State Water Board Loans Money For Mackenzie Land Purchase

The first step in water for the future for Tulia, Floydada, Lockney and Silverton was taken last Friday as the state water board granted a \$300,000 loan to the Mackenzie Water Authority for purchase of land for the dam project.

Although almost four million dollars are needed to build the dam and filtering plant, members of the Mackenzie board and the four city councils felt that purchase of the land was a "foot in the door" with the state water board and more money would be forthcoming after purchase of the land.



Rubella Campaign In Floyd County

The Floyd County March of Dimes chapter, the Floydada Lion's Club, and the Il Penserosa Study Club of Lockney are jointly sponsoring a special "Rub Out Rubella" program for children ages one through

Vaccinations for rubella, also called German measles or three-day measles, will be given at Floydada elementary schools on May 7, and at the United Methodist Church in Lockney on May 8,

The measles shots will be given to school children at Andrews Ward on the morning of the seventh, and at Duncan School in the afternoon. Preschool children ages one to six will be vaccinated from 4 to 5 p.m. at Duncan. School children through age

10 can receive the shots in Lockney until 4 p.m., and preschoolers from 4 to 5 p.m. As a result of expectant mothers having Rubella during the 1964 - 1965 national epidemic, an estimated 20,000 to 30,000 infants were born with severe birth defects. These included cataracts of the eyes, heart defects, deafness, liver damage, bone malformation, and physical and mental retarda-

It has been estimated that another 30,000 pregnancies ended in miscarriage or stillbirth. In addition, thousands of children died in early infancy. It is believed over 50,000 families experienced a personal tragedy as a result of this "mild" childhood disease. The greatest threat to the unborn child occurs when the expectant mother contracts Rubella during the first months of pregnancy. However, it can cause birth defects even if contracted later in pregnancy.

The tragedy of birth defects is great; but it would be even greater if another epidemic should occur simply because parents fail to have their children immunized against Rubella when there is an effective vaccine available. Rubella virus vaccine has been shown to provide long-lasting immunity which may even be life-long. Over 95% of patients immunized will develop protective antibodies against Rubella.

Is the vaccine safe? Over 30,000 children received it in initial trials with almost no untoward reactions reported. A few children experienced a minor rash or transient pain in the joints.







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Lloyds Tell Of African Trip

Louis and I have been asked share a few notes about our ip to Africa. I feel like the randparent who upon being sked about the new grandchild eplies, "Have you got a few lours?" It was such a wonder-'ul experience seeing places I had always read about. And the people were unbelievable - they just couldn't do enough for you.

Africa is a land of contrasts. There are large modern cities a ew miles from small native villages. We were in Johannesburg, South Africa for several days and many times would have to remind ourselves that we were in Africa. Except there, they drive on the left-hand side of the road. In Johannesburg there are some of the tallest uildings in the world and verything is very clean and eautiful.

We stayed in the home of ome friends several miles out the country over the weekend nd really enjoyed this opportunity. Here I was introduced o the lovely habit of having 'tea." We had early morning tea - this was served in all the hotels we stayed in - as soon as you awake. Morning and afternoon tea with neighbors, They all had very beautiful gardens - meaning flower gardens. Usually they were terraced or on a hillside with about n acre of grass surrounded by flowers and trees.

The Easter Rand Show was going on in Johannesburg and we enjoyed attending. This was their 75th anniversary. It is the iggest agricultural and industrial show in Africa, It certainly showed the industry of South Africa, the excellent livestock and agricultural exhibits. There were pavilions of exhibits from many different coun-

We particularly enjoyed the Rhodesian Pavilion as we planned to be there the following week. They really had a "Tiger in their tank". Live Tiger fish had been caught in Kariba Lake, Rhodesia and transferred to the show, along with other varieties. And a display of crocodiles by an increasing number of croc farmers, the skin bringing a very high price.

This pavilion won a number of prizes.

Our next stop was Zambia, an independent nation that was Northern Rhodesia. Here are the famous Victoria Falls, You can see the spray rising like a cloud of smoke in the sky for miles before you arrive. The missionary-explorer, Dr. David Livingstone, had heard the Africans talk of the "Smoke that Thunders" and traveled to the

we enjoyed seeing it from many viewpoints. Also you could walk in the Rain Forest created by the constant spray. This was especially beautiful at night.

Here we had a boat ride up the Zambezi River where the scenery remains undisturbed as it was in the time of Livingston. There is also a Game Reserve nearby which gave us our first glimpse of wild game in their natural habitat. This is completely different from seeing the animals in a zoo and we noticed the driver of our Zebrapainted Volkswagon always kept the motor going! And of course, we were not allowed out of the car. I think we saw every kind of wild life but an elephant.

A native village in Zambia also gave us a very interesting morning. The Africans sang and danced for us for hours, Including a brilliantly costumed man dancing on stilts, a Hiene Man, and a dance portraying an animal after an African woman with her baby. We were able to watch the natives at work making various implements and curios. The blacksmith actually was working with a primitive kind of bellows. (We saw one just like that in a Museum in Portugal that had been brought back by their early day explorers in the 11th Cen-

Louis and I really liked Rhodesia. They are trying to become an independent nation just as the United States did years

They have had sanctions put on them so that other nations are not supposed to trade with them. It's hard to understand why the United States is not helping them since they are really trying to fight against communism. And since we aren't buying chromite from Rhodesia the U.S. buys it from

We visited several farms around Salisbury. They have a long growing season and very good crops. The soil conditions, temperature and rainfall vary. Tobacco was very important before sanctions. We visited a farm where they were still growing tobacco. Maize, (corn), cotton and sugar are other important crops.

One interesting thing we saw were the large termite mounds. You can see them very often in the fields. One family we visited showed is that they were adding onto their house. He showed us the mound, they run water on it to soften it, take a brick mold and make the bricks. Some other interesting things were - seeing the Southern Star and the other star formations in the Southern Hemisphere.

In Portugal we visited old castles built in the 14th century. Saw a fort started in 200 Roman aquaducts were still in good shape though the ones we saw weren't being used. Fields all over the hill-

side where they cut the wheat by hand. A monument stands where De Gama, Magellan and other Portugese explorers prayed before leaving on their voyages. Cork trees where the cork is trimmed from the bark,

I think Africa is a continent that we will really hear a lot about in years to come. They have vast possibilities. We met some wonderful people that we will never forget. A trip like this really makes you more aware of what is going on in the

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1969 SORGHUM SHOWS GOOD NUTRITION

Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board has conducted additional surveys on cost factors for the feeders of this area. New test information still confirms that the 1969 milocrop is equal to past crops in nutritional value.

Regardless what chemical analysis is used, they do not substantiate claims that the 1969 production was inferior to previous crops.

As reported earlier by TGSPB protein is slightly higher; starch availability and energy are equal to '68 production. The only difference between '68 and '69 could be in protein availability; but since sorghum is not fed as a protein supplement, this should not be a serious consideration.

These studies have shown the importance of management. Some lots are showing high cost of gains; while others are reporting costs as low, or lower,

than this time last year. Yet, most are feeding the 1969 production.

Why, then is sorghum being blamed? There are just too many factors involved to single out one item for higher cost of gains. Feed costs have risen sharply over a similar period last year.

1. Molasses, up 5-6 dollars/

2. Fats - up 2-3 cents/pound 3. Alfalfa - up 2-3 dollars/

4. Cottonseed hulls - up 8-10 dollars/ton 5. Sorghum - up 3-4 dollars/

6. Balance of the other feed costs about the same.

These higher feed costs, plus increased cost of feeders and lower price of fat cattle, are all reflected in cost per pound of

The TGSPB survey reveals that the three following factors must be met before unjustly criticizing the 1969 milo crop for increased cost of gains. The reason for this suggestion is poor quality grain moving into the High Plains region. Some of this grain has as high as 80% heat damaged kernels and instead of No. 2 yellow milo would be graded as sample grade. It will usually analyze high in protein, but since the germ is damaged, this protein is not available to the animal and starch availability would be questioned. Feeders using grain of this quality can expect poor results. Feed lot managers should familiarize themselves with the following Federal Grain Grading Standards. PROCESSING

Proper flake is extremely important. Watch the processing equipment and make sure it is flaking all the grain, even the small kernels.

The '69 crop has a higher percent of small kernels; thus better processing is required. The lot producing the poor flake was allowing 13% of the total grain to pass through the processing equipment unflaked. Starch of this grain was less than 60%, which was reflected in gains

ANIMAL HEALTH AND WEATHER INSTRUCTION 1. Two to three year old lots can expect more disease prob-

2. Sick animals do not gain at an economical level. The weather which prevailed during last winter not only affected gains, but was certainly detrimental to the health of these animals.

SUMMARY 1. Chemical tests do not substantiate hypothesis that '69 production is inferior to pre-

vious sorghum crops.

2. Protein, starch availability, and energy are similar. 3. Feed and feeder costs have risen while fat cattle prices are slightly down over last year. This will reflect higher cost per pound gains,

4. Many lots are reporting gains better than or similar to a year ago and are feeding the '69 crop.

5. Operators should make sure of quality of grain purchased. Insist on No. 2 yellow
