## Street Building Project For NE. Floydada

### Neighborhood Center Work Progresses

A much needed street improvement project has been approved for the northeast area of Floydada. The Floydada city council has purchased five lots near the lake in the north part of Floydada and the Floyd County Commissioners Court has agreed to take caliche out of the lots and build up the streets.

When the project is completed, junk and trash will be used to fill the caliche pit. There is no paving plan in the project, as this must be financed by the individual property owners, but the caliche build-up will vastly improve the present mud-hole streets in that area of Floydada.

The Rev. Juan Salinas and John Campbell neighborhood aides, who are organizing adult classes to be held in the Della Plains school are making family interviews to determine what the adults in the poor class families want to learn through the neighborhood center classes.

The board of directors of the neighborhood center are organizing volunteer teachers for the various classes. At press time yesterday, the aides reported the most interest in the following classes: carpentry, mechanics, nursing, high school education, kindergarten, reading and writing, cooking, budgeting, drivers education, barbering.

Overall coordinator of the Lockney, Floydada and Ralls centers is Sid Thomas of Lockney. The four county OEO supervisor is Hubert Curry of Crosbyton. Jack McIntosh is chairman of the Floydada center board of directors.

The overall goal of the community center is to help the underprivileged to learn how to improve their homes and economic situation through individual and class instruction. . . a combination of education and "neighborly" help.

### New Residents Must Apply For Ballot To Vote

County Clerk Margaret Collier has issued a reminder that new residents of Texas who wish to vote in the presidential election this year must apply for a ballot at the county clerk's office by 5 o'clock September 20.

The reminder is for voters who will have lived in Texas more than 60 days but less than a year on next November 5, general election day. This is the first time that residents of less than a year will be able to vote in a Texas presidential election. A law passed in 1967 allows a new resident to vote if he will have lived in Texas for at least 60 days on election day, possesses all qualifications required for voting in Texas elections except the normal residence requirements, and was either a qualified voter in another state immediately before he moved to Texas.

## Floydada Jr. High And High Schools Enrollment Up

In comparing the school enrollment of Floydada schools with last year, it appears that

the high school and Jr. high schools are up and the grade schools are down.

The comparison favors last year because last year's count was made one and a half weeks after school started and this year's was made after five days of school.

The Hesperian will make another count next week, to better show a true comparison.

The count made yesterday at press time showed that the high school was up from 439 to 465; Jr. High up from 293 to 295; Andrews Ward down from 515 to 459; Duncan Elementary

down from 538 to 490.

Lockney schools were down from 1045 to 1013 after one week's school this year and last year.

South Plains school was down from 106 to 92, Dougherty up from 53 to 56 and Providence was down 64 to 55, according to a report from county school superintendent Clarence Guffee.

School officials felt that when a comparison is made next week the overall enrollment will be about the same as last year.

## Home Loans Offered Low Income People

There are many low and moderate income rural families living in sub-standard housing in Floyd and Motley Counties. This need not be the case as housing credit is available from the Farmers Home Administration according to Alfred A. Harrison, County Supervisor.

The FHA office in Floyd County has been able to provide assistance to an elderly couple who had lost everything they had accumulated due to sickness in the family. The husband is unable to work and was not able to meet the rent of adequate modest housing. Due to his age money was not available from conventional credit. Farmers Home Administration loaned this couple funds to purchase a home with repayment of \$34.00 per month. A couple with seven children

who works as farm labor and has been in Floyd County for twelve years had never owned a home or lived in a home with all modern conveniences or near school or churches, now own their own home that is adequate and modest with all modern conveniences near schools and churches. The monthly repayment is \$33.00 enabling them to be taxpayers and have pride in ownership.

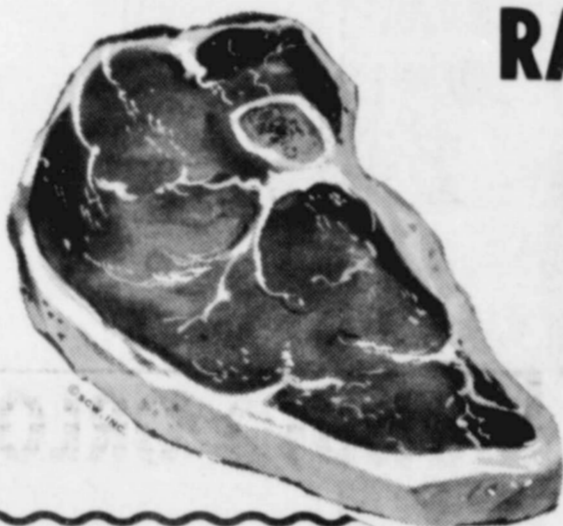

A high school football star in the 1950's, Strickland is past president of the Plainview Toastmaster. He is a member of the Community Concert Association and is a Kiwanian. Strickland is a member of the board of the Hale County Noxious Weed Program and was selected as the "Outstanding Weed Control Farmer of the Year" in 1965. He and his wife, the former Judy Graham, have three children, Michael DeJuan, 4; Karen Gail, 2 and Deidi Ann, 2 mos. They live at 1405 Zephyr in Plainview.

hard water area. Or fill the pot with hot water and soak with a tablespoon or two of dishwasher detergent until deposit is released. Don't count it clean if you can see a brown stain inside the pot, lid or basket. This stain is coffee oils that cling, get stale, and make the coffee have an off-flavor or taste bitter and strong. With stainless steel or aluminum pots you may use scouring agents to take stains off but soaking is easier where it works. Never scour inside of plated pots! Don't soak aluminum pots long enough to darken them.

For peak flavor plan to serve coffee within an hour of brewing time. The longer it stands the more flavor is lost. Of course with modern electric coffee makers keeping coffee at the right serving temperature is no problem.

Automatic coffee makers make the best coffee, providing you do not brew less than half the cups the pot will make. If you regularly make 2 cups of coffee it's wise to use a 2 to 4 cup pot instead of a larger one. Measure water and coffee carefully and start with faucet cold water.

Adjust the control on electric coffee makers for mild or strong coffee whichever you prefer.

Rinse the coffee maker well and towel dry after washing. If it's electric keep the base out of water unless it's irremovable.

When you have leftover vegetables and wonder what to do with them - try blending 1 can cream of chicken soup, 1 small can deviled ham, and 1/4 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing together. Spoon over hot or cold vegetables.

Sift together flour, baking powder, salt, and cinnamon. Beat butter, sugar, and egg yolks together. Stir in sifted dry ingredients. Add milk, stirring only until combined.

**FREEZING PREPARED FOODS**  
Part II

In using your freezer, here are some pointers about making combination dishes better.

Do not overcook foods that are to be frozen. Foods that are to be heated before serving are best if only partially cooked; meat should be tender but still firm, vegetables slightly underdone.

Use as little fat as possible in gravies and sauces. Fats have a tendency to separate, but if used in smaller proportions, they will recombine when heated.

Fried foods are apt to become rancid after one to two months of storage.

Use seasonings sparingly as some of them change during storage. Pepper gets stronger. Cloves may become stronger and discolor frozen fillings.

Garlic becomes stronger during storage and onions gradually lose flavor. Green peppers, sage and pimientos increase in strength.

It is important to cool cooked foods promptly to prevent continued cooking. Foods lose flavor rapidly when held at high temperatures. And warm foods

invite bacteria growth. Submerging the cooking pan in ice water to hasten cooling. After cooling, package in moisture vapor resistant material immediately. Pack all types of cooked foods as solidly as possible to avoid air spaces in the containers.

A suggestion for enhancing the flavor of meats, poultry, seafoods, precooked foods and vegetables is to add monosodium glutamate (MSG).

Casserole dishes containing macaroni, spaghetti, noodles or rice may be frozen. To serve, bake in 350 degree oven for 40-60 minutes.

You can freeze almost any type of creamed dish except those containing hardcooked egg whites. Avoid overcooking and cool rapidly in pan of ice water. Don't store longer than two to four months.

Package prepared foods in amounts suitable for serving. You may safely refreeze frozen foods that have been thawed if they still contain ice crystals. Thawed foods spoil faster than fresh foods. Thawing and refreezing may lower the eating quality of some foods, particularly fruits, vegetables and prepared foods.

#### Bond Sales

Savings Bond sales through July 1968 in Floyd County totaled \$118,538, according to a report received from Jake Webb, Chairman of the Floyd County Savings Bonds Committee. This represents 59 per cent of the county's goal of \$200,000 for 1968.

Sales of U. S. Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares in Texas for the first seven months were \$106,830,122 - an increase of 8.9 per cent over sales during the same period of 1967. For the month of July, sales totaled \$15,862,130 - an increase of 11 per cent over July 1967.

Sales of both Series E and H Bonds and Freedom Shares throughout the country totaled \$416 Million. Total sales of \$2,966 Million for the seven month period represents 54.4 per cent of the nation's goal.

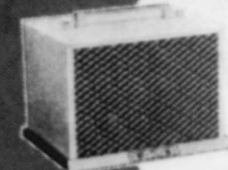

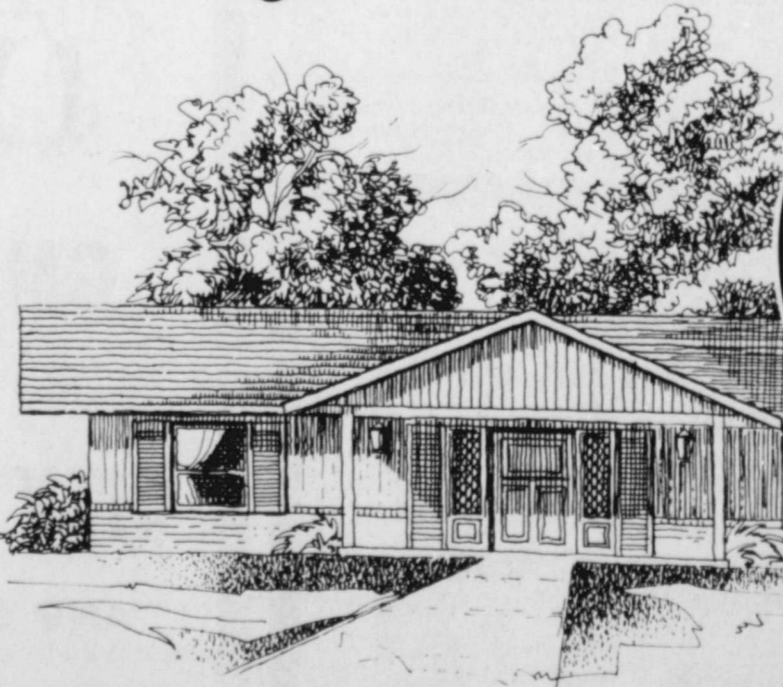

## WATER INC.

By Cliff Chamberlain  
Much water legislation is being considered. The National Water Commission, regional planning authorizations, anti-pollution bills and the like. We sometimes confuse a bill in process with being a law. A review of the legislative process may be helpful as all the legislation required to have water imported to West Texas and Eastern New Mexico will travel this route.

Here's the way it works. The feasibility study must be completed and the benefit to cost ratio must be favorable. The water import plan may be sponsored by both the Department of Interior and the U. S. Corps of Engineers. Perhaps one or both will send requests simultaneously to the Speaker of the House and the President of the Senate. Both houses may refer the measure to their public works and/or interior and insular affairs committee. The feasibility report and all comments are considered by the appropriate committees, hearings are held, and if the committee considers the project to be feasible and in the national interest, recommends its au-

The committee chairmen might then introduce identical bills on the proposal, after which hearings are normally held, and Department officials may testify. The committee may amend the bill, and if it makes a favorable report, the bill is sent to the floor of the House or Senate for debate.

A vote is then taken, and if the bill passes by a majority in the House, it is sent to the Senate, if the Senate has not yet held hearings on its bill, it considers the House proposal, but may amend it and report out a new bill.

If the House and Senate debate their own bills and pass them with any difference between the two, or if the Senate passes an amended version of the House bill, a conference committee is appointed by both Houses to resolve the difference.

After both houses approve the bill, it goes to the President for signing into law. If he doesn't sign within 10 calendar days, it automatically becomes law, unless Congress adjourns in this time. If the President vetoes the bill, it can become law only if passed a second time by a two-thirds vote of Congress.

This is only for authorization of the project. No funds for engineering designs or construction are included. A similar legislative process will be required to pass an appropriation bill which will provide funds for construction to begin. The rate of construction will depend upon the rate of funding by Congress.

were jumped by a bunch of these yippies. Then a newsman taking pictures was jumped by some more of them - and when the police went to his rescue, they jumped them, too. I saw as many as 10 yippies jumping on one policeman. They might have killed him if some of the others hadn't come to his rescue."

Wayne, a radio station owner, said he had covered racial violence in Little Rock, Ark., and New Orleans, but "I had never seen anything like this."

"It was unbelievable," he said, "I think the Chicago police and Mayor Richard Daley were unduly criticized. For one thing, it was unbelievable what some of those people were calling the police. I think the police used a lot of restraint."

"There might have been some indiscriminate hitting but that's bound to happen in a situation like that," he added. "You don't stop a mob by being polite."

"The police contained the situation before the troops came in to relieve them, so the troops did not get involved. I went downstairs to look at the situation just as the troops came in - and believe me, it looks a lot different from the street. You can't see what's going on - it's just a jungle of people."

"I saw a Jeep drive up with a young Latin-American soldier at the wheel. Some of the hippies and yippies started taunting him, asking if he had been ordered to come here. He finally shut 'em up by telling them, 'No, I volunteered - because I don't like your kind of people.'"

"I've never seen so many police in all my life," Wayne added. "And I sure was glad they were there."

there and complied with the state's legal requirements for voting.

Miss Collier said that if the voter was registered in the state of his former residence and has a voter registration certificate or other document to prove his registration, he should have the document with him when he applies at the clerk's office. Otherwise, it will be necessary for the clerk to contact the appropriate election official in the state of the voter's former residence to verify whether he would have been eligible to vote in that state if he had not changed his residence.

New residents whose applications are accepted will be notified of that fact and will return to the clerk's office between October 21 and November 1 to cast their ballots. They will not be permitted to vote on anything except Presidential and Vice President. Persons voting under this law are not required to register with the county tax assessor-collector.

Voters who will have lived in Texas more than a year on election day must be registered with the tax assessor-collector in order to vote, Miss Collier said. Persons who became residents of Texas on or before October 1, 1967, had to register by last January 31, the regular registration deadline, but those who became residents after October 1, 1967, may register at any time up to

31 days before the election. The deadline to register for the general election will be next October 5.

If a registered voter will have lived in the state more than a year and in the county more than 6 months on election day, he will vote a full ballot in the ordinary manner on election day at the polling place for the voting precinct in which he lives. If he will have lived in the county less than 6 months, he will be able to vote on statewide office and issues, including President and Vice President, but not on local offices and issues, by applying to the county clerk for a ballot during the period from October 16 through November 1.

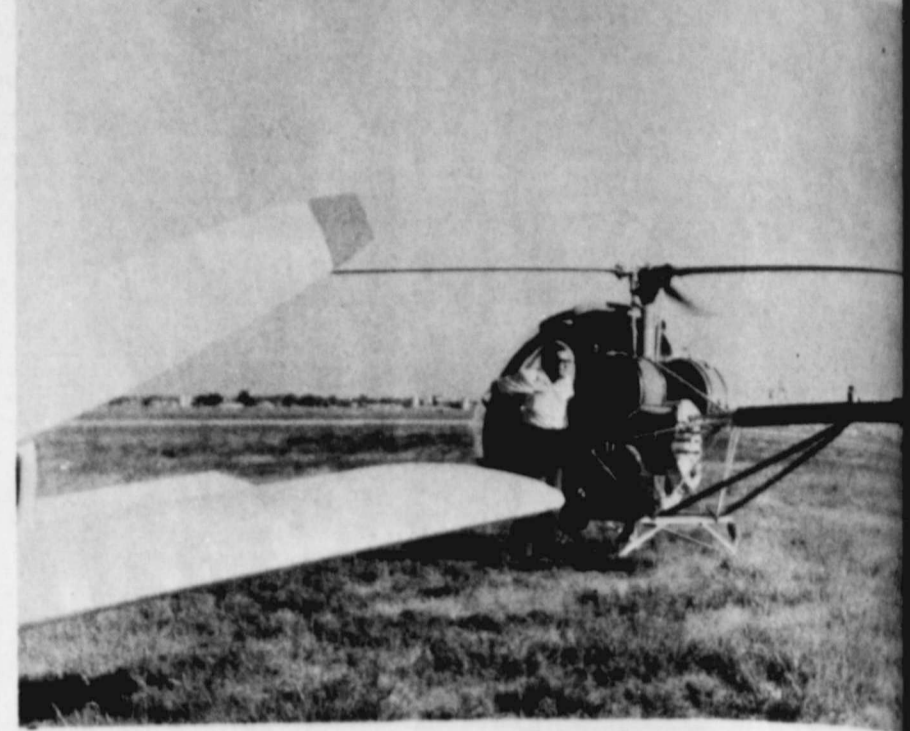

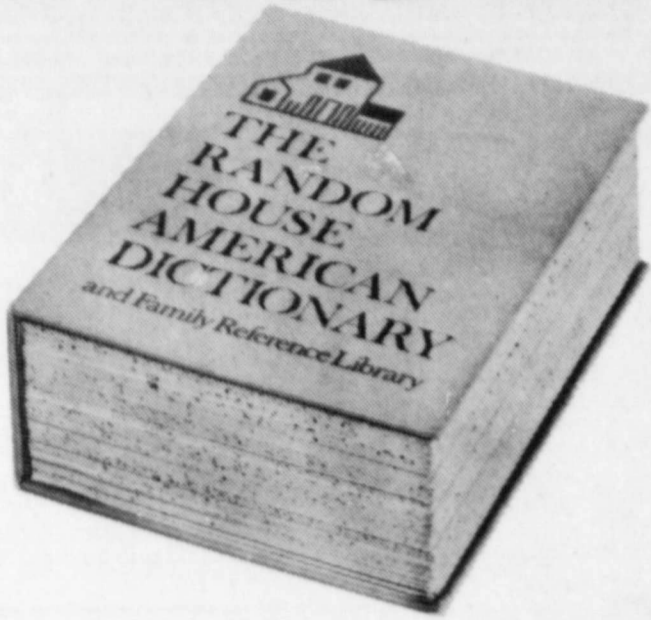

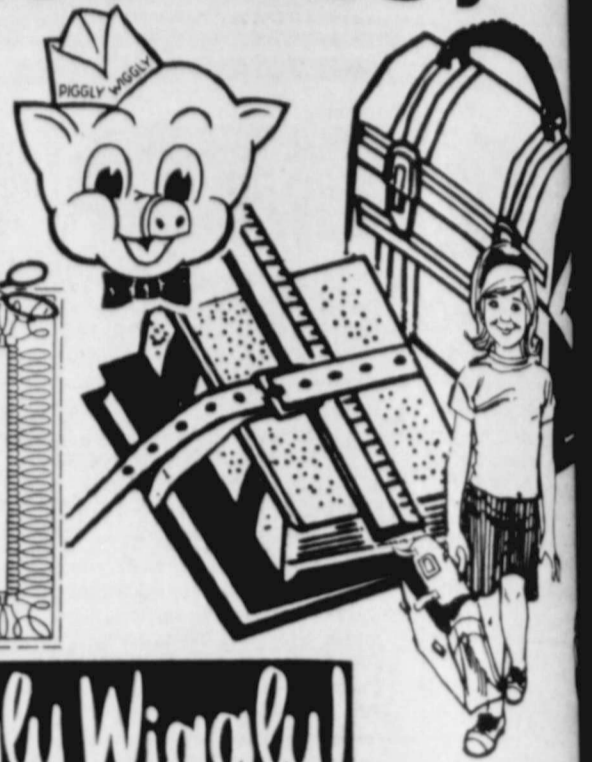
