The gin by gin count of cotton baled according to Bob Hambright of the Texas Employment Commission office in Floydada showed a total of 59,753 bales Monday by Floyd County gins. This compares to 34,179 bales ginned this time last

It appears now that most of the cotton is in the gin yard and the county will fall short of the Lubbock estimate of 75,000 bales for the county earlier. Around 75,000 acres were seeded to cotton in the county. Around 44,000 bales were

Giant Trees Are In Peril

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. Twenty years ago, needles on forest giants in moun-tains east of Los Angeles began turning yellow. Many trees have since died and hundreds of thousands are dying.

The trees, soaring more than 100 feet tail, some more than 700 years old, were Ponderosa pines, among the largest in the woods.

Foresters at first were baffled. They called the problem X disease and blamed it on some insect. Eventually, however, they tabbed the villain: smog.

The agent that withers the needles is a smog ingredient called ozone.

Prevailing winds carry smog from Los Angeles, 60 miles west, into the 60,000 acres of Ponderosa in the San Bernardino and San Jacinto Mountains, whose peaks jut nearly two miles high.

Today, experts estimate that 75 per cent, about 1.7 million, trees, are dying.

NEWS FOR HOMEMAKERS

'oods and nutrition specialists for the Texas A&M Extension Service have several good tips on how to safely prepare holiday foods.

You should be particularly careful in your preparation of your stuffing. This holiday treat usually contains bread crumbs, seasonings, chicken broth, fat, perhaps an egg or two, and sometimes chesnuts and meats. Chances of bacterial growth are great, because the small pieces of food are handled often when the stuffing is prepared.

Stuff the turkey just before roasting it and combine the ingredients just before cooking time. If pork is to be added to the stuffing, each as sausage, be sure it is thoroughly cooked. You should never partially cook a bird ahead of time. If

you do, the stuffing will only be warm by the time the bird is ready to be eaten. If the stuffing is not thoroughly cooked, bacterial growth will form. You must be careful to thoroughly cook all holiday foods. In five hours, there can be

PAPER BAG FRUIT BREAD

2/3 cups sugar 1/2 cup butter or margarine

1 cup milk 3 cups all purpose flour 2-1/2 teaspoons baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon grated lemon or orange peel

2 teaspoons anise seeds, crush-

1/2 cup golden raisins Take a paper bag with a bottom measurement of 1-1/2 x 4-1/2 inches and fold down the top, and fold again, until you have a secure "cuff" and sides are about 4 inches high. Grease insides of bag well and place on

cookie sheet. In small bowl beat eggs until thick and lemon colored; add sugar and beat 1 minute. Heat butter or margarine in small saucepan until butter melts; set aside. In large mixing bowl combine flour, baking powder, salt, anise seed, almonds and fruit. Add egg mixture along with half of butter-milk mixture. Blend well, Add rest of milk and butter. Blend until smooth. Pour into bag, bake at 350 degrees for 60 to 75 minutes.

The First Jail House

Although the Floyd County Commissioners Court had given jail building their consideration in their first meeting June 12, 1890, by the time the July meeting was held they decided to have "plans and specifications" for it, so they named Judge Arthur B. Duncan and Clerk R. T. Miller to prepare the papers and advertist for bids. The minutes read "a jail house be built of the following dimensions:

"Twenty-two by 30 feet with partition wall cutting off eight feet at the front of the building for a jailer's office; that the wall will be 12 feet high, a boxed building and stripped; covered with iron roofing; four windows, two on either side, two barred at the jail end; two doors, one at the front of the building and one in the partition wall, the one in the partition wall to be made of D&M flooring and doubled and closely nailed; the other to be a panel door six feet eight inches by two feet eight inches, all of first class material.

No Floor Needed

"The jail part of said building is not to be floored. The windows are to have eight lights, the lights 12 x 16 inches. The rafters are to be every two feet and laths every 18 inches; the roof to have a pitch of two feet and six inches. All to be well put together and in workman-like manner."

It is to be remembered the court had already bought a "pair of jail cells" in their first meeting on June 12, along with a safe to keep records in. The safe and jail cells set the county back a total of \$3,700, of which \$200 was contracted to be paid in cash, the remainder in "bonds to run 15 years at 6 per cent with option to pay at any time."

When the commissioners advertised for bids to build the jail house they had only one offer. This was by J. N. Smith. His bid was rejected on Sept. 15. On the following day, however, Smith must have changed his bid to the liking of the court. They voted to "receive"

the second bid of J. N. Smith and to construct the jail house for the sum of \$375, and the contract awarded to said Smith."

Why The Delay?
But still there was delay, which may or may not be accounted for by one of three things, or a combination thereof. (This is simply a matter of conjecture). (1.) Members of the court were elected in May, their terms to expire on general election day Nov. 4.

Members of the court might have been "shelling the woods" for re-election. Also, (2) since the court was requiring Mr. Smith to make bond for performance he could have been having difficulty finding acceptable bondsmen in this raw start of organized civilization.

Or (3) it could have been the court told Smith to hold up, since a more elaborate plan might be hatching. For, after the election there appears on the court's minutes an order for an election to vote on a bond

issue of \$4,000 for jail house bonds. Nothing further came of this order evidently. A notation apparently in R. T. Miller's hand writing on the margin of the page says "Was Not."

Whatever the delay the minutes record that on Dec. 16 the court voted to accept the J. N. Smith bond for proper construction of the building "and it is hereby approved." From then on everything must have been hotsy totsy, for the court voted to hand over \$250 to Smith to buy lumber, and in 1891, February 13, "The court received the jail house building from the contractor and his sureties released from his bond and that final settlement be made." Final settlement on the \$350 contract was a check for \$122.16 balance due.

This is almost the end of the story but not quite. J. B. Shaw was allowed \$21.84 for "corrozated iron" for the jail roof. At this late date in history we wouldn't know whether

"corrozated iron" was the same as "corrugated iron." Maybe yes, maybe no. --Homer Steen







Judge Holmes Attends Mental Health Meeting

The Central Plains Comprehensive Community Mental Health/ Mental Retardation Center, Plainview, Texas December 10, 1969

The Central Plains Comprehensive Community Mental Health/ Mental Retardation Center of Plainview, Texas, became a reality November 1, 1969 when it began limited operation after a year of planning and implementing.

This Center, which comprises the following 9 counties: Floyd. Motley, Briscoe, Hale, Swisher, Castro, Bailey, and Lamb, has the following services already available to the nine counties: a detoxification center through the Plainview Hospital under the supervision of Dr. Mary D. Bublis, and a crisis mental health care unit through the Plainview Hospital. An outpatient clinic for State Hospital Returnees and referrals of mental health cases from the outlying counties is being conducted through Dr. Mary D. Bublis office at 1005 W. 9th, Plainview, Texas. Information, education, programs and referral service is through the office of the coordinator, Mrs. Elizabeth Woodley, Box 578, Telephone 806,296,5289 Plainview Texas, 79072. The services for the retarded of the area, including testing, neurological and EEG examinations is through the High Plains Childrens Training Center at 214 W. 11th, Plainview, Texas. After the new Mental Health Building opens in the summer of 1970, adjoining the Central Plains General Hospital, Plainview, a full scope of services will be available for the nine counties.

Judge J. K. Holmes attended the site visit in September when the State Department of Mental Health/Mental Retardation of Austin came out and reviewed the plan that Mrs. Elizabeth Woodley had provided for their approval. At the beginning of the planning period he appointed Mr. Harley McCasland of Lockney as the representative from Floyd County to the 9 county Board of Trustees. He, too, attended the site visit.

Judge and Mrs. Holmes and Mr. and Mrs. Harley McCasland attended a Board Meeting and Christmas dinner in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Noel Woodley, December 10, along with twenty four other representatives from the 9 counties. Mr. Jess Osborn, member of the Texas Board of Mental Health/Mental Retardation, spoke to the group concerning the financing of the Cen-The State awarded \$59,517.00 to start the program and maintain it for 10 months. This includes the \$1800,00 monthly that the High Plains Training Center is given by the Community MH/MR Center. He stated that money will be even less easy to get in the fiscal year 1970/71 since there will be more community centers in operation and no more money available. He pointed out that the communities receiving these services will have to begin to plan ahead as to how they can provide money for the Center through their civic clubs, United Fund, Church groups, project, agricultural groups, etc.

Forty four children were served the past year from Floyd County by the Central Plains Comprehensive Community Mental Retardation facility. . the High Plains Childrens Training Center, in Plainview. Since the Community Center services opened November 1st two have used the Detoxification Unit from Floyd County and one the Outpatient Service. Five have used the referral and information service from Floyd County. As the Center becomes better known, and the facilities become operable this will be used much more, of course. Up to now no money has been required from Floyd County, but it is not expected that the Center can continue to pick up the tab. The Floyd County Commissioners have signed a contract with the Center to pay for the indigent care that is referred to the Center by the Court. Eight of the nine counties involved in this Center have signed a contract to this effect. The other county has not signed but is picking up the cost of services for its patients referred to the Center, as it has all along.






Nicholson In Advisory Meeting

Tries His Hand At Explaining Some Of The Many Aspects Of Inflation

Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnsongrass farm takes a look at inflation this week, but it's hard to tell what he

I had to make another trip into town the other day to pick up another 5-cent tractor bolt now costing 15 cents and since I was throwing money around recklessly anyway I hauled off and bought a newspaper

In it I ran across an article that said the cost of a college education is up 68 percent since 1957, and this got me to thinking about

Now you take that 15-cent bolt. It's true it costs three times as much as it did 10 or 12 years ago, but at the same time it's still just as good a bolt as the earlier one.

Now with college education, well I don't want to get into an argument, uh, I don't want to compare bolts and nuts with college kids, but are you positive the product is as good today as it was 12 years ago? Or are they just televising the wrong ones?

As I understand it, inflation hits us in two ways. In one, the quality stays the same but the price goes up, like in automobiles. Cars are as good today as they were 12 years ago, they just cost a lot more. In the other way, the price stays the same but the quality comes down, like a nickel candy bar. You can still buy a nickel candy bar, you just don't get nearly as much candy. Mostly wrap-

But when inflation really hurts is when you pay a lot more but don't get as much.

Take Congress for example. Congress costs over twice what it did 12 years ago, but can anybody prove . . . well, I'd better not get into
