Lamb County Farmers Organize **To Fight Irrigation Control**

Operation Duck

LITTLEFIELD, Dec. 2-In a county wide meeting at Amherst last week, irrigation farmers of Lamb County followed a pattern set by other neighboring counties in forming an organization to block threatened legislation for the control of irrigation water on the high plains. Approximately 75 farmers, most of them well-owners, set up an organization to be known as the Lamb County Water Conservation Board.

Gus Parrish of Spring Lake was named chairman of the organization, and Tommy McFarland of Littefield was named secretary-treasurer. Directors will be appointed.

Membership dues were set at \$2. Approximately 40 members were signed up at the meeting. Farmers of the irrigated districts of the South Plains are organizing to fight pro-ration of irrigation water.

There has been some discussion already in legislative circles of measures to regulate and control the use of underg:ound water supplies in irrigation areas, and many are predicting that such legislation will be introduced at the next session







5:18-21 THE notion that the early Christian church was composed of pure and perfect Christians is one that is soon dispelled when one reads in the New Testament the epistles that were written to the churches not only by Paul, but also by Peter, James, and John. When one considers how un-
