Water Development Board Reviews Mackenzie Bonds

Decision Due February 25

Floydada's Lon Davis, who is president of the Mackenzie Water Authority and Tulsa's Don Bookout, legal counsel for the authority were in Austin last week to meet with the Water Development Board in regard to bond money that is needed before construction of the Mackenzie dam can begin.

The following report from Austin gives details of the meeting.

"The Texas Water Development Board last week tentatively agreed to take \$3.8 million in Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority bonds to underwrite a three-county water resources project. But actual approval won't be forthcoming until the board makes a priority rating on all of its 'over commitments.'

At this time, the state board's loan commitments total \$23.8 million, and it has only \$17.5 million available to assist water districts and municipalities construct water supply projects - so the board is committed to lend \$6.2 million more than it has to lend.

The board has asked Attorney General Crawford Martin whether it can make interim financing on some projects which could be paid back before the more expensive projects get underway, but he has not yet issued an opinion.

However, some of the commitments do not have to be met for several years, and in an effort to get water to dry or nearly-dry communities, the board Thursday decided it must rate commitments by time of need as well as need itself. The staff was ordered to present a priority proposal when the board meets next in the Palacio del Rio in San Antonio at 1:30 p.m. Feb. 25.

MAKES REQUEST
Joe Smith of First Southwest Company, Lubbock, made the financing request for the authority which extends to Floyd, Briscoe and Swisher counties. Under the water supply project he explained, a dam and reservoir

Parents, Police Search For Dog

If found, the dog will be held and observed for evidence of rabies. If the dog is not located soon, young Christy will have to take the painful anti-rabies serum shots.

Cotton Bale Count

With 99 1/2% of the 1969 cotton crop harvested, Bob Ham-bright of the local Texas Employment Office reports that a total of 62,814 bales have been ginned by Floyd County gins.

This compares with a November 1 estimate of 70,000 bales for the county.

The 1968 bale count was a little over 45,000 bales.

The local ASCS office estimated that 78,000 acres were harvested in 1969.

The cotton allotment for Floyd County in 1970 is 101,288 acres. The farmer may plant all of his allotment or only 65%.

Nixon Farm Administration Says Farmers In Good Financial Shape

The Grain Sorghum Producers Association's request to President Nixon to reconsider the withdrawal of advance payments for the 1970 feed grain program was answered this week by Carl H. Schwartz Jr., director of the Natural Resources Programs Division of the Bureau of the Budget.

In his letter Schwartz said, "Continuation of the 50 percent advance payment would increase 1970 budget outlays by about \$300 million. Since the agricultural economy is now in relatively much better shape and because of the expressed desire of both the Congress and the President to fight inflation by holding budget outlays within the limits established by Public Law 91-47, the decision was made to discontinue the payments."

Schwartz added, "We recognize that this action, along with other actions we have had to take in the battle against inflation, will cause some adjustment problems. However, the consequences of not taking these actions would be worse for all of us."

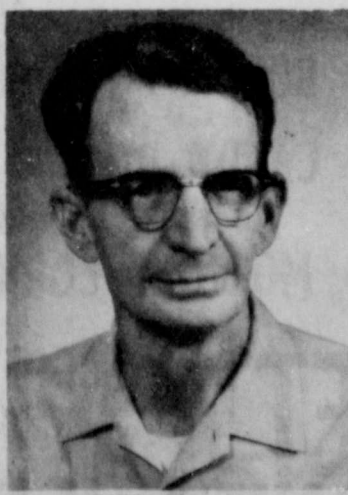
In commenting about Schwartz's letter, Elbert Harp, executive director of GSPA, said, "When farmers pay their 1969 income taxes, I believe the budget bureau will be shocked to find out farmers are not as well off as they seem to think we are."

Harp pointed out that because of pressure to continue the advanced payments, that Secretary Hardin has promised to make full settlement of government payments as soon as possible after July 1. Harp said, "This will help considerably if we can get these checks in July, and GSPA will be pushing for it."

He will direct a force of 29 crew leaders and 440 census takers throughout the area.

voir would be built on Tule Creek to serve Tula, Silverton, Floydada and Lockney. It would take \$3.8 million to get the project underway, Smith estimated, and the authority would have to come back at some future date and ask for \$4.2 million more for Phase II construction.

The M.M.W.A. is planning stage construction because the cities to be served would not all go on the line at the same time. Smith said Silverton is expected to be the first for service; Lockney - Floydada by about 1977 and Tula would come in whenever its Santa Rosa sand water well runs out - "that might be 10 or 20 years."

PROVIDES PROPOSAL

Smith provided the board members with a tightly-written 13-page proposal, tracing the development of the water authority and its financing programs. One board member who specializes in municipal bond financing professionally, W. E. (Buck) Tinsley, said, "This is one of the most expertly conceived and presented plans I have seen since I have been on this board - masterful. This is the type of program for which this board was created."

W.D.B. Executive Director Howard Boswell said there was no legal reason why Mackenzie M.W.A. cannot qualify as eligible for assistance, but he noted that the money needed simply is not available. "We could give a commitment with the understanding that the funding would have to come from proceeds of new water development board bonds," Boswell suggested, "or go the interim financing route."

"We say we are over committed," Tinsley said, "but we don't really know what that means. Let's establish a list of priorities." The board decided to do just that Feb. 25, and deferred a final decision on Mackenzie until then.

Wage Increases Due in 1970 to Hit Record High

The median wage increase falling due in 1970 under contracts currently in force is 17.1 cents an hour, according to a study just released by The Bureau of National Affairs, Inc. The increase is the highest in the thirteen years BNA has been compiling deferred wage increase data, and represents a gain of 2.7 cents over deferred increases falling due in 1969. Deferred increases will continue to carry weight in negotiations in the year ahead, according to BNA. In addition, provision in some contracts for cost-of-living increases - or escalator clauses - will continue to boost wage adjustments above the amounts designated as deferred wage increases. The construction industry continues to play a leading role in deferred wage gains. Increases coming due in 1970 are at an all-time high of 50.5 cents an hour, compared with 40.0 cents in 1969. Excluding construction settlements, the overall median adjustment drops 2.0 cents, to 15.1 cents an hour. In manufacturing alone, the median deferred wage increase next year is 15.0 cents an hour, up from 12.2 cents in 1969 and 10.2 cents in 1968. This step-up in 1970 - 2.8 cents - is slightly higher than last year's rise, unlike the all-industry pattern. Among nonmanufacturing groups, the median deferred wage gain for 1970 is 24.6 cents an hour, up 4.6 cents from deferred increases falling due in the current year.

ingredient before freezing. You also may add the ingredient to whole eggs you freeze. The choice of additive depends upon the use of the eggs after thawing.

For example add salt to yolks if you'll use later for mayonnaise or noodles. Add sugar if eggs are used later in baked goods.

Each cup of egg yolks should be blended with one tablespoon of sugar or corn syrup or one half teaspoon salt.

Freeze eggs in the amounts that you'll use at one time. Frozen eggs to be used in the refrigerator, or at room temperature, always in the unopened package. If packages are made small for cooking purposes when they are frozen,

FREEZE EGGS
Extra eggs, yolks or whites? Freeze them.

But do not freeze whole eggs in the shell; water inside will expand and break the shell.

Break egg and examine it carefully. Freeze only high quality eggs. Egg whites will freeze successfully without additional ingredients, but egg yolks become gummy and lumpy after thawing. They will not blend well with other ingredients unless you add a stabilizer.

To prevent this change in the yolks, add a small amount of salt, sugar or other edible

Frozen eggs should be used while they are still chilled, particularly when yolks are frozen separately.

Frozen egg whites can be used in the same manner for cooking purposes as one would use fresh egg whites. They make just as good meringues, frostings, and angel cakes as fresh egg whites do.

Egg and Potato Scramble
2 slices bacon
4 medium - sized potatoes, sliced thin
1 teaspoon salt (omit if using frozen eggs)
4 eggs beaten
1/4 cup milk
pepper

Fry bacon slices and remove from fry pan. Fry potatoes in the fat until they are well browned, sprinkling with salt as browning starts. Cover pan closely. Cook over low heat until potatoes are tender. Combine eggs, milk and pepper. Pour over potatoes in pan and cook slowly, stirring occasionally, until eggs are set. Crumble bacon and add just before removing pan from heat. Serve at once.

Frozen eggs can be measured after thawing and used as fresh eggs in the following proportions:

-3 tablespoons of thawed frozen whole egg equal one whole fresh egg
-2 tablespoons of thawed frozen egg white equal one fresh egg white
-1 1/3 tablespoons of thawed frozen egg yolk equal one frozen fresh egg yolk.

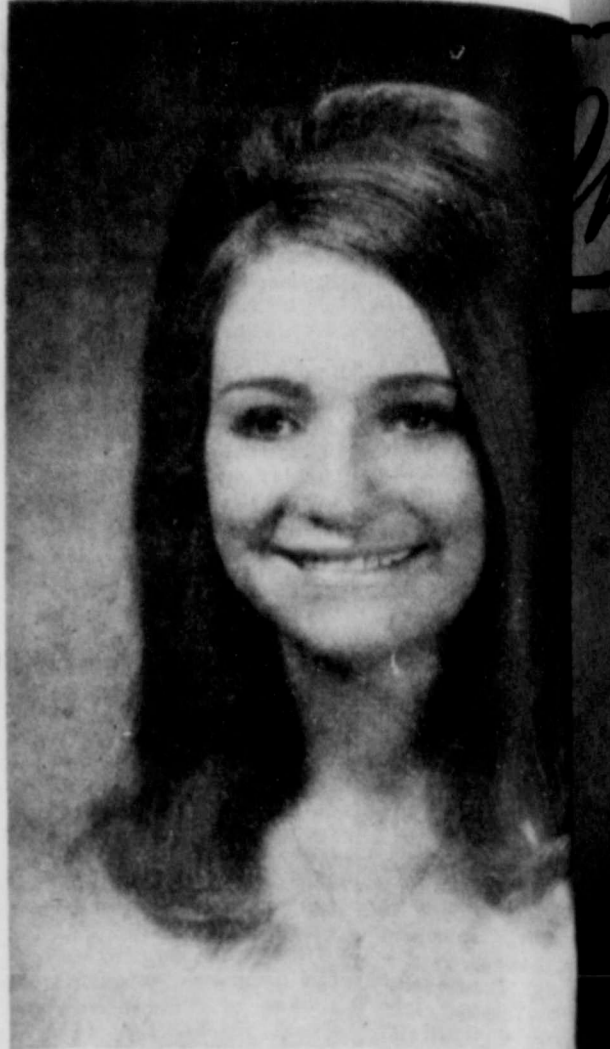

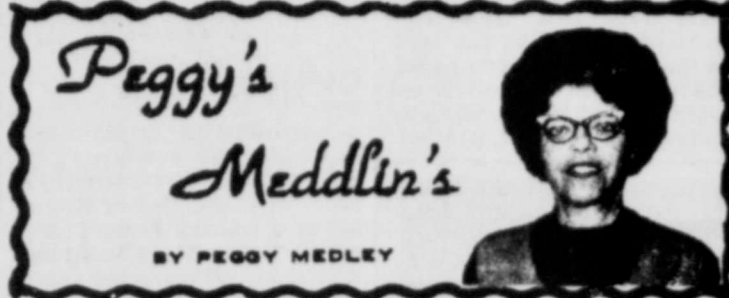

ter made 16 of 21 and the Whirlwinds made 10 of 14.

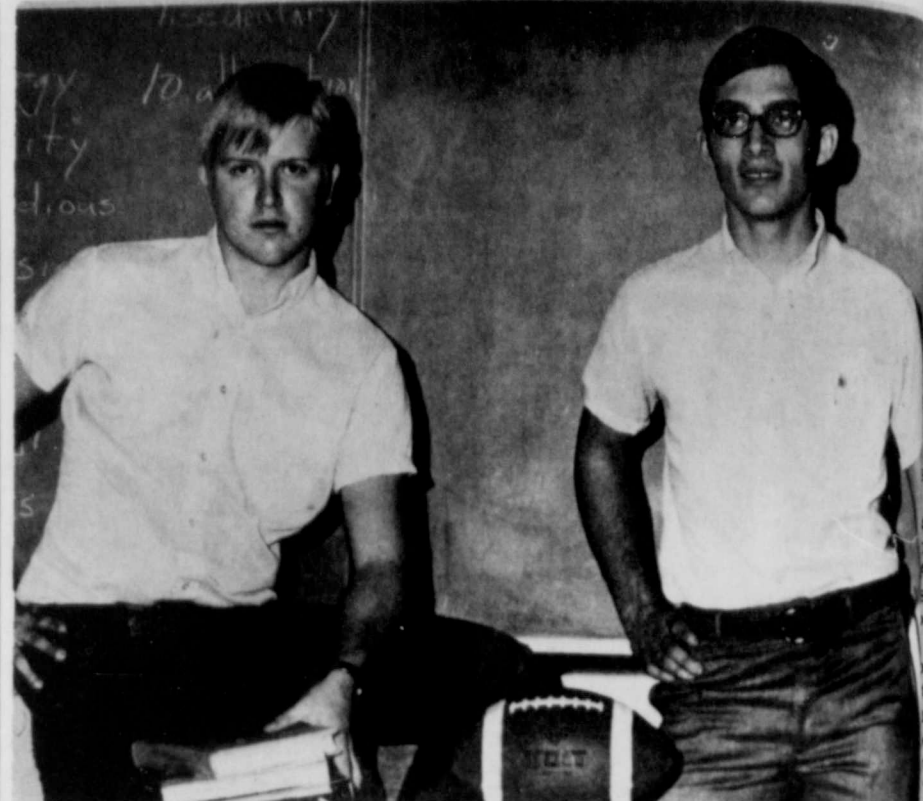

New Auto License Plate Purchase Plan

AUSTIN - When the owners of Texas' seven million motor vehicles get their 1970 license plates, they will find that the Texas Highway Department has taken a lot of frustration out of registration.

Owners will receive motor vehicle registration applications by mail early in January.

This three-part form is the key to convenience.

In previous years, the vehicle owner had to hunt up his certificate of title and last year's license receipt and take them to the tax office or a substation. Often, he found himself at the end of a long, slow-moving line.

The lines should be much shorter this year. And there are provisions for license plates by mail.

Here's how easy it is:

If a motorist goes to the county tax office or a substation, all he need take is the three-part form - the motor vehicle registration application - that came in the mail. And the registration fee, of course.

If he should find a line, chances are it will be shorter and faster-moving than any he remembered from previous years.

All he needs do is to present the renewal application and pay the fee. The clerk will validate the application with the new license numbers and return part of the form as a receipt.

Another part of the form is retained for the county's records and the third is sent to the Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department in Austin.

Should the vehicle owner decide to register his vehicle by mail, he sends the entire renewal application, the fee and an additional \$1 to his county tax officer. The \$1 additional charge is provided by statute to cover the cost of handling and postage.

The registration "season" begins at county tax offices and substations on February 1. The vehicle owner can register his vehicle in person until April 1. If he wants his plates mailed to him, he must send in his application, the fee and the \$1 postage and handling charge to his county tax officer by March 1.

This allows 30 days for delivery before 1970 license plates must be displayed after midnight, April 1.

Easy-to-follow instructions are printed on the three-part

form. The Highway Department asks that the owner leave the form intact and that he not separate the three parts.

The new system is the product of many months of planning and work. The system began taking shape in 1967 with the installation of the first computer equipment by the Highway Department.

At one stage, 500 inmates of the Texas Department of Corrections were engaged in matching records and converting the records into a format suitable to be put into computers.

The new system gives Texas one of the most modern and efficient systems for maintaining accurate and up-to-date records on motor vehicles in the world.

The big beneficiary, however, is the vehicle owner who will realize extra convenience and big savings in time.

Today's eating utensils fall into four categories: sterling silver, gold plate, silver plate, and stainless steel. Each has its special characteristics, but all are kept in tiptop condition by prompt washing, either by hand or machine.

The metal of which tableware is made need not be considered in the light of "company best" versus "everyday." Sterling grows more beautiful with use and some stainless is handsome enough to use with any table setting. In each category, there is a range of prices determined by quality of metal, weight and balance, craftsmanship, and intricacy of pattern.

Sterling stamped on the back of a piece means that it is made of 925 parts silver to 75 parts of an alloy. Since by law, all silver is equally pure in silver content, the differences in sterling flatware are in the sharpness and clarity of pattern and the size, weight and balance of each piece. Personal preference is a major criteria in selection. After purchase, proper care and washing techniques, though simple, are important for maintaining eye appeal.

Besides its intrinsic value as a precious metal, sterling doesn't wear out. And it is appropriate for any occasion - from casual family dining to formal entertaining. Unlike other possessions, frequent, even daily use, makes silver more lovely. It acquires a patina, the soft, lustrous finish created by the blending of many fine lines. Happily, care is simple - either machine dishwashing or hot suds and rinses with an occasional polishing. When washed by hand, be sure to dry thoroughly. All metals, including stainless steel, spot if left to drain dry. If necessary, use a soft, well-lathered brush. Polish so applied tends to remove dark shadow intentionally placed there by the silversmith to accent the design. Rather, for an occasional shine-up, use a liquid or cream polish made specifically for silver and follow directions. With a soft cloth or sponge, rub lengthwise, never in a circular motion. Sulphur in foods and air cause tarnish. So keep from prolonged contact with salt, eggs or anything rubber. Store in a silver chest or drawer lined with tarnish-preventing cloth or in roll-up cases made of this material. And to achieve a uniform patina, rotate the pieces used daily.

Gold flatware, is becoming more and more popular. Gold flatware is achieved by a process called electroplating. A layer of gold is deposited electrolytically on a base metal. Unlike sterling which is silver through and through, the amount of gold deposited on a piece ranges from about 12K to 23K. The higher the carats, the better the quality. In addition, design and craftsmanship are important when choosing gold electroplate service. Vermeil is gold-plated sterling silver. Although gold is non-tarnishing, it is a soft metal and should be stored carefully to avoid deep scratches.

Similarly, silver plate describes an article made of non-precious metal coated with a layer of pure silver by the electro-plating process. The base metal may be copper, brass, or nickel silver. Again, the care required is basically hot suds and rinses and careful drying. Polish as necessary and store just like sterling in order to prevent excessive tarnishing.

Both gold and silver plate will wear away with use. A discoloration, known as bronze

tarnish, may appear on plated pieces where the gold or silver has worn away. This is an indication that replating by a jeweler is necessary.

Stainless steel varies widely in price and appearance. This in turn, depends upon the alloy used, how the piece is made, and the finishing. The percentages of chromium and nickel with the steel determine color and rust-resistance. High nickel content in the alloy gives a whiter color and will look new longer. A bluish tone means more chromium is used. Pieces stamped from a sheet of uniformly thick metal, will be less expensive than those that are graded in thickness.

Fine finishing and polishing is also a sign of good quality. In well-finished pieces, the pattern is clear and all parts are smooth. Being a hard metal, it is difficult to create intricate patterns without costly hand-finishing. But stainless is available in designs that range from copies of traditional silver to the most modern.

Though much tougher than the other metals, even stainless will discolor from prolonged contact with certain foods, and will then need a treatment of metal polish. Otherwise, ordinary washing will maintain the shine of stainless steel.

Most sterling silver, gold and silver plate, and stainless steel tableware may be washed in the dishwasher. Hollow-handle knives are an exception. High temperatures may loosen the cement which holds them to the blade. Machine washing is sanitary, efficient, and ever so easy. However, sometimes silverware may spot or not be clean. There are several possible causes. First, check to be sure that the utensils are placed in the silverware basket according to the manufacturer's instructions. Avoid overcrowding and nesting of similar pieces. Only detergents designed specifically for dishwashers should be used, and in amounts proper for soil and water conditions. Avoid spilling dry detergent on wet silverware; it may cause dark spots on the metal. If this should happen, remove spots with silver polish.

Besides incorrect loading procedures and detergent use, the other most common fault is related to water temperature and an inadequate amount of water. Water temperature should be between 140 and 160 degrees. If pressure is low and cannot be increased due to local conditions, try running the dishwasher when water is not in use elsewhere in the home and at non-peak periods for the area.
