

acre. Yields of this magnitude compete with wood as a source of paper pulp. The plant grows well on all cotton soils. At Lubbock, irrigated yields were 9,000 to 12,000 pounds of dry matter per acre and dryland yields were 3,000 to 4,000 pounds.

Economic studies snow kenaf should be worth from \$15 to \$20 per ton of oven-dry material. Production costs should be low and the farmer should get a high net return on the money invested in kenaf production. A 100-ton-per-day bleached pulp plant could utilize the production of 15,000 to 20,000 acres of land. There are about five or six companies cooperating with the ke-

naf experiments and one mill in Houston is processing the pulp. Possibly here's a new crop that would help our farmers and looking on down the road, a possibility of a pulp plant near

A DRASTIC PLAN to overcome the state's shortage of physicians will be presented to the 1969 Legislature.


Proposal will come from the Coordinating Board, which is responsible for administering public education in Texas beyond the high school level.

Their multi-pronged program would include doubling firstyear enrollments in existing state medical schools in Galveston, Dallas and San Antonio - to a minimum of 565 freshmen by 1980 - and giving tax subsidies to the Baylor University College of Medicine in Houston so that it can educate as many doctors for the state as it does privately.

Then, if the Legislature agrees, a new state medical school would be established in the Texas Medical Center in Houston. Also, Texas Tech would be authorized to start planning for a West Texas medical school, using the facilities of the Amarillo Medical Center and the expertise of Lubbock, Midland and Odessa hospital authorities.

"Should the need for the establishment of another additional medical school develop in the future," the Coordinating Board said, it will consider putting one at the University of Texas in Austin.

Meantime, all medical educators will be urged to explore possibilities for clinical and post-graduate capabilities in medical centers in El Paso, Temple and Tyler.

Defendants Not Liable In **Hinkle-Jones Trial**

The case of Holt Bishop vs Billy Hinkle and C. W. Jones was heard in District Court recently with the jury finding for the defendants. The case stemmed from an accident which claimed the life of Mrs. Holt Bishop.

Bishop's car struck two Angus calves on the night of July 21, 1967 on FM 1958. Mrs. Bishop was fatally injured when she was thrown from the vehicle.

The plaintiff alleged that defendants were negligent in the following respects: (1) that old fence posts were too far apart to maintain and keep an electric wire tight enough to turn cattle; (2) that defendants were negligent in using 14 gauge wire which was not large enough to turn cattle of the nature and disposition of cattle owned by defendants on the occasion in question; (3) that defendants were negligent in putting cattle in the pasture in question without first breaking cattle to an electric fence; (4) that defendants failed to maintain around

both pastures and two sides of the lane an adequate fence to turn cattle of roguish nature; (5) that defendants failed to have adequate wiring for gate opening

The jury in answering special issues found that Hinkle and Jones did not fail to use ordinary care to keep such fence a round pasture as would be sufficient to retain cattle there-in.



tion at 3,475,000 bales as of Dec. 1 compared with a Nov. 1 figure of 3,525,000 bales. Nationally, the USDA estimated the 1968 crop down 90,000 bales from last month's forecast.

Bracelets and ring selection also follows the one basic overall rule in choosing jewelry; keep proportion in mind.
