School Board Discusses Several Items Of Business At Meeting

The Floydada school board discussed several items of business at its regular monthly meeting Monday night. It approved a textbook committee including: A. E. Baker, W. P. Nicholson, A. W. Coltharp, C. E. Tyer, Gladys Higgins, Larry Matthews, Helen Patterson, Charles McDowell, Henry Barber, Corine Barber, Jerry Livingston, Doris McLain Lois Guffee, Bob Copeland and Ella Reue. Dr. and Mrs. John Kimble visited the board concerning high school sports banquets. It is the recommendation of athletic director Preston Watson that Floydada high school have two banquets this year instead of one. He recommends a football banquet around the middle of January and an "all sports banquet" in the spring. The all sports banquet would exclude football players unless they participate in spring sports. In the past there has been only a football banquet. Mrs. Kimble expressed the opinion that more recognition should be given all sports in Floydada high school and that only the all sports banquet was necessary. Mrs. Kimble said, "I believe that all athletes should be treated equally." The board indicated that it would follow Watson's recommendation for two banquets. The board studied a summary of the football program submitted by head football coach L. G. Wilson. The summary reported that 74 boys and three managers participated in the football program this year. The varsity record was 7-3, the Jr. Varsity record 8-1, and the freshman team record was 1-7. Wilson expressed a very optimistic view for the football program in the future. Game gate totals are as follows: Ralls \$1,662.76; Tullia \$1,726.80; Post \$1,208.25; Hale Center \$1,683.25; Lockney \$2,046.75; Lorenzo \$537.15; Friona \$1,162.50; Olton \$1,913.80; Abernathy \$753.75 and Dimmitt \$721.95.

Doctors And Sons Ride Rio Grande

By Frank O'Hagan Jr. Swirling waters, below freezing winds, and 1200 foot cliffs on each side of a flat-bottom boat doesn't seem like a very pleasant way to spend a vacation - but that was the choice of Doctors Charles Craig and Jack Jordan. When most of us were eating turkey on Thanksgiving Day, the Floydada doctors and their sons Mark Craig, age 10 and Rickey Jordan, age 11, were riding the rapids of the Rio Grande. "We traveled through Big Bend National Park in my pickup and started our 35 mile journey at Bogillas, after renting a boat, instead of a canoe," Dr. Craig said. "The canoe is much more maneuverable but it is also much easier to flip over - so we stuck with the more reliable, flat bottom boat," he added. Dr. Jack Jordan said that he'd guess the speed of the water to range from 4 to 8 m.p.h. during most of the trip. "The level of the water constantly changing as we traveled down the river was the frightening part of the trip."

"In my opinion, that's how the man from Ralls, leading a scout troop, lost his life. We were told that he lent his life jacket to a boy scout who didn't have one - then he fell out of the boat and was pulled under by the current," Jordan said. Dr. Craig said that he and his son were just ahead of Jordan and his son in their separate boats when they saw search parties hunting for the Ralls scout leader. "We didn't know at the time that anyone had drowned... the men across the river from us just shouted, 'We've lost a man,' but we didn't realize that they meant he had fallen out of a boat," Dr. Craig said. Dr. Jack Jordan said that the thing that impressed him while on the "rapids" was the absence of birds, deer, or any kind of game. "During most of the trip, all we could see was the dirty, murky water and 1200 foot high cliffs on each side of us." "We didn't think that we would have any trouble but just in case we did, I took along some survival food (a mixture of peanuts, raisins, and

 acre. Yields of this magnitude compete with wood as a source of paper pulp. The plant grows well on all cotton soils. At Lubbock, irrigated yields were 9,000 to 12,000 pounds of dry matter per acre and dryland yields were 3,000 to 4,000 pounds.

Economic studies show kenaf should be worth from \$15 to \$20 per ton of oven-dry material. Production costs should be low and the farmer should get a high net return on the money invested in kenaf production. A 100-ton-per-day bleached pulp plant could utilize the production of 15,000 to 20,000 acres of land.

There are about five or six companies cooperating with the kenaf experiments and one mill in Houston is processing the pulp.

Possibly here's a new crop that would help our farmers and looking on down the road, a possibility of a pulp plant near Floydada?

A DRASTIC PLAN to overcome the state's shortage of physicians will be presented to the 1969 Legislature.

Proposal will come from the Coordinating Board, which is responsible for administering public education in Texas beyond the high school level.

Their multi-pronged program would include doubling first-year enrollments in existing state medical schools in Galveston, Dallas and San Antonio - to a minimum of 565 freshmen by 1980 - and giving tax subsidies to the Baylor University College of Medicine in Houston so that it can educate as many doctors for the state as it does privately.

Then, if the Legislature agrees, a new state medical school would be established in the Texas Medical Center in Houston. Also, Texas Tech would be authorized to start planning for a West Texas medical school, using the facilities of the Amarillo Medical Center and the expertise of Lubbock, Midland and Odessa hospital authorities.

"Should the need for the establishment of another additional medical school develop in the future," the Coordinating Board said, it will consider putting one at the University of Texas in Austin.

Meantime, all medical educators will be urged to explore possibilities for clinical and post-graduate capabilities in medical centers in El Paso, Temple and Tyler.

Defendants Not Liable In Hinkle-Jones Trial

The case of Holt Bishop vs Billy Hinkle and C. W. Jones was heard in District Court recently with the jury finding for the defendants. The case stemmed from an accident which claimed the life of Mrs. Holt Bishop.

Bishop's car struck two Angus calves on the night of July 21, 1967 on FM 1958. Mrs. Bishop was fatally injured when she was thrown from the vehicle.

The plaintiff alleged that defendants were negligent in the following respects: (1) that old fence posts were too far apart to maintain and keep an electric wire tight enough to turn cattle; (2) that defendants were negligent in using 14 gauge wire which was not large enough to turn cattle of the nature and disposition of cattle owned by defendants on the occasion in question; (3) that defendants were negligent in putting cattle in the pasture in question without first breaking cattle to an electric fence; (4) that defendants failed to maintain around

The Floydada Angel B team had no trouble in beating Plainview 17-8.

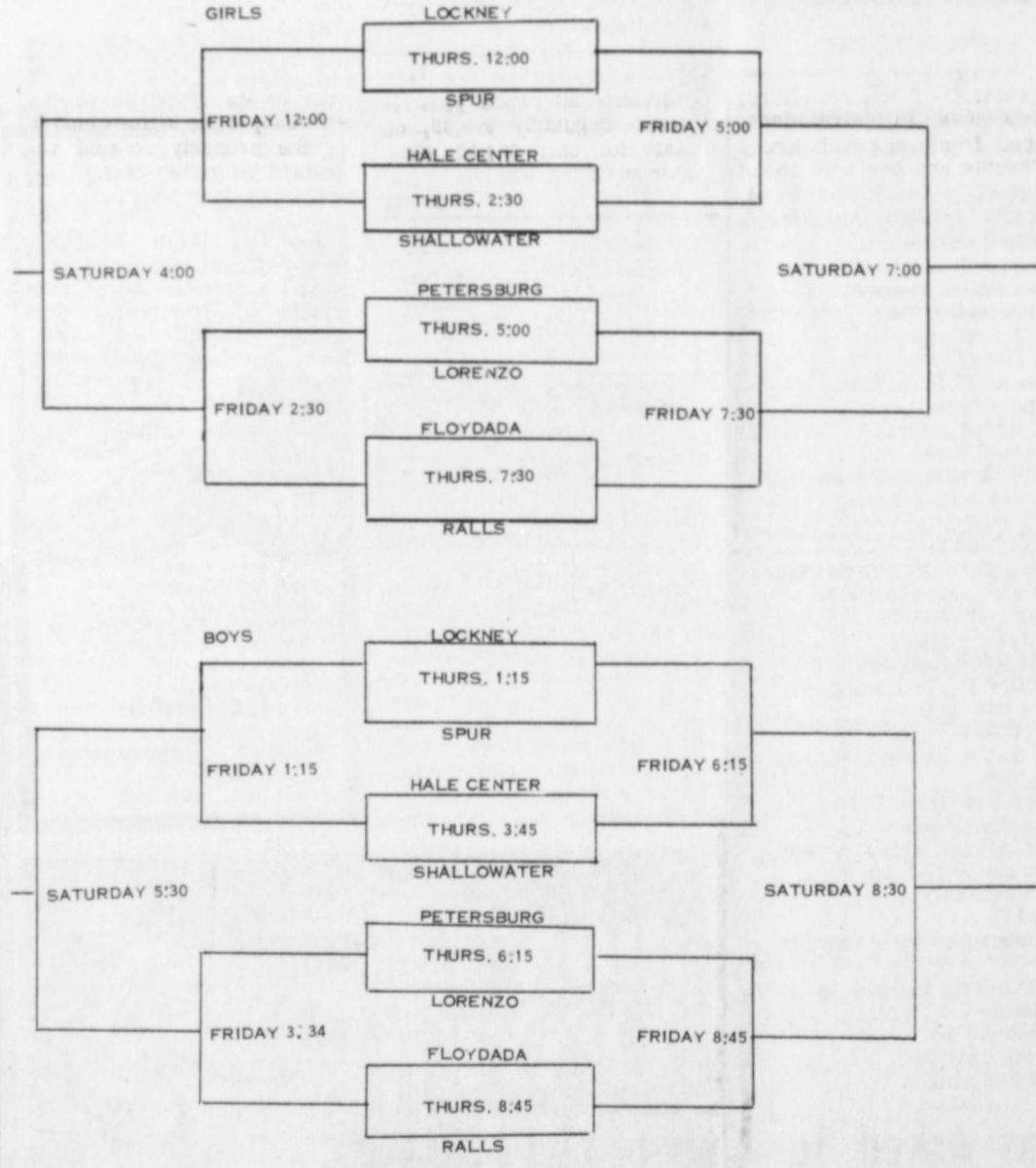
