Floydada's Jimmy Willson, who has lived all his life in Floyd County will be the 11 a. m. speaker on the courthouse square. He is well known in the state for his many honors received in the Methodist Church, Rotary, and Masonry. "Please to advise office of Economic Opportunity today approved grant of \$45,150 to provide staff and operating expenses for operation of Neighborhood Centers in five rural communities. It provides educational assistance, vocational programs, aid to better health, neighborhood home im-

provement, consumer making programs, legal counsel, job placement and referrals. Grant goes to Community Action Council for Floyd, Crosby, Dickens and Kent Counties. Program is for 12 months and will benefit low income residents."

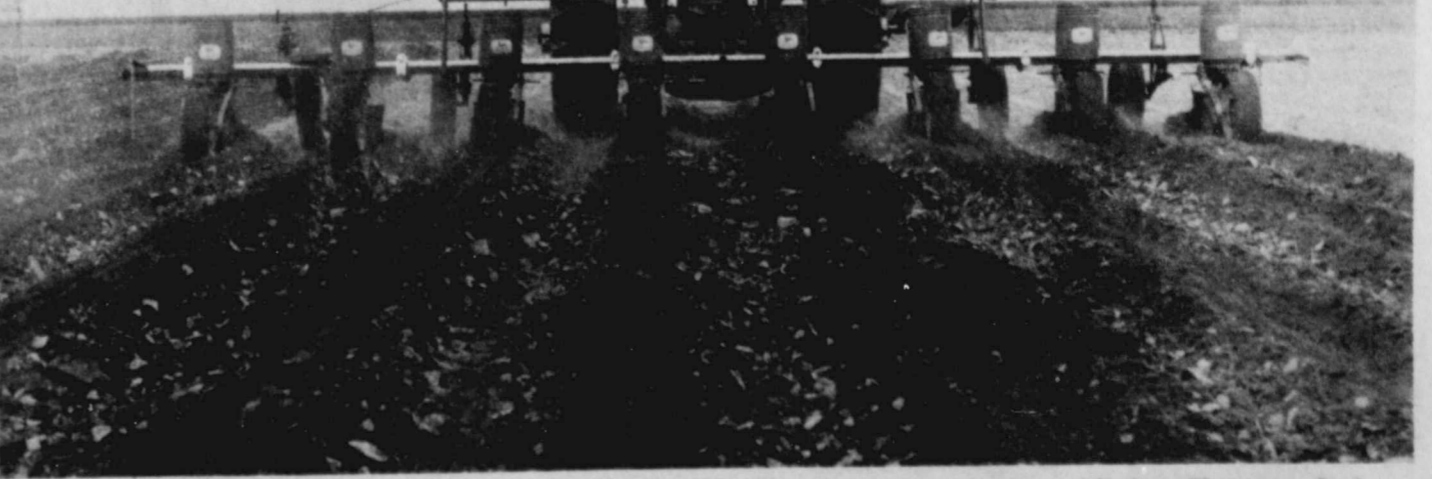

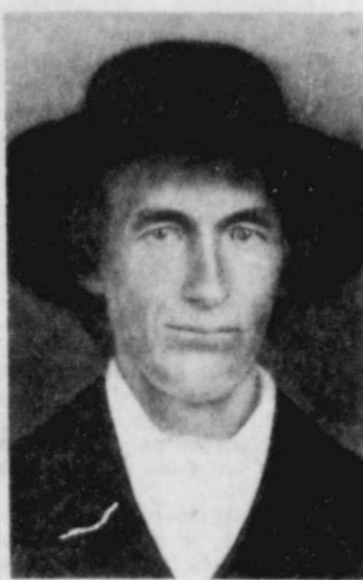
Dr. Marshall President Of ASA Surgeons

Editor Constitution: I was raised in Campbell County, Georgia, and took my first trip to Atlanta in 1847, when my father sold there a bale of cotton that had been packed with a crowbar. I was converted under the tune of "Dixie" June 6, 1861, played by Adam Bomar on a fife. I joined Captain T. C. Glover's company, left Atlanta the 18th day of June and arrived at Richmond on the 21st, and was attached to company A, Twenty-first Georgia regiment, General Dobbs' brigade, John B. Gordon's division, General Jackson's corps. Fought in every battle except Manassas, was wounded three times, captured twice, had the smallpox once and scared to death forty times. I was captured the last time October 9, 1864, at Cedar Creek, in the valleys of Virginia. General Early stampeded up the valley and carried Point Lookout.

I want to know how many men now living were in that battle. I remained in prison until June 6, 1865, took the oath of allegiance, was sent home by water, and got to Savannah, Ga., June 1, 1865.

I joined the Primitive Baptist Church December 13, 1873, and have been trying to preach for that denomination for thirty years. I will be glad to hear from all the old soldiers who read this who were at Cedar Creek.

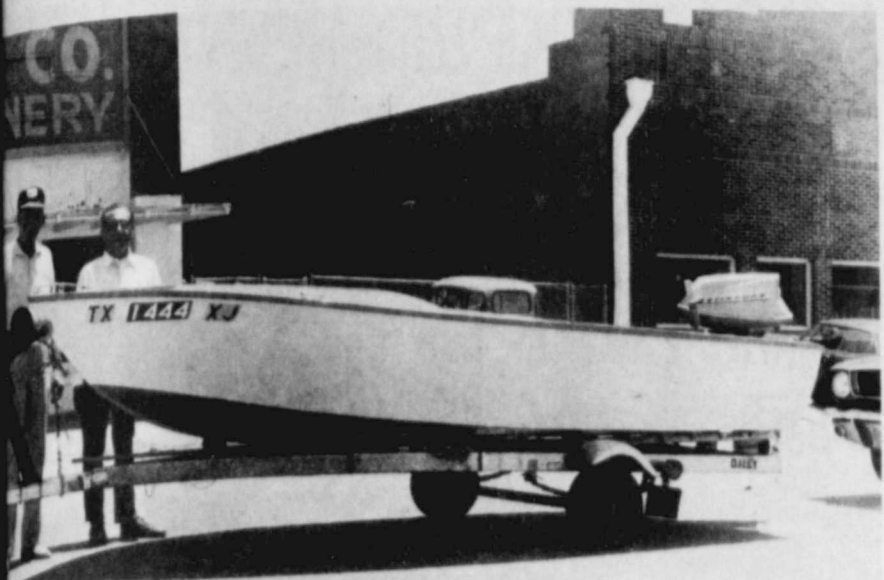

Seaman Scott With Unit For Apollo Flight

(28AP 191 104) WITH THE APOLLO TEN RECOVERY FORCE (FHTNC) May 19 - Seaman Joe M. Scott, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. John A. Scott of Roaring Springs, Tex., is serving aboard the destroyer USS Rich, a unit of Task Force 140 for the manned flight of Apollo 10.

Rich will be stationed approximately 400 miles east of Cape Kennedy, on the first revolution ground track of the spacecraft to recover the astronauts should there be a launch vehicle malfunction prior to orbital insertion.

The 364-foot, 3,100 ton Saturn Five launch vehicle carried astronauts Thomas P. Stafford, Eugene Cernan and John Young into space on a scheduled eight-day flight.

The Apollo 10 mission is one of the final steps before reaching the ultimate goal of the Apollo program, to land men on the moon for limited observation and exploration and assure their safe recovery upon return to earth.

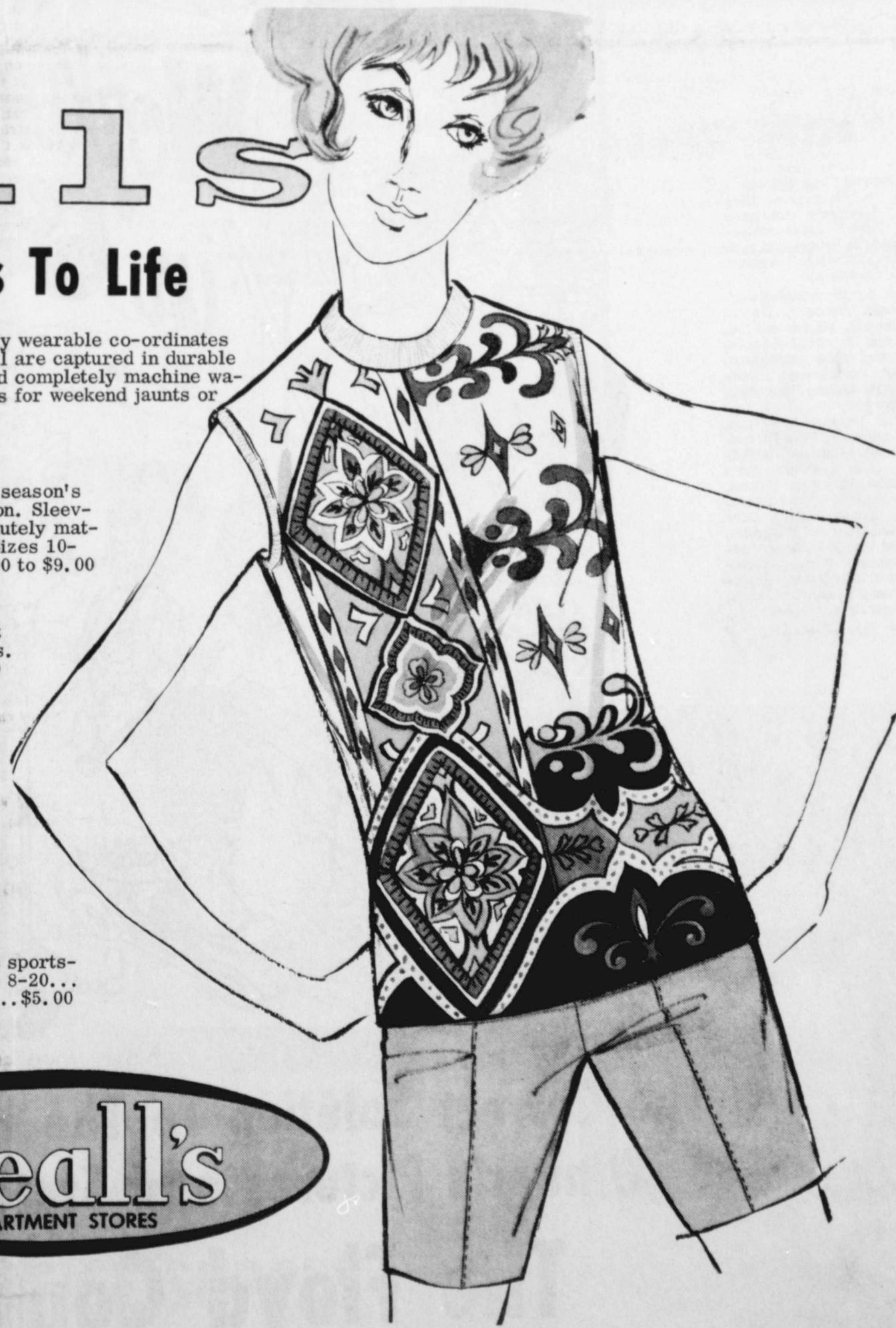

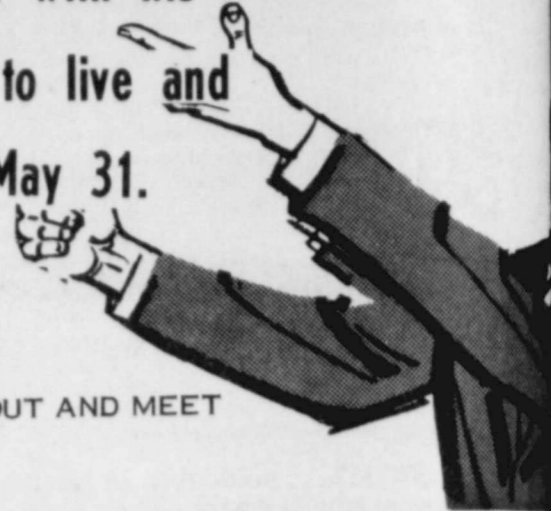

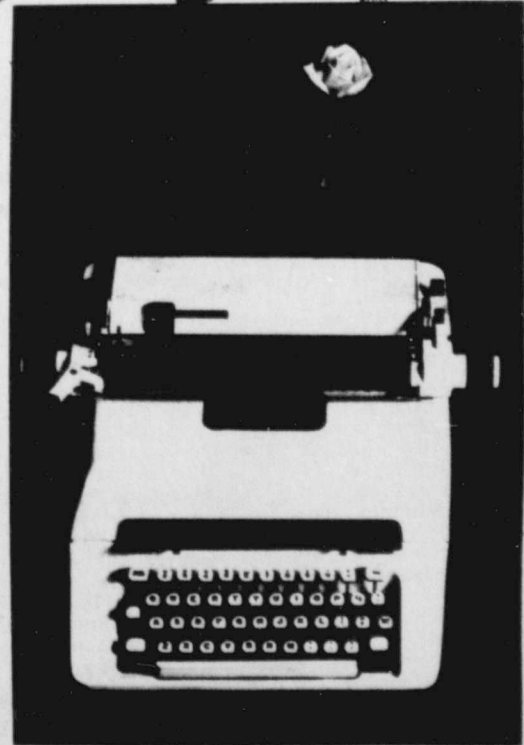

In Two Months Period 6,897 Car Tags Issued

According to C. J. Payne, county assessor-collector, during the period of February 1, 1969 through April 4, 1969 the total motor vehicle licenses issued in Floyd County were 6,897. This total being classed as passenger cars 3875; commercial trucks 1092; farm trucks 1127; truck tractors 77; farm truck tractors 70; motorcycles 71; and trailers 653.

The fees collected during this period for the above sales amounted to \$178,093.61. Floyd County's share of these fees was \$112,996.94, and the Texas Highway Department received \$65,096.67.

Want To Make Your Farm Or Ranch A Recreational Enterprise?

The Farmers Home Administration can now make loans to farm and ranch owners or tenants for outdoor income producing recreational enterprises according to Alfred A. Harrison, County Supervisor. Loans to individuals can be made to convert all or a portion of their farms to recreational facilities. The recreational enterprise may supplement regular farm income or, in some cases, replace farm income by converting the entire farm to recreation.

Public recreational areas are increasing in number each year; however, the demand for such facilities still exceeds what is available. The purpose of this loan program is two-fold in that it will provide more recreational areas and help farmers and ranchers to increase

their income, stated Harrison. Loans may be made for camping, picnicking, and hiking facilities, swimming, boating, skiing and fishing facilities, golf courses, riding stables or many other forms of outdoor recreation. Funds can be used to purchase necessary materials, supplies and animals, acquire and develop land and water resources, construct or improve modest essential buildings, and to purchase and install needed equipment and fixtures.

Hardin spoke at the dedication of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's \$400,000 cotton ginning research laboratory 7 miles north of Lubbock.

The laboratory is the first of its kind in Texas and one of four in the nation.

The secretary's remarks climaxed a program which included talks by U.S. Rep. George Mahon, D-Tex., Sen. Ralph Yarborough, D-Tex., and Gov. Preston Smith.

Hardin said that the true story of agriculture needs broader public understanding. He said growing numbers of congressmen from urban areas are tiring of farm subsidies.

Farm people, Hardin said, despite their success in producing the world's best food bargains have less than \$3 of income per person for every \$4 for non-farm people.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJRS)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 5, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The Legislature shall meet in regular session each year at such time as may be provided by law and at other times as convened by the Governor. When convened in odd-numbered years in regular session, the Legislature shall devote the first thirty days to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of such session the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters then pending; and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as

may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business during this session by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership.

"Regular sessions in even-numbered years, commencing in 1972, shall not exceed sixty days and shall be limited to legislation on the subjects of providing funds for the support of functions and activities of the state government and emergency matters submitted by the Governor in messages to the Legislature. At each regular session, commencing in 1971, appropriations shall be made for the support of functions and activities of the state government for the next fiscal year."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions."

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments only out of state funds on behalf of such individuals shall not exceed the amount of Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) during any fiscal year."

"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this Section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning September 31, 1971: Three Million, Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,600,000) for Old Age Assistance, Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, and Twenty-Three Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$23,900,000) for Aid to Families with Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and otherwise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes.

The new business is located on the Matador highway and features groceries, drugs, fresh doughnuts, hot barbecue, ice and picnic supplies.

Of course the new business is open seven days a week from 7 a.m. to 11 p.m. for the customer's shopping convenience.

The Hesson family moved to Floydada about two years ago and purchased the Tastee Freez drive-in. Soon after they had settled down to running the drive-in they decided to put in a doughnut shop.

In the opening of the new business, the doughnut shop has been moved to the 7-11 Grocery store. Mrs. Hesson continues to operate the drive-in.

You would also get about 73 pounds of ground beef and stew meat, and about 73 pounds of steaks, of which 33 pounds would be round steaks and 40 pounds would be loin steaks.

You should consider carefully whether you will be able to make use of these quantities within the recommended maximum freezer storage time (8 to 12 months for roasts and steaks, 3-4 months for ground beef). If not, money saving advantages would be nullified, since longer storage would tend to make the meat dry and less flavorful.

Quality is another important consideration. Your only sure guide to quality is the U.S. Department of Agriculture

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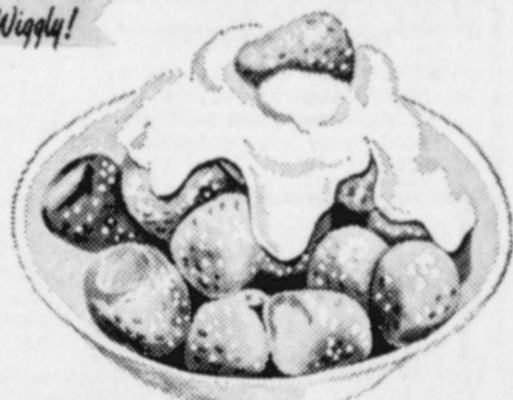
