when I visited the first picnic they had. The late Dr. Kimble and John Kimble have fitted me with several pairs of glasses. And the late Dr. Thacker pulled purt ny all of my teeth and I know quite a lot of folks in and around there. In the early days my Daddy operated a blacksmith shop here in Petersburg and did work for a lot of the old timers of western Floyd Co. such as Grandpa Carr, in which Carrs Chapel Church was named for, Uncle Dave Allmon for which the Allmon Community was named after, Grandpa McCoy of the McCoy community and many many others of the early day settlers,

I liked to sit around my Daddys shop and listen to them tell of the hardships they had to bear in the olden days; they would load a wagon of maize heads in the afternoon, get up real early next morning, for Floydada they would head, Sometimes it would be so cold with a blue Norther blowing they would have to walk on the south side of the wagon to keep from freezing. You just couldn't sit on a load of maize and brave one of our old time blue northers we used to have here. When they got to town they had their maize weighed up and after unloading it most of the time in a box car, they would drive a ways down the railroad and shovel a ton or more of coal into their wagons and head for home, arriving most of the time quite a while after dark. Sometimes they had to go to the house and thaw out before they could unhitch their team and feed them.

How lucky our present generation is to have all the modern ways to do things. Can't you just picture one of our present day farmers walking fifteen or twenty miles along the side of a wagon load of maize? That was a hard way to serve the Lord but on top of all the hardships folks in those days enjoyed life as well and maybe better then some do nowadays. They had their good old time revivals with dinner all day and preaching on the ground as they would say in those days.

About once a week there would be a party at some neighbor's home and all the young folks were invited. They would play a lot of games and every so often the party would wind up by opening up a ten gallon can of ice cream that someone had gone to town and bought, and all of the boys would chip in and pay them for the trip and ice cream. They also had picnics, old time threshing days, guilting parties where you could get the latest in community happenings. In those days there were fewer people and lived quite a distance apart and they were just glad to see one another at any place or time.

Well I could just go on and on telling about pioneer life on these plans of West Texas, and maybe some time I will write some more if Mr. Tooley don't object.



Do inverted air masses cause tornadoes? Are the causes of tornadoes all known and under-

Many weather experts (if there are any) agree that inverted air masses make for tornado conditions. This is logical from the standpoint that heavier air falling through to lower altitudes is likely to set off all sorts of disturbances and

The varied causes of tornadoes are not fully understoodeven with all the modern scientific knowledge and weather satellites at our disposal. The theory that inverted air masses produce tornadoes is one of several. This theory holds that heavier air, pouring down, gets turned, or twisted, in a whirlwind manner, and creates one or more tornadoes.

The inversion and the rushing and falling air masses might cover an area of approximately one hundred miles or more, while the small tornadoes created might be separated by many miles, some never touching the surface of the earth. One small tornado, either bouncing off the surface or staying above, is often the result of an inversion-though several are more often produced.

### **NEWS FOR** HOMEMAKERS

This and other questions frequently confront homemakers who have a home freezer.

There is no easy "yes" or "no" answer, according to U.S. Department of Agriculture ex-

The answer can be found only by making a careful comparison of costs among the alternatives available to you.

Basically, you have three choices in buying meat for the freezer; buying a whole carcass, side or quarter; buying wholesale cuts (loin, round chuck, etc.; or buying retail

Making this decision is the subject of a booklet prepared by USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service. It is called, "How to buy Meat for Your Freezer." The information provided in the booklet is intended primarily to answer the questions most frequently asked by consumer-buyers -those relating to costs, grades, kinds of cuts and usable meat.

For instance, the booklet tells you that cutting loss of a beef carcass could vary from 20 to 30 percent or more, A 25 percent cutting loss which is not unusual, means that a 300 pound side of beef could yield 225 pounds of usable meat

A rule of thumb for carcass beef is 25 percent waste, 25 percent ground beef and stew meat, 25 percent steaks and 25 percent roasts.

Take a hard look at advertisements which offer meat for the home freezer at bargain prices. False and misleading advertising of bulk meat "bargains" have caught the eye of the Federal Trade Commission which is responsible for protecting the public from unfair methods of competition,

Here are some suggestions from foods and nutrition specialists at Texas A&M University to help you buy bulk meat.

1. Has the meat been graded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture? What quality grade? At what yield grade? Ask to see the stamps on the

meat. 2. Remember that bulk meat is customarily sold at its "handling" or uncut weight: there will be considerable weight loss after the meat is cut and trimmed and bone and waste removed. The useable meat can amount to less than half of the bulk weight, depending on what parts of the carcass you are buying and upon the individual animal.

3. If an attempt is made to "switch" you from advertised meat to more expensive meat, don't buy until you have had a chance to check the prices per pound with comparable meat you could buy elsewhere.

4. If you decide to buy meat on credit, find out to whom your promissory note must be paid, whether interest and carrying charges will be added to your payments and how much they will be.

Above all, remember that you cannot use misconduct by the seller as a defense if a collection suit is brought against you by a third party to whom the seller later transfers the note,

5. Before dealing with a bulk meat dealer, find out what kind of reputation he has, Has he satisfied other customers? Has he Better Business Bureau received complaints about him? Ask him for the names of other customers he has served and check with them.

6. If you do get cheated, don't take it lying down. Write a letter giving all the facts to your local public prosecutor, state Attorney General, or the Federal Trade Commission.

This won't get your money back, but it can serve to enable your government to persuade the operators that their practices must come to an end.






