nature has shown the people of West Texas and the Panhandle just how destructive it can be. So far no one has been able to stop or detour its most vicious storm, the tornado.

Most people are never effected by this destroyer of property and taker of human life. but when this does happen, the Civil Air Patrol, Red Cross and local emergency organizations swing into operation to assist and render aid anywhere and any way possible. In this direction the Floydada Composite Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol has channelled its energy and its limited funds.

To increase effectiveness to the area towns, every member of the squadron has his own citizens (band (CB) radio with the capability of contacting the Emergency Operations Center (EOC), REACT, and the Civil Defense. These radios are bought and maintained out of the members' own pockets.

In this area a need arises for a more powerful radio, a single side band (SSB), This radio is used in conjunction with the Red Cross in sending emergency messages all over the world.

The squadron is in the process of obtaining a vehicle on which to mount the SSB, along with a CB and aircraft radio. This will be a four-wheeldrive communications vehicle on call 24 hours a day 365 days a year to assist in any local disaster. Also included

will be a jeep, a 2 1/2 - ton truck, and a portable generator. This, along with rescue equipment already in use by the squadron, will make the Floydada squadron the most effective rescue unit in the area. This area is the major concern of the squadron's rescue op-

In order to get the money to buy the single side band radio and insurance for the vehicles, the squadron must ask for sponsors in the area it serves. With the help of local sponsors, the Floydada CAP can become an effective organization that can help in case a tornado or other disaster strikes another

Each sponsor who donates over \$5 receives an attractive 8x10 plaque which shows him to be a supporter of the CAP. Individuals or firms who wish to become a sponsor should send their name and address to: Floydada Composite Squadron, Box 85, Floydada Texas 79235; or call (806) 983-5232.
