





Notice is here given as re-quired by Section 4 of the Water quired by Section 4 of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 (Article 7542a, Vernon's Civil Statutes) that all claims of ri-parian water rights, all claims under Article 7500a, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, to impound, divert or use public waters for other than domestic and livestock purposes for which and livestock purposes for which no permit has been issued, all claims of water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1913, as amended, and all other claims of water rights other than claims under permits and certi-114 W. California after leavfied filings, must be recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Section 4 does not apply to use of water for do mestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Commission Rules.

On or before September 1 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Comnission a sworn statement set ting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the worn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.

If you wonder how it came about that President Eisenhower was a native of Denison, Texas, whereas all his boyhood loyalties trace back to Abilene, Kansas, the explanation is a simple

That is what J. B. Jenkins told me in casual talks about the Eisenhower family back when Dwight David was chosen presi-

I may not be quoting Mr. Jenkins word for word but this is the way he told it:

"The Eisenhowers, like a good many other families, mine included, were 'running from the drouth,' " Mr. Jenkins said. "When a drouth hit in those days it began to dry up jobs and a man with family responsibilities had a problem. The

fered a job at Denison in Texas if he was willing to move to it. "While they were there the future president was born. In the course of a few years, possibly before the general could remember, I don't know about that for sure, things got better in Kansas and they moved back.

general's father worked for the Katy Railroad and he was of-

"It was much the same way with our family, only we were not railroad people and we landed in Ladonia, I was a considerable size boy. We got involved in Texas affairs and remained

Mr. Jenkins was of the impression that Mr. Eisenhower, the president's father, worked in the Katy shops at Denison although he couldn't state this as a fact. But he was sure the Eisenhowers made no bones about why they came to Texas. They were looking for work. Anybody who lived in the southwest in the eighties and nineties had experience like

Mr. Jenkins' career was as a cowboy with the JA's, the F's and Criswell Land and Cattle Co., and later as a cattleman. While Mr. Jenkins has passed on to his reward and is not here to defend himself against being misquoted, I am pretty sure I have recounted the events in the Eisenhower family life about the way he told it.

The State of Texas House of Representatives Austin, Texas April 16, 1969

With the 61st Legislature going into its final two months, I

thought I might report to you on a few items. Our Texas Water Plan continues to make progress. The Senate this past week passed H.J.R. No. 9 which authorizes three and one-half billion dollars in water bonds to finance the state's share of the proposed ten billion dollar water development program. This would extend over the next fifty years and is designed to bring water from the Mississippi River and East Texas to West Texas. The water would be conveyed through a large canal and by pipeline. The measure was finally approved last week and should be voted on by the people of Texas August

Governor Smith's tax proposals, including taxes on cigarettes, tobacco products, sales tax on alcoholic beverages, increased fines on traffic violations, and a .5% tax on the chemical industry are running into considerable opposition. As you know, under our constitution, tax bills must originate in the House and no one is sure yet as to what tax plan House Speaker Gus Mutscher will propose. Whatever his choice, it will not be an easy

We have several interesting legislative proposals facing us at this time. Among them are proposed laws that would crack down on obscene movies and remove outdated language from our present constitution. One of the items to be removed would take away the Governor's power to call out the state militia to protect the "frontier from hostile Indians." On the lighter side, Senator Red Berry of San Antonio has won committee approval by a five to three vote to divide Texas into two states - north Texas and south Texas. However, it is not too likely his constitutional amendment will pass either house. He would draw a line from Beaumont to El Paso and thereby divide the state. Interesting, but not too practical.

Incidentally, you might be interested in the results of a recent poll we conducted statewide with the independent businessman. The majority opposed a state minimum wage, heavily endorsed stronger hot check laws, and favored broadening the sales tax if additional taxes are needed.
