## Caprock Chat

AM HAPPY TO report that "Silver" Whirlwind band is able to wag his tail after being hit by a car in front of Howard Gregory home last Thursday. Silver can't walk but can sit up, and has no broken bones. I'm sure all his fans wish him "well soon."

HAVEN'T SEEN the "Diary of Anne Frank" play, but I join Floydada high school drama students in your invitation to the production on either Monday or Tuesday nights. (Go if you like).

ALL YOU JUST NEVER KNOW... our farmers take a couple of years in learning how to produce "better quality" cotton now it seems that the shorter staple is what will move the market.

THIS week's PCG Cotton Review says, "selling medium to staple cotton to date this year has been like selling rain in the desert... hard. Meantime shorter staples are enjoying stronger markets."

The explanation, or at least part of it, lies in the supply. As of November 1 supplies of lengths 1-1/16" and 1-1/8" were 1.8 million bales higher than last year, while 1-1/32" and shorter were 5.1 million bales below last year. Total of all upland cotton on November 1 this year was 12.2 million bales, 22 per cent below the 15.5 million bales on November 1, 1967.

Prices of longer staples zoomed last year, mills switched to shorter staples because they were cheaper. Producers, for the same reasons switched to planting longer staple cotton. Both producers and spinners were over-stimulated by the arbitrary increase of short staple discounts in the plan schedule.

The result was inevitable. But, other things being equal, longer and longer staples over the long haul will pay off for farmers. Long range trend among mills is still toward longer-staple cottons. Think twice before you switch back."

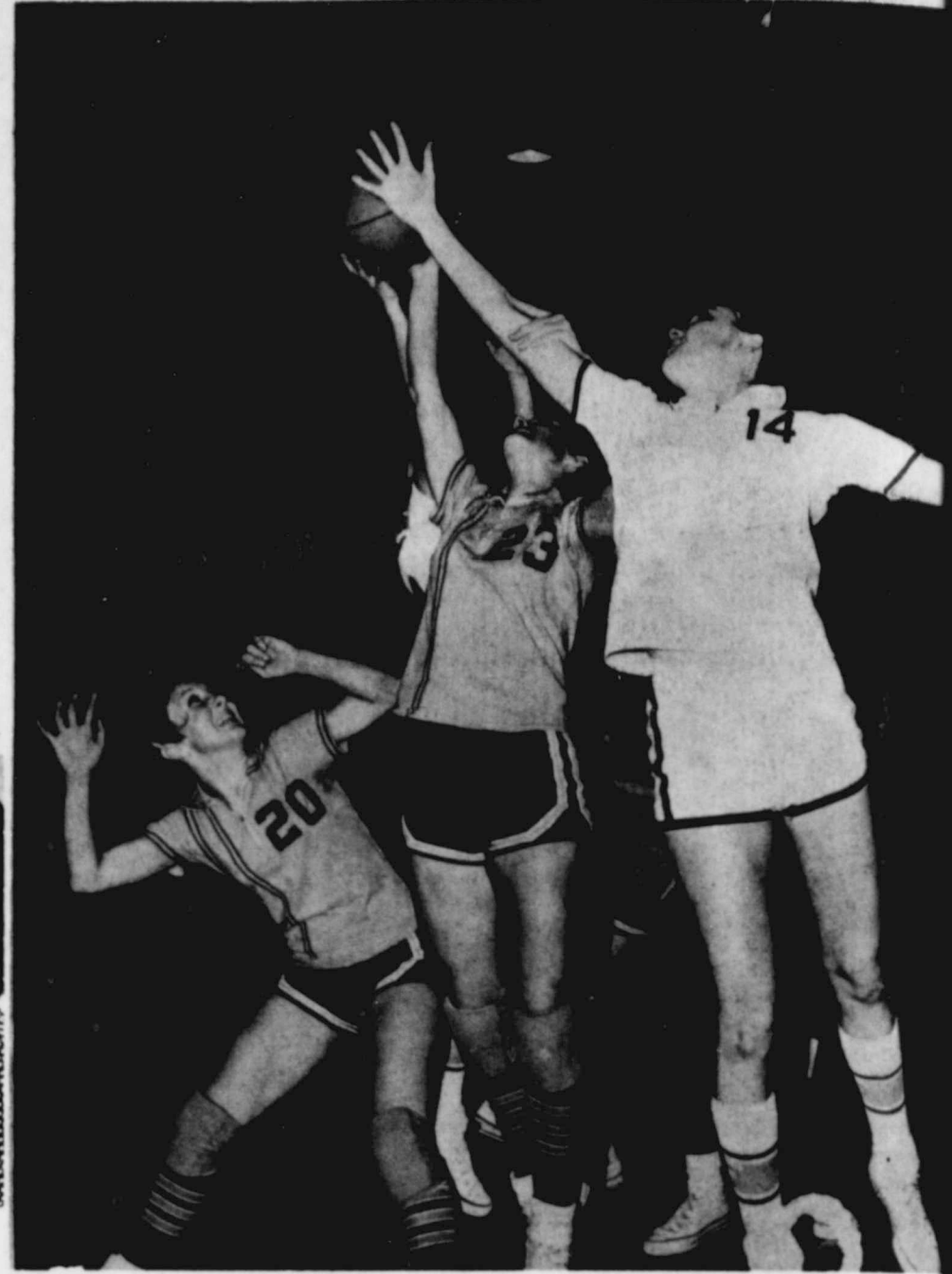

Vernon Parker, manager, Retail Sales Company, said, "The closer we get to the holiday, the fewer people are available for shoppers. The most popular items are first and often there is a rush to reorder before December 25th."

Postmaster Ed Wester asked residents to give both their own and postal employees a hand by shopping and mailing now to avoid the Christmas rush. Bench levels are now installed parallel with each other which eliminates point rows. Dr. Mattox worked with Harding College for fourteen years and served in the following capacities: Instructor in Physical Education, Social Science, Education, Psychology, and Bible; Dean of Men; Director of Admissions and Student Personnel; Dean of Students; Assistant to the President; Participant in the National Education Program, and Freedom Forum lecturer.

Dr. Mattox is Director of the Lubbock Christian College American Heritage Program, which received the George Washington Medal of Honor Award from Freedom Foundation in 1960 and 1961. He is a member of the LCC Speakers' Bureau and is a popular speaker on Americanism and the Communist threat.

**Patients Under Medicare Will Pay an Additional 10%**

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. - Wilbur J. Cohen, secretary of health, education and welfare, Thursday announced a 10 per cent increase in the amount patients will pay for hospitalization under Medicare.

The new rates will become effective Jan. 1, Cohen said in a speech here at the 76th annual meeting of the American Hospital Association.

A department spokesman gave these details:

- A patient now pays the first \$40 of his hospital bill, Medicare covering the balance through the 60th day of hospitalization. Beginning Jan. 1, the patient will pay the first \$44.
- THE PATIENT pays \$10 a day from his 61st to his 90th day of hospitalization. This increases to \$11 a day with Medicare handling the balance.
- The patient pays \$20 daily for the next 90 days. This will be raised to \$22.
- Should the patient enter nursing home a time, his rate is free.

What does this mean to you?

It means beginning January 1, 1969, Medicare will be paying a reduced percentage of your total hospital bill. In order to be sure that your Blue Cross Senior Texan Companion Service continues to provide adequate protection and because of other changes in the Medicare law, it is necessary to amend your present coverage.

This January 1, 1969, reopening is taking place solely for the purpose of enabling applications for new Senior Texan Companion Service Members for a January 1, 1969, effective date, only on those people who have already applied or have already insured.

And this reopening is taking place for the purpose of permitting any person now holding one of the other of the Senior Texan Companion Service coverages to switch to the Major Medical coverage if they have the basic and want to make the switch or to switch from the Senior Texan Major Medical coverage to the Basic if they want to make the switch.

There is one other category of people who may now enroll in the new Senior Texan Service and that is for those people who are or will be eligible by February 1, 1969, for Senior Texan Companion Service and have Regular Blue Cross-Blue Shield coverage in the F. B. group.

Those members who will attain the age of 65 by February 1, 1969, are eligible to transfer on the January 1st opening.

Please remember that to be added in our group as a new member for Senior Texan Companion Service, a member must have a current Farm Bureau membership.

**SKIP ROW RULES:** Same as in 1968. Only rows planted to cotton will be counted as cotton acreage.  
**USDA SAYS 1969 PROGRAM WILL BALANCE PRODUCTION OFFTAKE**

Total national allotment, including acreage reserve, will be 16.2 million acres. One million of that will be taken out by the Cropland Adjustment Program, Cropland Reserve, etc. Of the remainder, USDA calculates 12.7 million will be planted, 600,000 will be abandoned and 12 million will be harvested. They estimate national yield average at 520 pounds per acre, for a total crop of about 13 million bales, 480 pounds net.

Domestic mills will consume 9 million bales, they say, and the export market will take off 4 million. So all will come out even - they say.

### ALLOTMENT TRANSFERS PERMITTED TO DECEMBER 31

The transfer of cotton allotments by sale or lease is again permissible this year. May be made as soon as allotments and projected yields are established for individual farms. All forms must be signed in the ASCS office of the transferring county by December 31.

Other rules and regulations, including adjustment for projected yield differences, remain the same as before. You can get complete details from local ASCS offices or from PCG.

**BOLL WEEVIL PROGRAM COMPLETE - SUCCESSFUL**  
 Spraying in the High Plains Boll Weevil Control Program stopped on November 4. Was successful for the fifth consecutive year in keeping weevils out of vast Plains cotton acreage. Base 1968 acreage, 168,000, compares with 300,000 acres in 1964 when PCG initiated the program. Aggregate acreage sprayed in 1968 came to 616,629, compared to 300,000 in 1964.

Acreage sprayed this year would have been much smaller except for ideal insect year. Weevils, like green bugs and other insects, propagated much faster and more efficiently than before. More weevils survived the wet 1967-68 winter, too.

Some 50,000 acres were sprayed this year in Dawson, Borden and Lynn counties - where no spraying had been necessary in previous years of the program.

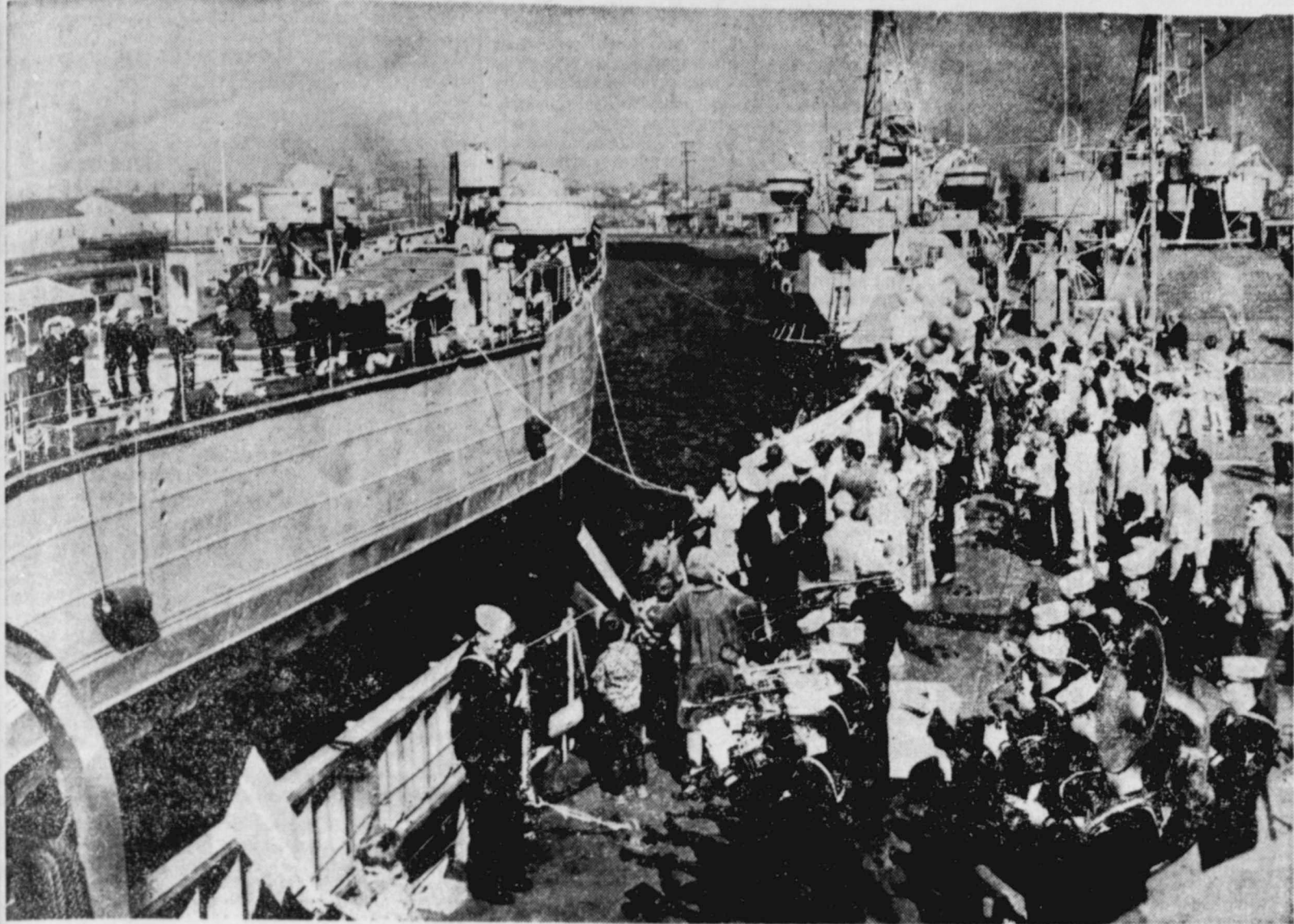
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# Heartfelt Welcome Greets Returning Floyd County

## Final Minutes Stretch As Kin Wait For Ship

Frederick Gaylord, 50, of San Diego, burped into the cover of his hand as he eyed the big bunch of gray-haired little boys in the harbor. He burped again, stuck his tongue in his mouth and fell back.

At the same time, some five miles away, Reginald Gaylord II was bringing his landing ship to the pier and her 100 men were hard-working, hazarding in Vietnam.

For the Floyd's men, it was going to be a happy, happy homecoming.

For Reginald the Third and seven other little fellows, it was going to be the meeting of some guy they'd heard about but hadn't seen—somebody called "Daddy."

**WAITING WIFE**

Standing on the deck of the Henry County, another LST the Floyd was to moor beside, a freckled and pretty Sara Reeves strained her eyes against the harbor breeze. "Why don't they

hurry!" she murmured.

It was her first time in that sorority of Navy wives who wait.

Her hands gripped the railing and she stood on tiptoes to lean farther out—to try and catch first sight.

Aboard the Floyd, now half-way down the harbor, her husband David and 99 other men eyed San Diego like the city was something with pretty legs and a miniskirt.

"Sure beats Da Nang and Saigon," smiled Lt. (j.g.) Eric Thorson, as he scanned Harbor Drive with his binoculars.

**VETERAN WAITER**

Two miles ahead standing among hundreds of welcoming signs and amidst the playing of "Green Berets" by a 16-piece Navy band, Vickse in White stood somewhat more composed than Sara Reeves. It was the sixth time she'd had to wait for her husband, Radioman 2C. Earnest.

"This is just the second time I've met him at the dock," she said. "The other times I was always too far away or working. But he made sure I'd be here to

day. He called me from Pearl Harbor and even wired me an orchid. That reminds me," she said. "I'd better go get that and put it on."

The Floyd was drawing nearer then, but still not in sight.

It had been a busy seven months of hard work for her and her crew. She had been under enemy fire several times and had a shrapnel scar to prove it.

In her trips to the war zones, she delivered over 2.5 million "C" rations, 450,000 rounds of ammunition, plus an assortment of Jeeps, weapons and other items needed by the troops ashore.

Once, to the delight of every GI in Vietnam, she delivered in one load some two million cans of beer and soda. "Mostly beer," recalled Thorson. "Enough beer to give every guy we have in Vietnam three cans. But we didn't get a drop of it."

Back at Mole Pier, the welcoming band of wives, mothers, sweethearts and others drew closer with anticipation.

## High Plains Reports On Castor Beans

This fall season begins the second year of state-supported research on castor problems at the High Plains Research Foundation and becomes a part of a "stepped-up" research program to find solutions facing today's High Plains farmers.

The initial program began in 1967 with a \$16,600 grant from the Texas State Department of Agriculture acting on recommendations of members of the Department's Castor Committee.

Members of the committee included Don Marble, South Plains farmer; Roy Davis, Plains Coop Oil Mill, Lubbock; and Dr. Wayne Domingo, Baker Castor Oil Company of Texas.

The committee, meeting with other castor growers, decided that the number one problem was volunteer castors which followed the harvested crop. And it was for a solution to this problem that the initial grant was let.

In November of 1967, Loyd Langford, associate agronomist, High Plains Research Foundation, conducted a study in castor fields before harvest and found as much as 275 pounds of viable castors on the ground.

"Another 86 pounds were knocked to the ground by the harvester and only two pounds per acre were passed through the combine," Langford said.

To combat the problem, Langford began a study of land preparation practices, more herbicide applications and new irrigation methods to reduce volunteer viability.

In the study on herbicides to kill castors, more than 24 agricultural companies were contacted for information available on effects of herbicides on volunteer castors.

These companies showed very little usable information.

on controlling castors because most herbicides are approved to kill weeds in castor crops.

Finally, Langford selected nine chemicals for use as castor control in grain sorghum and six herbicides for use in cotton.

To continue the research castor study, the Department of Agriculture, in October, announced a \$30,892 grant and expanded the research to determine more efficient irrigation and fertilizer practices to increase production.

Results of the first year's study on reduction of castor volunteers was inconclusive but favorable enough to provide a basis for extended research in use of additional herbicide rates, testing new chemicals, and detailed studies on decreasing pre-harvest losses through cultural practices, such as plant spacings, fertilizers and irrigations, to reduce the disease level.

Langford said that in the 1968 program, five plant spacings from six inches to 27 inches between plants are being studied in solid and skip-row planting practices.

He said this fall, pre-harvest loss data is being compiled from 16 castor varieties and experimental in three area locations. "Through this method, we may discover varietal strains that carry a resistance to the disease causing much of the castor volunteer problem,"

### Harold Huggins Given An Award In Proficiency

AUSTIN - An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Harold Huggins, plant operations specialist for the Floydada sewage disposal system. The citation reflects the regard in which Huggins is held by state water officials.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water Utilities Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operators who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He

must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers, but many operators seek certification on their own time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to their community and state.

The engineers said the attainment is evidence of Huggins' efforts to better prepare himself for the duties of his profession.

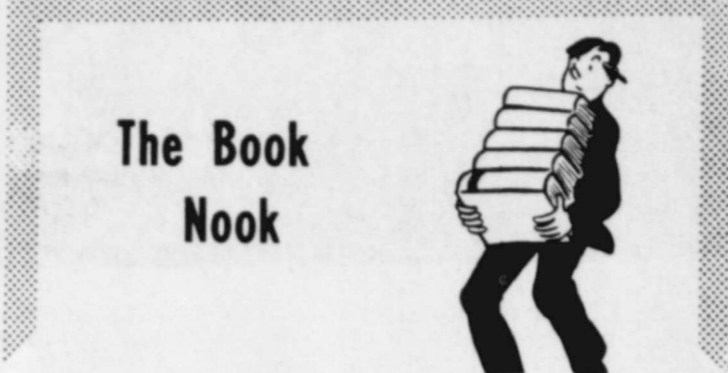

### Air Funds For Lockney Are Revealed

Lockney is one of 65 Texas towns for which the Federal Aviation Administration has recommended construction of new airport facilities within the next five years. One hundred and forty million dollars have been appropriated to assist communities with the endeavor.

Almost all the new installations recommended were for the "basic utility airports" generally for small-town use. Other towns in this area which have been recommended for financing are Olton, Silvertown, Seagraves, Seminole, Stanton and Tahoka.

Lockney applied for the airport assistance about three years ago when an airport and golf course were planned on the city farm. Little activity on the facilities has transpired in recent months.

Since the appropriation became known, however, the Chamber of Commerce is renewing its interest in the project, Irwin Boyd, chairman, John Dorman and Thomas Marr comprise this committee, according to Chamber President Tom Simpson.

A site for the airport and interest in the endeavor are necessary if Lockney is to secure this facility.

Q. I recently hired a woman to come in one day a week to clean house at \$5 a day. I thought that social security was only for regular employees; but a friend says I will have to report this part-time work. Is this correct?

A. Yes, it is. An employee in your home must be reported if the wages amount to as much as \$50 in a calendar quarter. At \$5 a week, your employee will receive wages of \$65 in a calendar quarter.
