Delivery of the new fire truck is expected in six to eight months. The council met Monday night and Tuesday afternoon as it considered the bids of Boardman Company of Oklahoma City, \$21,034.00, Howe Fire Apparatus Co. of Anderson, Indiana, \$23,650.60; and Fire Appliance Co. of Texas,

It should be noted that the above bid does not include the accessories for the new truck and the council will open bids on Monday night at 6:30 according to requirements stipulated in a legal notice in this issue of The Hesperian.

The new truck will be white color. The city plans to keep the fire trucks it now owns.

L. G. Wilson, who transformed the Floydada Whirlwinds from a league doormat to District 3-AA champs in two years, has been named Coach of the Year for 1969 by the Amarillo Daily News.

Coach Wilson achieved the honor over stiff competition from Doc Rowell of Dalhart. Rowell's team however was named the Most Surprising Class AA Team. This honor is given as a salute to the team which added special interest to the season.

Wilson's Whirlwinds were 3-AA co-favorites along with Dimmitt before the season but pushed aside all comers including the Bobcats on way to a perfect 10-0 regular season. The Winds whipped Frenship in bi-district before Iowa Park's Hawks knocked them out of the playoffs.

The Amarillo Daily News named John Baker of Childress as Back of the Year, Tim Jeffress of Lockney, All-State candidate, swept the Lineman of the Year laurels.

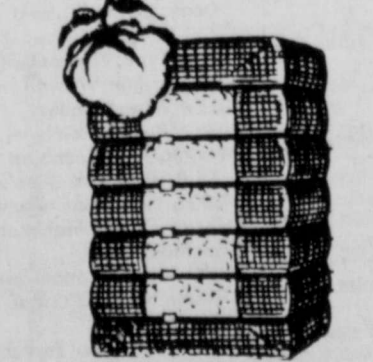
Jack Gregory, 'Winds' quarterback, received honorable mention in the Back of the Year Class AA awards.

Jeffress, more outstanding as a linebacker than end, according to the news report, completed his senior year with an average of 15.7 tackles a game of 157 for the year. Jeffress recovered five fumbles, intercepted two passes and blocked an extra point. He accumulated eight downfield blocks which cleared the way for the ball carrier to score touchdowns. In the past two years, Jeffress has caught 41 passes for 631 yards and five TDs.

## Bale Count



The gin by gin count of cotton baled according to Bob Ham-bright of the Texas Employment Commission office in Floydada showed a total of 59,753 bales Monday by Floyd County gins.

This compares to 34,179 bales ginned this time last year.

It appears now that most of the cotton in the gin yard and the county will fall short of the Lubbock estimate of 75,000 bales for the county earlier. Around 75,000 acres were seeded to cotton in the county. Around 44,000 bales were ginned last year.

In 1967 around 70,000 bales were recorded, 56,000 in 1966, and 121,000 in 1965 in Floyd County.

## Giant Trees Are In Peril

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif.

— Twenty years ago, needles on forest giants in mountains east of Los Angeles began turning yellow. Many trees have since died and hundreds of thousands are dying.

The trees, soaring more than 100 feet tall, some more than 700 years old, were Ponderosa pines, among the largest in the woods.

Foresters at first were baffled. They called the problem X disease and blamed it on some insect. Eventually, however, they tabbed the villain: smog.

The agent that withers the needles is a smog ingredient called ozone.

Prevailing winds carry smog from Los Angeles, 60 miles west, into the 60,000 acres of Ponderosa in the San Bernardino and San Jacinto Mountains, whose peaks jut nearly two miles high.

Today, experts estimate that 75 per cent, about 1.7 million, trees, are dying.

The eighth annual West Texas Water Conference has been set for Feb. 6, 1970, it was announced Tuesday. The program will have a double emphasis—availability of water for West Texas users and water quality problems.

The announcement was made by West Texas Water Institute Co-Chairman Gerald W. Thomas, dean of the Texas Tech University College of Agricultural Sciences, and William Miller, professor of geosciences.

The institute's vice chairman for education, Marvin J. Dvoracek, is in charge of the program which, he said, will include discussions of water pollution problems resulting from feedlot operations and new approaches to public understanding of the need for a statewide water plan.

## Six Cricket Fans Killed In Stampede

CALCUTTA, India (UPI)—Six persons were crushed or trampled to death and another 50 injured Tuesday in a stampede by thousands of cricket fans trying to purchase tickets for the championship test games between India and Australia. At least 10 of the injured were reported in serious condition.

Extra police, stationed at the Eden Gardens stadium since a minor riot last week, were forced to use tear gas and clubs to control the surging mob and restore order.

Police said about 20,000 fans lined up all night in hopes of buying tickets for the fourth day of the fourth test match between the Australian and Indian cricket teams.

The ticket booths were opened but after several hours, as the starting time neared, fans in the rear of the lines became worried and began pressing forward, police said.

The crush finally erupted into a stampede and scores of fans were knocked down, kicked and trampled before police could have in and break up the mobs.

The match opened on schedule before a capacity crowd with Australia winning.

**New Automated System For 70 Motor Vehicle Registration**

The Highway Department's seven (7) million vehicle records have been converted into an automated system with one of the major objectives being to reduce the long lines at the tax office during the registration renewal period (February and March each year).

These converted records are now stored in the Texas Highway Department's computer in Austin. During the last week in December of this year, the department will mail "License Plate Renewal Applications" to the seven million vehicle owners throughout the State.

Since the application is in fact a verification of the latest registration and title information stored in the computer, it will not be necessary for the owner to present his Certificate of title and the previous year's license receipt when renewing his registration. Under a new law, enacted by the 61st Texas Legislature, Regular session, 1969, the owner may, for an extra fee of \$1.00, obtain his 1970 license plates by mail.

Under the new system, it will not be necessary for the tax office to type license receipts for those persons having "License Plate Renewal Applications." This will greatly reduce the time required to register an automobile.

It is, therefore, most important for each car owner to keep his "License Plate Renewal Application" where it will be readily available for use during February and March. PERSONS NOT HAVING THE APPLICATION WILL, AS IN THE PAST, BE REQUIRED TO PRESENT THEIR CERTIFICATE OF TITLE AND CURRENT LICENSE RECEIPT.

At the time these 1970 "License Plate Renewal Applications" are received, the owner may if he so desires, mail this application card together with the license fee shown

thereon, plus the \$1.00 fee for mailing and handling charge (for each set of plates), to the County Tax Collector's Office during the month of January. Applications received by the Tax Office in January will be held until February 1, 1970, at which time the plates and owners receipt will be mailed to the applicant.

Due to this new system, there will be NO selection of license numbers. The Public's cooperation in this matter will be greatly appreciated.

Above all other things, the Chinese teen-ager is anxious to please his parents."

Most Chinese-Americans, no matter how wealthy or poor, maintain a strict family-style home. Mealtimes are ceremonious affairs which must be attended by every member of the family. Schooling, the reverence for religion, and decorum plus reverence for the elders are the prime movers in developing the child from infancy.

The amazing record of the Chinese-American youngsters shows that it is in the home that the cure for juvenile delinquency will be found--and in no other place.

HOMEMAKERS**

Foods and nutrition specialists for the Texas A&M Extension Service have several good tips on how to safely prepare holiday foods.

You should be particularly careful in your preparation of your stuffing. This holiday treat usually contains bread crumbs, seasonings, chicken broth, fat, perhaps an egg or two, and sometimes chestnuts and meats. Chances of bacterial growth are great, because the small pieces of food are handled often when the stuffing is prepared.

Stuff the turkey just before roasting it and combine the ingredients just before cooking time. If pork is to be added to the stuffing, such as sausage, be sure it is thoroughly cooked. You should never partially cook a bird ahead of time. If you do, the stuffing will only be warm by the time the bird is ready to be eaten. If the stuffing is not thoroughly cooked, bacterial growth will form. You must be careful to thoroughly cook all holiday foods. In five hours, there can be enough toxin to cause illness, in seven hours at room temperature, the possibility of poisoning is even greater.

Have a safe, pleasant holiday. Don't let undercooked food spoil it.

**PAPER BAG FRUIT BREAD**  
3 eggs  
2/3 cups sugar  
1/2 cup butter or margarine  
1 cup milk  
3 cups all purpose flour  
2-1/2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon grated lemon or orange peel  
2 teaspoons anise seeds, crushed

1/4 cup chopped almonds  
1/2 cup chopped mixed candied fruit  
1/2 cup golden raisins

Take a paper bag with a bottom measurement of 1-1/2 x 4-1/2 inches and fold down the top, and fold again, until you have a secure "cuff" and sides are about 4 inches high. Grease insides of bag well and place on cookie sheet.

In small bowl beat eggs until thick and lemon colored; add sugar and beat 1 minute. Heat butter or margarine in small saucepan until butter melts; set aside. In large mixing bowl combine flour, baking powder, salt, anise seed, almonds and fruit. Add egg mixture along with half of butter-milk mixture. Blend well. Add rest of milk and butter. Blend until smooth. Pour into bag, bake at 350 degrees for 60 to 75 minutes.

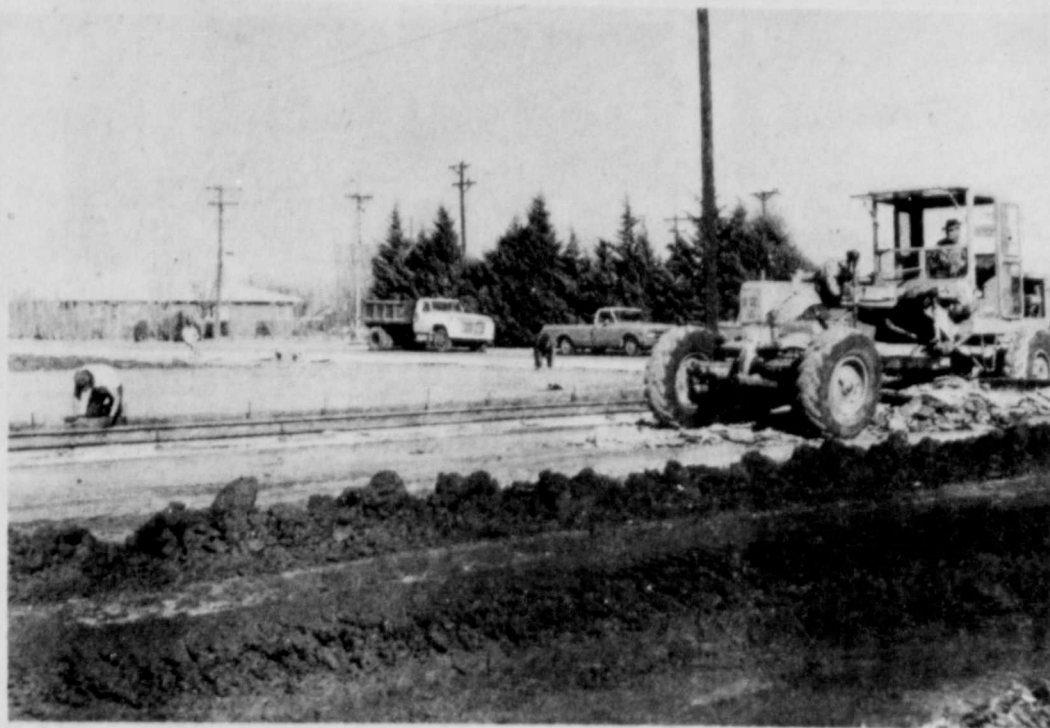

### The First Jail House

Although the Floyd County Commissioners Court had given consideration in their first meeting June 12, 1890, by the time the July meeting was held they decided to have "plans and specifications" for it, so they named Judge Arthur B. Duncan and Clerk R. T. Miller to prepare the papers and advertiser for bids. The minutes read "a jail house be built of the following dimensions:

"Twenty-two by 30 feet with partition wall cutting off eight feet at the front of the building for a jailer's office; that the wall will be 12 feet high, a boxed building and stripped; covered with iron roofing; four windows, two on either side, two barred at the jail end; two doors, one at the front of the building and one in the partition wall, the one in the partition wall to be made of D&M flooring and doubled and closely nailed; the other to be a panel door six feet eight inches by two feet eight inches, all of first class material.

No Floor Needed  
"The jail part of said building is not to be floored. The windows are to have eight lights, the lights 12 x 16 inches. The rafters are to be every two feet and laths every 18 inches; the roof to have a pitch of two feet and six inches. All to be well put together and in workman-like manner."

It is to be remembered the court had already bought a "pair of jail cells" in their first meeting on June 12, along with a safe to keep records in. The safe and jail cells set the county back a total of \$3,700, of which \$200 was contracted to be paid in cash, the remainder in "bonds to run 15 years at 6 per cent with option to pay at any time."  
When the commissioners advertised for bids to build the jail house they had only one offer. This was by J. N. Smith. His bid was rejected on Sept. 15. On the following day, however, Smith must have changed his bid to the liking of the court. They voted to "receive

the second bid of J. N. Smith and to construct the jail house for the sum of \$375, and the contract awarded to said Smith."

**Why The Delay?**  
But still there was delay, which may or may not be accounted for by one of three things, or a combination thereof. (This is simply a matter of conjecture). (1) Members of the court were elected in May, their terms to expire on general election day Nov. 4.

Members of the court might have been "shelling the woods" for re-election. Also, (2) since the court was requiring Mr. Smith to make bond for performance he could have been having difficulty finding acceptable bondsmen in this raw start of organized civilization.

Or (3) it could have been the court told Smith to hold up, since a more elaborate plan might be hatching. For, after the election there appears on the court's minutes an order for an election to vote on a bond

issue of \$4,000 for jail house bonds. Nothing further came of this order evidently. A notation apparently in R. T. Miller's hand writing on the margin of the page says "Was Not."

Whatever the delay the minutes record that on Dec. 16 the court voted to accept the J. N. Smith bond for proper construction of the building "and it is hereby approved." From then on everything must have been hotsy totsy, for the court voted to hand over \$250 to Smith to buy lumber, and in 1891, February 13, "The court received the jail house building from the contractor and his sureties released from his bond and that final settlement be made." Final settlement on the \$350 contract was a check for \$122.16 balance due.

This is almost the end of the story but not quite. J. B. Shaw was allowed \$21.84 for "corrozzated iron" for the jail roof. At this late date in history we wouldn't know whether

"corrozzated iron" was the same as "corrugated iron." Maybe yes, maybe no.

### Attends Workshop

LaVada Garrett, Floydada Junior High School special education teacher, recently attended a workshop for junior high school teachers of the educable mentally retarded hosted by the Region XVII Education Service Center.

Sixteen teachers from the area attended the sub-regional workshop to review current procedures and practices and to learn new concepts in prevocational activities for the mentally retarded.

Vocational Adjustment programs were also discussed at this meeting. These programs are limited to the high school in which the EMR student is in school half a day and leaves in the afternoon to work at a job suited to his abilities.

### New Interest Rate On Savings Bonds

J. C. Webb, Floyd County chairman for U. S. Savings Bonds, was today queried about the new 5-per-cent interest rate for Savings Bonds.

"The new higher rate announced by President Nixon makes Savings Bonds a better buy than ever before", Chairman Webb states. "It will greatly benefit the members of our communities who have been putting aside dollars regularly - through Payroll Savings Plans or over-the-counter purchases at their banks - savings for a new home, farm improvements, an automobile, college for the children, a dream vacation, or a retirement nest egg."

The 5-per-cent interest rate applies to all outstanding Series E and H Bonds sold on or after June 1, 1969, if held to maturity. All outstanding E and H Bonds also benefit from the new 5-per-cent rate, beginning with the first semiannual interest period starting on or after June 1.

According to Webb, "The maturity period for Series E Bonds has been reduced from 7 years to 5 years, 10 months. H Bonds continue to mature in 10 years.

"Freedom Shares - which have been sold in combination with E Bonds since May 1, 1967 - will be removed from sale effective June 30, 1970."

"The higher rate should boost Savings Bonds sales throughout our area," Webb said. "And it will be an added incentive for our young folks -

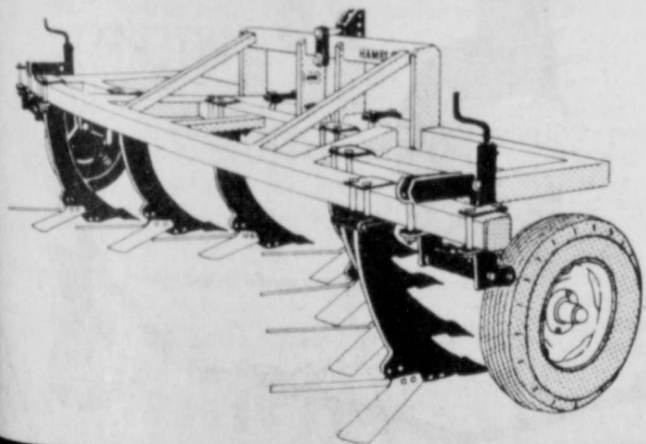

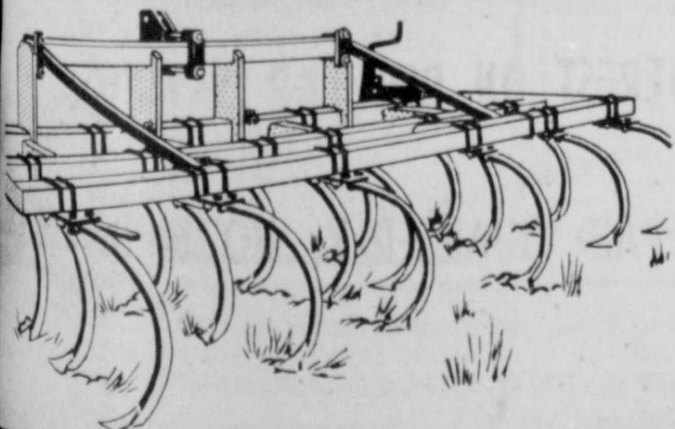

# Judge Holmes Attends Mental Health Meeting

The Central Plains Comprehensive Community Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center, Plainview, Texas, December 10, 1969

The Central Plains Comprehensive Community Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center of Plainview, Texas, became a reality November 1, 1969 when it began limited operation after a year of planning and implementing.

This Center, which comprises the following 9 counties: Floyd, Motley, Briscoe, Hale, Swisher, Castro, Bailey, and Lamb, has the following services already available to the nine counties: a detoxification center through the Plainview Hospital under the supervision of Dr. Mary D. Bubliss, and a crisis mental health care unit through the Plainview Hospital. An outpatient clinic for State Hospital Returnees and referrals of mental health cases from the outlying counties is being conducted through Dr. Mary D. Bubliss office at 1005 W. 9th, Plainview, Texas. Information, education, programs and referral service is through the office of the coordinator, Mrs. Elizabeth Woodley, Box 578, Telephone 806, 296, 5289 Plainview Texas, 79072. The services for the retarded of the area, including testing, neurological and EEG examinations is through the High Plains Childrens Training Center at 214 W. 11th, Plainview, Texas. After the new Mental Health Building opens in the summer of 1970, adjoining the Central Plains General Hospital, Plainview, a full scope of services will be available for the nine counties.

Judge J. K. Holmes attended the site visit in September when the State Department of Mental Health/Mental Retardation of Austin came out and reviewed the plan that Mrs. Elizabeth Woodley had provided for their approval. At the beginning of the planning period he appointed Mr. Harley McCasland of Lockney as the representative from Floyd County to the 9 county Board of Trustees. He, too, attended the site visit.

Judge and Mrs. Holmes and Mr. and Mrs. Harley McCasland attended a Board Meeting and Christmas dinner in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Noel Woodley, December 10, along with twenty four other representatives from the 9 counties. Mr. Jess Osborn, member of the Texas Board of Mental Health/Mental Retardation, spoke to the group concerning the financing of the Centers. The State awarded \$59,517.00 to start the program and maintain it for 10 months. This includes the \$1800.00 monthly that the High Plains Training Center is given by the Community MH/MR Center. He stated that money will be even less easy to get in the fiscal year 1970/71 since there will be more community centers in operation and no more money available. He pointed out that the communities receiving these services will have to begin to plan ahead as to how they can provide money for the Center through their civic clubs, United Fund, Church groups, project, agricultural groups, etc.

Forty four children were served the past year from Floyd County by the Central Plains Comprehensive Community Mental Retardation facility. The High Plains Childrens Training Center, in Plainview. Since the Community Center services opened November 1st two have used the Detoxification Unit from Floyd County and one the Outpatient Service. Five have used the referral and information service from Floyd County. As the Center becomes better known, and the facilities become operable this will be used much more, of course. Up to now no money has been required from Floyd County, but it is not expected that the Center can continue to pick up the tab. The Floyd County Commissioners have signed a contract with the Center to pay for the indigent care that is referred to the Center by the Court. Eight of the nine counties involved in this Center have signed a contract to this effect. The other county has not signed but is picking up the cost of services for its patients referred to the Center, as it has all along.

Floyd County as an advisory board appointed by Judge Holmes to bring the information to the communities: Mr. and Mrs. Wendell M. Tooley, Mrs. Billy Jordan, Mrs. Emily Potts, Mrs. Mary Pearl Coward, all of Floydada; Harley McCasland, Weldon Dodson and R. L. Knox of Lockney; Bob Gibson of Aiken, Texas.

At the meeting that Judge Holmes recently attended of the Center seven of the nine county judges were in attendance. Judge Forrest Campbell and Mr. and Mrs. Algie Groves of Motley County were in attendance. Any information concerning this Center can be had by calling Mrs. Elizabeth Woodley or Judge J. K. Holmes, or W. W. Allen, Chairman of the Board of Trustees.

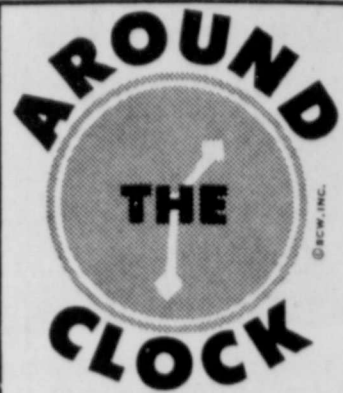

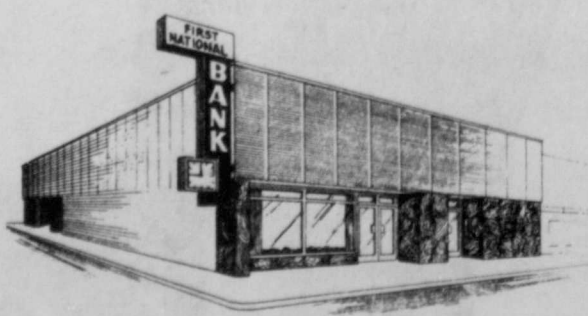

...approaching Christmas season is a time for thoughts and a reflection of what friendship really means. I wish to you for your past kindnesses and for your encouragement and support. The best way to express appreciation is to say "Thank You" most sincerely.

...been my honor to represent our district since 1964. There have been many changes during that time. The most significant has been the necessary increase in appropriations to keep up with the fantastic population explosion in our state. We now have twice as many students in our colleges as we did in 1964 and the public school enrollment has increased by 50% since then. The expansions in the education of our state have caused many changes... notably appropriations and additional taxes. Needless to say, these have been controversial and will continue to be so.

...controversy has come about recently over an opinion issued by the Attorney General Crawford Martin interpreting the new Family Code that becomes effective January 1st. The controversy has been over young people being able to get married by "common law."

...posed was this: The Legislature adopted a new code of laws regarding marriage and divorce. Contrary to general belief, the new laws do not change a thing about either teenagers or common law marriages. The new code will simply make it possible for the state to keep track of common law marriages by "setting up a registration system." Most of the controversy has been over the filing of this declaration.

...officials who worked on the new code, including myself, to outlaw common law marriages, regardless of whether or not the model statute of the Bar Association was used. Before common law marriages can be outlaws, they must be laws written to protect the legitimacy of common law unions.

...marriage, which is a remnant of frontier days when licenses and preachers were far less accessible, are recognized by Texas courts. It has always been for girls 14 or older and boys 16 or older without parental consent. However, the courts have held that there is no "secret" common law marriage.

...new law parents and guardians will have the power to annul marriages within 90 days. This provision appears to be used to break up underage common law as well as legal marriages. Thereby parents will actually have more and not less over their children's marriages. Congratulations!

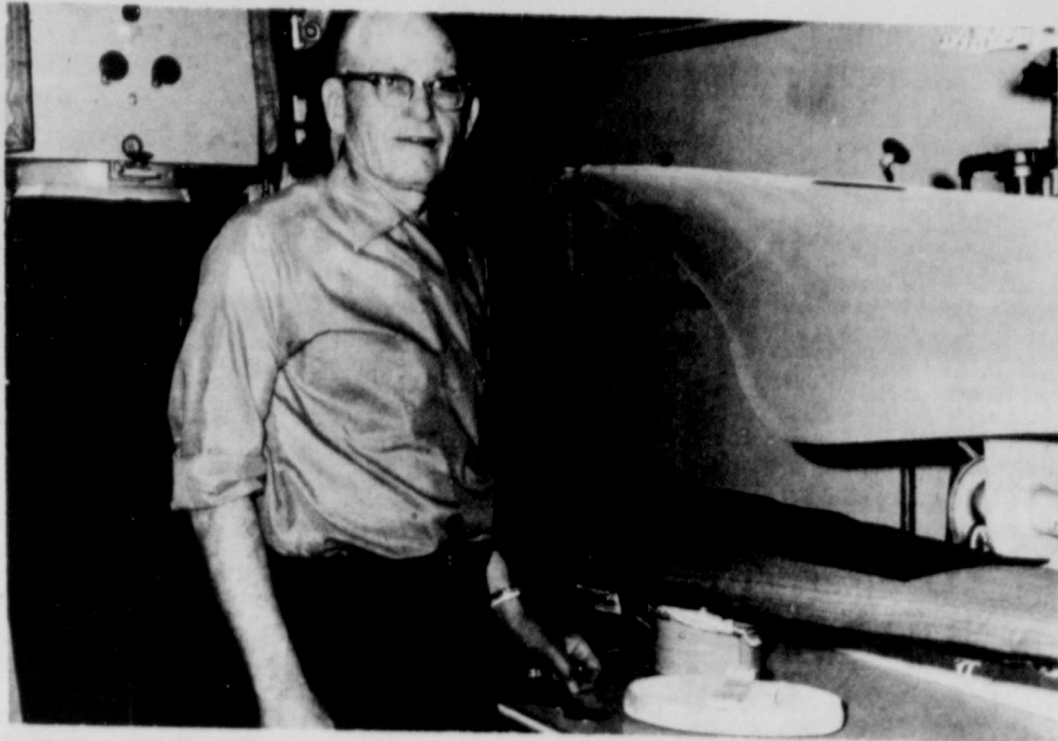

Editor's note: The Floyd Philosopher on his Johnsongrass farm takes a look at inflation this week, but it's hard to tell what he sees.

Dear editor:

I had to make another trip into town the other day to pick up another 5-cent tractor bolt now costing 15 cents and since I was throwing money around recklessly anyway I hauled off and bought a newspaper.

In it I ran across an article that said the cost of a college education is up 68 percent since 1957, and this got me to thinking about inflation.

Now you take that 15-cent bolt. It's true it costs three times as much as it did 10 or 12 years ago, but at the same time it's still just as good a bolt as the earlier one.

Now with college education, well I don't want to get into an argument, uh, I don't want to compare bolts and nuts with college kids, but are you positive the product is as good today as it was 12 years ago? Or are they just televising the wrong ones?

As I understand it, inflation hits us in two ways. In one, the quality stays the same but the price goes up, like in automobiles. Cars are as good today as they were 12 years ago, they just cost a lot more. In the other way, the price stays the same but the quality comes down, like a nickel candy bar. You can still buy a nickel candy bar, you just don't get nearly as much candy. Mostly wrapper.

But when inflation really hurts is when you pay a lot more but don't get as much.

Take Congress for example. Congress costs over twice what it did 12 years ago, but can anybody prove... well, I'd better not get into that.

It's an odd thing. Politicians are always saying if you raise salaries you'll get a better quality of office-holder, but what happens? We raise the salary and the same people turn up running for the same offices.

There's just one way to whip inflation, and I knew what it was I'd say so.
