Wheat Harvest Begins In Floydada Area

Dry-Land Averaging To 20 Bushels

Wheat elevators began their first loads of dry-land wheat last week as harvest began in the area. The first wheat received at a Floydada elevator was at Lon Davis Grain, brought in by Buren Cates on Wednesday, June 3.

Dry-land wheat brought to market so far has averaged 15-20 bushels per acre, with yields of up to 26 bushels reported.

Rains Monday night slowed the harvest somewhat but combining was in full swing again by Wednesday.

Other first loads reported by local elevators include C. W. Jones at Producers (Floydada), June 5; Helms Farms at Floydada Grain, June 4; and Robert Stovall at Wylie Grain, June 6.

Local Boys State Delegates In Austin

The thirtieth annual American Legion Boys State sponsored by the Department of Texas and held on the Campus of the University of Texas, got underway Saturday as 785 high school boys from all parts of Texas, and two from Mexico, began registration, Henry H. Hill, Department Commander, announced.

Among those registering from Floydada were Jeff Martin Feuerbacher, 101 W. Ollie St., and James Stephen Crawford, Box 20, Dougherty, who were sponsored by local American Legion Posts.

Following registration, each citizen was assigned to one of two political parties - the Nationalist or Federalist. Each citizen then functions as a member of his party, he attends its precinct, county and state conventions and votes in its primary.

In Boys State, The American Legion provides the type of program where the young citizen has the opportunity to learn for himself what his government is just what he makes it. The boy "Learns to do by doing."

Highlight of Boys State will be a trip to the Capitol on Friday morning where each elected Boys State Official will be given an opportunity to serve in his respective office for a day, followed by the Governor's Ball Friday evening.

Boys State enrollment this year brings the total to 14,939 junior high school boys who have attended since 1940, when Boys State was first inaugurated in Texas.

Floydada Chamber of Commerce president Jake Webb and manager John Reue are in Austin today to attend the third annual "Beautify Texas Council."

The Council is an organization which advises and acts as a coordinating agency through which business and industry, government and public and private groups work to solve the problems of beautification of the state. Efforts are underway throughout the state to improve the appearance of streets, highways, homes, farms, communities and cities.

Governor Preston Smith will be featured speaker at the noon luncheon, when he will present the first three of the annual Governor's Community Achievement Awards to cities under 12,000 population showing the most progress in community improvement.

The local Chamber of Commerce, in cooperation with the city, has been involved in a city beautification program which this past year has included removal of over 800 junk cars from the city and removal of weed and debris and in some cases, dilapidated buildings from several locations within the city.

IN COUNTY ELECTIONS

Holmes, Ford Win Runoffs

Incumbent J. K. Holmes received 842 votes to Foster Amburn's 570 in Saturday's second Democratic primary to win the nomination for County Judge. In the runoff primary for Justice of Peace, Precincts 2 and 3 in the Lockney area, R. H. (Raz) Ford defeated Earl Cooper by a 476-268 vote to win the Democratic nomination for that position. Both nominees will appear on the November general

election ballots with no Republican opposition. Holmes and Amburn were high vote-getters in a three man race in the May 2 primary where no candidates received a majority. The vote in the first primary was Holmes 1,024, Amburn 620, Ralph Cog-

dell 426. Cooper had received more votes than Ford in a four-candidate race in May, 294 to 188, before losing in the second primary. Ford barely nosed out the third-running candidate, Esker M. Pyle, who received 187 votes.

New Assistant Agent Is Named For Floyd County

Richard C. Crow of Baird in Callahan County, has been named as Floyd County Assistant County Agricultural Agent, according to an announcement this week by Judge J. K. Holmes and Billy C. Gunter of Lubbock, district agricultural agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Crow will assume the duties of the position on July 1. He replaces Mack Heald, who became county agricultural agent for Parmer county on June 1. The new agent is a spring graduate of Texas Tech University with a B.S. degree in agronomy. At Texas Tech he was a member of the Collegiate FFA Chapter and served as corresponding secretary of the Agronomy Club. He was also on the Dean's List.

During his youth Crow was active in FFA work at Baird High School. He was named Star Greenhand and Star Chapter Farmer and received the Lone Star Farmer degree. He was also a member of the livestock judging team and the National Honor Society.

Crow is married to the former Miss Sue Howard of Baird who teaches in the public school at Petersburg. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Frank Crow of Baird.

The new agent will be working with County Agricultural Agent, Joe Wilson, and County Home Demonstration Agent, Miss Sherry Mullin, in conducting adult and youth educational programs in Floyd County. Doyle Warren, associate county agricultural agent for Lubbock County, will replace Wilson July 16. Wilson is returning to Texas A&M University to complete his studies for a master's degree in agricultural education.

Handicapped Children's Camp This Week At Plains Assembly

The Plains Baptist Assembly south of Floydada is the site this week of a camp for children afflicted with muscular dystrophy and related diseases. Activities got underway Sunday and will continue through Saturday. Forty-six children from West Texas, southwestern Oklahoma and New Mexico are attending the camp, sponsored by the Muscular Dystrophy Association of America.

Each MD-handicapped child has a teenage attendant assigned to him, and other teenage volunteers serving as counselors and junior counselors are in charge of activities. Included in activities at camp are modified versions of swimming, riflery and archery, ground sports such as track, volleyball, softball and horseshoes, and arts and crafts, each tailored to the abilities of the handicapped children.

Special entertainment is featured each night. A K-9 demonstration by the Lubbock police department will be featured tonight (Thursday), with Awards Night and final campfire on Friday. This is the third year for SEE CAMP, PAGE 2

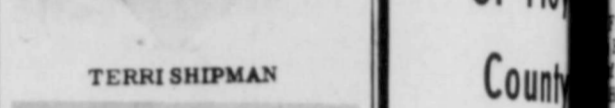

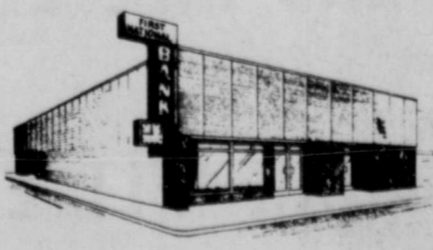

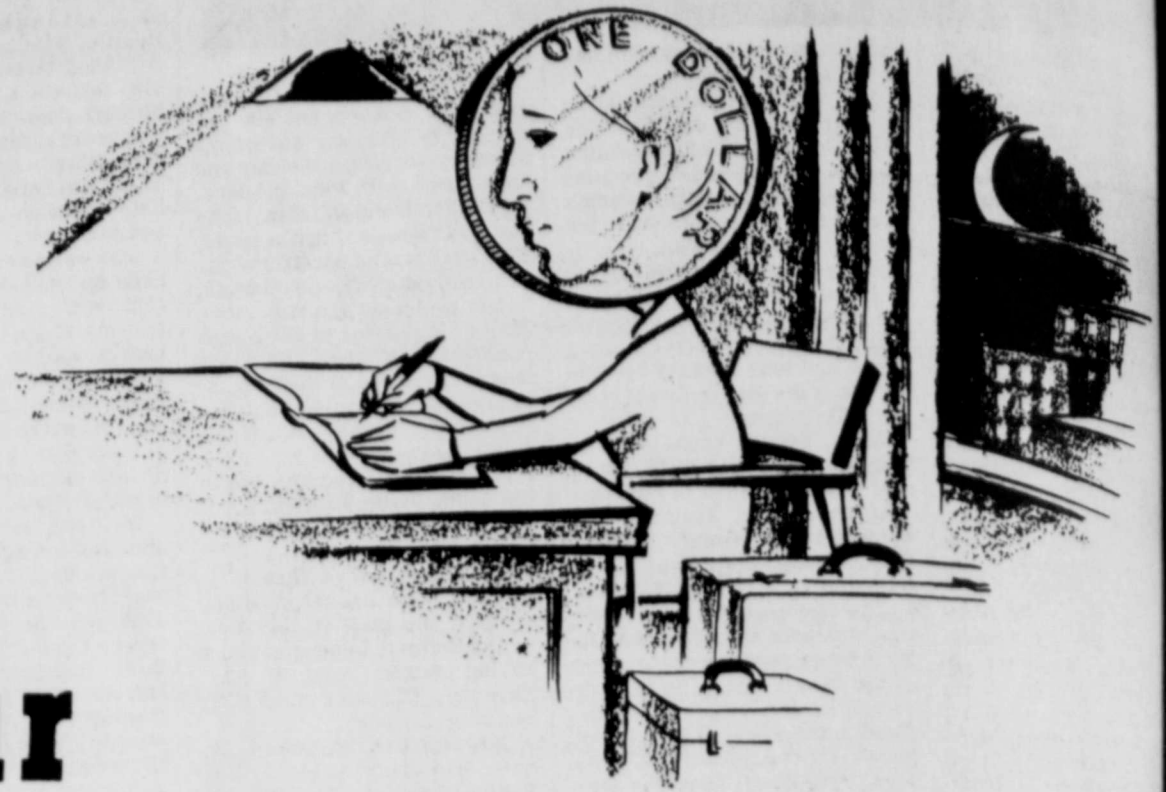

The study of genetics is fascinating, the genes, what they do to complexion, eye color, hair, long life, short life, tall, short and so forth.

I guess Andy McCoy didn't bother about such, possibly did not have an opportunity to read up on genetics. The early-day settlers for the most part had not much to read. Often only the Bible, a novel or two, a mail order catalog, even in well-regulated homes. A bachelor's quarters many times had no reading material at all, much less a study of genetics on the shelf. We had one or two early-day bachelors who were bookworms but Andy was not one of these.

I don't know from asking anybody at this late date when Andy showed up in this part of the world. It had to be in the late eighties or first part of the nineties, I feel sure, because he has a pre-emption survey named for him on the county map in the southwest part. Also McCoy School District and McCoy Voting Precinct were named for him.

I think when we came here and John Gravette were two bachelors I used to see sitting around at G. R. Griggs' John Wanamaker store, waiting for the wind to blow. The reason they waited for the wind to blow was for the windmill to turn. If the windmill turned it would grind corn in Mr. Griggs' grist mill. Otherwise they would do without meal until they came back another day.

A GOOD NEIGHBOR People of the community thought of Mr. McCoy as a good neighbor. He was a good hog raiser, he could catch carp if anybody could (on Blanco Canyon, where there was living water in those days). He had always a good dog, a hunter knowledgeable about hogs. Of the succession of good dogs he had one named Sorg, or that was the way it sounded to me.

Since his name was McCoy and he just showed up some of the folks wanted to have him be one of the McCoy's from Ken-

tucky, tired of feuding with the Hatfields. They said he kept too sharp an eye out for anybody coming his way not to be on the lookout. And they may have been right.

But the Smiths, Mr. and Mrs. W. W. and their family, who came here about the same time our family did, or a little later, got the impression Andy might be a Louisiana man. Anyway he was what you'd call regular people always until he did a thing that was most surprising.

One day Andy brought home a bride. Nobody new whether she was a mail order bride, a girl he had known in his youth, or what. She fitted in nicely, it seemed, a well-behaved, likeable person. And everything was fine and dandy until within a year or so, as often happens in such circumstances, she gave birth to a baby.

Things turned bad right quick. Just as soon as Mrs. McCoy was able to get around Andy had her bundle up her baby and get off the place. (Mrs. Melvin Day, now of Ralls, who was the eldest child in the Smith household, also recalls this.)

Mrs. McCoy, only something more than a year before a blushing bride, came trundling down the road pushing her baby

buggy ahead of her, to the Smith home. The Smiths compassionately took her in to their home until she could write to her people for money to come home, wherever home was.

Andy was of dark hair, dark complexion. He knew good and well a fair-haired baby was not any child of his.

August 1 is the final date to certify, but if you have measured your crops or have had measuring service, you may report. A farm is subject to spot check any time after certification, so remember that the acres you certify must be accurately measured. You cannot plow up cotton or grain after you certify.

WHAT DO YOU REALLY KNOW ABOUT EGGS?

Eggs play such a commonplace, taken for granted, role in the life of most every U.S. citizen that many shoppers simply pick up a carton from their grocer's display case with never a thought about size, quality or freshness. Here are some questions and answers which might prove interesting and at the same time provide up to date and correct information on the buying and storing of eggs.

Answer true or false, and then check with the answers provided.

1. A U.S. Grade A Large egg is better than a U.S. Grade A Medium egg.

2. You should never use a dirty or cracked egg in an egg-nog.

3. To keep their quality store eggs promptly and large end up in the refrigerator.

4. A U.S. Grade B egg will be just as nutritious as a U.S. Grade A egg.

5. All eggs in a carton marked "Large" are identical in size.

6. Not all cartons marked "Grade A" have been officially graded by the Federal State Grading Service.

7. Eggs are no good after a week in the refrigerator.

8. If you want to serve poached eggs, U.S. Grade AA or A eggs would be your best choice.

9. Shell color does not affect the nutritive value or quality of an egg.

10. Leftover egg yolks should be covered with cold water before storing in the refrigerator.

Check your answers with those below, and if each correct answer means a prize of one egg, how big an omelet could you make.

1. False. A large egg is bigger than a medium egg, not better. Size refers to the weight of the egg; the grade refers to the quality.

2. True. Eggs eaten uncooked - as in an egg-nog - should always be clean and shouldn't be cracked. This is just to provide an extra safeguard against possible contamination by bacteria. Never buy cracked or dirty eggs. USDA-graded eggs will be clean and sound-shelled and will be safe to use for all purposes. If one becomes cracked accidentally, use it only in thoroughly cooked dishes. Don't use dirty eggs for any purpose.

3. True. Keeping eggs large end up will keep the yolk from sticking to the shell and keep their natural quality longer. Keeping them in the refrigerator is essential to keep the egg's natural quality. Get the eggs under refrigeration as soon as possible. Holding them for any length of time in a warm place can result in quality loss.

4. True. The Grade B egg many not look quite as nice as the Grade A egg if you fry or poach it, but it will be just as

nutritious.

5. False. If a carton of USDA-graded eggs is labeled "Large," all the eggs together must weigh at least 24 ounces. There may be some slight variation between individual eggs, but rarely should any be smaller than the average of "Large," 2 oz. per egg. If you find apparent disparity in egg sizes, chances are you'll have some eggs larger than the average marked, not smaller. Here are the minimum weights per dozen for commonly sold sizes. Extra large, 27 ounces; large, 24 ounces; medium, 21 ounces; small, 18 ounces.

6. True. Only egg cartons marked with the official USDA grade shield have been officially graded under the Federal-State grading service. Eggs marked simply "Grade A" are supposed to meet State or local standards for quality which usually are based on Federal standards.

7. False. Eggs will lose some quality (appearance) after a week in the refrigerator, but they will usually still be just as good in taste and in nutritive value. To prevent off-taste, don't store eggs next to cheese, citrus, fish, or other aromatic foods.

8. True. U.S. Grade AA and A eggs have high standing yolks, and thick whites and won't spread out in the pan. These highest quality eggs would be best for poaching or frying.

9. True. Shell color is determined by the breed of hen. It does not affect the nutritive value or quality of an egg.

10. True. Leftover egg yolks should be covered with cold water and stored in the refrigerator in a tightly closed container and used within a day or two. Don't cover the egg whites with water.

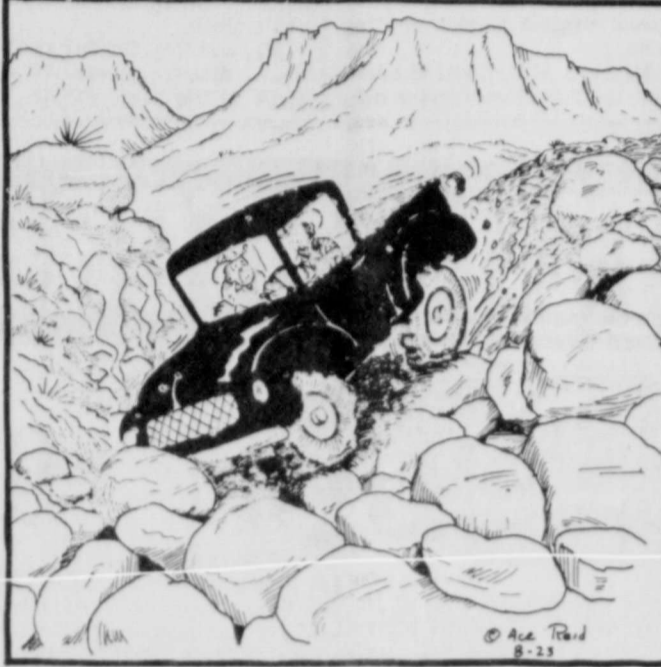
