Improvements At Vegetable Plant

According to a report from Junior Simpson some improvements have been made at the vegetable shed on the Lockney highway. More warehouse space has been added to the east end of the plant, enabling trucks to unload out of the sunshine or rain.

New plate glass windows and door have been added to the

front of the building and a huge concrete loading dock has been added on the northwest corner of the plant.

Nine trucks can load at once from the new dock.

Increased pepper and cucumber acreages, plus some egg plant acreage will possibly increase production in the plant this summer.

## Mobile X Ray Unit To Be Here Tuesday

West Texas Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association has begun a concentrated campaign to have as many citizens as possible x-rayed by the Christmas Seal Mobile Unit of the association during the month of May.

The chest X-ray program discovers many abnormalities other than tuberculosis. In the past year, it has located emphysema cases, lung cysts, and cardio-vascular abnormalities.

The association bears the cost of having the film read and reported to each person in the survey. There is a fee of \$1.50 for the film and developing. A post card is mailed to those having a normal chest film. The ones who have an abnormal reading are notified by a first-class letter which urges them to contact their private physician, or the local health officer for further examination.

Everyone is urged to keep the card with the number of their X-ray film and the date taken. These films are stored at the office of the association, and can be valuable for comparison purposes if some trouble develops in later years.

Children under twelve years of age are too small to be X-rayed.

Food recipients of the Floyd County Food Distribution Program are receiving their food allotment this week on schedule.

Last Wednesday the county was informed by the Lubbock Food Distribution Center that there would be no food distributed this month. On Thursday this order was changed, and Floyd County recipients were able to pick up their food on Wednesday of this week as scheduled.

O. M. Watson Jr., authorized representative of the county food program, has announced that people who did not pick up their food on Wednesday may go by Room 102 in the courthouse today or tomorrow and receive their food for this month.

## County Gets Rains Up To One Inch, Little Wind Damage

While Lubbock and the surrounding area were experiencing tornadoes, heavy rains and high winds last week, Floyd County reporting stations recorded not more than an inch of rain and little property damage, although winds were high in most areas.

Most of the rainfall was recorded in the southern and eastern portions of the county, with a maximum one-inch fall at the Lakeview Community.

About .4 inch fell at the Ned Bradley residence near the Antelope Community Monday night, the night of the Lubbock storm, and another quarter-inch Thursday. At the Henry Hinton residence close to Dougherty, rain measured about a quarter-inch for the week, and winds Monday night overturned two trailers but caused little other property damage.

Precipitation at the Barwise Gin measured .2 inch Monday night and .4 inch Thursday. Barwise also reports high winds but no damage Monday.

At the Roy Hale residence at Harmony, rain totaled one-

half inch, with strong winds but no property damage.

Producers Elevator in Floydada recorded .12 inch from the Monday night rains and .56 Thursday.

No precipitation was recorded at the Muncy Elevator, Cedar Hill Elevator or South Plains Gin north of town.

## Unofficial Report Shows Floyd County Population Down

It's unofficial, but according to the preliminary population figures released by Robert L. Butler, district manager of the Bureau of Census, Floyd County is down in population from 12,369 in 1960 to 10,582 in 1970.

Another unofficial census count (not from Butler's office) shows that the Floydada population has increased from 3796 in 1960 to 3875 in 1970. This means that the Floyd County loss has occurred in other towns and communities in the county.

Chamber of Commerce Manager John Reue reports that Floydada increased in number of gas meters in the ten year period from 1960 to 1970.

There was an increase of phones from 1766 in 1960 to 2,016 in 1970. Water meter records are not available.

Floydada school enrollment hit a peak in 1964.

It seems that the new farm program in 1964, which called for more layout land, the use of insecticides to control weeds, machine cotton harvesters, have brought about the loss of population in the county. . . mostly working class people. Floyd County hit a peak in population back in 1930. Population reports for both Floydada and Floyd County are as follows:

## Injured Couple To Be Flown Home Next Week

Newlyweds, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Covington are expected to be flown home next week from an Englewood, Colorado hospital where they have been since Sunday evening with injuries sustained in a one car accident.

Their parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. T. Dycus and Mr. and Mrs. Bob Covington, are with the couple at this time.

Covington and his wife, the former Tomi Beth Dycus, were in the Denver - Boulder area visiting friends after leaving Lubbock Friday night following their wedding. They were near Englewood enroute to Santa Fe, New Mexico, when the driver

lost control of the car. Both were thrown from the vehicle which was demolished.

Mrs. Covington is suffering from a head and neck injury, but was improved sufficiently to be transferred from intensive care Monday to a private room adjoining her husband's.

Relatives said she would be in a neck brace for several weeks.

Covington is suffering from a broken collar bone and a cracked pelvis bone. Both sustained numerous contusions.

From the wreckage area all of the couple's belongings were located with the exception of Mrs. Covington's diamond ring.

## Tentative 70-71 Shool Calendar

A tentative 1970-71 school calendar for the Floydada Independent School District has been announced. A new ruling in the forthcoming school term requires teachers to be on the job 10 months, according to Claude Estes. Students will still be taught on the nine month schedule.

School for teachers will begin August 19-20-21 for inservice and registration. Opening of school for students will be August 24, 1970. End of school for students will be May 28, 1971 and for teachers June 1, 1971.

The remainder of the schedule is as follows: Labor Day holiday, Sept. 7, 1970; End of first six weeks,

Oct. 9; student holiday in October for District teachers meeting, date to be announced later; end of second six weeks, Nov. 25; Thanksgiving holidays, Nov. 26-27; Christmas holidays, December 23, 1970 to January 3, 1971;

Semester tests, Jan. 12-13, 1971; end of first semester, Jan. 13; student holidays-teachers work days, Jan. 14-15; start second semester, Jan. 18; end of fourth six weeks, Feb. 26; student holiday-teachers work day, March 1; end of fifth six weeks, April 9;

Easter holidays, April 10-18; senior days, May 26, 27, 28; Baccalaureate, May 23; semester tests May 27, 28; end of second semester, May 28.

## CENSUS TALLY UPSETS CITIES

Preliminary population figures released last week by the Census Bureau for some of the larger West Texas cities left officials in some of those towns upset over apparent declines.

Lubbock appeared to have the advantage over Amarillo, with a preliminary figure of 146,379 to Amarillo's 123,973, but in neither city were officials happy. Lubbock has been claiming 170,000 while Amarillo has alleged 155,000, although the 1960 official counts were 128,691 for Lubbock and 137,969 for Amarillo.

In the Lubbock district, which includes Plainview, only Lubbock and Levelland showed increase.

## REPUBLICAN RESOLUTIONS

The following resolutions were voted on and passed to be submitted to the Texas State Republican Convention:

1. Be it resolved that the delegates of the Floyd County Republican Convention voted to bind their delegates to the Texas State Republican Convention of September 15, 1970, to the support of:
2. The Floyd County delegates to the Texas State Republican Convention be bound by the Unit Rule.
3. Resolve a strict enforcement of Constitutional laws pertaining to a speedy trial.
4. Resolve to retain the felony charge regarding the possession of marijuana.
5. Resolve to support the Administration on Foreign Policy, and especially in regard to the action taken in Vietnam and Cambodia.
6. Resolve that the Administration support equal integration of schools within all states, coinciding with neighborhood policy - no compulsory bussing of students to achieve racial balance.
7. Against any form of guaranteed income or other such proposed welfare legislation

that would promote indolence and a welfare state.

8. Reorganize (change) the form of the farm program to aid the independence of the individual farmer.
9. Revise the import program to establish a true balance for domestic production.
10. To require Congress to submit to the States for ratification, as a Constitutional Amendment, any legislation that would permit 18 year olds to vote.
11. To retain and control the area of the Panama Canal Zone. It has been leased, constructed and maintained by the United States of America.
12. Stabilization of the American dollar, thereby stabilizing wages, prices, and curbing further inflation.
13. Standardization of Riot Control laws in all states which will enable authorized riot control groups to quell all riots, using force and live ammunition if necessary.
14. A Texas State Law be passed which requires owners of motor vehicles to have minimum liability insurance as well as a valid drivers license prerequisite to registering said vehicle.
15. Resolve to return the Supreme Court to its constitutional position as a judicial system and cease its legislative activity.
16. To urge passage of law to put the United States back on a full gold standard and to allow citizens of the United States to legally own gold or gold bullion if they so desire.

## PARITY FEUD

## Farming Bill Hits Snag In Committee

WASHINGTON — Negotiations over a proposed new farm bill were temporarily snagged Tuesday as Nixon administration officials balked at congressional farm bloc demands that feed grains and cotton support prices go up when production costs rise.

Clarence D. Palmbly, assistant Secretary of Agriculture, told newsmen the administration was now willing to set supports for domestic wheat at 100 per cent of the "fair earning power" parity price in a proposed new farm bill.

**Raises Programmed**

In effect, this would allow wheat supports to go up each year in line with increases in farm costs. The parity price is tied to farm cost levels.

But, Palmbly added after a closed-door meeting with a House grains subcommittee, the administration will not agree to similar escalator clauses for feed grains and cotton.

Chairman W. R. Poage, D-Tex., of the full House Agriculture Committee, in a separate interview, confirmed Palmbly's account of the administration's stand.

**Can't See Why**

Poage said lawmakers "are not kicking at all" about the administration's proposals for initial support levels on feed grains and cotton.

"But we can't see why, if wheat is to get the benefit of future increases in parity, they should leave cotton and feed grains out," Poage added.

Among the people I used to enjoy when I was a young man growing up in the newspaper business here was Sam D. Mills. After many years they organized the Floyd County Pioneers' Reunion Association in 1928. Sam, I think, attended practically every meeting of the association until his passing in 1938.

Mr. Mills would stand around in the edge of the crowd and talk quietly with this and that old acquaintance, although he was not the one to recall the coldest day, what a hard time they had getting up the cap-rock, how many buffalo skulls there were lying around when he got here, what year it was the cattle piled up at the drift fences and froze to death.

But mention an old-timer (did you know so and so?) and usually his reply would be "Yes, when he got up the cap I asked if he didn't want me to drill him a well." Then if anything else about the man some pleasant. Never a mean thing about anybody did I ever hear him say.

It got to be a sort of a game with me. I would ask Mr. Mills about this and that one. The answer was almost always the same. I guess you'd put it that Sam just happened to be here when the county was organized in 1890. He must have voted at Lockney in the first election for he and Mrs. Mills first settled on a pre-emption survey east of Lockney approximately where the Lockney Cemetery is located. They came from Erath County here.

The couple - Sid and his wife - must have gone through some rather rugged experiences sometime in the passing years. For one thing Mrs. Mills also had typhoid fever, and that was one disease from which, if you recovered, you barely recovered. You dwelt at death's door for a time and it was said it was only the gentle breeze of angel wings on your fevered brow that sustained you. This was just poetic fancy, of course.

Charlie must have been the only member of the Mills family that ever went to see Sid and his wife. He wrote Sid a note that he might come to see him sometime. The answer came back "If you are going to come to see us, come on now. I need help." For many

years I did not know this. I was told, incorrectly, that Sid was killed in a range accident. Sid's surviving wife is a nurse. She lived in Arizona for awhile and probably still does.



## NEWS FOR HOMEMAKERS

Rainwear remains rainproof only when given proper care. Read all tags and labels carefully and follow the care instructions given. Dry cleaning is harder on water repellency than laundering. Repeated dry cleanings may diminish the water repellency of a coat, but it can be renewed by a cleaner for a modest price. But once the water-repellent finish is renewed, it will probably be necessary to repeat the process with each cleaning. Furnish the cleaner with information on the label attached to a new raincoat. If a raincoat is marked "washable" it can be washed quite safely in a washing machine. Use a gentle washing action and warm water with at least three rinse cycles to remove detergent or soap. Soaps and detergents are wetting agents, and thus, they cause water to penetrate the fabric which is not desired in a water repellent raincoat. Spare the coat of a long spin cycle and tumble dry at a medium heat or less, or drip dry. An easy test to check to see if a coat is still water repellent is to place a drop of water on the fabric. 

## Post Office Rates Increase

The Post Office Department today proposed parcel post and catalog rate increases totaling \$123 million to help meet the added costs of pay increases in recent years.

The proposed increases - which average 15.4 percent for parcels and 6 percent for catalogs - must be approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission before adoption by the Department.

Facing a \$2.5 billion postal revenue deficiency in the coming fiscal year, the Administration recently asked the Congress to increase postage rates for first- and third-class mail 33 percent and second-class by 48 percent.

Higher parcel post rates (zone-rated fourth-class mail) are also needed to comply with legal requirements that these services pay at least 96 percent of their fully allocated costs.

No increase has been asked for educational materials (packages containing books and phonograph records).

Under the proposals, minimum postage for parcels mailed for local delivery would be increased from 50 cents to 60 cents.

For non-local deliveries, the minimum per parcel rate would go from 60 cents to 65 cents. This 5-cent increase would apply on 2-pound parcels going to non-local zones 1 and 2 (distances up to 150 miles).

Some typical proposed rate hikes are as follows: a 5-pound parcel from Chicago to New York or other Seaboard cities in the Middle Atlantic states, from \$1.05 cents to \$1.20; an 8-pound parcel going

from East Coast cities to West Coast points (zone 8), from \$2.15 to \$2.60; an 11-pound parcel for local delivery, from 65 cents to 80 cents.

The Department estimates that for 46 percent of its parcel post volume, the increases would amount to 5 or 10 cents per package.

Catalog rates will be increased a flat 2 cents per piece, both for individual-piece and bulk-rate mailings.

To compensate for the extra costs of hard-to-handle parcels, the Department is requesting a 75-cent per-piece surcharge on parcels more than 36 inches long, or over 84 inches in combined length and girth. This would replace the 10-pound minimum charge now in effect for "balloon" parcels.

The proposal, published in today's Federal Register, invites interested persons to file written statements with the Department by May 25, and participate orally in an informal conference in Washington scheduled for June 1.


After consideration of the views submitted, the Department plans to submit its final proposals to the Interstate Commerce Commission in June for new higher rates.

The effective date of any increases would depend upon ICC action. If the Commission takes no action for 30 days, the proposals would be approved automatically.

However, ICC can elect to institute an investigation of the Department's proposal. In that event, that agency has 180 days from the June filing date to rule upon the Post Office Department petition. The law re-
