# City Sales Tax Opponents Tell Why They Are Against Tax

## Sales Tax Election February 18

Several Floydada merchants have voiced an opposition to the city sales tax, and a spokesman for the group lists several reasons why the group opposes the tax. The city sales tax election is scheduled for Tuesday, February 18.

David Kirk, spokesman for the group said that around 100 Floydada merchants were against the sales tax in Floydada for the following reasons:

1. "We depend upon so many shoppers from outlying communities that have no sales tax, especially below the caprock, who might shop elsewhere should the one cent sales tax be voted in at Floydada.
2. Competing stores can be opened, or present outlying community stores can be expanded to take care of shoppers who do not want to pay a Floydada sales tax.
3. If there is no sales tax in Floydada, this gives our merchants a very much needed advantage in selling their merchandise over neighboring cities of Lubbock, Plainview and Lockney.
4. We believe that the property owner will continue to pay most of the tax load, because the tax plan eliminates tax on

such items of purchase as groceries, rent, hospital bills, prescription medicine, doctor bills, gasoline, autos on the city level, utility bills, labor of any kind, dry cleaning and laundry, amusement, transportation, insurance, loans of any kind, farm implements, freight, parcel post, postage.

5. Transients just don't buy much of the merchandise that will be taxed on a city sales tax.
6. It is a tax without due representation. The residents outside the city limits must pay it, yet he does not have the privilege of voting in the election.
7. Once a tax is enacted, does it ever come off of the people? Does a tax not usually go up, once enacted?

Kirk said that he felt most everyone would agree that the city of Floydada needs a new fire truck and some improvement money. He suggests that the city put a \$1.00 per month surtax on each water meter for a period of two years. This would bring in around \$35,000.00. It is estimated that a fire truck would cost \$25,000. A three year meter surtax would give the city \$52,200.

## Lions Rate Floydada

Lion Jim Word presented questionnaire sheets to members of the Floydada Lion's Club here, Thursday, to survey their opinions of Floydada.

Members of the Lions Club rated Floydada in the categories of services, offered, facilities available and prospective opportunities.

The survey indicated that this cross section of Floydada citizens regard the community as adequate in neatness of residential property, appearance of downtown, police protection and county law enforcement.

However, they feel that recreational and cultural activities, job opportunities fall short of what should be expected of a town this size.

As far as the school system

is concerned in the Lion survey, the quality of instruction and school facilities are good but the pay should be higher.

The members of the club ranked hospital facilities as good with only one vote of criticism and seemed to be satisfied with local taxes.

The Lions were pleased with the appearance of downtown, service in local stores, stock in local stores, attitude of businessmen, eating facilities, street maintenance, garbage collection, water supply and fire protection.

They felt that improvements should be made concerning labor available, opportunity for young people, local wage scale, pay for firemen and policemen and cultural activities.

## 4,313 Voters Register In '69

A total of 4,313 Floyd County residents registered to vote this year. The deadline for voter registration was January 31.

C.J. Payne, director of the county tax office, said the number of registered voters falls short of last year's count of 4,820.

Payne said that the number of voters is "average" for a general election year and last years count was high because of the presidential election.

## Whitley Rites Set For Today

Funeral rites will be conducted this afternoon (Thursday) at 2 o'clock in the Calvary Baptist Church for Thomas J. Whitley, 84, who died Tuesday night in Caprock Hospital. Whitley sustained a broken hip Jan. 28 at his home and underwent surgery the following morning in Lubbock Methodist Hospital. Hewas transferred by Moore-Rose ambulance to Caprock Hospital about 5:30 Tuesday afternoon and succumbed several hours later.

Whitley was born April 24, 1884 and was married December 18, 1908 in Comanche, Tex., to Mary Magdelene Buchanan. The family moved to Floyd County in December of 1933 from Shamrock. Whitley was a longtime farmer in this area before retiring, at which time he and his wife moved into Floydada.

He was a member of the Calvary Baptist Church. Whitley was preceded in death by three children, Jack in 1922, Buck in 1943 and Mrs. J. R. (Vileta) Young, who died two weeks ago last Sunday in Missouri.

Survivors include his wife, one daughter, Mrs. Mildred Franks, Floydada; two sons, T. M. Whitley, Floydada and

Clifford Whitley of Clovis; 15 grandchildren and 34 great grandchildren. Hollis Payne, pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church, will officiate for the rites. Interment will be in Floydada Cemetery under the direction of Moore-Rose Funeral Home.

Registration began at the office of the assessor-collector. Registration period opened Saturday but courthouse normally Saturdays and Sun-effective beginning Monday.

Unlike the current plates, the new license plates carry no slogans-only the registration number, the name "Texas" and the year 1969. The white background has a special reflecting paint.

Fees for the new license plates are unchanged from 1968. The schedule for passenger cars is up to 3,500 pounds, \$12.30; 3,501 to 4,500 pounds, \$22.30 and 4,501 to 6,000 pounds

\$30.30. Fee for motorcycles and motorscooters is \$5.30.

Vehicle owners, on applying for new license plates should have with them the certificates of title to their vehicles, the 1969 registration receipt and the registration fee, preferably in cash.

Also this year, registrants are required to give their actual street addresses rather than post office box numbers and their Zip Code numbers.

For the 1969 registration year, Floyd County has been assigned a total of 8,365 license plates.

5,115 license plates for passenger cars, 1500 for commercial trucks and 1,750 for farm vehicles.

### NEWS FOR HOMEMAKERS

**A LOOK AT TRICOT BONDED FABRICS**

The "pros" and "cons" of tricot bonded fabrics are of concern to consumers.

"No linings and easier construction" are echoes of manufacturers of this fabric. Yet consumers want to know if it will serve the purpose for which they purchase it.

Some important facts are learned from research and observation of fabrics on the local market. The greatest majority of these fabrics are wool flannel or mohair cotton, and synthetic knit bonded with acetate tricot. Other implications from research are:

With bonded fabrics, because of the chemicals in the bonding, some stains cannot be removed.

The acetate tricot has much poorer strength and abrasion resistance qualities than the wool, and will probably wear out much quicker than the wool flannel.

A regular woven fabric, as a lining, is used to eliminate this give and prevent sagging. The tricot, being a knit, will give and allow the wool to stretch.

Acetate is a heat-sensitive fiber and cannot be pressed at the steam setting on the iron, which is used for wool.

The backing does give more body to sheer fabrics and would be quite good on these such as knit mohair to prevent sagging.

Acetate has poor colorfastnesses and it should be observed whether change of color in this backing will affect the outward appearance of the garment. The wool will hold its color well.

Acetate could not be washed without damage, therefore, it would be a poor choice to select

it bonded to a washable fabric. The bonded fabrics are easy to handle and would be especially good for an experienced person.

There is a problem of bulkiness at corners and where seams are joined over seams. Ordinarily, an underlining could be cut out at the corners, but this is not possible with this fabric.

Difficulty arises in getting a flat seam, crisp edge, and pointed corners, so the design of the garment should not call for this. The same situation exists with stretch.

Bonded fabrics are being improved constantly, but the homemaker needs to consider the above criticisms when making fabric and pattern selections.



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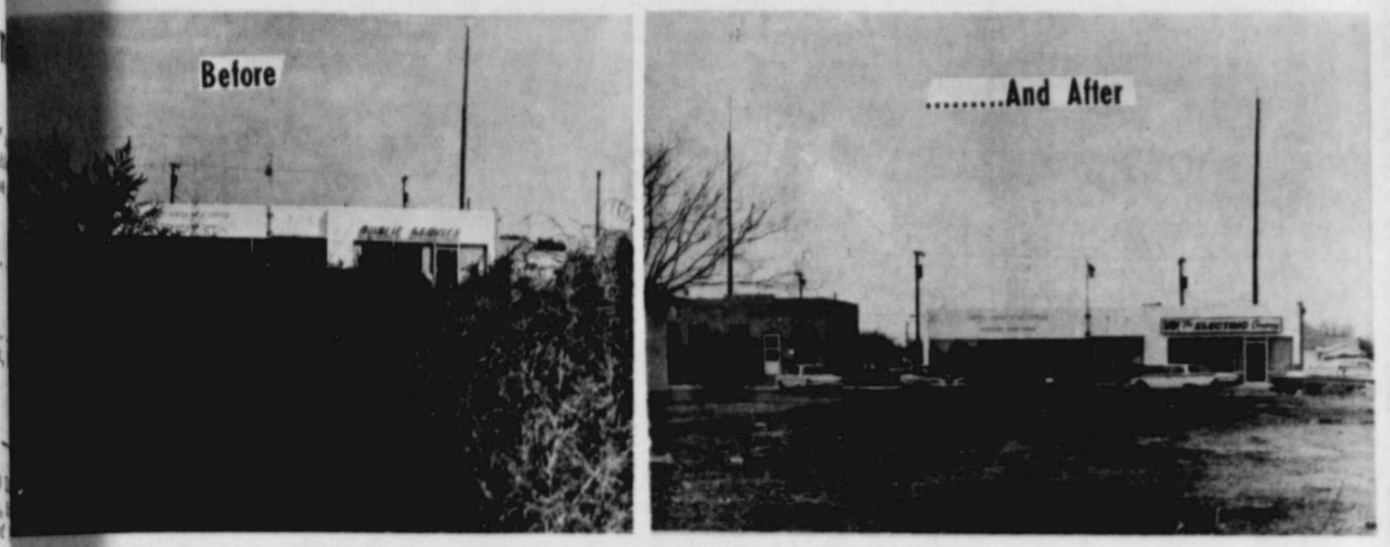

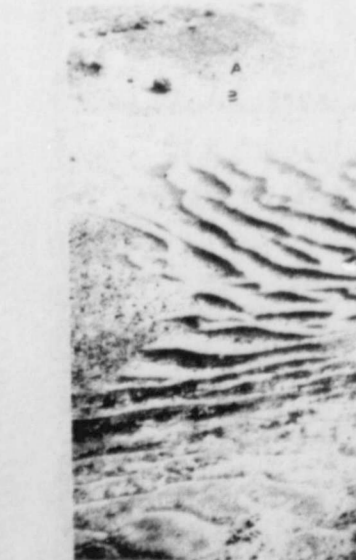

LT. GOVERNOR  
PREDICTS SCHOOL  
CONSOLIDATION  
DEFEAT

AUSTIN - Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes predicted defeat of the proposed compulsory consolidation of school districts in Texas.

"The Governor's Committee on Public School Education has made many constructive recommendations. I feel that the Texas Senate will pass many of them," Barnes said in a statement released this week.

"However, I feel that the Texas Senate will not pass compulsory consolidation," the new lieutenant governor said. Barnes added that the recommendation to consolidate school districts with less than 2,600 students will probably fall on deaf ears.

"The Texas Senate and this Legislature will probably write an attractive financial incentive program to encourage voluntary consolidation but will not adopt laws making consolidation compulsory in Texas this year," Barnes said.

Compulsory consolidation and other recommendations of the Governor's Committee on Public School Education are included in Senate Bill No. 2 which was introduced last week by Senator A.R. Schwartz of Galveston and Senator Oscar Mauzy of Dallas. The bill has been referred to the Senate Education Committee.

They invested in 500,000 acres of rice paddies. Workers were imported, roads built, ground leveled and two years later their investment lay in ruins.

Writing off their cash losses, the Hollywood Pioneers went home - all except Art Linkletter, who 10 years later turned the loss into a productive sheep ranch.

"The Dizzy Dean Story," by Milton J. Shapiro. . . In the long history of baseball, no player ever had more color or excitement than Dizzy Dean, spectacular pitcher for the St. Louis Cardinals.

Shapiro tells the story of Dean's career from the pennant winning years until injuries forced him out of the game of baseball. Dean retired as a 30 game season winner and was elected into the Hall of Fame to remain as one of the all time greats in the game.

### Students Study Government Without Standard Text

Two sections of students studying Advanced Social Science problems at Floydada High School will move into their second year of studying from the unique "living textbook."

The living textbook refers to the student weekly newspaper on current events - edited by the New York Times Publishing Co.

Mrs. L. H. Christensen, teacher of the advanced class, says that the course involves the study of public issues in daily news that will be the history of tomorrow.

"This is a relatively new method of teaching. In fact, Floydada High School is the only high school on the South Plains presently using the system," Mrs. Christensen said.

"The topics of class discussion will change as the day to day events are altered in the news," she continued.

"Recently we have been studying some of the problems that

are facing Richard Nixon and the new Republican Administration.

"I've found that students are extremely interested in the course. They are given a chance to express their ideals and argue their points of view based on fact," says Mrs. Christensen.

Students use not only the survey weekly New York Times newspaper. Instead, they use all available sources of mass communication.

Radio, T.V., news magazines and newspapers furnish an overall view of national and international news by giving students varied opinions and new facts, she said.

Students present written and oral reports for panel discussion that focus on the ever-changing policies of the day to provide a stimulating course, Mrs. Christensen said.

"I find that using periodicals rather than the standard text is much more interesting and I plan to continue the study of government through periodicals," Mrs. Christensen said.

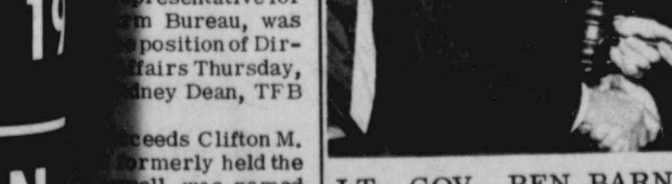

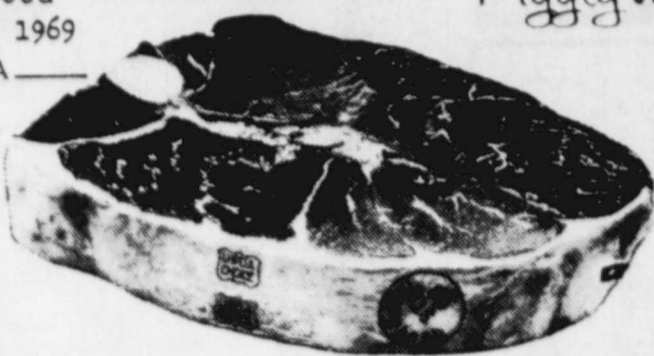

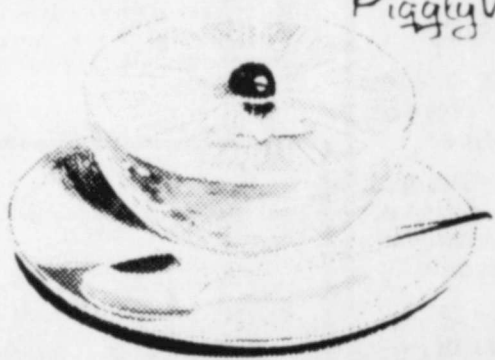
