## State Water Board Loans Money For Mackenzie Land Purchase

The first step in water for the future for Tulla, Floydada, Lockney and Silverton was taken last Friday as the state water board granted a \$300,000 loan to the Mackenzie Water Authority for purchase of land for the dam project.

Although almost four million dollars are needed to build the dam and filtering plant, members of the Mackenzie board and the four city councils felt that purchase of the land was a "foot in the door" with the state water board and more money would be forthcoming after purchase of the land.

Some 2,000 acres on Tule Creek will be purchased for the dam site and filtering plant from five land owners. Mackenzie board president Lon Davis said the \$300,000 would not all be spent for land purchase as some of it would be used for incidental expenses of setting up taxing system for the authority and other smaller expenses.

Davis said the money would bear interest of 3.78 percent.

The Friday decision by the state water board came as a result of a meeting called by Floydada mayor Jimmy Seay a couple of weeks ago when he invited the chairman of the state water board Marvin Shurbet to meet in Floydada with the four city councils and Mackenzie board members.

At that time Shurbet invited the group to Austin. Attending the meeting from Floydada were Mayor Seay, councilman Wayne Russell, Davis and city manager Bill Feuerbacher.

TAKE stock of my pet peeves, really, I don't have them. Floydada folk are very fine people and in most cases cooperative. However, I do wish everyone would help with our production problems in obeying our 5:30 p.m. deadline on news and advertising each week.

When there are emergencies, or Tuesday night news, when they want to get them in the paper that week. . . I don't want anyone who seeks the cooperation of the police, or a balance person than I, in getting tips on these emergencies. The wrecker people have occasionally been good to me, but when something happens. . . "please and thank you."

EARLY '40s a tornado hit our place on the southern edge of the Kress town section. Although our house was not hit, it took some trees, twisted the windmill, went into Kress where two persons were killed. We were in the house, just getting ready to go to the cellar. If we had got out we would have certainly been scared when the tornado hit the cellar door off.

Something of the fear, the sorrow, that comes with a disaster, and join the people of the neighboring towns in expressing sympathy to the people who suffered tornado damage and loss of lives last Friday night.

## Politics Coming To Life

### Absentee Voting At Clerk's Office

With three persons seeking the office of county judge, politics is beginning to come to life in Floyd County.

A big vote is expected in the May 2 Primary for both Democrats and Republicans, and candidates with opponents are advertising and making personal contacts, seeking the votes.

At press time yesterday, 20 persons had voted absentee.

Floyd County Democrats will find several county races contested, including the County Judge race, with three names on the ballot - J. K. Holmes, Ralph R. Cogdell, and Foster Amburn; Precinct 4 Commissioner, where candidates are Bill McNeill and Babe Jones; Justice of Peace, Precincts 1 and 4, with S. J. Handley and Lee Howard listed on the ballot; and Justice of the Peace, Precincts 2 and 3, where four seek election - Florence Hooten Dillahunt, Esker M. Pyle, R. H. (Raz) Ford, and Earl Cooper.

## Tornadoes Miss Floyd County, Rain, Hail Falls

Floyd County escaped the destruction of the tornadoes that skipped across parts of a Panhandle - South Plains area last weekend, killing 22 persons, injuring 135, and causing property losses in the millions of dollars.

Only minor hail damage was reported in the county, with rainfall from about a quarter inch to an inch reported. Week end totals of .3 inch were recorded at the Lakeview Store, Sandhill Elevator, and the Jay S. Hale property in the Starkley Community.

Precipitation near .4 inch was reported at Cedar Hill, Mancy, and the Henry Hinton residence near Dougherty. Half - inch rains fell near South Plains and Harmony.

Heaviest rainfall was recorded east of Floydada, where .9 inch fell on the Jack McIntosh residence on the Matador highway, with hail damage to wheat crops. The Ned Bradley residence in the Antelope community had about three-quarters of an inch.

A strip of hail cut across the county, extending from McCoy, across Blanco Canyon, going near the Jay S. Hale and Howard Gregory residences south of Floydada, and heading northeast to the McIntosh place and across the Fowler farms, then on northeast and off the caprock.

Tornadoes touched down at the area towns of Anton, Claytonville, Cotton Center, Lazbuddie, Plainview, Silverton, Whiteface, Whitharral, and Sherwood Shores (near Clarendon).

The death toll included: Claytonville - (three miles east of Kress) - Mr. and Mrs. W.H. Blackberry; Cotton Center - Mrs. Mary Saucedo and her son Tommy; Lazbuddie - Mrs. Alton Morris.

Rubella Campaign In Floyd County

The Floyd County March of Dimes chapter, the Floydada Lion's Club, and the El Peneserosa Study Club of Lockney are jointly sponsoring a special "Rub On Rubella" program for children ages one through 10. Vaccinations for rubella, also called German measles or three-day measles, will be given at Floydada elementary schools on May 7, and at the United Methodist Church in Lockney on May 8.

The measles shots will be given to school children at Andrews Ward on the morning of the seventh, and at Duncan School in the afternoon. Pre-school children ages one to six will be vaccinated from 4 to 5 p.m. at Duncan.

School children through age 10 can receive the shots in Lockney until 4 p.m., and pre-schoolers from 4 to 5 p.m. As a result of expectant mothers having Rubella during the 1964-1965 national epidemic, an estimated 20,000 to 30,000 infants were born with severe birth defects. These included cataracts of the eyes, heart defects, deafness, liver damage, bone malformation, and physical and mental retardation.

It has been estimated that another 30,000 pregnancies ended in miscarriage or stillbirth. In addition, thousands of children died in early infancy. It is believed over 50,000 families experienced a personal tragedy as a result of this "mild" childhood disease. The greatest threat to the unborn child occurs when the expectant mother contracts Rubella during the first months of pregnancy. However, it can cause birth defects even if contracted later in pregnancy.

The tragedy of birth defects is great; but it would be even greater if another epidemic should occur simply because parents fail to have their children immunized against Rubella when there is an effective vaccine available. Rubella virus vaccine has been shown to provide long-lasting immunity which may even be life-long. Over 95% of patients immunized will develop protective antibodies against Rubella.

Is the vaccine safe? Over 30,000 children received it in initial trials with almost no untoward reactions reported. A few children experienced a minor rash or transient pain in the joints.

Americans eat a half billion pounds of peanut butter a year and cash in on its economy, nutritional value and versatility.

U. S. Department of Agriculture ranks peanut butter near the top in lists for protein content, food energy, fats necessary to maintain body balance, phosphorus, thiamine and niacin.

Texas is the number two peanut producing state. Last year's crop totaled 213,000 tons worth about \$50 million to Texas farmers.

To help consume Texas peanut products, here are some recipes.

**NEW ORLEANS PEANUT BANANA BREAD**  
1/3 cup shortening

2/3 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
1 cup chopped salted peanuts  
1 cup mashed ripe bananas  
1 3/4 cup flour  
1 teaspoon soda

Cream shortening and sugar. Add unbeaten eggs one at a time, and beat thoroughly (one minute, medium speed with electric beater). Add the chopped peanuts. Add the mashed bananas alternately with the flour and soda which have been sifted together twice. Mix lightly, being careful not to overbeat. Turn into a greased 8 1/2 x 4 1/2 x 2 1/2 inch loaf pan. Bake at 350 F. an hour and 10 minutes or until done.

**GRAHAM CRACKER PIE CRUST**  
1/4 cup smooth or crunchy

peanut butter  
2 cups finely crushed graham cracker crumbs  
1/4 cup sugar  
2 tablespoons water  
Blend peanut butter into combined cracker crumbs and sugar. Add water and knead mixture gently. Press into bottom and sides of well buttered 9 inch pie pan. Chill thoroughly and use with favorite filling.

**PLANTATION PIE**

1 unbaked 9 inch pie shell  
1 cup crunchy peanut butter  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
2 tablespoons melted butter  
3 eggs, slightly beaten  
1 cup dark corn syrup  
1/2 cup sugar

Blend peanut butter, vanilla, salt and melted butter into combined eggs, corn syrup, and sugar. Pour mixture into pie shell. Bake in a very hot oven (450 F) for 10 minutes, then reduce heat to 325 F. and continue baking for about 35 minutes; until filling is set.

No fatalities had been recorded early this week in the Plainview storm, but Thomas reported that 48 were injured, six critically.

The twister cut a path through Plainview varying from three blocks to one-half mile wide, coming within two and a half blocks of Thomas' home on Lexington St.

The Floydada CAP members were busy Saturday and Sunday moving downed utility poles, clearing debris, and aiding in traffic control in the stricken areas.

**Lloyds Tell Of African Trip**

Louis and I have been asked to share a few notes about our trip to Africa. I feel like the grandparent who upon being asked about the new grandchild replies, "Have you got a few hours?" It was such a wonderful experience seeing places I had always read about. And the people were unbelievable - they just couldn't do enough for you.

Africa is a land of contrasts. There are large modern cities a few miles from small native villages. We were in Johannesburg, South Africa for several days and many times would have to remind ourselves that we were in Africa. Except there, they drive on the left-hand side of the road. In Johannesburg there are some of the tallest buildings in the world and everything is very clean and beautiful.

We stayed in the home of some friends several miles out in the country over the weekend and really enjoyed this opportunity. Here I was introduced to the lovely habit of having "tea." We had early morning tea - this was served in all the hotels we stayed in - as soon as you awake. Morning and afternoon tea with neighbors. They all had very beautiful gardens - meaning flower gardens. Usually they were terraced or on a hillside with about an acre of grass surrounded by flowers and trees.

The Easter Rand Show was going on in Johannesburg and we enjoyed attending. This was their 75th anniversary. It is the biggest agricultural and industrial show in Africa. It certainly showed the industry of South Africa, the excellent livestock and agricultural exhibits. There were pavilions of exhibits from many different countries.

We particularly enjoyed the Rhodesian Pavilion as we planned to be there the following week. They really had a "Tiger in their tank". Live Tiger fish had been caught in Kariba Lake, Rhodesia and transferred to the show, along with other varieties. And a display of crocodiles by an increasing number of croc farmers, the skin bringing a very high price.

This pavilion won a number of prizes. Our next stop was Zambia, an independent nation that was Northern Rhodesia. Here are the famous Victoria Falls. You can see the spray rising like a cloud of smoke in the sky for miles before you arrive. The missionary-explorer, Dr. David Livingstone, had heard the Africans talk of the "Smoke that Thunders" and traveled to the Falls in 1855. 75 million gallons of water pour over the Falls every minute. They were

a short walk from our hotel so we enjoyed seeing it from many viewpoints. Also you could walk in the Rain Forest created by the constant spray. This was especially beautiful at night.

Here we had a boat ride up the Zambezi River where the scenery remains undisturbed as it was in the time of Livingstone. There is also a Game Reserve nearby which gave us our first glimpse of wild game in their natural habitat. This is completely different from seeing the animals in a zoo and we noticed the driver of our Zebra-painted Volkswagon always kept the motor going! And of course, we were not allowed out of the car. I think we saw every kind of wild life but an elephant.

A native village in Zambia also gave us a very interesting morning. The Africans sang and danced for us for hours. Including a brilliantly costumed man dancing on stilts, a Hiene Man, and a dance portraying an animal after an African woman with her baby. We were able to watch the natives at work making various implements and curios. The blacksmith actually was working with a primitive kind of bellows. (We saw one just like that in a Museum in Portugal that had been brought back by their early day explorers in the 11th Century.)

Louis and I really liked Rhodesia. They are trying to become an independent nation just as the United States did years ago.

They have had sanctions put on them so that other nations are not supposed to trade with them. It's hard to understand why the United States is not helping them since they are really trying to fight against communism. And since we aren't buying chromite from Rhodesia the U.S. buys it from Russia!

We visited several farms around Salisbury. They have a long growing season and very good crops. The soil conditions, temperature and rainfall vary. Tobacco was very important before sanctions. We visited a farm where they were still growing tobacco, Maize, (corn), cotton and sugar are other important crops.

One interesting thing we saw were the large termite mounds. You can see them very often in the fields. One family we visited showed us that they were adding onto their house. He showed us the mound, they run water on it to soften it, take a brick mold and make the bricks. These are laid out to dry and then they bake them and use them to build their homes. They use only specially treated wood

and not much of that because of the termite problem. Also many roofs, some of the prettiest houses we saw, had roofs made of thatch. (Grass cut from the veld).

Some other interesting things were - seeing the Southern Star and the other star formations in the Southern Hemisphere.

In Portugal we visited old castles built in the 14th century. Saw a fort started in 200 B.C. Roman aqueducts were still in good shape though the ones we saw weren't being used. Fields all over the hill-

side where they cut the wheat by hand. A monument stands where De Gama, Magellan and other Portuguese explorers prayed before leaving on their voyages. Cork trees where the cork is trimmed from the bark.

I think Africa is a continent that we will really hear a lot about in years to come. They have vast possibilities. We met some wonderful people that we will never forget. A trip like this really makes you more aware of what is going on in the world.

Appreciate Floydada Friendly Folk

Dear Mr. Tooley:  
I hope, somehow, you can find space in your newspaper to publish this letter, for I know of no other means of reaching all of the people for whom it is intended.

On April 6th, my brothers and I returned to Floydada, our hometown, bringing our Mother for burial, beside our Father, who died there in 1948. Mother and I moved from Floydada in 1950, and had not had the opportunity to return many times, and my brothers had moved away years before that, so all of us had been out of contact with the old friends and neighbors.

We were gratified to see so many friendly faces at the grave-side services, and afterwards, we were hosted to a lovely meal at the Byron Robertson home, and had an opportunity to visit a short while with many of these friends, before we started home to Wichita Falls.

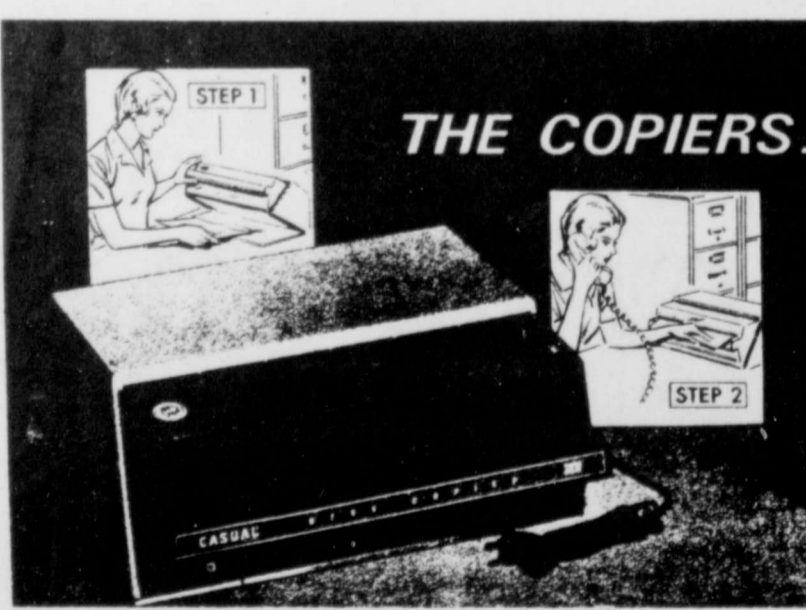

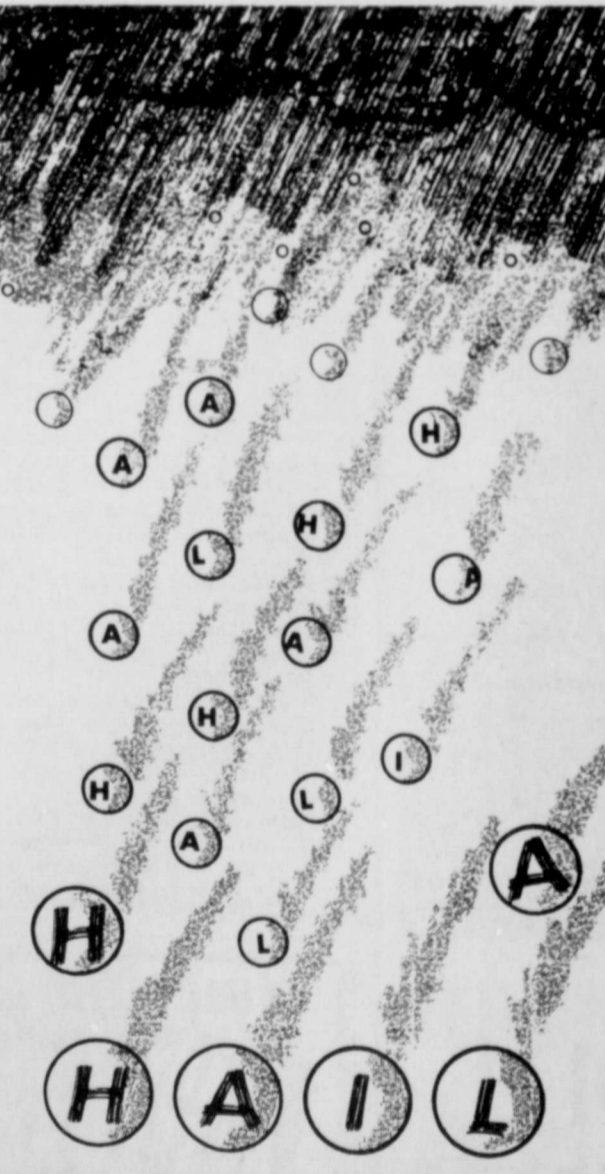

Dear Member:  
We are enclosing your membership plaque for the year. It indicates the legal holidays recommended by the Retail Trades Committee of your Chamber of Commerce.  
This ends the first month of the Chamber year, however much has happened in Chamber activities to date.  
BANQUET: Although each annual banquet is held in behalf of the out-going administration - the grand finale so to speak. The feed back we have received to date has been most satisfying. We have had correspondence from the speaker, the third to this date. Mr. Newt Hielscher indicates enjoying giving the message as well as the attendants did in receiving, "Orchids" to Past President Vernon Parker and President Jake Webb for doing such an outstanding job on stage, and let's not forget Kay Crabtree. Financially speaking we did just a little better than breaking even.  
COMMITTEES: To date we have had excellent involvement

concerning our committee activities. A total of 161 hours of committee involvement to date. This amount is in excess of twenty 8-hour work days.  
STOCK SHOW: This is of course the big event of the year and the number of hours which has gone into the stock show by participants and committees can never be counted. We do, however, have records of paying out a total of \$39,379.68 in about two and one-half hours and it must go without saying that the same amount has to be collected. A total of \$78,759.36 cash responsibilities for the show. In addition, the finance and attendance committee did a good job of bidding on Floydada area stock to the point that it helped the income of the participating youngsters.  
EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING: The committee has met two different times to wrestle with the finance and budgeting concerning the chamber. This was light during March. We render many such services especially during harvest. We do hope folks use this service which will save many hours.  
INDUSTRY AND NEW BUSINESS: Fourteen different Industrial Firms have been contacted during the month of March. Tourism: Requests have been made and pamphlets received on national parks. If you plan to attend the Palo Duro Canyon State Park or Six Flags Over Texas, these and others are available at the chamber office.  
RETAIL TRADES: In two different meetings one item, among others, was the orientation as to documents in their complaints

We thank you again for your every assistance of the mentioned above, and please feel assured that your request will be taken for granted. You are important.

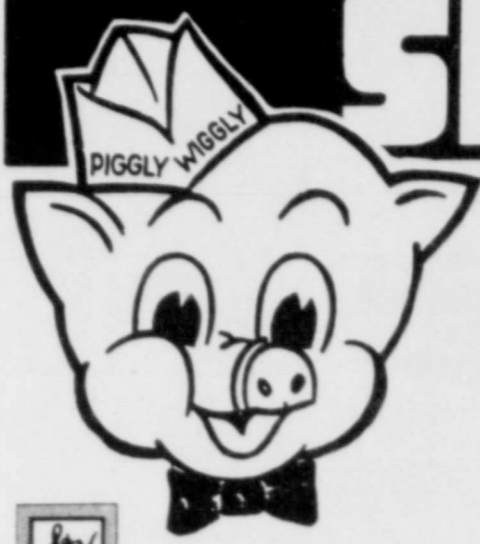

### 1969 SORGHUM SHOWS GOOD NUTRITION

Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board has conducted additional surveys on cost factors for the feeders of this area. New test information still confirms that the 1969 milo crop is equal to past crops in nutritional value.  
Regardless what chemical analysis is used, they do not substantiate claims that the 1969 production was inferior to previous crops.  
As reported earlier by TGSPB protein is slightly higher; starch availability and energy are equal to '68 production. The only difference between '68 and '69 could be in protein availability; but since sorghum is not fed as a protein supplement, this should not be a serious consideration.  
These studies have shown the importance of management. Some lots are showing high cost of gains; while others are reporting costs as low, or lower, than this time last year.  
Yet, most are feeding the 1969 production.  
Why, then is sorghum being blamed? There are just too many factors involved to single out one item for higher cost of gains. Feed costs have risen sharply over a similar period last year.  
1. Molasses, up 5-6 dollars/ton  
2. Fats - up 2-3 cents/pound  
3. Alfalfa - up 2-3 dollars/ton  
4. Cottonseed hulls - up 8-10 dollars/ton  
5. Sorghum - up 3-4 dollars/ton  
6. Balance of the other feed costs about the same.  
These higher feed costs, plus increased cost of feeders and lower price of fat cattle, are all reflected in cost per pound of gain.  
The TGSPB survey reveals that the three following factors must be met before unjustly criticizing the 1969 milo crop for increased cost of gains. The reason for this suggestion is that there is some cheap and poor quality grain moving into the High Plains region. Some of this grain has as high as 80% heat damaged kernels and instead of No. 2 yellow milo would be graded as sample grade. It will usually analyze high in protein, but since the germ is damaged, this protein is not available to the animal and starch availability would be questioned. Feeders using grain of this quality can expect poor results. Feed lot managers should familiarize themselves with the following Federal Grain Grading Standards.

PROCESSING  
Proper flake is extremely important. Watch the processing equipment and make sure it is flaking all the grain, even the small kernels.  
The '69 crop has a higher percent of small kernels; thus better processing is required. The lot producing the poor flake was allowing 13% of the total grain to pass through the processing equipment unflaked. Starch of this grain was less than 60%, which was reflected in gains.  
ANIMAL HEALTH AND WEATHER INSTRUCTION  
1. Two to three year old lots can expect more disease problems.  
2. Sick animals do not gain at an economical level. The weather which prevailed during last winter not only affected gains, but was certainly detrimental to the health of these animals.  
SUMMARY  
1. Chemical tests do not substantiate hypothesis that '69 production is inferior to previous sorghum crops.  
2. Protein, starch availability, and energy are similar.  
3. Feed and feeder costs have risen while fat cattle prices are slightly down over last year. This will reflect higher cost per pound gains.  
4. Many lots are reporting gains better than or similar to a year ago and are feeding the '69 crop.  
5. Operators should make sure of quality of grain purchased. Insist on No. 2 yellow milo.  
6. Proper flaking, animal health, and weather fluctuation have also contributed to higher costs.

OUTSIDE GRAIN POOR  
As stated before poor quality grain is being shipped into West Texas from the Midwestern United States. Some of this grain has heat damage as high as 85%. Heat damaged grain has dead germs and questionable starch availability.
