MASKED MAN FORCES OSBORN. ASST. CASHIER, TO OPEN SAFE

Two robbers entered the Friona State Bank shortly after 12:30 today (Friday), forced Jessie M. Osborn, assistant cashier, to open the safe, removed \$3,713.30 in cash and escaped. They were in the bank but a few minutes.

Osborn was alone in the bank, sitting with his back to the door, when the first robber, who was masked, entered quietly and forced him to the rear of the bank at the point of a gun. He was ordered to open the safe, which he did, and then, turning his face to the door, saw the second robber who had entered unnoticed and who was unmasked. Two customers, Floyd T. Schlenker, a farmer living west of town, and a second man whose name is unknown here, entered the bank while the bandits were removing the loot and they, with Osborn, were locked in the vault where they were found about thirty minutes later by G. D. Anderson, cashier, when he returned from lunch.

According to Osborn, the unmasked man was of light complexion, about five feet and eight inches tall, weighed around 150 pounds and wore a blue serge suit and grey cap. The robbers came into town in a Buick coupe and parked just south of the bank which is located on Main Street. They are reported to have turned left on the Amarillo-Clovis highway in leaving Friona. No trace of the car or its occupants had been found at 2:30 today.

The robbery today is the third disaster that the Friona State Bank has suffered within the past twelve months. HOG MEN SLIGHT AVAILABLE FEEDS

Almost every good hog farm grows legumes and either oats or barley, in addition to corn, and yet but very little attention is given to the proper utilization of these legumes and smallgrain crops, as compared to the amount that is given to corn, R. A. Smith of the swine husbandry division, college of agriculture, University of Illinois, says.

The legume imitation fig syrup. crop is grown to furnish incidental pasture, but more especially to keep up the fertility of the soil. The smallgrain crop, such as oats and barley, is not in the rotation because of the profits produced but because such a crop aids in spreading out the work and providing a medium through which the legume crop may be started.

"These last two crops-the legume and small-grain-can play an important part in economical and profitable pork production if they are properly utilized. During the summer, for instance, hogs should always be fed on a good legume pasture. If a full grain ration is fed an additional protein supplement, such as tankage, skim milk or a mixture of tankage and linseed oil meal, should be given. A new use of the legume crop that has developed in the last few years is that of furnishing the clean pasture in the swine sanitation system. Such biennial legumes as red and sweet clover take care of this requirement very nicely. but each have certain other disadvantages that cannot be overlooked. The pigs may be started on red or sweet clover and transferred to the old alfalfa pasture when three or four seventy. be large enough to resist serious infestation from the round

"Under certain conditions annual pasture crops such as soy beans, and cowpeas, may be used to good advantage. Rape, although not a legume, ranks very high as a hog pasture."

Protein Feed for Pigs recommends either skim milk or butpasture. They have found that when corn is worth \$1 and \$1.50 per cwt. skim milk is worth 28 and 42 cents respectively. Buttermilk is worth just about the same as skim milk, Whey has about half the feeding

value of skim milk. Tankage will replace from three and a half to five and a half times as much corn when fed to swine. With pigs of 50 pounds they recommend that 1 pound of tankage be fed with about 6 pounds of corn; as the pig takes on weight the corn should be gradually increased until a weight of around 200 pounds. 



By thus watching they noticed that posts from Lewiston to Portland were marked with the number 26 and that from Portland on to Sagus Center, where their father took them, the number appearing on posts along the way was number 1.

Pulling the Great Colorado Off the Mud

Has Speedy Craft to Cross the Ocean

Rome.-An attempt to cross from Europe to the United States in 50 hours by means of an especially constructed semisubmersible boat, is to be made late this year by Ettore Bugatti, owner of an automobile factory in Alsace, France.

Bugatti, who is of Italian origin, declared, after being received by Premier Mussolini that plans for his invention are virtually complete.

The craft, about 32 feet long. with a beam of 10 feet, will be inclosed like a submarine, but will travel only half submerged. In the center will be a cabin and a tube, about a foot and a half wide, for ventilation,

There will be two forward and two aft motors, each with an entirely independent system of con-

Washington.-If a new crystal detector recently patented as a telephone attachment is put on the market, many fans may return to the delightfully clear reception and simplicity of operation afforded by the first type of radio receiver, Literally it amounts to a pocket crystal receiving set or, if desired, an adjustable and perhaps more efficient tube receiver which may be attached to any desk telephone and used to listen to local broadcasts, utilizing the regular telephone receiver.

Patent No. 1,622,355, issued to G. F. Mitchell of Washington, and as yet unassigned, covers a simple means of constructing a crystal radio receiver readily attachable to an ordinary telephone. Its use may depend, however, upon securing the permission from local telephone companies. An examination of contracts may prevent its general use, although it is said not to interfere with the ordinary use of the

Device is Compact, Simple.

The device is exceedingly interesting, compact and simple. It carries out the scheme of using the lines of the telephone company as an aerial for broadcast reception, but in addition permits the use of the telephone earpiece itself. Its adoption elminates, therefore, the need for an aerial, head phones, extra wiring, or any modification of the telephone circuit beyond simple connections with the conductors. On one side of the housing is mounted a mechanical latch which, when engaged, prevents the rising of the telephone switch or hook when the receiver is lifted and used to listen in on broadcasts picked up by the telephone wires. When this latch is disengaged the telephone may be used in the ordinary way for conversation. As in a simple crystal receiver circult, the regular telephone receiver, or if desired, a pair of ear phones, is connected across the detector which is placed between the aerial and ground connections.



Tandem Condenser and How the Part Is Made

A variable condenser having 48 plates can be easily made into a tandem condenser, composed of two 17plate sections, says a writer in Radio News. The condenser used for this purpose should be one of the type which is held together by three bolts, so it can be taken apart. Remove these bolts, being careful not to bend the plates, and cut the long bolts in

half with a backsaw. Before the condenser is taken apart, it is best to measure the exact distance between the two end plates, so that the bakelite strips can be cut to the exact length. This is necessary because the distance between the bearings of the rotor must be kept the same. In 17-plate condensers there will be 9 stator plates for each section. Since the rotors of a condenser in a R.F. receiver are connected to the "A-" lead, the rotor need not be



How to Construct Tandem 17-Plate Condenser From 43-Plate Condenser.

Assemble the two end plates and place them on the table, at the same distance apart as they were originally. Measure the distance between the inner edges and make the separators this length. In Fig 1 the separators are of bakelite rods, drilled and tapped to the size of the condenser The method of assembly is clearly shown in the diagram. One separator is used for each bolt, and for most condensers three will be required. This is a neat method but a little difficult.

A similar method is shown in Fig. 2. This will be found to be excellent if the bakelite remains firm, but the construction is not as strong as that shown in Fig. 3. Here the two stators are supported by three bakelite strips, about 1/2 inch thick and 1/2 inch wide, and just as long as the condenser was originally. Four small metal brackets are bolted on each strip and then to the stators by means of the original bolts cut in half.

The five center plates of the rotor should be removed and cut down to washers. Replace these washers in the original positions and the rotor will be the same length as before.

Aurora Affects Radio Reception, Says Expert

During the Arctic expedition with MacMillan, Austin C. Cooley, radio operator on the Sachem, had ample opportunity to observe the effect of the northern lights on radio reception. "At times ' he says in Radio Broadcast Magezine, "signals seemed fairly good, and then they would fade out completely. On one such occasion I went on deck to investigate. Never before had I seen such a violent and brilliant display of northern lights. Sometimes we were completely surrounded by the bright blue bands of aurora, and streamers from all around the horizon would shoot up to the zenith, making a complete umbrella of aurora. In places the bands were fringed with dark red.

"For three hours or more I kept running up and down the companion way taking notes on the aurora and then listening to the radio. Later I made other observations. I am thoroughly convinced, after going over these notes, that a definite relation does exist between the aurora and radio conditions. All these tests were made slightly below the 40-meter band. In the data collected, there appeared to be a rather definite relation between barometric pressure, mirages, aurora, magnetic storms, and radio fading. The data are by no means complete, but the observations substantiate the following statements: 1. Mirages and aurora only occur with heavy air pressure.

2. The relation between the aurors and radio fading depends upon the following: (a) Formation of aurora and its location in respect to the approaching radio wave and the receiving station. (b) Frequency of the radio signal. "In accounting for the fading, the

temperature is an important factor in the formulas already worked out for mirages."

Czechoslovakia Claims 200,000 Radio Amateurs

Early this year there were approximately 200,000 amateur radio operators in Czechoslovakia, and more are taking out licenses, it is reported from Prague. This total, it is believed, includes both broadcast listeners and smateurs, as known in the United States, where only 18,000 are Beensed. 



IGNORANCE IS BLAMED FOR MALNUTRITION IN CHILDREN

Large Proportion of Mortality Among Children Traced to Faulty Nutrition.

Washington.-Investigations by the children's bureau of the United States Department of Labor of the extent of malnutrition among children indicate that from one-fourth to one-third of the children in the United States are definitely malnourished.

Why are there so many children below par? Evidently they were not "just born that way," for the studies of malnourished children show that in the great majority of cases they started life in normal physical condition. Given this start they should have developed into healthy, robust children. That they failed to do so indicates that comething is wrong with their diet and

Improper or inadequate diet, lack of

sleep, too little outdoor play, fresh air, and sunshine; overexertion due to too much work or too strenuous play, and physical defects such as bad teeth. tonsils, or adenoids are listed among the causes of malnutrition. But this gives rise to another question: Why are children improperly fed? Why do they have too little sleep? Why are bad tonsils, teeth, or adenoids not attended to? The answer seems to be that ignorance, lack of parental control and poverty, singly or together, are the causes underlying these bad conditions.

Parents come in for a heavy share of blame. Abundant evidence has been found to show that ignorance and lack of parental control are more important causes of malnutrition than poverty. Studies have shown that many children are improperly fed because parents do not know what are the

proper foods for children nor how to spend their money to get the best return in food values; because they do not know that children should have regular meals, and because they do not know that drinking tea and coffee and eating indiscriminately between meals are worse for children than adults.

Then, too, there are parents who know all these things, but who just don't seem to care what and how their children eat or when they go to bed. The result of this ignorance or neglect is malnutrition, which may result in lowered vitality, increased susceptibility to disease, and retarded mental development. A large proportion of mortality among children is traced directly or indirectly to faulty

"The Camels are Coming!"





ABOARD FOR AMERICA!

By ELMO SCOTT WATSON HE camels are coming!"

No, it isn't the old circus call, nor a paraphrase on words of the old poem about the Slege of Lucknow, nor an announcement of a new prohibition enforcement drive.

The camels, the servants of man since prehistoric times, are coming to Canada, there to work on the

lands of certain farmers in Saskatchewan who believe that these ships of the desert may be superior to horses and mules as draft animals And if the experiment across the international boundary line is successful, it is not at all unlikely that it may be tried in North Dakota, Montana and other states where climate and soil conditions are similar to those in the Dominion.

Over in Russia camels have been used for some time as farm animals and have proved their worth on the plow and the reaper. Several of these camels are already in service in Canada, and the Saskatchewan farmers have ordered 400 more from northern Russia. They are the Bactrian camels which are different from the Arabian camel in being smaller and sturdler, having longer wool and tougher feet, and they are remarkable for their ability to stand extremes We have it on the word of Musso-fini that "women are the agreeable or on the plateau of Tibet where the thermometer shoots up to 140 degrees In summer, only to fall far below zero in the winter.

> The Canadian farmers who are going to make the experiment are doing so because they believe that the camels will live longer than horses, can walk faster, carry heavier loads and can work longer and under more adverse weather conditions. Bactrian camels are capable of carrying loads of 1,000 to 1,500 pounds and can walk in deep snow in which horses would flounder helplessly. The pace of the camel is steady and uniform. How tireless they are is shown by the fact that the lighter type of desert camel has often traversed 100 miles a day. It is believed also that it will cost less to feed the camels than horses because these hump-backed animals will eat almost anything they can find-tough shrubbery and thorny plants.

At any rate, the experiment will be

watched with interest by farmers in this country even though it probably will never be adopted on a large scale. It is interesting, also, to recall that the United States government once made a somewhat similar experiment, although for a different purpose. During the Mexican war, Jefferson Davis. later president of the Confederacy but then a colonel in Gen. Zachary Taylor's army, was struck by the fact that camels would be much better than horses or mules for transport service in the deserts of the great Southwest. So when he became secretary of war under President Franklin Pierce he determined to make the experiment, and after some effort succeeded in 1855 in getting an appropriation of \$30,000 from congress for that pur-

pose. Accordingly he detailed Maj. Henry C. Wayne to the task of going abroad and purchasing the camels, and the Navy department ordered Lleut, David Porter, commanding the storeship Supply, to take Wayne on his mission. aid him in getting the camels and re-turn them to the United States. The Crimean war was then in progress and England had bought up all the camels available in that part of the country. In other places they found there were laws forbidding the export of camels and in several places they found that they needed the wit of a Yankee horse trader to deal with the wily sultans, pashas and beys and their grafting underlings.

Eventually, however, they got what they wanted, and on February 15, 1856, the Supply sailed from Smyrna with 12 male and 20 female camels and one calf. One adult camel died en route and two of the six calves born on board lived, so that 34 of the animals were landed at Indianola, now Port Lavaca. Texas, a month or so later. The camels had proved themselves good sailors, although their objections to going abroad had to be overcome by the use of block-and-tackle. A special harness had been designed lash them to the deck as a safeguard against rough weather, but they gave very little trouble in some of the storms that were encountered.

The arrival of the camels in Texas caused something of a sensation and some of the natives were skeptical of their value as beasts of burden. This was soon overcome, however, when Major Wayne sent one of the animals to a forage barn to carry four bales of hay which weighed 1,256 pounds. After the kneeling camel had been loaded with this burden, it calmly arose and walked away as though scarcely aware of the weight. The camels were next marched overland to their permanent quarters at Camp Verde, 60 miles northwest of San Antonio, and immediately put into transport service where they soon demon strated their usefulness. In one case six camels, accompanied by two sixmule teams, were sent in to San Antonio to carry back oats. The camels immediately returned to Camp Verde in 54 hours with 3,648 pounds of grain. The mule teams however had to rest in San Antonio a day longer and returned in 961/4 hours. Within a few months the "camel

corps" experiment was considered such a success that Lieutenants Porter and Heaps were sent back to the Levant to get another lot of the animals. They returned with 41, and the scope of the "camel corps" activity widened. Lieut. Edward F Beale used 20 of them to carry supplies while building a wagon road from New Mexico to California in 1857, and during the next four years he continued to use them in exploring trips through remote parts of New Mexico and Arizona.

Despite the apparent success of the experiment, however, an element of discord arose that was due to the temperamental incompatability of the camels and the men who had charge of them, the American mule skinners. III. Peter's Sermon (vv, 34-43). The introduction (vv. 34, 35).

He showed that God is no respecter of persons. This does not mean that Cornelius was already in a state of grace, thereby saved, but that he was eligible to hear the gospel and accept the terms of salvation.

His discourse (vv. 36-43).

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
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
