agreement; set the city tax rate the same as last year (\$1.30 per hundred evaluation and 35% of market value). The council also agreed to renew its membership to Water Inc. All councilmen were present.

Osborn Awarded Silver Star, Purple Heart Posthumously

The Silver Star Medal and the Purple Heart were awarded posthumously to Spec. 4 Jack W. Osborn, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Osborn of Plainview, former Floydada resident, in ceremonies held Friday. The medals were presented at Texas Tech's Military Science Department in Lubbock.

Maj. Bobby J. Carter, acting Professor of military science at Tech, made the presentation to the youth's father and mother. The artilleryman, who attended school in Floydada, was fatally wounded by enemy mortar fragments in Vietnam April 1967. SEE OSBORN, PAGE 6

Mostly In Dryland Area

Floyd County irrigation wells got a lift. . . and dry land crops got a new lease on life when thunder storms dotted the county on Saturday, Sunday and Monday nights. Floydada received a total of .68 during this period and the largest amount of rainfall came to the Neil Bertrand farm southeast of Floydada, about two and a half inches, and the Antelope community with almost three inches.

Other rainfall totals are as follows: Lakeview, 1.89; Dougherty one inch, about two inches south of Dougherty; Sandhill trace to .50; South Plains, sprinkles; Cedar Hill, .50; Barwise, .25; Muncy, trace; McCoy, .60; Harmony, .90; Campbell, 1.30; Baker, 1.00; Blanco from .50 to 1.00; Liberty, shower; Pleasant Hill, 1.00; Fairmont, 1.00; Fairview, 1.25.

The rain was heavier to the south of Floyd County as storms crossed Crosby County and dumped heavy amounts south of Falls.

Most of the rains came in the weak irrigation water and dry land areas of the county.

E. L. Norman Retires After 48 Years With Local Bank

E. L. Norman, who has been associated with the First National Bank in Floydada for the past 48 years officially retires today. "I started to work on the posting machine, worked up through every position in the bank, and I'm ready for a rest," he told a Hesperian reporter yesterday.

He will continue to serve on the board of directors. "I've seen good times and bad times since 1920 when I went to work here, but I've enjoyed my work through the years . . . and left my work in the office when I went home nights," he continued.

The Normans moved to Floydada in 1915 from Winters, E. L. worked on his father's farm for a year, then went to Abilene for a year with the F&M bank (now the First National), then moved to Plainview for a year with the Third National Bank, before moving to Floydada.

The Normans reared two boys who have worked in banks and E. L. has three brothers who were bankers: T. A. is at Rockwall, W. O. retired from an Abilene bank in April this year and Lewis, who was associated with the local bank is in the rest home here.

"I've always liked Floydada, we found it a good place to rear a family and I look forward to spending more time visiting with my friends and neighbors upon retiring," Norman said. "In 1932, The First National was the only bank in the county still in business, and there were very few on the Plains that lasted through the depression. We have been fortunate in many ways. . . we never had a bank robbery, never had our bank to burn," he continued. Norman retires as executive vice president. He was president from 1950 to 1961.

LETTERS to EDITOR

(Editor's Note) The following letter was received by Mrs. Callie Wilson from Matt Kenzie of Lubbock, long ago Floyd County pioneer, who now resides in a rest home. We thought perhaps our readers would enjoy sharing the letter. Spelling and such remain as in his letter.

Dear Madam:
I am wondering whether it will be alright to address you or not, because I have not seen nor heard of you since 1903. I have my granddaughter to write this letter for me. I am 96 yrs old blind but otherwise in good health.

Now Miss Callie to make long story short your father Henry Randolph was a life long friend mine. We got acquainted as very young men in Jones County, Texas and we worked together on ranches there as long as he lived down there, and when he moved to Floyd County and bought the Rodgers land, I was with him and went back to Jones County and stayed with him and your mother and helped them move their stock and household goods

to Floyd County. I remember you well, as you were quite young but you was a good horseman, and you could sure handle a drive. As well as I can remember your brothers Leonard and the twins, I can't remember their names, and when I was visiting you all at the old Rodgers place East Lockney there were 2 or 3 small boys, your brothers and I think a sister or 2. So many years gone by since then and I just cannot recall their names.

After your Father Henry Randolph moved from Jones County, I sort lost interest in that country and got a job on trail drive of 4 years of over 12,000 cattle for Hank Creswell from the Quitaques and went to Canada with them. We were 4 to 6 months on the drive. We left the Quitaques in late March and landed in Canada in October a long and hard drive.

Hank Creswell was an Englishman and ranched in Roberts County, and when Goodnight bought the Quitaque lands he leased from Charles Goodnight, and after few years the settlers got to coming in and settling so fast, Hank rounded up and went on drive to Canada where he had already been looking over and getting land for a ranch. Chas. Goodnight advised against his going up there on account the cold weather. Sam Barton was one the head men, Geo. Glutts went as far as Montana and turned back. Walter Byars was one the hands who helped round up and start the drive. Buck Russell, Oscar Stroup and

Henry Kell helped get the cattle on trail and returned and filed on school land South Quitaque. John Farris was one the hands too as well as many others I knew them all but so long ago forgot their names.

Now your Father Lite Knight and Henry Slaton all worked cattle in Jones County. Now your Father was always considered a TOP hand at the round UPS. He had a turtle colored horse with black stripe down his back and no better horse ever worked a round up and your father was always picked out and sent in to the herd to do the cutting. I am blind but can see him setting on that horse, he rode straight as Indian and was considered the best cow man on the ranch. In fact Miss Callie I tell you no better nor more honorable man ever lived than Henry Randolph. I could write a book of his life in early days, now so long ago.

I remember coming to Floyd County, it took weeks or months, and once we were camped on Duck Creek in Dickens County for quite a spell. Your Mother was a good horseman, and good with a gun, and she went out one morning with her gun and came back with antelope, prairie chickens and fixed best meals I know that ever was. My what a good and fine woman she was. I don't think this letter ought be too long, but I could write pages and pages of your Father and Mother's early life as I knew them before they were married. I came with them to Floyd

County. I lived with them as one of the "kind" and Creswell with to Canada I signed up and went. I all froze to death that winter and bankrupted him. I Canada and got hold 20,000 acres land and finally got wheat, little at a time and wound up with making over 10 million bushels for 6 yrs and the war was on and the price I sold out for \$6 1/2 million dollars, and came away with prices and friends busted me and now I am in old here in Lubbock and got nothing. My friends bought and tied intensely and took ever advantage me.

Oh how I do wish I had made connection with Hank before it was too late.

Now I know much beside this and when I die, please buried with me. However when I heard about you write you this last letter.

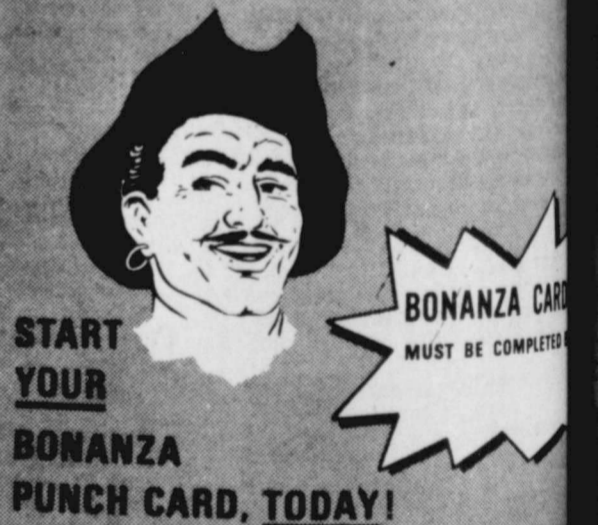

Rolf Hinnen Hanson, 61, who was in Floydada to visit relatives from his home in Honduras, in Central America, was buried in Lockney Cemetery Sunday following funeral rites in the First Baptist Church in Floydada. Hanson died of a heart attack in Caprock Hospital Friday morning.

Hanson was born in St. Joseph, Mo., and was married to the former Donnie Taylor of Floydada July 2, 1938 at Manila in the Philippine Islands. The couple met in Alaska where she was employed. In 1942 Hanson and his wife were captured by the Japanese and held in a Philippine prison camp for 38 months.

The deceased had been an overseas mining engineer for the past 30 years. He had been a resident of Honduras for the past 21 years. The couple came to Floydada in June to visit relatives including Mrs. Hanson's sister, Mrs. J. B. Wington. They had planned to be here some six months.

Hanson was a member of the

Episcopal Church.

Survivors include his wife and a sister, Mrs. S. A. Skinner of Upland, Calif.

Rev. Hollis Payne, pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church in Floydada, officiated at rites. Moore-Rose Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Funeral rites for Martin "Stogie" Bumpus, 35 year old brother of Mrs. Tom Moore of Floydada, were conducted last Thursday in the Cee Vee Methodist Church. The former Matorador cowboy died in an ambulance enroute from Tucumcari, N.M., to Amarillo Tuesday of last week. He was pronounced dead on arrival at St. Anthony

Hospital.

Bumpus became ill while at work spraying cattle in a Tucumcari feed lot and was taken to a hospital there for emergency treatment. An autopsy ordered revealed that death was due to natural causes, as a result of a bleeding ulcer. He had been ill for sometime, according to reports.

Bumpus worked on the Matorador Ranch for some ten years before ranch holdings were sold.

Purpose Of Community Action Centers Explained

What is Poverty? Poverty is being unable to make ends meet; is being always in want. Poverty is living in run-down, leaky, cold houses, often vermin-ridden; it is competing with cockroaches and rats for food.

Poverty is fear - fear of the landlord who wants his rent, of bill collectors, of the law because of no driver's license, of hunger and not being able to adequately clothe the children, or to provide shelter from the heat of summer, or the cold of winter.

Poverty is making out with faulty plumbing, with holes in the floor and walls, often with no sewer connections or indoor toilets.

Poverty is having no mixers, vacuum cleaners, washers, or other conveniences. It is feeling inadequate, frustrated, and rebellious. It is being an outsider, a second-class citizen who has no contacts or friends in "City Hall". It is not knowing what to do or where to turn for help.

Poverty is having little or no education, no skills, no trade. It is being referred to as lazy, no good, no ambition. It is living one day at a time with no thought of the future. Poverty is no hope - knowing that tomorrow will be just like today, always running scared, always on the brink of disaster. It is running out of gas, or having a wreck, or illness with no insurance, no credit, and no friends who can help.

The purpose of our Neighborhood Centers is to fight poverty in our own community. There are those who need help, and those who want to help. You may ask, "What can I do?" A survey is being made, and when it is complete, there will be a number of things that can be done to help. We welcome club efforts, and help from any source. We wish to fight poverty with whatever weapons we can lay our hands on, be it local, state, or federal. Remember we do not want your money; we want your concern and effort. Often friendship, encouragement, and love is all a family needs. We need to "Share ye one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ."

Tulia Okays Insurance Water Pact

TULIA (Special) — Approval of a water contract to be presented to the Mackenzie Water Authority has been voted by the Tulia City Council.

The contract is to assure Tulia of a supply of water in the future by providing that transmission lines will be constructed when the water is needed. Tulia and Floydada defeated a Mackenzie Water Authority \$7.9 million proposal to build a dam, treatment plant and transmission lines to the cities in elections last fall.

The contract approved relates to a second proposal now being considered by the authority directors to build the dam and treatment plant, with the towns in the authority being able to get transmission lines when needed.

Tulia councilmen wanted to make sure that when the city was ready to build the lines, it could get the amount of water due it, Jim McAlister, city manager, said. The lines will not be built unless the water is available.

In other action, the City Council rejected a 20-year extension of the Pioneer Natural Gas Co. franchise expiring June 29, 1972, but approved a franchise drawn up by City Attorney Burrell Evans for a 10-year period.

The new franchise contract will be submitted to the gas

company. It is felt to be more beneficial to the city than the franchise submitted by the gas company, McAlister said.

NEWS FOR HOMEMAKERS

A mulch works like a silent gardener helping to stabilize soil temperature, hold moisture and prevent growth of weeds around trees and shrubs and in flower beds and vegetables.

An organic mulch can be straw, sawdust, tan and pine bark. You can use an inorganic mulch such as gravel or black plastic film about four millimeters thick.

But don't use clear plastics because sunlight penetrates and allows weeds to germinate and grow.

Coffey grounds, wood shavings, wood chips and chopped leaves can be used as mulches. A solid mat of leaves prevents air exchange needed to keep the surface water from getting stale so grinding the leaves is preferred.

Peat moss is a good soil conditioner and mulch. But mulches should not take the place of fertilizer.

Straw makes a good mulch in the vegetable garden but for use around shrubs, in flower beds and flower pots use something prettier such as gravel chips in white or colors like the blues and reds. These chips are coarser than gravel and should not be mixed with soil.

Generally mulches are used 1 to 2 inches deep. It's often hard to estimate the bushels or bags needed. Baled mulches sometimes have tags that tell the coverage to expect, for example a 6 cubic foot bale may cover 72 square feet 1 inch deep, or 36 square feet 2 inches deep.

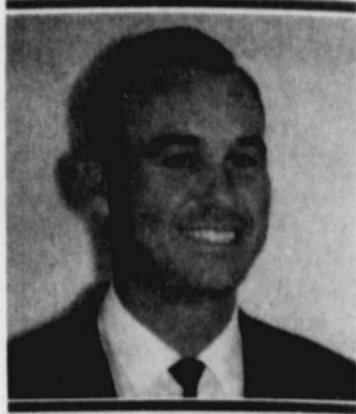

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ELEVEN ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to add Section 64 to read as follows:

"Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within El Paso or Tarrant Counties. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52e to read as follows:

"Section 52e. Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR61)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year and a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day of each Regular Session and each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government not to exceed one round trip per month during such time as the Legislature is in session, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and

most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller, to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year."

"Section 1. Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows:

"Section 2-a. (a) The Legislature may, by General Law, exempt from ad valorem taxation by the state and its political subdivisions all or a portion of any equipment, device or improvement installed or constructed on real property, which is designed to eliminate or abate the harmful effect of air emissions or water effluents on the air and water quality in this state, to the extent that the capital investment in such property is made to comply with or to exceed air or water quality standards established by law.

(b) Legislation which may be enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Section is not void because of its anticipatory nature."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 1-e to read as follows:

"Section 1-e. From and after December 31, 1978, no State ad valorem taxes shall be levied upon any property within this State for State purposes except the tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, for certain institutions of higher learning."

"2. The State ad valorem tax authorized by Article VII, Section 3, of this Constitution shall be imposed at the following rates on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation for the years 1968 through 1974: On January 1, 1968, Thirty-five Cents (35¢); on January 1, 1969, Thirty Cents (30¢); on January 1, 1970, Twenty-five Cents (25¢); on January 1, 1971, Twenty Cents (20¢); on January 1, 1972, Fifteen Cents (15¢); on January 1, 1973, Ten Cents (10¢); on January 1, 1974, Five Cents (5¢); and thereafter no such tax for school purposes shall be levied and collected. An amount sufficient to provide free textbooks for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State shall be set aside from any revenues deposited in the Available School Fund, provided, however, that should such funds be insufficient, the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State.

"3. The State ad valorem tax of Two Cents (2¢) on the One Hundred Dollars valuation levied by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution shall not be levied after December 31, 1976. At any time prior to December 31, 1976, the Legislature may establish a trust fund solely for the benefit of the widows of Confederate veterans and such Texas Rangers and their widows who are eligible for retirement or disability pensions under the provisions of Article XVI, Section 66, of this Constitution, and after such fund is established the ad valorem tax levied by Article VII, Section 17, shall not thereafter be levied.

"4. Unless otherwise provided by the Legislature, after December 31, 1976 all delinquent State ad valorem taxes together with penalties and interest thereon, less lawful costs of collection, shall be used to secure bonds issued for permanent improvements at institutions of higher learning, as authorized by Article VII, Section 17, of this Constitution.

"5. The fees paid by the State for both assessing and collecting State ad valorem taxes shall not exceed two per cent (2%) of the State taxes collected. This subsection shall be self-executing."

Devotional of the Month

"Righteousness exalteth a nation"

"Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people." (Proverbs 14:34) This familiar text is still valid in spite of all of the oratory and long-winded speeches that we have heard to the contrary. A number of us lift our eyebrows when we hear modern versions of the old refrain that "every day in every way the world is getting better and better." Though it made money for the Frenchman that sold it to us, the burden of proof still rests with him. And in a computerized age with more statistics than ever available, that illusion is becoming increasingly difficult to prove.

Leaving room for differences in definition, it can be agreed that for each reproach that rests upon our nation sin is its root. Not just one sin, but many sins, committed against many, and by many, have compounded the problem. Too often the suggested solutions are themselves so steeped in the sins of greed, lust, avarice and pride that the cure is more like a curse than a blessing. No human hand or mind today is competent to accurately adjust the delicate scales of justice. All of us know deep down inside that there is a God who intervenes in the affairs of men and nations. The truth of our devotional thought-starter is not merely a rule of thumb stumbled upon by a hard pressed slogan-writer; it is a divine revelation given for our good and tested repeatedly in the laboratories of history. This hour of travail in our nation is not the only or the last one to vindicate the declaration that "sin is a reproach to any people." But let us turn our thoughts to the happier first part of the text to see the solution to our problems.

"Righteousness exalteth a nation," and a people. Genuine thorough-going righteousness is always in short supply. It is one commodity with which no nation has ever been overstocked. Most of us are here by our own choice. All who have moved here did so of our own volition. Those who were born here have been at liberty to leave, our community, our state and our nation. We love our flag and our country and our neighbors. Still we can see that in the best country in the world there is room for considerable improvement in righteousness. Righteousness does a lot of things. Righteousness gives a day's work for a day's pay. Righteousness measures sixteen ounces to every pound and thirty-six inches to every yard. Righteousness makes a dollar worth one hundred copper pennies or an equivalent amount of silver or gold or any other commodity. Righteousness honors "God, even the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ. . ." (II Cor. 1:3b KJV), the God who was honored in the majority of the charters of the founding colonies of this nation. Righteousness refrains from using His name lightly and speaks out when others do. Righteousness honors Him with honest business on six days and sanctifies the seventh with rest and worship. We have plenty of room for the kind of righteousness which provides comforts and conveniences with honor for the aged. It goes beyond lip service to a sharing of ourselves with our parents. Righteousness places as high a value on human life as Christ did, but does not presume to place it higher than He. Righteousness practices purity both before and after marriage. Righteousness respects the property rights of ourselves and of others. Righteousness tells the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth about our worst enemies and best friends, and ourselves. Righteousness rejoices at our neighbor's good fortune and sorrows at his failure. It will indeed exalt our nation if we become a people "poor in spirit," that comforts the mourning, that evidences meekness, a hunger and thirst for righteousness, mercy and heart purity. A nation that makes peace with justice and avoids war with honor, may be ridiculed and abused by both the far right and the far left, but she will be honored and exalted by God. Let us demonstrate our regard for the Ten Commandments of Moses and the Beatitudes of Jesus by endeavoring to apply them to every day life in Floydada.

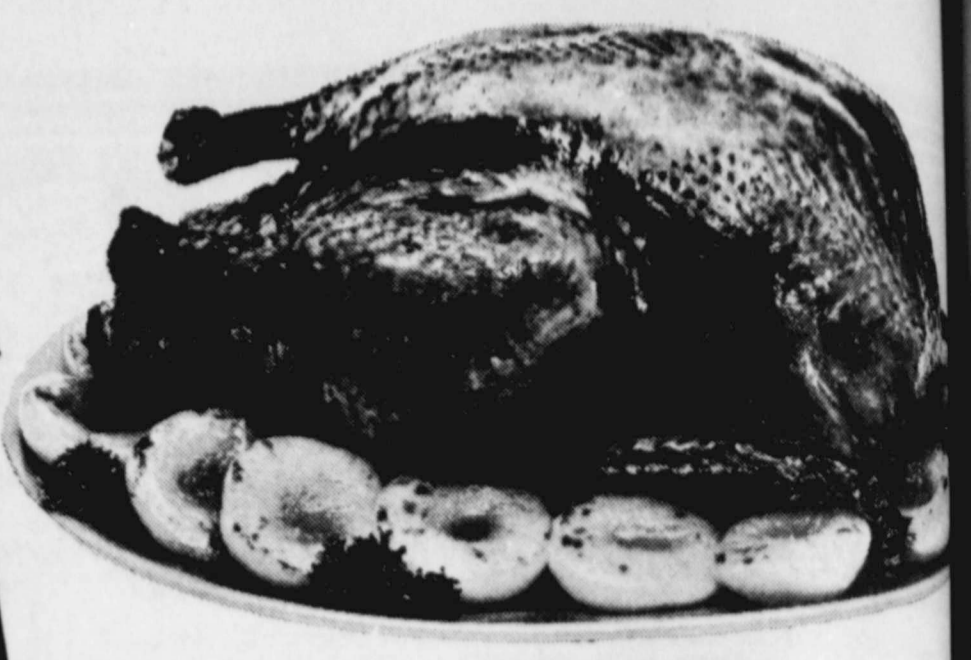

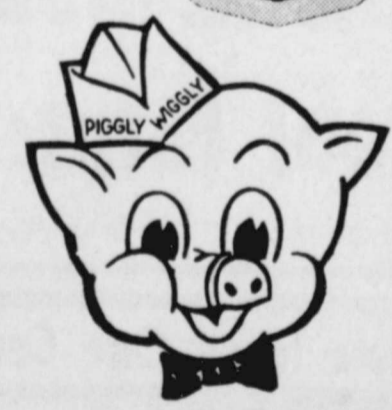
