

CENSUS TALLY UPSETS CITIES

Preliminary population figures released last week by the Census Bureau for some of the larger West Texas cities left officials in some of those towns upset over apparent declines.

Lubbock appeared to have the advantage over Amarillo, with preliminary figure of 146,379 to Amarillo's 123,973, but in neither city were officials happy. Lubbock has been claiming 170,000 while Amarillo has aleged 155,000, although the 1960 official counts were 128,691 for Lubbock and 137,969 for Amaril-

Farming Bill + Hits Snag In Committee

gotiations over a proposed new farm bill were temporarily snagged Tuesday as Nixon administration officials balked at congressional farm bloc demands that feed grains and cotton support prices go up when production costs rise.

Clarence D. Palmby, assistant Secretary of Agriculture, told newsmen the administration was now willing to set supports for domestic wheat at per cent of the "fair earning power" parity price in a proposed new farm bill.

Raises Programmed In effect, this would allow wheat supports to go up each year in line with increases in farm costs. The parity price is tied to farm cost levels.

But, Palmby added after a closed-door meeting with a House grains subcommittee the administration will not agree to similar escalator clauses for feed grains and cotton. Chairman W. R. Poage, D-

Tex., of the full House Agriculture Committee, in a separate interview, confirmed of the Palmby's account administration's stand. "Can't See Why

Poage said lawmakers "are not kicking at all" about the administration's proposals for initial support levels on feed grains and cotton.

"But we can't see why, if wheat is to get the benefit of future increases in parity, they should leave cotton and feed grains out," Poage added.



ter repellency than laundering. Repeated dry cleanings may diminish the water repellency of a coat, but it can be renewed by a cleaner for a modest price. But once the water-repellent finish is renewed, it will probably be necessary to repeat the process with each cleaning. Furnish the cleaner with information on the label attached to

An easy test to check to see if a coat is still water repellent is to place a drop of water on the fabric. If the drop flattens out, it has wet the surface and the cloth is not water repellent. If it takes on a spherical or round shape, it has not wet the surface and will probably roll off and a coat is still water repellent.

A professional drycleaner can removed almost any stain in the book - but he is not a mind reader.



CAP Holds Storm Rescue **Practice**

The Floydada squadron of the Civil Air Patrol held a "practice disaster" Sunday afternoon. The south part of town near Junior High and Duncan schools was the site of a mock tornado, and CAP members tested new search and rescue procedures to be used here in case of a natural disaster such as the recent Plainview and Lubbock tornadoes.

Richard Thomas, commander of the local squadron, said that the CAP, which was called into action in the Plainview and Lubbock storms, is expecting rescue equipment and a power generator soon from the U.S. Air Force. The CAP is a civilian auxiliary of the AirForce.

Post Office Rates Increase

today proposed parcel post and catalog rate increases total-ing \$123 million to help meet the added costs of pay increases in recent years.

The proposed increases parcels and 6 percent for catalogs - must be approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission before adoption by the Department.

Facing a \$2.5 billion postal revenue deficiency in the coming fiscal year, the Administration recently asked the Congress to increase postage rates for first- and third-class mail 33 percent and second-class by 48 percent.

Higher parcel post rates (zone-rated fourth-class mail) are also needed to comply with legal requirements that these services pay at least 96 percent of their fully allocated costs. No increase has been asked for educational materials

(packages containing books and phonograph records). Under the proposals, minimum postage for parcels mailed for local delivery would be

increased from 50 cents to 60 cents. For non-local deliveries, the minimum per parcel rate would go from 60 cents to 65 cents. This 5-cent increase would ap-

ply on 2-pound parcels going

to non-local zones 1 and 2 (distances up to 150 miles). Some typical proposed rate hikes are as follows: a 5pound parcel from Chicago to New York or other Seaboard cities in the Middle Atlantic states, from \$1.05 cents to \$1.20; an 8-pound parcel going

The Department estimates that for 46 percent of its parwhich average 15.4 percent for cel post volume, the increases would amount to 5 or 10 cents per package.

Catalog rates will be inreased a flat 2 cents per piece, both for individual-piece and bulk-rate mailings.

To compensate for the extra costs of hard-to-handle parcels, the Department is requesting a 75-cent per-piece surcharge on parcels more than 36 inches long, or over 84 inches in combined length and girth. This would replace the 10-pound minimum charge now in effect for "balloon" par-

The proposal, published in today's Federal Register, invites interested persons to file written statements with the Department by May 25, and participate orally in an informal conference in Washington scheduled for June 1.

After consideration of the views submitted, the Department plans to submit its final proposals to the Interstate Commerce Commission in June for new higher rates.

The effective date of any increases would depend upon ICC action. If the Commission takes no action for 30 days, the proposals would be approved au-

tomatically. However, ICC can elect to institute an investigation of the Department's proposal. In that event, that agency has 180 days from the June filing date to rule upon the Post Office Department petition. The law re-
