Don Ed Holmes, son of Mr. \$950.00 per month as recom-mended by Joe Smith, First and Mrs. Chuck Holmes, is said to be improving in Caprock Hospital in Floydada, where he is under treatment for first and third degree burns. The 15 year old youngster was burned over his body Saturday evening about 70'clock while attempting to burn out a red ant bed near the

onion shed at Barwise. Relatives said Don Ed had poured gasoline into and around the ant bed, set the fuel container back of him then neared the bed, tossing a match into it. As he scrambled backwards he tripped over the container saturating his clothing and the ground. The blaze ignited his clothing before he could get clear. His family said he was able to tear most of his clothing from his body and roll in the dirt, putting out the fire, and

Young Holmes is being treated for first degree burns about the body and third degree burns on his back and ankles.

The Justice Of Farm Subsidies

Urban dwellers, both merchant and laborer, have no conscience when it comes to putting a price tag on their contribution to the economy. Almost every week we receive a form letter from a supplier in the city informing us that due to rising costs, it is necessary that he up the price of whatever he has to sell. And labor comes along, demanding a cost-of-living adjustment when

Unlike the urban dweller, the farmer cannot say, "Due to rising costs I must have more for my grain or livestock." Of course, he might organize like the labor unions and demand negotiation. Or through a government program, parity could be attained by setting the price of agricultural products where it should be, then sending the bill to the consumer.

One of these plans is as fair as the other. To unionize farmers and make the price of products negotiable, just as is done in the case of labor, would be one way to solve the problem. If wheat farmers all got together and demanded \$2 a bushel for wheat, refusing to take a penny less, the effect would be to pass the increase on to the consumer.

Or . . . if the government determines that \$2 is a fair price for wheat and pays the farmer a subsidy to bring the price up to \$2, again the cost of the subsidy is passed on to the consumer. So one plan is as just and fair as the other. The fact is, to have income in line with that of industry and labor, the farmer must have perhaps \$2 for his wheat . . . and it matters not, so far as justice is concerned, whether the consumer pays it through higher prices at the store or through

The National Farmers Organization would go the union route. It would band together and negotiate with the purchaser of agricultural products.

The Hereford NFO presented some "food for thought" in its monthly newsletter:

"Suppose that all of the farmers in our county decided that prices charged by our merchants were too high, even though our merchants were not getting a fair return on their investment and for their services. Perhaps we could travel to Dallas and buy our automobiles for \$150 less than we would have to pay locally. Our tractors and com-

bines could be purchased in Oklahoma City at a savings of several hundred dollars. By travelling to Amarillo or Lubbock we could buy our groceries and clothing. We could even get our fuel for our equipment wholesale direct from the oil companies and lower our cost of production. We would store all of our commodities on the farm and thus bypass our local elevators and save storage and handling charges.

"Of course this would lower our expenses, but what would it do to our local economy? Most of our local businesses would be forced out of business, our town would dry up and our schools close down because of lack of local taxes. Eventually we would have only large cities servicing our farm economy. Our children would be forced to ride buses hundreds of extra miles to get their education.

"I think you will agree that we would not want a situation such as this to exist. Yet, we have a trend taking place which will eventually cause the same thing to happen. We see grain trucks transporting grain from outlying areas because it can be bought at a cheaper price than the farmers in our area can produce it. The money being paid for this grain in other areas will never be used to help our local economy. It serves only one purpose and that is to depress our local grain prices and decrease the income of our local farmers. The argument is that we must be competitive in prices or it will be freighted in. No consideration is given as to what it cost to produce it, nor how much those producers are losing in the 'low price areas' by selling at lower prices, only that we must be competitive.

"What happens when the farmer does not receive a fair price for his commodities? The same thing happens if he takes his business elsewhere for reasons previously stated. The local economy does not share in added profits, tractors and automobiles are not purchased, clothing is worn a little longer and purchases of all necessities are cut back. Businesses close down and taxes are cut off. And our local economy suffers."

How long is it going to take the public to accept the fact that the farmer can no longer accept whatever is offered him for his produce . . . and survive?

Perryton In Drive For Plant

Ochiltree County coun missioners took a major step Friday toward acquiring an American Beef Packers Inc. esponsibility for a \$2 million airport expansion project required for the plant.

Perryton City Council members in a joint session with the county officials, announced plans to call a \$1 million city bond election to finance extension of utilities to the pro-

posed plant. Council members also disclosed that half the \$100,000 needed to secure a building site has been raised.

A councilman confirmed Friday night American Beef officials have indicated they will build the packing plant at Perryton if the site and airport facilities are made available, by the community.

The money for expanded airport facilities would be raised by a county bond issue and the acquisition of government funds through the Federal Aviation Agency, a spokesman said.

In separate action Wednesday night, officials American Beef, based Oakland, Iowa, Wheatheart Feeders Inc. of Perryton announced the two firms have begun merger negotiations.

American Beef officials have said a 12,000 foot runway will be necessary to accomodate Boeing 747 freight liners, the largest freight jets in America. American Beef Packers plans to fly out most of its products. Frank R. West, president and

chairman of the board of the multi-million dollar firm, said earlier in the week Perryton was prominent among Panhandle cities being considered for the plant and set forth the requirements.

'We have also taken close looks at Stratford, Amarillo and Dumas," he said.

West said he and his associates traveled about 1,500 miles through the Panhandle and decided the Perryton area could support a packing plant larger than any being operated by American

The largest beef packing plant in the world is reputed to be the Missouri Beef Packers plant at Friona, which employs 225 persons and processes more than 400,000 head of cattle yearly.

"Our plant will be comparable to the one at Friona," West "The

plant will include fabricating and breaking facilities, and will be designed to ship both fabricated beef and dressed carcasses."

The county commissioners voted during the meeting to employ First Southwest Company of Dallas, a bonding firm.

Farm Subsidies Not A Handout

Urban Congressmen are revolting against farm subsidy programs.

At the heart of the controversy are subsidies for cotton, wheat and feed grains.

Opponents ask why spending grows with farmers declining in numbers, production on the increase and farm income comparatively

Bipartisan opponents to continued subsidies have gained reinforcements from reapportionment with its inroads on House membership from rural districts.

Whatever the future holds for major farm subsidy programs, it will be dictated in 1969 by House members from the cities.

In a complex system, the government pays farmers to plant within a certain maximum acreage or to withhold acreage from production entirely. In several programs, the government also agrees to give the farmer a loan for his crop if he cannot obtain an adequate market price. By thus holding back crops from the market, the government hopes the market price will rise.

If commodity prices rise and the farmer wishes to sell his crop, he can take it back from the government and repay the loan from the money he realizes in the sale. If the market price remains low, he can forfeit his crop to the government which then stores it, distributes it free to the poor through one of the government food prorgams or sells it abroad. This system is basically fair.

Chief objection to the subsidy program seems to be the fact that so much of the sub-

sidies go to large farmers.

Rep. Paul Findley (R.-Ill.), who has sponsored a subsidy limitation plan since 1965, charged on the House floor that the top 15 per cent of the farmers, with sales in excess of \$20,000 per year, received almost one half of the government payments each

Antagonism towards so much going to so few lies in a false understanding of what the government farm program is all about. It is pictured as a benevolent Santa Claus which passes out favors to farmers much like Santa Claus distributes treats at Christ-

Farm subsidies are NOT charity! They are not relief! They are not bonuses passed to people in distress, victims of a calamity!

The farm program is designed to correct inequities in our economy. In theory, all segments of our economy should have a fair price for their efforts. Business and labor are able to demand a fair price for their contribution to the economy. Since the farmer cannot, the subsidy is nothing more than an effort to reimburse the farmer for his shortage as the economic pie is cut.

It's nothing more than a legitimate business transaction. It is nothing like welfare payments. It's an attempt at equalization ... The government reimburses the farmer for his loss in the way of a fair price. This being the case, it shouldn't make too much difference whether the farmer is a small or large

Such congressmen as Findley have another reason for opposing the subsidy programs . . . they want to see an end to all government price support and production control programs in agriculture. A free and competitive market, they say, where supply and demand would determine market price would earn the farmer a better income.

Horseradish!

This is the most assinine observation yet. The last time the farmer operated in a "free and competitive market where supply and demand determined market price" he was receiving 50 per cent of parity! And as a result the typical farmer lived like peons . . . in unpainted rural shacks without running water. It even affected his social class. The farmer of that era was considered second rate socially, economically and politically. Who wants a return to that era?

The coalition of convenience between urban Democrats and Republicans spells deep trouble for farm programs in 1969. The subsidy limitation plan passed the House by a 70-vote margin in 1968. The margin had widened to 83 votes in 1969. All House members from districts in New York City, Detroit and Philadelphia voted for a subsidy ceiling..



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
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
