## Seventeen Students Represent FHS At Regional Contests

### New Industry Signs Lease Contract

Representative for the Louisiana Strawberry Company, Kenneth Fox, signed a lease agreement for the use of the bowling alley building in Floydada when he was here last week. The company will use the building to pack cucumbers and peppers beginning in June.

the Floydada Development Company and have agreed to remodel the building according to an agreement with Louisiana Strawberry.

Louisiana Strawberry will not only pack vegetables grown locally, but will handle vegetables from many area Plains towns.

Willson said that work will begin very soon on the bowling alley building in order to have it ready by the first of June. A loading dock will be built to accommodate four trucks unloading at a time, a warehouse at the rear of the building will be built for the washing equipment, and a building for box storage will be added on the north side of the present building.

New offices and other remodeling will be done on the inside of the building.

Louisiana Strawberry has packed vegetables in Floydada the past two summers, but on a limited basis through two different buildings that had not proved satisfactory to the company.

It is thought that the company will employ approximately 400 people in the packing building and in the fields from June until frost each year.

### Postmaster Warns Of Offensive Mail

In the past week or ten days Floydada mail patrons have been receiving unsolicited first class advertising from a firm in California that is very offensive or "erotically arousing and sexually provocative." Unless you want this in your home or business, steps should be taken to stop it.

You may write the company and ask that your name be removed, (this sentence is on all the material in very fine print), or you may bring all contents and the mailing envelope to the Post Office marked, "Request for prohibitory order," and sign the envelope.

You will then sign one form at the Post Office and this will remove your name from their mailing list. Postmaster Edward Wester said, unless you take one of these steps that within 30 days you may be on other such mailing lists. "The great bulk of this advertising comes from fewer than 20 so-called 'smut dealers' who are frequently swapping mailing lists." So he insists that this material not be kept or thrown away unless you desire to remain on such mailing lists.

Postmaster Wester said: "This new law should give some protection to American families offended by advertising." SEE MAIL PAGE 7

Floydada will be thoroughly represented in regional competition this weekend in Lubbock with seventeen students traveling to the "Hub City" for golf, track, tennis and literary competition.

Whirlwind golfers Deryl Evans, Gregg Campbell, Andy Hale, Steve Craig and Kent Hale will begin their regional competition at 8:30 a.m. Friday at the Meadowbrook Golf Course.

The golfers came in second behind Friona in an Amarillo tournament to win a place in the Lubbock tourney.

In the track and field events, Dale Baker, Steve Puckett, Mike Burk, Andy Selman, Stan Pierce and Jim Crawford will be entered in the regional competition.

Baker will be throwing the shot put and discus for the whirlwind track team after winning first place in each of the events in the district track meet in Friona.

In the district meet, Baker threw the shot 50' 10" and the discus 143' 7 1/2" to take top honors in the events.

Steve Puckett will be entered in the broad jump at the track meet after winning first

place in the district meet with a jump of 21' 3 1/2".

Mike Burk will be competing in the 880 yard dash. He won first place at the district meet with a time of 2:05.9.

The mile relay team will be spotlighted at the regional event. Running in the mile relay will be Andy Selman, Steve Puckett, Mike Burk, and Stan Pierce with Jim Crawford acting as alternate for the team.

Unless we take a firm stand against these anarchists, many of them are not even students, but professional troublemakers. We see an end to the university and the birth of fascism."

Newell Burk was elected president of the Floydada school board at the regular monthly meeting Monday night. He succeeds Jack Stansell, who did not seek re-election to the board this year.

Thomas Warren was elected vice president and Howard Gregory secretary. Stansell opened the meeting, then after new board members Flo Davis and Elmer Biggs were sworn in, retired with Ralph Johnston from the board and the meeting.

Mrs. Davis is the first woman to serve on the board since Mrs. Alton Chapman served in the middle 1950's. Johnston has served on the school board for 14 years, Stansell served nine years.

Board members Louis Pyle and Howard Gregory canvassed the election returns and declared them correct.

Mrs. Lorin Leibfried reported that the current school taxes were 97% collected.

The board approved employment of Mrs. Keith Buhman, Mrs. L. G. Wilson, Mrs. Claude Estes and Mrs. Jimmy Seay as aids in the Migrant school program to finish the present school term.

Superintendent A. E. Baker said that the Headstart program would not be used in the school system this year, as another government program would be used that would require less local money.

The board approved the employment of Charles Christian to teach physical science or physical education next year. He has three years experience in Amarillo schools, is married, and a former Floydada football player. He was graduated here in 1962, was graduated from West Texas State University in 1966. He is the

Maverick is low in price, roomier and more convenient than major foreign competitors, and it has distinctive flair and sportiness.

Debut day for Maverick at Ford dealerships throughout the United States is April 17, the fifth anniversary of Mustang, which set a new trend in American automotive design and concepts.

At a suggested retail price of \$1,995, Maverick is designed to expand Ford's share of the American small car market, and recapture part of that market that is being lost to foreign cars.

"We think the American auto industry should start doing a better job of meeting the foreign challenge and we are becoming a 'maverick' to do it," said John Naughton, Ford Motor Company vice president and Ford Division general manager.

"With the steady increase in the import segment of the American small car market (from five per cent in 1962 to 11 per cent in 1968), we knew that we had to introduce a suitable competitor. We studied the market, interviewed thousands of domestic and imported small car buyers and determined what the 'personality' of the new car should be," Mr. Naughton said.

The small car market is comprised of people who seek an automobile with a low initial purchase price, one that provides economy of operation, reliability and durability. The new Maverick, whose overall size places it between the economy imports and the domestic compacts is designed to provide these features without compromising in comfort, convenience and design.

Maverick will attract many within its market segment, from young adults to high in-

come multi-car owners. It should appeal as a first car to young people and as a second car to families.

Mr. Naughton said that Ford's Maverick is "a car that - by definition - is going to go its own way, stand apart, be independent."

"It's going to be economical to buy and operate; of quality workmanship with millions of miles of use and testing under its roof; built with the help of the latest in computer technology; large enough for the American family, lively enough in appearance and performance for the swinger.

"We believe it is the greatest automotive value ever offered in terms of price, upkeep and features included at no extra cost," he said.

The Maverick is a sporty-looking four-seater family car, of two-door design with a modified fastback roof and suggestion of a "ducktail" at the rear.

Although 19 inches longer than its principal foreign competitor, (and nine inches wider) Maverick turns in a tighter circle. It is five inches lower than the import, with almost twice the trunk space.

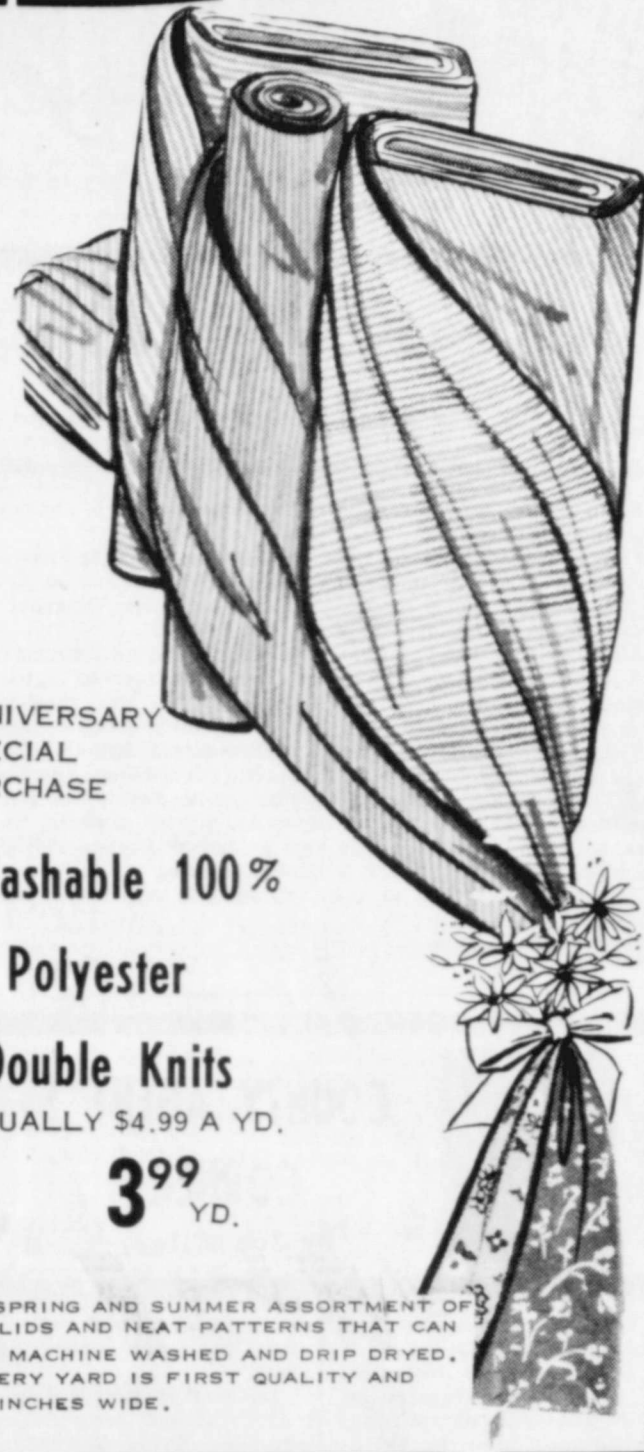

**Highway Patrol Investigates Eleven Accidents**

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 11 accidents on rural highways in Floyd County during the month of March, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed, four persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$13,750.00. The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first three months of 1969 shows a total of 22 accidents resulting in one person killed, eight persons injured,

and an estimated property damage of \$19,500.00. The final entry in the 1968 Texas traffic records has been entered and closed. An all-time record of 3,481 persons killed, 216,972 persons injured, and an estimated property loss of \$836,802,000.00 was sustained. Since the death county of 2,254 in 1960, Texas has gained steadily each year. The Sergeant stated, "If the number of deaths continue to increase as they have since 1960 by 1975 they will have increased 100 per cent."

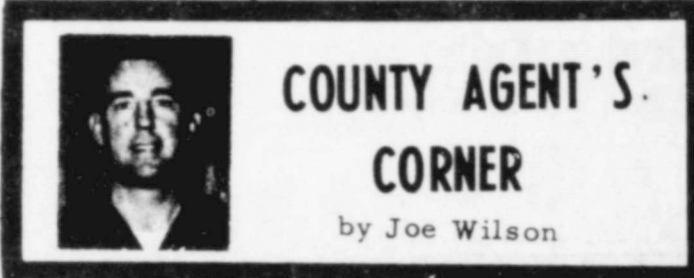

**COUNTY AGENT'S CORNER** by Joe Wilson

There will be a dutch breakfast held Tuesday, April 22 at 7 a.m. at Rogers Restaurant in Floydada to organize the Floyd County Brush and Range Improvement Association.

The association is a statewide organization headquartered at Abilene for collecting funds for research and education on Brush Control and Range Improvement. It is the association's goal to collect \$.01 per acre from producers, for five years for this extensive project. Donations will also be accepted from businesses, foundations, city, state or federal governing bodies. The money collected will be made available to universities, individuals, companies or foundations for projects approved by the evaluation committee of the association. These projects will have a new approach toward brush and weed control and grassland improvement. This research can be chemical, mechanical, fire or environmental or any other approach that has merit.

All donations to the Association are tax deductible and none of the money collected will go to pay salaries, personal compensation for work done or any way other than that mentioned above.

**ASCS NEWSLETTER**

**CERTIFICATION:** This is a reminder that farmer certification will be used again this year. Under this method, you are responsible for informing the county office about your wheat, feed grain, cotton, and diverted acres.

You will be expected to report the actual acreages. Certification is not a guessing game, and there may be monetary penalties for overstatements of acreages as well as for understatements. Do not certify a land use acreage until you are certain the acreage is final (no further acreage adjustments to be made and no more of the crop to be planted).

**WHEAT AND BARLEY:** Report your acreage of wheat and barley for harvest by May 1, 1969. Producers who have allotments but no wheat seeded, must also file an acreage report.

**COTTON:** A reminder - do not overplant your cotton allotment unless you are willing to pay a marketing quota penalty.

**ACP:** Money is still available for carrying out conservation practices. Why not carry out a summer cover crop practice?

The local meeting is for educational and organizational purposes. An individual will not be expected to donate just because he attends the meeting. All contributions will be accepted on a voluntary basis. Land will not be taxed or money will not be collected from producers or businessmen from any other way.
