#### Postmaster Warns Of Offensive Mail

In the past week or ten days Floydada mail patrons have been receiving unsolicited first class advertising from a firm in California that is very offensive or "erotically arousing and sexually provocative." Unless you want this in your home or business, steps should be taken to stop it.

You may write the company and ask that your named be removed, (this sentence is on all the material in very fine print), or you may bring all contents and the mailing envelope to the Post Office marked, "Request for prohibitory order," and sign the envelope.

You will then sign one form at the Post Office and this will remove your name from their mailing list. Postmaster Edward Wester said, unless you take one of these steps that within 30 days you may be on other such mailing lists. "The great bulk of this advertising comes from fewer than 20 socalled 'smut dealers' who are frequently swapping mailing lists," So he insists that this material not be kept or thrown away unless you desire to remain on such mailing lists.

Thomas Warren was elected vice president and Howard Gregory secretary.

Stansell opened the meeting, then after new board members Flo Davis and Elmer Biggs were sworn in, retired with Ralph Johnston from the board and the meeting.

Mrs. Davis is the first woman to serve on the board since Mrs. Alton Chapman served in the middle 1950's.

Johnston has served on the school board for 14 years, Stansell served nine years. Board members Louis Pyle and Howard Gregory canvassed






